Practicing some yoga with Downey's yogi

DOWNEY – Two weeks ago, a fascinating ball of positive energy bounced its way into the Downey Patriot office. Bronze-skinned and captivating, it was this city's unofficial self-help guru/celebrity life coach-Downey's answer to Dr. Phil.

Happiness, thy name is Yogi Ramesh.

Always the honest one, he'll poke your stomach while trying to guess your weight, and lead you in a breathing exercise to undo the 'smoking damage' you have very obviously suffered. From anybody else, it would have warranted a sneer; Yogi receives embarrassed admissions of guilt.

Quirky, yet lovable, he has been a yoga practitioner for more than 40 years, having honed his skills in his native India. He now runs Universal Yoga Center, based out of Downey. On this morning, he was in the office dropping off promotional material for his Oxygen Power Yoga and Laughter Therapy workshops at the community center. The idea was brought up of a possible feature story. Skeptical, I looked over his pam-

"[The class] induces mood-enhancing endorphins into the bloodstream creating a feeling of happiness while suppressing stress-inducing chemicals," one flyer promised. "Yogi Ramesh's lifelong mission is to give the knowledge of internal healing, and to have his students create the divine life that they are meant to live."

Riiiiiiight. I continued reading anyway.

"A celebrity guru, Yogi Ramesh has appeared on such television programs as The Roseanne Show and Oprah...'

OK, now he really wasn't helping himself.

Nonetheless, it's hard to say no to the guy, so I agreed to one Yogihosted yoga session, put on last Thursday at the Barbara J. Riley Community & Senior Center.

Much to my surprise, the class was populated by very normal-looking people. (Even Yogi was sporting a Paco Jeans sweatshirt.) One of which was Downey resident Sonia Dubon, 48, who credits Yogi's classes with helping eliminate her chronic back pain.

"It's easy with [Yogi]," Dubon said. "It's not like you see on TV, with people all twisted. He teaches balance, coordination, relaxation and, of course, healthy eating."

Indeed, Yogi's classes are as much about spiritual and emotional enrichment than bending into a human pretzel. He teaches to love one's body, literally. ("I love you heart!" he exclaims, clutching his chest. "I love you, I love you, I loooooove you!") And he believes that the country is overmedicated — if people simply learned to breathe properly, they could let go of stress a lot easier, saving themselves trips to the doctor's office.

"Loving, breathing, laughing, it's all good for heart disease," says Yogi, leading the class in breathing exercises. "They say, 'I got headache, I go to Rite-Aid, I get medicine...' I say 'Shut up! Be your own doctor. If you need them, they are there, but do not depend on them."

Apparently, Yogi is on to something because CareMore has employed the yoga master for five years running, deploying him to senior centers throughout the Southland.

Breathing is key to successful yoga, Yogi says, and he demonstrates how to channel oxygen to specific parts of the body. An inhalation of air and a tilt of the head pushes oxygen to the back of the brain, a surefire remedy for headaches. And the secret to losing weight? Breathe with your stomach, release with your mouth.

Of course, it was impossible in only one class to grasp the full complexities that make yoga what it is. While unorthodox, the class is far from silly, especially when considering the stakes involved: Los Angeles Unified School District teacher Michele Schutt uses Yogi's teachings as a tool in her battle against Parkinson's disease, and more than a couple are trying to do away with internal cancers.

Yet, even with such heavy-hearted issues lingering like dark clouds on the horizon, Yogi puts on a smiling face.

"If you are happy here, you will be happy there," he says, tapping his chest and pointing to the skies.

Police make arrests in robbery cases

DOWNEY—Police here have made arrests in separate robbery cases. Downey police took a lone male in custody Jan. 7 for a series of robberies that have plagued residents of a large apartment complex over the past

In a separate case, two males, one an adult and the other a juvenile, were arrested in Paramount following an armed robbery of a Downey donut shop earlier Sunday, Jan. 9.

In the first arrest, the suspect is believed to be the man who used a knife in a series of four armed robberies since early December in the complex of apartments at 10000 Imperial Highway. The suspect was held after a brief foot chase near the area of the holdup. Officers Dustin Doyle and Leandra Joy found him in his family's apartment at 9999 Imperial Highway, along with evidence linking him to the crime, police said.

Four counts of robbery have been filed against him by the D.A., and he is also wanted on warrants in prior burglaries.

Walk for Independence slated for Mar. 12

DOWNEY – The Arc Walk for Independence, the signature event for Arc of Southeast Los Angeles County, will be held Saturday, March 12 at the Stonewood Center near Acapulco Restaurant.

