DOWNEY – Downey Regional Medical Center began the unofficial countdown towards its annual Charter Ball this week, hosting a kick-off celebration attended by more than 130 guests.

The celebration offered a foretaste of what DRMC officials say is in store for the Oct. 30 black-tie event, to be held at the Hyatt Regency Huntington Beach Resort and Spa.

Ron and Kathy Kolar, Downey residents and owners of L'Abri Management, Inc., were named this year's Charter Ball honorees.

"Ron is one of the most dedicated citizens the city of Downey has ever known," said Wendy Doty, Superintendent for Downey Schools. "He has been very generous in his financial support and commitment of time to many important community organizations. He is a good man and a personal friend."

Ron Kolar has dedicated thousands of hours to DRMC. In the 1980s, he joined the Memorial Trust Foundation Board of Trustees and became involved in raising money for a new hospital wing, eventually joining the Founder's Circle with a \$100,000 contribution. Today, Ron is President-elect of the DRMC Corporate Board and member and past president of the MTF and Hospital boards.

He has also served on the hospital's audit, finance, capital and litigation committees.

"I became and stayed involved at the hospital because I feel I can make a difference, and I like the people," said Ron, who is also a 20-year member of Downey Los Amigos Kiwanis. "The hospital administration and

board have the best motives with respect to the hospital.

Through a lot of work and consternation our board has helped the hospital survive and turn the corner financially. DRMC is an outstanding medical facility that does a number of things as well as anyone in the county, and it is certainly above average for a community hospital of this

A University of Southern California alumnus, Ron also has extensive ties to the Downey Family YMCA, where he's served as Board president several times. He has earned the Y's Red Triangle Award for community service and Distinguished Service Award for service to the YMCA. He was also honored by the Los Angeles Metropolitan YMCA with the Golden Book Award.


The Ball will raise funds for the DRMC Capital Campaign/Patient Care Tower. This year's event will include a performance by Creedence Clearwater Revisited.

Sales tax measure would add police

DOWNEY—The Downey City Council, after hearing a staff report from Police Chief John Finch, has decided to hear more before throwing its support to Los Angeles County Measure A on the November ballot, which, if passed, would raise about \$560 million through addition of a half-cent sales tax to be used to expand law enforcement services throughout the county (including Downey).

The vote to bring the matter back for further consideration was by a 4-1 vote with Meredith Perkins opposed. Perkins complimented Finch on a fine report, but said it would take much more to get him to vote for a half-cent sales tax increase.

The measure, which requires a two/thirds majority for passage at the polls, began as an initiative measure and was placed on the ballot by a vote of the L.A. City Council in July.

Downey's share, if passed

If passed, Finch said Downey's share would be \$5,202,864, which would be used to improve police staffing levels here. He said basic response times for emergency and non-emergency services are both tied to staffing, and he added now is the time to assess and hopefully improve staffing levels in Downey. The last formal staffing review conducted in 1990 recommended that 143 sworn police officers (for a then population of 91,444), be maintained. Currently, the Downey Police deploy 114 sworn officers and serve a population of 112,800.

Finch said the most critical staffing priority is in uniformed patrol/enforcement officer positions, the first-responders to emergency and most non-emergency calls. Downey currently has 77 such officer positions (67 percent of the total sworn staff).

The other sworn police positions are plain-clothes investigators who conduct follow-up investigations (31 or 28 percent of the sworn staff); undercover detectives (6 or five percent of sworn staff). All special assignment officer spots have been eliminated through transfer to uniformed patrol jobs

Workload increases

Finch noted this in an effort to keep up with increased calls for service; increases in violent crime (up four years in a row here); increase in gang graffiti and window etchings; increases in government mandated police action and reporting; increases in high-tech investigation which is time consuming, including cyber-crime and identity theft; demands brought on by science advances such as DNA testing; and ever-increasing demands to properly prepare for domestic terrorism threats.

Finch noted that Downey's authorized number of 114 sworn officers to protect a city of 112,800 calculates to a ratio of 1.01 officers per thousand population. This is near the lowest in the state according to Department of Justice figures, which show Downey ranked 67 out of 73 cities with a population of 75,000 or more in California. Nationally, compared to cities with populations of 100,000 or more, Downey ranks 332 out of 340 cities measured.

