Couple charged with cashing checks for gang members

DOWNEY – A man and woman who obtained more than \$20,000 in unemployment benefits for incarcerated gang members, including one awaiting trial for murder, were sentenced to state prison Tuesday.

Norwalk Superior Court Judge Robert Higa sentenced each to five years in prison and ordered them to pay full restitution of \$22,087 plus interest.

Juan Leonard Garcia, 48, of Pico Rivera, and Sandra Muro Jaimez, 46, of Downey, each pleaded guilty to making false unemployment insurance claims. Garcia also pleaded guilty to two counts of second-degree burglary, while Jaimez pleaded guilty to one count each of possession for sale of methamphetamine and felony child abuse.

The defendants, along with a third woman who pleaded guilty last year to a conspiracy count, submitted false unemployment insurance claims and cashed biweekly state unemployment checks for almost two years.

Garcia is the father of Anthony Garcia, a Rivera 13 gang member who currently is serving a 65-year-to-life prison term for a Pico Rivera murder. Authorities said that from October 2008 to August 2010, the defendants received and cashed biweekly unemployment checks on behalf of the younger Garcia, who because he was in jail was ineligible to receive EDD assistance.

Proceeds from the checks were shared by the defendants, the younger Garcia and other gang members in the Los Angeles County Jail.

Police hunt for double homicide suspects

DOWNEY – Two people were stabbed and shot to death after an altercation at George's Bar spilled onto Florence Avenue early Sunday morning.

The victims were identified in news reports as Isaac Perez, 31, and Raymond Contreras, 34.

Officers were dispatched to George's Bar, located at 7857 Florence Ave., after receiving reports of a stabbing at about 2 a.m., said Lt. Mark McDaniel of the Downey Police Department.

The fight started in the parking lot but spilled onto the street, where one of the suspects pulled a handgun and shot both victims.

Paramedics transported the victims to a hospital where they were declared dead.

The suspects, who were described only as males, fled westbound on Florence Avenue.

A witness eating at Tacos Mexico told ABC-7 she heard three gunshots.

"The next thing you know some of the guys inside said, 'Something's going down outside.' We heard three gunshots, and by that time everybody in the restaurant was on the floor," the witness, identified only as Betty, told the news station.

Downey art gallery profiled on 'Vista L.A.'

• Program to highlight Stay Gallery, at the center of Downey's cultural resurgence.

DOWNEY – "Vista L.A.," the long-running ABC-7 news magazine highlighting Southern California's dynamic Latino community, will feature Stay Gallery and its efforts to galvanize Downtown Downey on its show this Sunday.

The program airs at 11:30 a.m.

"Vista L.A." is produced by Jessica Dominguez, a Warren High graduate who grew up in Downey and now lives in Whittier. She said she hadn't heard of Stay Gallery until her younger brother discovered the facility on Facebook and prodded her to look into it.

"My brother told me they were doing interesting things and that it looked exciting," Dominguez recalled. After researching the gallery, she was inspired by what she saw.

"I heard their passion and saw

three people who wholeheartedly, 100 percent believed in this," Dominguez said, referring to executive director Valentin Flores, operations director Joseph Manacmul and creative director Gabriel Enamorado. "It made me excited for them.

"These kids – I call them kids but they are young men – are coming back to Downey instead of leaving, and contributing back in a way that is really relevant and forward-thinking. They are trying to engage their generation, which from a business perspective makes a lot of sense."

Stay Gallery opened last October with financial support from the city of Downey, which was looking to harvest the city's artistic talent.

The segment on "Vista L.A." will show how the gallery is driving a cultural resurgence downtown through its hosting of art exhibits, plays and community gatherings, Dominguez said.

"I saw a story that was relevant, a story that would entertain people and a story that would hopefully inspire people," she said. "The fact that I grew up in Downey, I feel proud. I thought, 'How awesome is it that these kids are trying to come

back to Downey.' They believe that through art and culture, the downtown will succeed."

Flores, the executive director, said the gallery just completed its first capital fundraising campaign of \$20,000. A \$2,800 donation from Dominicus Dental Center put the campaign over the top.

"He is someone that is grounded in our community and believed in us from the very start," Flores said of dentist Dr. Luis Dominicus. "He's all about Downey."

In its first six months of operation, the gallery has already formed strategic partnerships with local businesses, non-profits and residents.

Flores said the gallery is now entering "the most challenging phase of our development," launching "key community programs that will civically engage all sectors of our community." The gallery has plans to partner with the Downey Unified School District, Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center and the city's Parks and Recreation Department for joint programs and special events.

"We are thrilled with the community support we have received, which is allowing us to develop and coordinate these high impact programs for our community," Flores said. "It's about to get really fun in Downtown Downey."

Meanwhile, the gallery's latest exhibit, "Barely Even Human," celebrates its opening night Friday, March 22.

The exhibit features work by prolific graffiti artists Made Rindu and Matthew "Nacho" Ward, who "manage to warp what is perceived and natural into something terrifying and surreal."

The grand opening is from 8 p.m. to midnight and will feature food, drinks and live entertainment.

"Barely Even Human" will be exhibited through April 12.

Stay Gallery is located at 11140 Downey Ave., diagonally across the street from the new Downey Gateway project.

School board renames East Middle School after Doty

• Campus will be named Wendy Lopour Doty Middle School starting in September.

DOWNEY – In recognition of Dr. Wendy Doty's service to the Downey Unified School District, the school board voted last month to rename East Middle School after the outgoing superintendent who started her teaching career at the campus nearly 30 years ago.

"A number of us thought of it once she announced her retirement," said Donald LaPlante, president of the DUSD board of education. "We named buildings after the last three superintendents that retired so we all thought of it."

However, some local residents, including alumni, are petitioning the school board, protesting the name change in the hope of preserving the pride and tradition of the nearly 60-year-old middle school.

An online petition, created by Downey resident Sergio Vasquez, has garnered more than 170 signatures as of Thursday, but LaPlante defends the change as an appropriate and well-deserved honor.

