Young lady to compete in pageant

NFL Hall of Famer Jim Brown confirmed as GOOD speaker

 Former Cleveland Browns running back will headline April 22 fundraiser at Rio Hondo Event Center.

DOWNEY - Hall of Fame running back Jim Brown, a three-time NFL MVP who has dedicated the past two decades to saving troubled children and adults from a life of crime and self-destruction, will serve as the keynote speaker at the April 22 Gangs Out of Downey luncheon at the Rio Hondo Event Center.

Brown's appearance was confirmed at GOOD's regular meeting this week.

Brown is expected to speak on the Amer-I-Can program, a selfhelp training program he founded in 1988. The program addresses several life issues, including drug and alcohol abuse, family relationships, emotional control, decisionmaking, goal-setting, and more.

The program operates in a peer group setting with the help of a trained facilitator. Amer-I-Can has been successfully implemented in prisons, juvenile halls, probation camps, school campuses, and local communities, officials said.

Sponsored by a grant from Mace Siegel, Amer-I-Can opened an office at Stonewood Center last vear.

Brown used a combination of

Brown was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1971, and was named by Sporting News as the greatest NFL player of all time.

The luncheon is GOOD's main fundraising event of the year and sells out annually. Ticket information is forthcoming.





Residents warned of tax scam

DOWNEY – Los Angeles County officials are warning homeowners to be wary of solicitations from private companies offering to file property assessment reduction forms for a hefty fee.

Property assessments can be done by the county's Assessor's Department for free.

"We are again receiving calls from homeowners who have been

sent these deceptive mailers, many of which could be mistaken for government notices and mislead property owners into thinking they must pay at least \$100 to apply for a review of their assessed value," said Los Angeles County Assessor Rick Auerbach. "Because of the real estate market downturn, however, my office will begin reviewing nearly 500,000 residential

properties for their 2009 assessed values.

"We don't charge a fee for this," Auerbach continued, "and anyone whose homes are reviewed will receive a letter in June notifying them of the results."

One firm is charging \$179 to file a decline-in-value application,





as well as a "late fee" of \$30. The company is the subject of investigations in several counties, Auerbach said.

"What is particularly disturbing about the latest solicitation from this firm is that it misleads the homeowner by mixing up years. The mailer states that the firm will represent the homeowner in an assessment appeal, when in fact, the last date to appeal was November 30th," Auerbach said. "If the soliciation is for 2009, assessments have not yet been made. Therefore, this firm won't know what the 2009 assessed value is until after our review of the 500,000 homes is completed in June and the homeowner is notified.

"At best, these are legal but sophisticated scams taking advantage of homeowners who don't understand that my office will do a reassessment on its own," Auerbach said. "Or anyone can file a simple application form available on our website...This can be completed in a few minutes. The form suggests including comparable sales if known, but that section can be left blank and we will still do the review.

"At worst, these private soliciations may even violate laws which require very specific language and disclaimers that they are not being sent by a goverment agency," Auerbach continued. While anyone has the right to file a decline-in-value application requesting a review of their property's value, Auerbach urged those who bought their house or condo in 2002 or later to wait until June when the results of the review will be mailed.

If a letter is not received, or the owner is not satisfied with the results of the review, a decline-in-value application can be submitted.



However, DACC also recognizes that additional responsibilities are crucial in order to maximize the quality of life for a pet. Pet owners must understand what it means to be a "responsible pet owner." DACC has included a list of tips that can help make everyone a responsible pet owner.

• Spaying or neutering your pet: The benefit of spaying and neutering is not only the best solution to controlling pet over- population, but it can also help prevent certain cancers and diseases in your pet. Spaying or neutering saves you money for pet license fees and it is the law in most of Los Angeles County.

· Licensing your pets: California law requires that every dog four

months of age or older must have a current license fastened to its collar, and be vaccinated against rabies. Making sure your pet has its current license is also one of the best ways to have your pet returned to you in case he or she becomes lost.

· Getting your animal microchipped: Besides having your pet licensed, a microchip provides an added layer of protection. In the event that your animal gets lost, the microchip can help reunite you with your animal by a simple scan of the animal. Microchips are an important additional identification tool, as tags can be lost or damaged. All six of our shelters offer free microchip clinics.

How to stop being greedy

B usinesses are currently the subject of conflicting popular emotions: we feel anger towards those banks that got us all into the current economic mess and sympathy for those companies that are going bust because of it. So it's time to take a hard look at companies' greed.