Challenges

Finch points out that Downey faces more challenges than many cities, among which are a metropolitan environment which makes enforcement more difficult. He added that while Downey is socio-economically healthy, the southeast L.A. region is one of the poorest in the nation, a disparity that makes Downey and its businesses and residents prime targets, requiring more, not less policing.

Fireworks, words and tears all at Council meeting

Several reduced to tears

DOWNEY—Verbal fireworks and accusations at the Tuesday City Council meeting as well as word of the turmoil at a recent Project Area Committee (PAC) meeting were enough to spur Mayor Kirk Cartozian to ask staff to prepare some rules for ensuring propriety and good conduct to be considered by the Council at its next session.

Meanwhile at least two lawsuits were threatened by members of the audience at Tuesday's Council meeting. As if this were not enough, the room was packed by advocates and members of the Desert Reign Church who appealed both vocally and by petition for rezoning of the former Stats property for their hoped for religious center. Several speakers burst into tears while speaking.

City Council candidate Gary DeRemer said he had hoped for a clean election race, but said his opponent had made verbal slurs that could not be overlooked. He vowed a lawsuit unless the slurs stopped.

Lenny Whittington told members of the PAC who complained of his conduct and alleged verbal abuse of them at a recent PAC session that he would sue them. Then he said he would sue the Mayor as well, calling Cartozian a liar at one point.

And a group of speakers including the current owner appealed for help in saving the historically significant Rives Mansion at Third Street and Paramount Boulevard, which is currently on the market. Realtor and historian Barbara Briley Beard spoke well in behalf of saving the structure and its stately columns which date to 1912. One solution would be rezoning

The meeting ended on a sour note when a 2-2 Council vote (with Cartozian abstaining) scuttled the hope of Downey Sister Cities for \$2,500 in city funding for a party welcoming a delegation from Ensenada, Mexico. The future of the gala planned for Sept. 25 is now in doubt. Councilmembers Meridith Perkins and Anne Bayer voted "no."


Soil problems key to rebid process



I-5 improvements to tie up traffic

DOWNEY -- Caltrans has announced that pavement rehabilitation and improvement work along an 11 mile strip of the north and southbound Santa Ana (I-5) Freeway from La Mirada to Commerce, including Downey, will result in overnight freeway lane, ramp and at times full freeway closures now through November of next year.

The project will offer a smoother driving surface, improve public safety, and extend freeway life when completed.

Signs and detours will be posted to assist motorists and media releases will update the public and commuters where work is in progress.

Traffic delays of up to 30 minutes are expected in some cases. Caltrans is working with the CHP and other law enforcement agencies to assist in traffic management.

Cost of the project, which is state funded, is \$25 million.

An end to hazing

An article in the CIF Southern Section Bulletin inspires the timely topic for this week's column—it's on hazing.

Southern Section is concerned about hazing in athletic programs, but in fact it can be found all over campuses from the band room to weight room.

Hazing has been loosely defined as any activity that requires new members to show "subservience" to older group members, while lowering the self-esteem of the newcomers.

One school defined hazing as any action or situation which recklessly and intentionally endangers the mental or physical health of a student.

It can include physical brutality, sleep deprivation, exposure to weather, confinement to a restricted area or activities that subject persons to unreasonable risk or harm.

The inherent problem with hazing is that many practices seem harmless. Some coaches see them as "team building" or good for morale.

But just let one prank or initiation go wrong and all the fun and character building evaporates.

The apparent message here is for schools to set up policies to address this issue now and avoid problems later.

Schools have to let students know that hazing is no longer permissible.

Los Angeles County is also the home of about 90,000 gang members, and the concentration of prison parolees in the county is the highest in the state, and one of the highest in the nation. The recent closures of courthouses in South Gate and Huntington Park has resulted in the addition of the criminal case load to Downey Superior Court, creating a logiam for Downey officers filing criminal cases and testifying in court. This also has resulted in more criminal defendants now being released directly onto Downey streets.

L.A. County's current practice of incarcerating convicted criminals for only 10 percent of their assigned county jail sentences also makes law enforcement more difficult.

The planned emergency room at Kaiser Hospital and its 81 bed capacity will draw cases from throughout the area, and will often require a local police response.

