# Havard and Glasser honored as teachers

DOWNEY-Mary Havard and Bernard Glasser were honored for their work as teachers for the Downey Unified School District at the regular School Board meeting Tuesday.

Principal Pam Box of Old River Elementary introduced Havard by saying it was a privilege and an honor to present her as the "Elementary Teacher Honoree." She described her as a highly skilled professional who is highly regarded by students, parents, friends and colleagues.

#### Havard

Havard began at the DUSD in 1987 at Imperial school. Ten years later she transferred to Alameda, and joined the Old River faculty in 1999. She has done a superb job as a lead teacher in the GATE program, and is an invaluable member of the School Site Council. She has planned and presented staff in-services and parent education programs, addressing the unique needs of students of all learning styles and ability levels.

She was awarded the Old River School PTA Honorary Service Award in 2003

Box described Havard as a master teacher in all areas, who is described by her students as a wonderful teacher who can make learning fun and interesting. One student even said she makes it easy to learn.

A parent commended her for her high standards, yet nurturing nature.

She is a PQR reviewer on the district level, and a BTSA Support Provider, as well as a member of the Gate Advisory Committee. She serves on many committees.

She knows the curriculum and she knows how to reach kids!

Allen Layne, Principal at Downey High School introduced teacher Bernard Glasser, as a great teacher.

"Your work has a profound affect on the present and future. Your enthusiasm opens minds and transforms lives," Layne said.

Glasser is an important member of the school's leadership team, and is a co-department chair of the 17-member Social Science Department, as well as Gate coordinator.

When he delivers one of his popular lectures on economics, history or psychology, students really get it. Their phenomenal pass rate in the advanced Placement Test proves this. Students remember him when they go on to college as a member of the teaching community who opened their minds to the future.

# Beethoven Concerto

# laced with genius

DOWNEY-An audience left the Downey Theater Sunday, Nov. 14 with an awareness that they had just experienced something rare and unusual-a classical piano performance of Beethoven's 3rd Piano Concerto which bordered on genius.

Norman Krieger placed his considerable reputation as a soloist on the line Sunday, taking grave musical risks, but raising his performance to classical heights not commonly achieved.

The audience, sensing the extraordinary, responded with a standing ovation that required many curtain calls, before they would let him retire

DOWNEY-Former major league pitcher Darrell Jackson, who currently serves as president and founder of the 10-20 Club which fights to keep "at risk" youngsters in school and resists gangs and drugs, will serve as celebrity marshal of this years Holiday Lane Parade.

The parade is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Dec. 5 on Downey Avenue between Lexington and Third Street, then east on Third to City Hall.

Jackson attended Locke High School and played with the Minnesota Twins as a pitcher. His college career at Arizona State saw him part of a national championship in 1977. He pitched five years in the major leagues after being called up by Minnesota in 1978.





# Man shot earlier dies after crash

**DOWNEY**—An unidentified man being rushed to a Downey hospital by two friends after he suffered a gunshot wound earlier died when their Jeep Cherokee collided with a car and flipped on its side, throwing him partially out of the vehicle and causing a head wound. The collision occurred around 3:30 p.m. Wednesday on Florence Avenue, near Tweedy Lane.

All the other passengers, including the driver of the other vehicle, suffered only minor injuries, police said.

The man was reportedly shot on Ira Avenue, just south of Florence Avenue, in Bell Gardens. It was not clear if he died of the gunshot wound or because of the crash. The man's identity is being withheld pending notification of kin.

An autopsy is pending.


The big parade is filled with local heroes like Jackson who have earned your applause. Come out and cheer. It is all free.

# Take down those political signs

**DOWNEY**—At the request of a caller we run this story on the law requiring political signs to be taken down within 10 days after an election. The Downey Code reads:

"All political signs shall be removed by the owner or the property owner within 10 days after the election to which the signs pertain."

# Holiday health a very weighty issue

**DOWNEY** — As seasons change and the holidays approach, many people will start eating more and exercising less. Although eating a second serving may not seem dangerous, a healthy weight is vital to a body's total well-being.

This is time of year when many of us slip into overeating and seem to lose focus on our healthy lifestyles. While we convince ourselves that we are only enjoying the season, we set a lower standard of health. A healthy weight is one that does not put someone at risk for weight-related diseases. Health risks begin as people move from a healthy weight into overweight and increase much more dramatically as they move from overweight to obese.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), five of the 10 leading causes of death in America can be linked to poor eating habits paired with insufficient exercise. Heart disease, some types of cancer, stroke, diabetes, liver disease and arteriosclerosis can often be associated with an unhealthy diet.

Physicians and patients can use the body mass index (BMI) to detect weight-related health risks. BMI is a measurement relating body fat to height and weight. A higher number denotes a greater health risk.

The emphasis should be on changing your diet, rather than just going on a diet. If food is consumed in moderation with appropriate portion size and combined with regular physical activity, most foods can fit into a healthy diet. Fad diets are not necessary, balance is the key. Try to take smaller portions of the high fat and high sugar foods, and avoid going back for seconds.

A diet is not the only factor influencing a healthy weight—age, metabolism, genetics and exercise also play a significant role in an individual's weight.

Age is an important factor in finding a healthy weight because as we mature through life, our bodies may require different levels of energy to achieve the very same task, metabolism changes as you age.

Metabolism, also known as a basal metabolic rate (BMR), is the average daily amount of energy needed by a body at rest. The average person's BMR accounts for approximately two-thirds of the energy s/he expends. This energy is used to maintain body temperature and power the heartbeat, breathing, and other organ functions. Age, height, body composition, and genetics determine how much energy a body will need. To maintain your current weight you need to take in the same amount of calories as food as your body expends (your BMR + any other physical activity).

Lastly, the exercise regime that an individual practices affects his or her weight directly. Exercise is paramount to achieving a healthy weight. Unfortunately, the holiday feasts are consumed during the winter months when physical activity generally declines significantly.

According to a 2003 survey by the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases, National Institutes of Health, only 22% of Americans currently exercise at recommended levels. The goal is at least 30 minutes of moderate exercise five or more days a week. But remember, any activity is better than none. Try walking for 10-30 minutes during a lunch break. Do some pushups or sit-ups during a commercial. Find any excuse to get up and move your body.

After considering all of the factors involved in finding a healthy weight, the easiest way to maintain a healthy weight is to remain health conscious at all times—even during the holidays. The best preventive medicine is not needing the medicine at all.
