Ono is teaching award winner

DOWNEY — Downey Unified School District's Diana Ono was one of 13 winners selected from a field of 62 teachers Friday, Sept. 24 as Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year. The 13 were announced in ceremonies in Universal City.

Ono works at Rio San Gabriel Elementary School in Downey with K-5 English Language learners, as well as fourth and fifth graders in the District's gifted program.

"She never says no," to any teaching demand, according to vice principal Ruth Hesketh of the school.

Field of 62

All 62 finalists were awarded prizes in the ceremonies, including computers, hotel stays and gift certificates.

"You are teachers of vision, of larger horizons, and your love for learning and knowledge ends up being the most important thing that gets passed along to your students," County Schools Superintendent Darlene P. Robles told the honorees at the luncheon which some described as the teachers' "Oscars."

Winners were chosen on the basis of classroom practices and dedication, determined through detailed written statements and interviews with panels of both working and retired teachers.

State finals next

Other area winners among the 13 announced Friday included Monte Eric Weiss of Bellflower Unified and Sylvia Padilla of Long Beach Unified.

The three winners will advance to the State Teacher of the Year competition. Five winners will be announced in that statewide competition in November. One of that five will represent California in competition for National Teacher of the Year in the spring.

Ono was honored as Downey Unified's Teacher of the Year in ceremonies before the School Board Sept. 21. She has been with Downey Unified since 1976. Prior to assignment at Rio San Gabriel in 1998, she served as SI Resource Teacher at both Lewis and Carpenter Elementaries.

She has taught grades 1-5, Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) students, at-risk students, Computer Lab, and Library, and has been recognized through numerous service awards.

Meglev rails win Council's favor

DOWNEY—The City Council has considered and then authorized the Mayor to execute a joint powers agreement with the Orangeline Development Authority.

The legal counsel for the development authority had requested that the City officially execute the joint powers agreement. The Council had previously approved dues for the authority in 2003-04 but did not officially

The Council did appoint Keith McCarthy as the City's representative to the authority at that time.

The authority's purpose is to promote and create a high-speed mass transit line between Santa Ana and downtown L.A. Cities that have formally adopted the agreement include Bell, Bellflower, Cudahy, Vernon, Los Alamitos, Paramount, South Gate, Cerritos, Huntington Park, and

Dues for Downey for fiscal 2003-04 were \$5,680. For 2004-05 they are \$7,830.

The agreement provides that the City may withdraw from the authority by giving 30 days notice but any obligation that exists as of that date must be honored. The two terminus cities, L.A. and Santa Ana have not

Council comments cover many topics

DOWNEY—City Council comments Tuesday ranged from stagnant water to improved traffic configurations.

Mayor Kirk Cartozian noted improved traffic conditions at Brookshire Avenue and Firestone Boulevard thanks to new lights and left turn configuration. He also was interested in the fiber-optic installation and cameras which will be part of the improved city-wide traffic plan when completed. Public Works Director Desi Alvarez supplied answers on the city-wide plan.

Councilman Rick Trejo reported stagnant water and a breeding ground for mosquitoes on Lubec. He said the City was working on draining the water off as soon as possible.

All the Council expressed concern over problems at recent Project Area Committee (PAC) meetings. Mayor Cartozian noted similar problems at Council sessions.

Council opts for fire lease-purchase

DOWNEY—The Downey City Council, after thorough evaluation by staff, has followed the recommendation to acquire a new fire department ladder truck through lease-purchase over a 10-year period at an interest rate of 4.25 percent through Oshkosh Capital.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

The staff report noted that although the contract purchase price is \$831,258, the amount to be financed has been reduced to \$741,199. \$63,352 of the sales tax will not be financed but paid directly to the state thereby limiting interest costs. Oshkosh Capital has also offered a principal discount of \$26,707 by funding the truck through their company.

An estimated lease payment for the ladder truck was approved in the 2004-05 budget. The Oshkosh agreement calls for annual payments of \$83,323 at an interest rate of 4.25 percent.

On Aug. 24, 2004, the Council approved the acquisition of a fire ladder truck from Pierce Fire Apparatus, and allowed itself time to study the option of cash or lease purchase. Large reputable financing companies contacted led to the decision that Oshkosh Capital offered the most favorable terms.