"We wouldn't think of naming schools with names, but East and West, those are directions," LaPlante said. "It's the same school with a new name, Wendy Lopour Doty Middle School."

Interestingly enough, history reveals that the DUSD has a habit of naming its schools after local educators who have helped shape the legacy of the school district.

Before Downey schools consolidated under one unified school district, the city was split up into several districts with elementary, middle, and high schools under different jurisdictions.

During his tenure, Elbert Warren Ward provided sound leadership and vision for the growing Alameda School District.

In 1923, Ward became principal at Alameda Elementary School and would leave a lasting legacy at the school and the district.

After more than 15 years at Alameda Elementary, Ward went on to become the superintendent of the Alameda School District, ultimately retiring in 1955. But of all the elementary districts in Downey, Alameda grew to become the largest.

In honor of Ward, the E.W. Ward Elementary School was opened in 1952. The Alameda District also oversaw the construction of the Ed Lewis School in 1950, C.C. Carpenter School in 1952, and A. L. Gaudin School in 1956. Imperial School, named after the street it runs

along, opened in 1954.

The Downey District meanwhile added Spencer V. Williams School, named in honor of a local educator, and Rio San Gabriel School, which was constructed near a river of the same name, in 1952. Years earlier, Rio Hondo Elementary School, named for the eponymous river nearby, was built along Rives Avenue.

Founded by early settlers that once occupied north Downey, Gallatin Elementary School was moved in 1893 to the site it still occupies today on the corner of Brookshire Avenue and Gallatin Road.

From 1937 to 1942, Maude Price and Edith Unsworth were the only teachers at Gallatin Elementary School. During this time, Mrs. Unsworth taught the lower grades and Mrs. Price taught the upper grades.

Both Price and Unsworth have schools now bearing their names as a testament to their influence on the Downey education system.

With the influx of new students, new junior high schools were needed. On May 1, 1952, South Junior High School was dedicated as the first separate junior high school. In July of 2001, South was renamed after Dr. Edward Sussman, former DUSD superintendent and principal at the school.

In 1953, students began attending North Junior High School, renamed Gordon Griffiths Middle School in 1966. Griffiths was principal of the school when he died earlier that year. East Junior High School was formed in 1954.

By 1957, a second senior high school, Earl Warren High School, named for United States Chief Justice Earl Warren, and a fourth junior high school, West Junior High School opened their doors.

In 1956, the elementary school districts merged with the Downey Union High School District, which established the junior high schools in the city, to create the Downey Unified School District known today.

When the school board announced its decision to rename East Middle School, LaPlante recalls Doty being quite emotional.

"She was tremendously honored," he said. "It's the highest honor as an educator to have a school named after you and East is the school where she started."

According to LaPlante, the change will take effect starting next school year.

"Over the summer we'll fix the signs and there will definitely be a ceremony in September where we'll unveil a plaque," he said. "Over time, everyone will understand this wasn't a random choice...students will be very happy once they get to know her."

Disaster training offered to Downey residents

DOWNEY – The Downey Fire Department will begin its next round of CERT training for local residents April 6.

CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) is a free program in which residents ages 18 and older are trained to respond in the event of a neighborhood disaster.

Residents are trained in disaster preparedness, fire suppression, medical operations, damage assessment, light search and rescue, team organization, disaster psychology and disaster simulation.

After they are trained, CERT members may be called upon to assess damage after a disaster, extinguish small fires and teach fire safety, perform triage and provide medical services to the injured, gather supplies, and more.

"There is a very good chance that your neighborhood will be on its own during the early stages following a catastrophic disaster," fire officials said. "After a catastrophic disaster, citizens will volunteer to help. Without proper training, these people can expose themselves and others to potential injury and even death."

To become CERT-certified, residents must attend three days of training – April 6, 13 and 20, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. – at the Barbara J. Riley Community and Senior Center. Training is free.



The Four Preps bringing oldies back to Downey

DOWNEY – The Four Preps, an all-male quartet that amassed eight gold singles and three platinum albums over a career that has spanned several decades, will perform at the Downey Theatre on Sunday, April 14.

The Four Preps have performed in front of sold out audiences around the world but for band member Bob Duncan, the Downey performance is something extra special.

"Coming back to Downey is really a sentimental journey for me," Duncan said. "A great part of my young life unfolded in this town."

In 1967, fresh from four years as a regular on the "Lawrence Welk Show," Duncan assumed the post of youth minister and choir director at First Baptist Church of Downey.

Duncan left First Baptist in 1974 and relocated to Camarillo, embarking on a 20-year stint as leader of The Diamonds, performing their smash hits "Little Darlin'" and "Silhouettes" for audiences around the globe.

Then in 2007, Duncan was approached by Bruce Belland, co-founder and lead singer of The Four Preps, about joining his re-formed

edition of the group. Duncan readily accepted.

The collaboration led to a featured spot on the PBS special "Magic Moments" and has taken the Preps to renewed heights of popularity and performances from coast to coast.

DOWNEY – Matthew Paulson has been a client at The Arc - Los Angeles and Orange Counties for 15 years and as far as he’s concerned, he wouldn’t have it any other way.

From the employment services to adult education, Paulson says his life would be different today had it not been for the 57-year-old organization where he’s now a part of the Community Integrated Training program.

Founded in 2010, CIT helps clients expand their horizons through social interaction and community involvement. For Paulson, social engagement means one thing: bowling.

“I’m going to state,” exclaimed Paulson, who is part of a Special Olympics bowling league. “We have tournaments on the road in Torrance, Fountain Valley, and last October we hosted one at Del Rio Lanes in Downey.”

This year, Paulson finished on top during a regional tournament in Covina and has been given a spot in the state tournaments in Sacramento.

“There are different districts and they compete with the other districts,” Paulson said. “They have first, second and third for individu-

als and teams...there are also special awards from past bowlers.”

While bowling isn’t an Olympic sport, it is considered to be among the most popular sport in the Special Olympics. It also proves beneficial since it ensures physical exercise, participation, and social integration at the same time.