To get through this crisis to a better way of doing things, we need to recognize greed. While most of us readily admit to faults in the areas of food and sex, we tend to see greed as a quality in other people rather than in ourselves. We see it in the mega rich with their conspicuous spending, in city executives with their huge bonuses or in corrupt politicians taking bribes. We think that all greedy people are corrupt or rich, probably both, and since we're neither corrupt nor rich, logically, we are not greedy. By thinking like this, we avoid facing our own greed. We fail to see that greed is not an all-or-nothing event; it is a thought that exists on a spectrum from weak to strong but it affects us all to some extent. It is a subtle influence constantly present in all the decisions that everybody makes about material things. Our communal happiness and our individual happiness depend on our ability to acknowledge and curb our greed.

It comes as a surprise to most people when they discover that greed was a problem for the first Christian monks and nuns. After all, these monks and nuns had purposely chosen to give up all material wealth and, in the case of some of them, very considerable wealth. Yet those who were poor by choice still had to wrestle with thoughts about wanting more, just as those who become rich by choice are often driven by a demonic desire for still more wealth.

Here are three steps to restrain greed:

1. Recognize how it works for you

We all have a spontaneous understanding of how gluttony and lust work but we need guidance to understand greed. Greed is about the attraction of wealth and begins with apparently harmless thoughts: "what I have at present is not good enough and needs replacing." Sometimes this is, of course, true: if the bucket has a hole in it, you need a new bucket; if the dress is very old, get a new one. But, so often, that's not the case; it's just that we really fancy the latest iPod or the latest fashion. Fashion is the hardest one to call: we can condemn our children to misery if we make them wear old-fashioned clothes but we still need to prevent them growing up impulsively buying the hottest new thing. If children only deal with greed by getting what they want, then they grow up to be miserable adults because even when they're wealthy, they'll still want more. And notice that even our language links unhappiness and avarice: the word miser is the root of miserable. Each of us needs to recognize and contain our own greed if we are to live happy and fulfilled lives.

2. Tell yourself a better story

Greed is the product of our imagination, not of our bodies. The attraction of food and sex is different from the attraction of wealth: humans are hard wired to respond physically when food and sex are attractively presented, but the same is not true of money. Once life's basic necessities have been met, the rest is determined by each person's description of the good life, their personal story. Someone can leave a marriage partner to have a wealthier lifestyle, somebody can get into debt in order to keep up with their neighbors, children can fret that they don't have the latest video game. We have to avoid the pitfalls of distorted descriptions of happiness that actually lead to frustration. We need to describe to ourselves a good life that is balanced, long-term and generous, the opposite of the consumer good life that is indulgent, short-term and self-centered.

3. Take stock of your life, literally

Once a year in Lent, English Benedictine monks have the custom of writing out "a poverty bill." They write down an inventory of everything they have for their personal use and hand it to the abbot. It's a very revealing exercise and enables them to ask: do I need all this? An excellent rule of thumb is this: if you haven't used an item in the last twelve months since the last poverty bill, then you probably don't need it, so you can give it away.

Dietetic Association urges committment to healthy lifestyle

CHICAGO – The American Dietetic Association has released an updated position statement on weight management calling for people to make a "lifelong commitment to healthful lifestyle behaviors" that includes the prevention of weight gain.

The statement also urges ADA members - primarily registered dietitians and dietetic technicians - to take an active role in addressing the country's obesity epidemic through partnerships among health professionals, government, schools and other organizations.

ADA's statement, which has been endorsed by the American College of Sports Medicine, is published in the February issue of the Journal of the American Dietetic Association and represents ADA's official position on weight management: It is the position of the American Dietetic Association that successful weight management to improve overall health for adults requires a lifelong commitment to healthful lifestyle behaviors emphasizing sustainable and enjoyable eating practices and daily physical activity.

While the wording of this statement is identical to ADA's last weight management position issued in 2002, it is accompanied by a new 17-page evidence-based review of the latest research and interventions. That includes updated information on weight-loss surgery and weight-loss obesity affect the health and quality of life in all segments of the population, increasing health-care costs and putting significant burdens on our society," said registered dietitian and ADA Spokesperson Elisa Zied. "This new position provides guidance to ADA members who are uniquely qualified to improve the health of the public through effective weight management interventions and strategic partnerships."

Highlights of ADA's 2009 weight management position statement include:

•The importance of weight gain prevention and the challenge of weight loss maintenance in addition to the necessary continued attention on the implementation of effective weight loss interventions.

•The value of the unique contribution ADA members can make through collaborations with other health-care providers, government agencies, scientific organizations, schools, and community organizations to create social and environmental solutions to the epidemic of overweight and obesity.







DOWNEY - Downey's hole keeps getting deeper as far as playoff hopes go.

Losing games that needed to be won is not helping their cause as Downey dropped another one last Friday, 70-62, against Paramount.

The Vikings (12-11, 1-5) have a daunting task ahead of them if they plan on touching any hardwood come mid-February. After finishing a three-game home stand, Downey has to battle on the road if they plan on getting into the postseason, but boy's basketball head coach Larry Shelton's confidence is a bit shook.