The measure passed 4-1 Tuesday with Councilman Meredith Perkins

A crackdown on conduct at public meetings

Profanity, racist remarks?

DOWNEY---In response to an appeal by Project Area Committee members, who say they have lost control of their recent meetings due to unruly conduct by other members, the City Council has approved additional language to the PAC bylaws, which allows expulsion for inappropriate conduct and language.

The action at Tuesday's Council meeting bans profanity and abusive language, including sexist or racist remarks and other personal attacks, as well as the consistent use of interruption and/or filibuster to disrupt the business of the PAC.

Link to residents

The PAC or Downey Redevelopment Project Area Committee provides a means of support and advice to the Downey Community Development Commission on matters related to the development and planning of the Downey Redevelopment Project area. It does this by gathering information and serving as a communications link between the Commission (City Council) and persons living in the project area.

Threats, yelling, or other means of verbal or physical intimidation are now banned, as is harassment of fellow members, their families or coworkers, either during or outside of PAC meetings. This includes phone calls at home or at their place of business.

Code of conduct

PAC members failing to adhere to this code of conduct may be removed from the PAC, pursuant to guidelines.

The PAC also consults with the Commission on policy matters, and assists it in carrying out activities in accordance with State Community Redevelopment law.

PAC members Guy Sterner and Michael Sullivan spoke before the Council Tuesday in behalf of the need for the measure, including expulsion powers.

The measure passed by a unanimous 5-0 vote. Councilman Rick Trejo said, "I will support this." and Mayor Kirk Cartozian also strongly supported the measure.

The Mayor noted that similar language to that added to the PAC bylaws is under consideration for City Council sessions since some disruption has been experienced there as well.

Narrow endorsement of 1/2 cent tax hike

DOWNEY—The City Council adopted a resolution in support of Los Angeles County Measure A, the Public safety and Homeland Security Sales Tax Initiative which would add a half-cent sales tax in the county if approved by the voters in November's ballot.





Downey Police warns of crimes against elderly

DOWNEY – The elderly have long been targeted by crooks hoping to trick them out of their money. Quite often, scams against the elderly are committed over the phone or, increasingly, over the Internet. Recently, however, we have seen an increase in the incidents of scams perpetrated by suspects who come to the victim's residence. These suspects count on their ability to convince the resident to let them inside.

The Downey Police Department has been investigating several cases since the beginning of this year where elderly victims have fallen prey to suspects who were allowed to enter their residence. Several incidents have involved the suspect(s) claiming to be with Avon wanting to show their product. In some cases, suspect children were used under the ploy of having to use the bathroom. Once inside the residence, the victim is distracted while a second suspect rummages through the house.

Other crimes have originated under the guise of the suspect wanting to buy a vehicle (not listed for sale) or offering to do some type of work on the residence, i.e., tree trimming, roof repair, plumbing repair, etc.

In all cases, the suspect was either allowed into the residence where the thefts subsequently occurred, or the suspect alleges that some work was performed and then demand cash as payment for the "work."

All of our victims have been over the age of 70, with most of them being in their eighties and nineties. Quite often, the victims in these cases cannot provide very accurate descriptions of the suspects or provide a vehicle description. Many incidents may have gone unreported due to embarrassment felt by the victims.

We are asking the community's assistance in identifying suspects in these cases. If you are approached by anyone that you do not know, do not allow him or her into your residence. If possible, get to a phone and call the police station. If you have an elderly neighbor and see someone suspicious at his or her residence, write down the suspect's vehicle license number, and check on your neighbor's welfare if you are comfortable in doing so. Also, do not hesitate to call the police station and let us know what you observed.



We have written often of our love for the Old Farmer's Almanac, the publication of which we eagerly await each year.

The 2005 edition is just out, and has all sorts of fun predictions of trends and directions. For instance, would you believe designer eggs? The Almanac says designer eggs (from chickens fed sea kelp, flaxseed, canola oil and other nutritional ingredients) are low fat, rich in omega-3 fatty acid, iodine and vitamin E. Health conscious consumers are gobbling them up, even at higher prices.

The Almanac warns of a bad food backlash. What about toys? The Almanac says foldable bikes and collapsible kayaks that fit in your luggage are coming in 2005. Self-heating hiking and ski boots will become popular. And self-powered fishing lures that attract fish by making the sound of their mates will shake up angling.