Paulson, 38, says he has no problem getting two strikes in a row, but it’s that third that proves challenging.

“I’ve got to stay focused and keep the ball where I want it so I can get strikes,” he said. “I want three strikes in a row, a turkey. I’m still hunting for the trifecta.”

Like many programs at The Arc, CIT gives clients like Paulson the opportunity to enjoy life and engage the community in new ways.

“I’ve known Matthew for a couple of years. He has this personality... he’s not scared to try new things,” said Maribel Cerna, who oversees the CIT program. “It’s about experiencing life. Participants do things they wouldn’t be able to do outside – hobbies to help them feel independent in themselves.”

Administrators at The Arc are hopeful clients like Paulson inspire community members to participate in the annual Arc Walk for Independence, which supports children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Since 1997, the Arc Walk has raised funds and awareness for The Arc’s various educational and occupational programs by inviting com-

munity members to walk either a one or three-mile route around Stonewood Center.

Starting at 8 a.m. this Saturday, registered walkers who donate \$15 to The Arc will set out on the course, walking for independence.

Beginning at Acapulco Restaurant and Cantina, the 3-mile walk travels west on Firestone Boulevard to Lakewood Boulevard, up to Florence Avenue, around to Woodruff Avenue and back to Firestone. The Arc has seen its annual fundraising event grow from just 250 walkers in 1997 to nearly 4,000 last year.

Phillip Palmer of KABC Los Angeles will again serve as master of ceremonies this year.

Host sponsor Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe, Tredway, Lumsdaine & Doyle, Coca-Cola, Wescom Credit Union, Century 21-My Real Estate Co., Penske Toyota of Downey, and Stonewood Center are just some of the dozens of families, companies, and organizations banding together to support the annual fundraiser.

Paulson, who plans to do the walk with his girlfriend Yvonne, encourages the community to support the walk, which helps hundreds of people every year.

“It’s about being able to keep the programs going and having the community’s support,” he said. “Come and have a tour, see all the programs, and don’t forget the walk.”

Let's be smart about environmental justice

Communities all over California are facing tough challenges nowadays, some more than others. Clearly, the economy tops the list for most cities. But in disadvantaged communities and communities of color, environmental justice is also high on the radar screen.

But in advocating for environmental justice, government policies and programs should be scrutinized to make sure they are carefully balanced with the other needs of our communities so they can be effective without triggering unintended consequences that might prove harmful.

An example of such a program is "CalEnviroScreen," also known as the California Communities Environmental Health Screening Tool. Currently under development by the California Environmental Protection Agency, CalEnviroScreen will classify cities according to their level of environmental risk.

Sounds good so far, right? The problem is not with identifying communities with high environmental vulnerability, but in how that designation is used. If the data is used to help public agencies and the legislature determine which communities are eligible for state funds intended to alleviate the impacts of environmental inequities, it could be very useful.

But if that ranking is factored into decisions about business improvements or expansion, or about whether or not to allow new stores, homes, offices or industrial facilities to be built, it could deprive our communities of precisely the kind of investments they need to create jobs, fund essential public services and improve our downtowns and our neighborhoods.

How many times have you heard stories about projects that could bring jobs and services to our communities being delayed or even abandoned because of environmental challenges? It's one of the main reasons companies give when asked why they hesitate to locate in California.

Advance directive

Dear Editor:

In the last month, the press was ablaze with the criticism of a worker at a senior living facility refusing to give CPR to an elderly patient. The 6 o'clock news feed played that 911 call over and over again.

It was easy for the public to fault the caregiver and the facility but not POLST was involved (Physicians Order for Life Sustaining Treatment). This is a directive that needs to be discussed regarding life-sustaining treatment before and at the end of life – then maybe this lady's final wishes would have been on file and that 911 call might have been unnecessary.

The sad truth is that very few aged patients either inside or outside of a hospital following cardiac arrest survives to live a life without permanent neurological damage. Unfortunately, with no POLST or advance directive in effect, once that 911 call comes in, first responders are compelled to provide all life-sustaining treatments possible.

What the end result usually means is the elderly person will be admitted to critical care only to spend the final days of his or her life connected to machines, maybe with no ability to make his or her wishes known until the end eventually comes, dependent on family members fearing the pain of loss. They often can't make that decision.

Most people, if we ask them, would rather spend their last few weeks of life surrounded by family and friends at home, in their own bed. A quiet room, a little chicken soup, free from thirst and pain.

What is the most humane way to treat you? When you have no voice? What are your wishes at the end of life? What do you want?

Let's talk about it before it's too late. More medicine might not be the answer. I know that. I have an advance directive.

The point is we already have some of the strictest environmental laws in the country, and they apply as equally in disadvantaged communities and communities of color as they do in more affluent cities. CalEnviroScreen, while a potentially powerful tool in addressing environmental justice concerns, could also be the straw that breaks the camel's back if it becomes a tool to unreasonably thwart economic development.

That's why mayors and city councilmembers from all around the state are asking the California Environmental Protection Agency to make some important changes to the proposed CalEnviroScreen. They understand that if a ranking of high environmental vulnerability is used to block jobs and economic development, our communities will lose much more than they will gain.

There's a lot of room for improvement in this tool, starting with specifically prohibiting its use for regulatory or permitting purposes. What many of our community leaders would like to see is a more clearly defined focus on how the available data is analyzed and interpreted, to provide the most accurate assessment of where environmental justice resources should be directed.

Let's deploy CalEnviroScreen where it can do the most good, while keeping the door open for new, environmentally responsible economic development.

Reaction to city of Bell verdicts

In response to the multiple guilty verdicts found against former City of Bell council members Oscar Hernández, Teresa Jacobo, George Cole, Victor Bello and George Mirabal, Assemblymember Cristina Garcia (D-Bell Gardens) released the following statement:

"After a long, painful ordeal that has taken its toll on the City of Bell and its residents, I am cautiously optimistic. I am happy that justice has prevailed and that these public officials must finally pay the price for their criminal activity.