"Right now this team does not deserve to go to the playoffs," said Shelton, who acknowledged he was very disappointed in his team's play. "We had three big games in league that we had to win and we came up empty so playoffs are something we don't want to talk about right now."

Shelton's team was plagued by poor shooting in the first quarter which buried the team from the outset. Downey made only three field goals in the quarter and scored only seven points. By the time the quarter was over, Paramount had already established a 14 point lead which was too steep of a mountain for Downey to climb.

The biggest blow taken in the first quarter was when forward Matt Taylor retaliated after being elbowed by a Paramount player.

As it so often happens, it's the response by the second player that is always caught by the officials. Taylor, who at the time was Downey's leading scorer, threw an elbow at the player who hit him and was immediately ejected from the game at the 1:43 mark in the quarter.

Downey crept back in the game slowly but surely, getting within six points at different junctures behind double-digit scoring from Matt Black, 13 points, and Royal Walker, 16 points, but was never able to push over the top.

Shooting fewer than 30 percent from the 3-point line also frustrated the Vikings. Their first 3-point make didn't come until the early parts of the third quarter. After that, they made only two more from behind the arc, which is very uncharacteristic of this team.

Shelton said Paramount had a great game plan and that a reason why they struggled from behind the line was because the Pirates switched on every screen defensively, putting pressure on the shooters.

Ultimately, according to Shelton, it wasn't the 3-point shooting, or the ejection of Taylor that lost the game. It was getting behind way too early.

"My kids are always going to battle but we don't have a lot of depth, we don't have much size, and we dug ourselves a little bit too much of a hole to come out of," he said. "You can't do that in this league and expect to be successful."

Shelton believes his team needs to get back to their philosophy if they want to be successful.

"We have to try to get better," he said. "We have two weeks. We know what we're up against. We have really tough games ahead of us. I'm just going to try to emphasize to the kids about going back and doing what we teach particularly on the defensive end. We've been giving up too many points and that's not like us."

Downey will be home for the last time tonight against Lynwood. Then in the final week, they'll be at Warren and at Gahr for their finale.

CSULB fees ranks among state's lowest

LONG BEACH - Adding credence to its recent ranking among the top 50 "Best Value" public colleges in the nation by "The Princeton Review," officials at Cal State Long Beach released national data this week showing that CSULB fees are the lowest of any four-year institution in California and the lowest among all 23 campuses of the California State University (CSU) system.

For 2008-09, the national average cost of attending a four-year public university was \$6,585 while the national average of attending a private institution reached \$25,143. By comparing those rates to the 2008-09 average cost of enrolling at a University of California campus, which was \$8,007, or one of the 23 CSU campuses, which averaged \$3,849 for the year, CSULB at \$3,392 was one of the nation's best university values, college officials said.

Even within the CSU, the cost of attending CSULB is lower than the rest, in some cases much lower. The second lowest resident undergraduate student fee at a CSU campus in 2008-09 was at CSU Monterey Bay, where full-time undergraduate students paid \$3,535 or \$143 more than at Long Beach.

At the other end of the spectrum, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo had the highest student fees in the CSU system at \$5,043 for 2008-09. All University of California institutions charged considerably higher rates than all CSU institutions.

nomic necessity for every child and student in the years to come," said F. King Alexander, president of CSULB. "Many of our students are among the first in their families to go to college, and they come from a wide array of diverse socio-economic backgrounds.

"We have thousands of middle and lower income students who would not be able to afford a university education if they lived in a state other than California. So, the issue of affordability is paramount, but it is also indisputably linked to the public commitment on the part of California taxpayers and legislators to keep it this way."

Although its fees are the lowest, CSULB has been recognized the past five years by "U.S. News & World Report" as one of the top five public comprehensive universities in the western United States. CSULB also attracts some of the brightest high school graduates in California through its President's Scholars Program, which has awarded more than 900 full scholarships to high school students.

"In addition to affordability, however, we also understand the value of providing a well-rounded and high quality education to our students," Alexander said. "It is this reputation that makes Cal State Long Beach one of the largest universities in the nation and California in terms of student enrollment. If we didn't provide a quality experience, students wouldn't want to come here, and their parents wouldn't want them here.'

The difference within the CSU system is in the mandatory campus fees. While all 23 CSU campuses charged a state university fee of \$3,048 for full-time undergraduate students - the lowest system student fee in the nation - each campus has its own set of additional campus fees, which averaged \$801 system wide for 2008-09. CSULB campus-based fees were only \$344 for this year.

Campus fees are charged for a variety of university services that are not covered by state fees, including health services, technology enhancements and other instructionally related activities. Campus fees may also support