On what we will wear in 2005, women will turn to personalized purses, with decorating parties to create same on ladies' nights out. Spray-on hosiery, invented for Tokyo women, will be popular even in the heat. A week's supply costs about \$15. And the latest scent for both men and women will be—gin!

Governor signs Karnette bill into law

SACRAMENTO—Gov. Schwarzenegger has signed Senate Bill 1749, a measure that promotes consumer confidence in purchasing more environmentally sound plastic bags. It was authored by State Senator Betty Karnette, (D-27th, Long Beach and Downey).

SB1749 requires that any bag labeled as "compostable" or "biodegradable" must meet recognized, scientific standards for those terms.

"Consumers are right to expect that if they buy a compostable or biodegradable bag, that the bag will live up to the use for which it is advertised," said Karnette. "People put in extra effort and sometimes extra money to purchase these products, so they should get what they are paying for."

The need for standards behind the "compostable" and "biodegradable" label are needed now because of increasing demands for these types of plastic bags. Municipalities and individual consumers are increasingly looking towards biodegradable and compostable bags to collect and compost green waste, thus reducing the amount of materials being sent to landfills.

Additionally, with increased public attention on the problems plastics can cause on the marine environment, some unscrupulous bag manufacturers are attempting to greenwash their products by marketing them as degradable or compostable. For example, last year the State Coastal Commission paid a premium for plastic trash bags for a beach clean-up that were fraudulently marketed and labeled as "degradable." This bill would help prevent this deceptive practice.

"I am proud to have carried a measure that received widespread support from both the environmental community and the industry," said Karnette. "I believe this bill is an example of how we can bring different interest groups together to work towards a common goal."

Consumers have a growing interest in products that can have a lower impact on our environment, and the industry is looking to respond to these demands. However, for this market to be stable and profitable, consumers must have confidence in the claims of these green products. SB1749 will help plastic bag manufacturers protect consumer confidence.



Letters to the Editor: Give Planning a break!

Dear Editor:

In recent issues of the Patriot I have observed oblique condemnations of Downey's Planning and Building Departments by council candidates and others. No specific complaints have been delineated and the city departments therefore are provided no opportunity to respond.

I observed and participated in many planning and building matters while serving 8 years on the planning commission and another 8 years on the city council of Downey. The city's planning/zoning ordinances generally are well-tailored and designed primarily to protect the appearance and compatible uses of structures in the city. For example, a multi-story hotel should not be allowed in the middle of single family residences. Variances from the rules are permitted if a reasonable basis is demonstrated. Building codes are mostly state-mandated and are designed primarily for the safety of persons and property. The city merely is the enforcer of the mandated rules – most of which are reasonable.

A few complaints against the planning and building departments may have merit. However, I have observed that in nearly every instance persons demanding highly unreasonable exceptions to the zoning and building rules complain the loudest and make a general condemnation of city government. This is not fair to the city workers who, for the most part, work hard and provide good service. Here is what I recommend for anyone who has a specific complaint involving the planning or building rules or their enforcement. State the complaint in writing, file it with the appropriate city department and with his or her councilperson. This will allow the staff of the appropriate city department to focus on it and, if it has merit, a solution may be found.

Overall, I am grateful that I live in a city that is well governed and is a pleasant place in which to reside!

City in defense of rivers conservancy

DOWNEY—The City Council has approved a resolution officially opposing the California Performance Review Commission's recommendation to eliminate the San Gabriel and lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy.

The action at Tuesday's regular Council meeting, was at the request of the Gateway Cities Council of Governments (COG) which asked its member cities to oppose the Performance Review Commission (CPR) plan to eliminate the conservancy.

History

The conservancy was founded by legislation sponsored by COG, and was envisioned as a state-local partnership to bring state resources and expertise to bear on the desperate need for preservation and expansion of open space while respecting local land use control. The conservancy met expectations bringing millions of dollars and heightening environmental awareness in the region, It has performed pioneering work as an urban

Before the conservancy the region voted and paid for state park bonds, but did not get equitable return of dollars. Elimination of the conservancy will revert the region to the old status. It is interesting to note that the CPR has not recommended elimination of the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, which critics say serves a more politically favored popula-