"I feel that the hard-working people of Bell have been partially vindicated, by these guilty verdicts and it is my hope that all of those involved be given stiff sentences for their violation of law and the City's trust. I also await the trial for Rizzo and Spaccia and hope the jury is not at all sympathetic of the two administrators because the reality is that Bell residents will continue to carry the burden of the millions of dollars that were misappropriated for a long time long after the cases are over.

"Let's not forget that those who committed these crimes are more than ordinary citizens. When they took their oath-of-office, they became extraordinary citizens by choice, with a high moral and legal responsibility to the people of Bell. They have shattered that bond and now the new leadership must pick up the pieces and build a new, transparent government that will heal the city and return the hands of government back to the residents of the City of Bell."

Cristina Garcia is a co-founder of the community group Bell Association to Stop The Abuse (BASTA) that led the recall charge and forced a new election in the city of Bell. She was elected to the State Assembly in November 2012.

Bell mayor Ali Saleh also released a statement:

"While [Tuesday's] guilty ruling for five of the Bell Six helps bring some closure and justice to our community, there are still trial cases which remain pending -- the trials of those remaining assailants that in my view plundered our City's resources and shackled Bell's hard-working families with an overwhelming tax burden.

"Our community will rest when the legal process has come full circle, and justice has been served. Until then, my colleagues and I will continue to look toward the future. We will continue to rebuild Bell City Hall and ensure that transparency and open government flourish in all our functions.

"We will remain focused on the tasks which we were elected to accomplish – establish a model local government while building a town that residents are proud to call home".

All places that fly the American flag should take care of the flag or replace it with a new one.







Wheelchair athletes finish 125-mile challenge

• Rancho wheelchair teams complete 125 miles in honor of hospital's 125th anniversary.

DOWNEY – Ten-year-old Lourdes Mack rolled onto the course for last week's inaugural Rancho Quad Marathon Relay Challenge hoping to complete a one-mile trip around the Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center campus and help the Rancho Wheelchair Sports teams meet their goal of completing 125 miles to commemorate the 125th anniversary of the world-renowned hospital.

Lourdes was one of 35 members of Rancho's Wheelchair Sports teams to compete in the event, which was co-sponsored by the Rancho Los Amigos Foundation and Coloplast. The reigning Little Miss California Wheelchair, Lourdes took to the track with hope that her teams would be able to roll 125 miles with wheelchairs and hand cycles. A total of 20 members of Rancho's Futures team (ages 12 and under), 10 members of the Junior team (ages 13-18) and five members of the Senior Team (over age 18) took the Quad Marathon Relay Challenge.

The Futures and Juniors teams are sponsored by Las Floristas, and the Senior team is sponsored by Coloplast.

"We came up with the Quad Marathon because four marathons are almost exactly 125 miles," said Susan Ross of Coloplast, who organized and coordinated the challenge, despite the fact that she had a baby less than a month before the event.

"It's such a privilege to work with the outstanding Rancho athletes as well as the Warren Humanitarian Society, which had nearly 40 volunteers around the course to help make this event a success," Susan said.

Warren Humanitarian Society President Paul Lim said, "We were interested to see how this first challenge would develop. It turned out to be a very inspiring day for everyone involved, because the athletes were so dedicated and determined that it was fun cheering them on to victory."

The challenge wasn't easy. Each team member would have to complete nearly four miles to meet the goal. But Lourdes and her teammates

were ready. "I work out on Saturdays with the Futures team here at Rancho where I learn push and keep going," she said. "I have become much faster, and now during P.E. at school and I can push and push and never stop. I get stronger every time I come to Rancho.

The tiny 10-year-old needed every bit of strength to make it around the one-mile track, but when she finished the lap, she decided to go the extra mile. She was cheered on by Humanitarian Society volunteers and Coloplast team members shouting their encouragement while raucously shaking cowbells.

"It was fun, but very tiring," Lourdes said. As she approached the finish line for her second lap, Lourdes was out of energy. She was not going to stop, however. "I knew I could do two miles, and I was not going to quit," she said. "I have learned that if I want to be successful in life, I need to keep going."

Lourdes felt her arms getting heavy, but the cowbells and the cheers and the sight of her mom at the finish line spurred her on. "My mom was cheering me on, and I could hear so many people cheering for me. It made it easier for me to keep pushing."

As she crossed the finish line her mom rushed to her and gave her a hug. And suddenly Lourdes got her second wind and joined the Humanitarian Society members that were passing out water to the athletes that were still on the course.

"I was happy to be able to help the older team members because they are always helping me," she said. "I am so proud to be an athlete and to be part of Rancho's wheelchair sports teams."

"Our whole program has been about mentoring," said Rancho Wheelchair Sports Director Rob Welty. "whether it's the younger kids, the older kids or the adults. Our program helps our kids better understand the importance of school and how to be productive members of society."

"The adult program is a very important part of Rancho's Wheelchair Sports experience, because it's all about giving back and showing what you can be when you grow older," he said.

While Lourdes has finished two miles, some members of the Junior and Adult teams completed as many as six, seven or even eight miles. As

each wheelchair athlete passed the start/finish line, the Humanitarian Society members would shout out the total cumulative miles for the team. As the laps went from 10 to 20 to 50, it seemed impossible that the athletes would meet the challenge. Cheer upon cheer was heard from the enthusiastic Humanitarian Society volunteers, and the competitors were actually smiling as they rolled around the Ranch.

"It is amazing to see the smiles on the athletes' faces when they accomplish a goal such as completing 125 miles together," Rob said. "It was tough, but our teams weren't going to quit until they accomplished the goal. In a sense, this challenge was a metaphor for the lives we live every day, and we have learned to never give up."

As the number of laps reached 100, the cheers became louder still, and although they were tired, the Rancho athletes seemed to push even harder. "When the 120th mile was completed, you could really feel the excitement from everyone on the course," Susan said. "It was awesome."