Despite all of the above, Finch noted that to meet budgetary mandates, crime prevention, gang suppression and proactive programs addressing public safety issues have had to be scaled back.

In 2002 an independent survey conducted to examine all levels of nonsworn staffing in California cities with their own municipal police department with populations between 100,000 and 140,000, Downey finished 19th out of 21 cities surveyed.

Finch added the thrust of his report was not meant to alarm listeners, but rather share facts. He said Downey has much to be proud of including an average median home price of \$453,000; the outstanding Downey Unified School District; the Downey Landing project currently underway; and a homicide rate averaging less than four a year, compared to much higher rates in surrounding cities

He said he is aware these are tight financial times for cities.

The cost of policing is up nationwide, according to a study this year by the U.S. Bureau of Statistics the cost of fighting crime increased from \$36 billion in 1982 to over \$167 billion in 2001, reflecting an increase of 363 percent during a period when the Consumer Price Index increased only 83.5

Mayor Kirk Cartozian and Councilman Rick Trejo were enthusiastic with the concept of funding to add more police. The matter will be brought back for the Sept. 28 meeting.

Dear Editor:

I have just read that some 1,000 young American soldiers have died in Iraq and elsewhere in the last few months. It saddens me a lot because the future of our country belongs to the young.

An idea has germinated in my mind about how to maintain our international commitments while at the same time protecting our young men and women from the horrors of war.

I propose that Congress pass a law implementing what I call the **Senior Draft**, which simply consists of drafting into military duty our senior citizens over 60 years old. They would take the place of young soldiers in implementing our foreign policy in Iraq or where they are needed.

Most senior people will gladly take up this challenge particularly if it means keeping a son or daughter out of harm's way. I for one would be most willing to take a place in the war effort if I can be assured that my son or my daughter will not be called into military service.

Since many people over 60 are unemployed and unable to find a new job because of their age this opportunity is tailor-made for them.

An added bonus is that many of the old people will die while servicing the country in foreign lands; this will reduce the number of people who need Social Security and Medicare benefits and will alleviate the financial problems expected to apply to these systems.

I urge you to give this modest proposal your editorial support so those members of our legislative delegation learn about it and introduce in Congress a bill which will give birth to the Senior Draft. I can not think of a nobler calling for my old age than serving the country and protecting our

SOIL

Arsenic

Previous soil testing indicated concentrations above background levels of arsenic. The soil was considered as hazardous and all soil above the limit was slated to be removed from the site and transported to a disposal site. The amount to be remediated was estimated at 7,500 cubic yards. Past uses include an east-west runway, offices and conservation yard. It is currently being considered for use as a public park, sports complex and a location for the Columbia Memorial Space Learning Center.

During the bidding process potential bidders raised questions on the likelihood of arsenic concentrations at the center of the site as well. A reexamination of the study found it to be limited in terms of testing in the central area. Additional tests found an estimated 1,500 in additional cubic yards need remediation. This will cost an estimated additional \$200,000, and the soil is determined as hazardous on the state rather than federal level

Further tests

Rebidding strategies are being explored to reduce the cost of the project. Further tests reveal the contaminated areas in the northeast and southwest of the site involves 5,300 cubic yards rather than the original 7,500 cubic yards estimated in the original bid. With 1,500 cubic yards from the center portion of the site, this brings the total remediation figure to 6,800. This plus the difference in disposal costs between state-hazardous material and federal material results in estimate savings of \$450,000.

Recycling of asphalt paving at the site could further reduce costs, using new technology. Savings are estimated at \$200,000.

Talks with the State Department of Toxic Substance Control indicate the project qualifies under a provision of the Health and Safety Code for the waiving of Generator Fees in the sum of about \$122,000.

The project will be rebid next month with an estimated cost of \$850,000, and detail cost estimates will be included.

*Rejected all bids and granted authority to re-advertise for bids on Phase 1B of the Lakewood Boulevard Improvement project which runs from Fifth Street/Cecilia to about Bellflower Boulevard just south of the Union Pacific tracks, due to irregularities in the bids submitted. The low bidder appealed the action, but the Council trusted staff. The partial funding through an MTA grant requires that expenditures must be made before April 30, 2005, but staff added MTA indicated this was flexible.

Parking agreement at Denny's transferred