Soon the noise reached a crescendo as the goal of 125 miles was reached, with 13 athletes still on the course. They all completed their laps, and so the Rancho Wheelchair Sports team rolled a total of 138 miles, or the equivalent of four and a

half marathons.

Melissa Paris, Director of Marketing for Coloplast's Continence Care division, who came all the way from Minneapolis to witness the Quad Marathon Relay Challenge, said, "It was a pleasure to attend this event, which is part of Coloplast's ongoing commitment to connecting to the community and those who use our products."

"The collaboration between Rancho, community volunteers, and industry partners resulted in a great experience for the participants. All were there to support Rancho, and all left with a great experience and sense of community. We are looking forward to making this event even better next year."

"We're so pleased that there was so much support for our Rancho Wheelchair Sports teams from everyone involved," Rob said. "We're excited for the future."

And the future is Lourdes, who despite being born with spina bifida, has a smile as wide as her wheelchair that makes everyone around her smile, too. Lourdes and her teammates will forever remember that they didn't give up and that each one pushed and pushed and pushed until they met the challenge. And perhaps they also learned a bit more about how to turn trial into triumph not just in Wheelchair Sports, but in life as well.

Express chiropractic office to open at Landing

DOWNEY – An express chiropractic office that offers chiropractic services without the need of an appointment is opening at Downey Landing.

The Joint secured a conditional use permit from the planning commission earlier this month and will operate in the same building as Massage Envy.

According to a city staff report, The Joint is unlike a traditional chiropractic office in that several patients are examined simultaneously in a large treatment room.

Patients are charged \$29 per visit, or \$49 for a monthly subscription that includes up to four treatments.

The Joint is expected to offer quick exams and adjustments only, city officials said. Patients likely will receive referrals for x-rays or prescribed massages.

"It should be noted that although the applicant is proposing to refer all massage services to other providers, state law prevents the city from prohibiting the business owner from providing massage that is under the supervision of a chiropractor," noted senior planner Dave Blumenthal in a report to planning commissioners. "Nevertheless, pursuant to the restrictions of the specific plan, any massage therapist is required to have a state massage therapist license."

The Joint will occupy 1,296 square feet. Its proposed hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Police on alert for unbuckled kids

DOWNEY – The Downey Police Department will be on special alert next week for children under 16 who are not properly restrained in their vehicle.

The enforcement is part of Special Enforcement Week and Safety Seat Checkup Week taking place March 24-30.

The Downey Police Department is participating with the Peace Officers Association of Los Angeles County and SafetyBeltSafe USA.

"Motor vehicle crashes are the number one cause of deaths and injuries for children and young people," Downey police officials said in a statement. "Based on data provided by the California Highway Patrol, more than 80% of the children under four years of age killed in traffic collisions since 1990 died in survivable crashes. In other words, they would have lived if their parents had properly buckled them up."

"Children who are not properly restrained present a serious traffic safety concern. As a result, law enforcement agencies all over Los Angeles County will be making a special effort to watch for children who are not properly restrained and conduct zero tolerance enforcement."

Rotarian Larry Garces cautious about short-term real estate prospects

• Owner of Security Land Escrow Company, Garces is cautious about the future.

DOWNEY – Larry Garces, who took over ownership of the independent, medium-sized, Downey-based escrow firm of Security Land Escrow Company in 2002, after his owner-mom passed away, is not overly excited about recent economic developments that purportedly show encouraging signs of recovery from the malaise that has characterized the economy for so long.

The Federal Bank's Ben Bernanke the other day was quoted as announcing that "consumer spending and business investment have increased" while the "housing market has strengthened"—sure indications that the economy may indeed be on the road to recovery.

A strengthening of the housing market would normally be music to an escrow official's ears, as escrow is clearly a derived demand from real estate activity, but Garces is not betting on an escrow activity surge, and therefore an increase in his business transactions. He says banks are holding on to their foreclosed properties right now, waiting for housing prices to go up. This means the inventory of houses remains low, and there's nothing much out there for buyers to choose from. Some real estate speculators may be salivating at the low interest rates they can get for borrowing funds, but again, the banks and other financial institutions are not letting go of their properties and are loath to release funds.

"Real estate is tough right now because of the stricter lending require-

ments," Garces said, because of the traumatic 'bubble burst' of the past.

"We are basically a clearing house," he says, "and right now not too many financial instruments cross my desk and are being cleared."

Fed chairman Bernanke shares Garces' caution. At his press conference the other day, Bernanke said that while the economy has improved, prudence would dictate that the Fed will continue its "aggressive stimulus policies [purchasing \$85 billion a month in bonds] until it's convinced the [apparent] economic gains can be sustained." The Fed regards an unemployment rate of 6.5 percent as a "threshold"—a distinct signal, but not a "trigger"—for a possible interest rate increase.

It was also indicated that the unemployment rate has dropped to 7.7 percent, definitely an encouraging 4-year low. Then the Cyprus crisis erupted, sending shivers all around.

Security Land Escrow Company, according to Garces, was established in 1944 here in Downey by the original owner, Paul Wissack. "It's probably one of the oldest, if not the oldest, in Southern California," says Garces. The only other claimant to the title would be Wilshire Escrow in Los Angeles, he adds.


The Vikings will compete for a league title this season and hope to

Bicycle coalition awarded Kaiser grant

DOWNEY – The recently formed Downey Bicycle Coalition, in tandem with the City of Downey's Healthy Downey campaign, has been awarded a Kaiser Community Benefit Grant to support its activities in the Downey community.

The DBC came into existence last December through the interests of a burgeoning group of cycling enthusiasts and environmental advocates.

Thanks to the initiative of Roger Pardo, who now chairs the group, the DBC affiliated itself from the beginning with the Los Angeles County Bicycle Coalition, creating ties to a well-established

organization promoting the advantages of bicycling county-wide. Pardo and Eric Bruins, planning and policy director for the LACBC, collaborated in the submission of the Kaiser grant application.

The DBC also dovetailed its efforts with those of local environmental activists Steve Perez and Alex Gaytan, who had begun monthly bicycle rides last fall, and is now sponsoring community bike rides on various routes throughout Downey every month, on the last Saturday of the month. Participation thus far has been in the range of thirty to over seventy riders, including families, begin-

ning bicyclists, avid riders, and seniors. Beginners' bicycle training for children was also offered at the last ride.

This increased bicycling activity is also taking place as the City is about to submit a Caltrans grant application to fund a Bicycle Transportation Plan, often called a Bicycle Master Plan, for the City of Downey. Such plans quantify the City's goals for improvements to bicycling accessibility and infrastructure and are keys to other funding opportunities through State and Federal agencies.

The Downey Bicycle Coalition's next Community Bike Ride will take place on Saturday, March 30, at 8 a.m., starting at Furman Park, and making a 6-mile rectangular loop around the City, including City Hall. Rides are currently leisurely and social, designed to generate public awareness, but more ambitious, longer rides are also being planned.

Sanchez introduces anti-bullying measure

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Rep. Linda Sanchez last week introduced bipartisan legislation that would require schools and school districts to institute policy that bans bullying and harassment.

The Safe Schools Improvement Act would protect students from harassment whether they are being targeted based on their race, gender, real or perceived sexual orientation, or any other basis, Sanchez said.

“We owe it to our children to protect them and make sure they have a safe and comfortable learning environment at school,” the congresswoman said. “We are failing our students if they are afraid to come to school because they face daily threats and intimidation.

“Bullying can destroy a student’s self-esteem and wreck their academic progress. No child deserves to be bullied or harassed, and it’s time we made this violence and destructive behavior a relic of the past.”

“Bullying remains an epidemic in our schools and occurs at alarming rates based on sexual orientation and gender identity,” added Chad Griffin, president of the Human Rights Campaign.

Hospital chain fined \$7M for not paying workers

BELLFLOWER – A Los Angeles-based hospital chain has been fined more than \$7 million for not paying its workers and issuing checks to employees that later bounced.

Pacific Health Corporation oversees Bellflower Medical Center, Los Angeles Metropolitan Medical Center, Tustin Hospital, Newport Specialty Hospital and Anaheim General Hospital. All of the locations except Newport were cited.

The California Labor Commission fined Pacific Health \$6.5 million for failing to provide itemized wage statements to employees, and more than \$524,000 for late payment and issuing checks that were returned by the bank for insufficient funds.

“Employers have an obligation to pay workers the wages they’ve earned,” said Christine Baker, director of the state department of industrial relations. “Forcing employees to wait for payment, or depriving them of promised benefits, are illegal acts and cause unacceptable hardship.”

“Workers depend on the timely payment of their hard-earned wages for the basic necessities of life,” added California Labor Commissioner Julie A. Su. “When paychecks are returned marked ‘insufficient funds,’ it is a fundamental breach of the promise of a just day’s pay for a hard day’s work. My office will step into that breach and make sure California’s workers get the money they’ve earned in their pockets.”

Students attend Disney leadership class

BELLFLOWER – A group of Bellflower High School students traveled to Disneyland last month to take part in the Disney Youth Education Series program titled “Disney’s Approach to Leadership & Teamwork.”

Each year, students and professionals from around the world travel to Disneyland to take part in one of several Disney Y.E.S. programs. Most of the programs take place behind the scenes of Disney’s famous theme parks.

Bellflower High students learned about career discovery, life management, physical science, natural science, history, and arts and humanities.

The programs run 2-3 hours and are offered at Disneyland and Walt Disney World in Florida.

DyCy, a Whittier-based singer whose music has been described as “inspiring, lovely and sexy,” will perform this Saturday at 6 p.m. inside Super Stack Burger, located at 11011 New St. adjacent to Krikorian Theatres. Also scheduled to perform is Adrian Delgado. DOWNEY – Aldine Lucille Michaels, born March 1, 1929 near Chicago, passed away March 11, ten days after her 84th birthday.

Aldine and her husband, Bernard, were married 55 years and raised four children, sons Stephen and Philip, and daughters Carol and Patricia.

Services were held at Miller-Mies Mortuary and St. Raymond's Catholic Church before she was laid to rest in Long Beach.

Downey man collected \$1.3M filing false tax returns

DOWNEY – A Downey man who cashed tax refund checks that were issued based on false tax returns and fraudulently obtained more than \$1.3 million was sentenced today to 54 months in federal prison.

William Gomez-Corzo, 52, who also used the name "William Perez," was sentenced this afternoon by United States District Judge Christina A. Snyder.

The judge also ordered him to pay \$1,320,566 in restitution to the IRS.

Gomez-Corzo pleaded guilty to one count of theft of public money for his role in a scheme that defrauded the IRS of millions of dollars by filing false income tax returns. As part of the scheme, Gomez-Corzo and his associates used the names and social security numbers of residents of Puerto Rico to file more than 1,000 false federal income tax returns seeking tax refunds based on the earned income credit.

Gomez-Corzo and his co-conspirators used false out-of-state drivers licenses to open private mail boxes to receive the tax refund checks.

Gomez-Corzo also pleaded guilty to one count of aggravated identity theft for using an identity stolen from a dead man to obtain a United States passport.

The 54-month sentence included a mandatory two-year term for the identity theft charge.

Attorney gets jail for smuggling drugs into court

LOS ANGELES – A now-suspended attorney who tried to smuggle heroin and methamphetamine to his client in the downtown Criminal Justice Center, then a month later was arrested at the Antelope Valley courthouse for possessing rock cocaine, was sentenced to jail last Friday.

Deputy District Attorney Rosa Alarcon of the Justice System Integrity Division said Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Fred Wapner sentenced 49-year-old Kenneth Roger Markman to a year in county jail and to a one-year residential treatment program as part of three years of supervised probation.

A report on Markman's progress was scheduled for Oct. 15.

Markman pleaded no contest last month to conspiracy and drug charges.

He was first arrested by Sheriff's deputies on Oct. 21, 2011, after trying to smuggle 26 balloons containing heroin and methamphetamine into a jail holding facility at the Foltz Criminal Justice Center in downtown Los Angeles.

Authorities said he was trying to deliver the drugs to his client, 36-year-old Jorge Zaragoza, who had a court appearance that day in an attempted carjacking case.

According to the criminal complaint, Zaragoza and his girlfriend, Jennifer Vasquez, 28, both believed to be with the 38th Street gang, conspired to acquire the drugs and supply them to Markman.

Markman was arrested at the courthouse in Lancaster a month later after a security officer saw suspicious items in the X-Ray machine when Markman went through. Authorities said the defendant grabbed his wallet and tried to leave the building, but was stopped by a Sheriff's deputy.

Drug paraphernalia and two bindles of rock cocaine were in Markman's wallet, authorities said.

The State Bar of California suspended Markman pending a decision on whether he will be allowed to continue to practice law.

Markman, Zaragoza and Vasquez were charged in January 2012. Vasquez pleaded no contest to one count of conspiracy to bring a controlled substance into a jail facility. She was sentenced by Judge Wapner in January to two years in prison, but given credit for 782 days already spent in custody.

Zaragoza was due in Judge Wapner's court Tuesday for a pretrial hearing and trial setting.

Student named 'face of engineering'

• Sabrina Rivera receives honor from American Society of Civil Engineers.

LONG BEACH – The American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) recently announced the selection of Sabrina Rivera, a fourth-year student at California State University, Long Beach (CSULB), as a finalist for its 2013 New Faces of Civil Engineering – College Edition.

Rivera was chosen from a field of talented college students nationwide whose academic and extracurricular achievements demonstrate their promise as future engineers and leaders in their profession.

"I was very excited to find out that I had been selected for this national award," said Rivera, 23, who will complete her bachelor's degree in civil engineering with a minor in environmental science and policy this May. "I have put a lot of time into the ASCE CSULB chapter, and it is great to see the outcome now through this award and the success of the club."

As an ASCE New Face, Rivera is eligible for selection as ASCE's representative for the national New Faces of Engineering – College Edition recognition program, sponsored by the National Engineers Week Foundation. If chosen, she will be recognized along with top students from other engineering disciplines in a national media campaign, and receive a \$500 cash scholarship from ASCE. The announcement will be made April 1.

Rivera began her studies at CSULB as a biology major, and while she found the subject interesting, she said it just wasn't something she felt passionate about. So, she spent time searching through different campus departments.

"I eventually wound up in the Civil Engineering/Construction Engineering Management Department talking to a graduate advisor," she recalled. "He told me about the many ways civil engineers were improving water and waste-water treatment, about building bridges and improving

the relationship of our built environment with the natural one. I changed my major the next day, and I can honestly say that it has been one of the best decisions I have ever made."

The current president of the school's ASCE chapter and a member of the team participating in the regional Concrete Canoe Competition, Rivera also serves in a liaison capacity between the chapter and the Younger Member Forum of ASCE's Orange County Branch, which is part of the Los Angeles Section. Last year, the chapter and the forum jointly hosted an event that challenged middle school students to build bridges using Popsicle sticks.

"I wish someone [earlier in my life] had told me of the seemingly endless possibilities that are available through engineering," said Rivera, who was born and raised in Long Beach and whose mother also graduated from CSULB. "I was always under the impression that engineering was too hard, but now that I am in my senior year, I view all of those struggles as important building blocks for the person that I have become."

A member of Chi Epsilon, Tau Beta Pi, and the Golden Key International Honor Society, Rivera has also served as treasurer of the Engineers Without Borders-USA chapter and written grant applications for that group. As a volunteer in the activities organized by the Orange County Branch in connection with Engineers Week in 2012, she helped plan events where students built towers using spaghetti and tape, and this year she helped organize a cardboard boat race for students.

"As graduation approaches I am looking forward to utilizing the knowledge and skills that I have gained through school and work to improve my community and to finding solutions to many of the challenges that our society faces and make the world around me a better place," Rivera said. "I am excited for the opportunities to come from this new phase in my life."

As she prepares to graduate, Rivera said she is looking for a

position in the field of water resources where she will be able to continue to grow and develop as an engineer. She has enjoyed the areas of hydraulics, hydrology and groundwater transport in her studies and is also interested in project management. Omar Camacho takes Titan Tow in green direction

• Tow company won Downey Police, California Highway Patrol contracts last year.

DOWNEY – Prior to co-founding Downey-based Titan Transportation Co. with partner Stephanie Breault in April 2007, Omar Camacho worked for his family's trucking and construction company for twenty years. Mechanically inclined early on, only son Omar, a burly, solid-looking, and affable hunk, in those twenty years performed a gamut of duties, including driving a truck, dispatching, and equipment operations, as well as bookkeeping, accounts payable, and accounts receivables collections. He also learned the business' sales and marketing functions.

He says he likes to look at a mechanical problem, and try to find the solution. A graduate of Downey schools, he has taken criminal law at Fullerton College and criminal justice at the University of Phoenix—

subjects which have served him in good stead.

When his mom, Esther, retired, Omar decided to go into the tow truck business, a business practically entirely new to him. Fortunately there was current driver and colleague Gabriel Martinez to show him the ropes. Martinez had had twelve years towing experience prior to working with his mom. Omar says he learned the fundamentals of towing from him.

Titan Tow provides 24-hour towing and roadside assistance to the cities of Downey, Norwalk, and Bellflower, with a 25-mile radius as its normal range of operations. Out-bidding six other towing companies, it was one of two companies that won two-year towing and storage contracts with the Downey Police Department and the CHP in May last year.

In PDPs case, the evaluation/ranking criteria used were: completeness and accuracy of the proposal; the proposer's having a sufficient number of properly licensed, trained and qualified personnel, as well as its possession of an adequate number of specified operating equipment; the ability to operate and maintain a business office as well as a primary storage lot within city limits; the ability to meet specific insurance requirements (including liability and

workmen's comp); together with customer service (references) and demonstrated experience.

Titan Tow hurdled all prerequisites.

Titan Tow's offices and storage facility are located at the corner of Downey Avenue and Phlox St. Inside the huge compound are found its fleet of diesel-powered tow and fork-lift trucks and flatbeds (now numbering eight and acquired via lease-purchase agreements). Prominently seen are impounded cars and trucks in various stages of wreckage: a few are crushed, its fenders severed; many, neatly arranged in the yard, sit there silently, victims of highway collisions, others impounded for illegal parking, expired registration (over 6 months), unpaid parking citations (5 or more), and abandoned due to the arrest of erring drivers, etc.

There is a separate "evidence cage" as well where vehicles involved in the commission of a crime or otherwise involving bodily, even fatal, injury, and when evidence such as fingerprints and other evidence are critical, are sequestered.

Federal and state emissions regulatory standards have in the meantime been decreed. In compliance, Titan Tow's latest monstrous Peterbilt flatbed acquisition that cost \$160,000 has been outfitted with a special device which reduces the emission of particulate matter from its engine and meets the EPA requirement of near-zero nitrous oxide emissions. With the injection of a nontoxic diesel exhaust fluid (DEF) into the engine's hot exhaust, the



truck emits no visible smoke, and it doesn't pollute the air; in brief, he says, his diesel tow truck leaves no carbon footprint.

Omar says another brand-new diesel flatbed tow truck similarly outfitted with a DEF device has just been acquired the other day and is due to arrive "in two weeks." Two more fleet tow trucks in operation are scheduled for retrofitting by the end of this year. The rest of Titan's fleet has to comply with EPA/CARB requirements by 2020. Titan's earlier—and smaller—tow/forklift truck models cost the company considerably less than its latest acquisitions. (Its oldest truck is a 2008 model).

Aside from the high cost of equipment, which has necessitated financing support "from numerous banks," Titan has to contend with a sizable level of accounts receivable (about \$500,000), many of them aged. Otherwise, Omar says the tow truck business is "rough, tough,

risky, very competitive, and demands long hours."

Rough, because people whose cars are impounded are usually "people in trouble and who cannot immediately pay the recovery fees," if at all. Risky, because the impounded cars are often linked to the random commission of crimes, not to mention the risk one takes when one hoists vehicles in the narrowest of margins on the freeways.

Omar says Titan Tow's 24-hour operation requires the presence of at least one dispatcher and three drivers at all times. During the day, it has eight drivers on duty.

Omar has made it a point over the years to get heavily involved in the community, particularly the Downey Rose Float Association. He is also an active participant in many events sponsored by the DPD and the city, including its annual Toy Drive for needy kids, even as it assists with Concerts in the Park logistics, Kids Day events, and the like.

He says he works hard now so he can have "an easy time of it tomorrow"—a perfectly acceptable attitude.

It's arduous work, Omar says, "but it's been fun."






Plastic ocean at Gauldin Elementary

Gauldin students get a good lesson in the three R's: reduce, reuse and recycle.

DOWNEY – "Plastic Ocean" is the title of a 2011 book penned by Captain Charles Moore, a self-taught ocean environmentalist, and the sailor who discovered what is now known as the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch." Moore, who lives in Long Beach, was sailing home from Honolulu in 1997 and decided to check out the North Pacific Gyre, a vortex of currents not widely visited by sailors because it's a thousand miles from land, and lacks sufficient wind currents to be attractive to sailing.

What Captain Moore noticed on his side trip home, however, has since made the North Pacific Gyre famous--or, more accurately, infamous. Here is his eloquent description from the book:

"Let it be said straight up that what we came upon was not a mountain of trash, an island of trash, a raft of trash, or a swirling vortex of trash--all media-concocted embellishments of the truth. It would come to be known as the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, a term that's had great utility but, again, suggests something other than what's out there. It was and is a thin plastic soup, a soup lightly seasoned with plastic flakes, bulked out here and there with 'dumplings'; buoys, net clumps, floats, crates, and other 'macro debris.' I was not a latter-

day Columbus discovering a plastic continent. I was a seafarer who noticed--at first incredulously, then with greater certainty--that this immense section of the northeastern Pacific Ocean, about halfway between Hawaii and the West Coast, was strewn throughout with buoy-ant plastic scraps."

Captain Moore was so astonished with his findings that he channeled the efforts of the Algalita Marine Research Foundation towards accurately documenting the extent of plastic in the North Pacific Gyre. (Moore had created the Foundation three years previous to help restore coastal waters.)

Among the sobering results of his research was the discovery that water samples of this "plastic soup" contained six times as much plastic by weight as organic materials. In addition, estimates put the depth of the plastic suspension to about 100 meters.

Here in Downey, in early June of 2010, Gauldin Elementary students got a peek at this plastic soup, thanks to the efforts of former Warren High School science teacher, Anna Valcarcel, who now teaches environmental science at Cerritos College. Valcarcel had been in touch with the Algalita Marine Research Foundation regarding a possible presentation to one of the Downey schools as part of a one-day after-school program on plastic pollution.

It turned out on short notice that Anna Cummins, who had just been at sea doing research for the Algalita Foundation, was available to come. She brought, along

with a compelling presentation, a sample of the plastic soup that Captain Moore had discovered a thousand miles away in the middle of the ocean. The children experienced an unequivocal example of anthropogenic ocean pollution, and one hopes their lives were slightly changed.

As Ms. Cummins explained after the presentation to Ms. Valcarcel and this writer, she was about to voyage out again to the world's other four ocean gyres to determine whether or not they too contained significant amounts of plastic.

The sad answer turned out to be yes, and Cummins has teamed up with Dr. Marcus Eriksen to research ocean pollution and its solutions around the globe through their new foundation, appropriately titled 5 Gyres (which you can find on Facebook).

There's much more to be articulated about what you and I can do to help cure this global problem. But for now, suffice it to say, that afternoon at Gauldin Elementary, those students got a good lesson in the 3 R's: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle.