The Arc (formerly the Association for Retarded Citizens) has seen its annual event grow from 220 walkers in 1997 to more than 1,400 in 2004. In eight years it has raised more than \$380,000 to help people with developmental disabilities.

The event includes the choice of two walking courses: a one-mile and a three-mile course. A marching band, clowns and balloons regularly line the walk and prizes are awarded for the largest registered team, most sponsorship money raised, and other honors.

City's backup pact for legal services

DOWNEY—The City Council approved an agreement with the law firm of Oliver, Vose, Sandiver, Murphy and Lee for on-call legal services.

The contract approved Tuesday is a follow up to City Attorney Charles Vose's appointment as a City employee (full time), last month, and allows the City to call on the law firm to provide general legal service work at times when the City Attorney is on vacation or otherwise unavailable.

The estimated expense to the City is estimated at \$10,000 per year.

It was noted the cost is dependent on the amount of litigation the City faces, which varies widely from year to year.

Security hiked at Parking Structure

Guard patrols will help

DOWNEY-The City Council, acting as the Community Development Commission, has awarded a contract not to exceed \$45,000 to SOS Security Incorporated for security services at the City's Downtown Parking Structure.

The action was approved unanimously at Tuesday's regular Council

Councilman Meredith Perkins asked staff why surveillance electronics had not been included when the structure was built. He was told by staff that it had been considered but deemed impractical because of the low ceilings.

Hours varied

Total hours for the security guard patrols are estimated at 60 per week in the peak months of January, June and July; with four hours Mondays, four hours Tuesdays, four hours Wednesdays, six hours Thursdays, 14 hours Fridays, 14 hours Saturdays and 14 hours Sundays.

Recommended hours for guard patrols for the remaining nine months are set for 40 hours per week, with eight hours per day on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays and four hours Thursdays.

The cost breakdown is \$31,000 for the cost of patrol; \$11,000 for contingency and \$3,000 for the construction of a golf cart enclosure. The contingency inclusion is to provide special hours as need is found.

The golf cart itself will be a contribution from the city-owned Rio Hondo Golf Course.

Longtime trouble spot

The Parking Structure has been a problem since its completion with numerous burglaries and car vandalisms noted.

Idlers have often managed to elude police by melting into the nearby theater crowd in peak hours.

In other action Tuesday the Council:

Debate on committee jobs, hot and long

DOWNEY—Members of the City Council differed vehemently over the reassignment of board, committee and subcommittee jobs at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

Councilman Kirk Cartozian took exception to the realignment suggested by newly seated Mayor Anne Bayer which he said reduced his assignments by seven positions leaving him almost nothing to do.

To settle the debate that followed the Council decided to consider the lengthy list of assignments one-by-one.

While most of the assignments remained unchanged from the Mayor's original list, there were some key changes including Gangs Out of Downey (GOOD) which Cartozian will share primary representative with Councilman David Gafin; the City Chamber of Commerce Committee which Cartozian will share with Gafin; and the Downey Landing Park Site/Learning Center which he will share with Mayor Bayer.

Cartozian submitted a letter to the members of the Council which he read aloud. It read:

"Although the Mayor is responsible for suggesting such assignments, it is the City Council's duty to approve them. Noting the current recommendations for assignment, there is a drastic change from previous years. Due to such change, it is pertinent that the Council not approve the recommended assignment list by a slate vote.

"In the proposed list, I have been removed from seven assignments on which I had previously served. Most of those assignments had been for four years, during four different mayoral terms."

The Mayor responded to the letter's reading by assuring the Council and audience that she had considered her reassignments quite carefully.



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Continuity?

The proceedings at Tuesday night's City Council meeting were a perfect example of how division and dislike can make the process of routine business almost impossible.

The hard feelings in the wake of an abortive effort to fire the City Manager more than a month ago are still with us and surfaced Tuesday when the allocations of committee, subcommittee and board seats were recommended by the new Mayor, Anne Bayer. Her recommendations left Councilman Kirk Cartozian with seven fewer seats than he has been filling for the City.

Cartozian complained by reading a written statement at the council meeting. The result was the Council decided to laboriously plod through each committee and board assignment to each councilmember, approving each one by individual vote. Cartozian got some of his seats back. Others were reassigned as Bayer suggested.

When challenged over her earlier decision to remove seven positions from Cartozian she responded that she had considered each seat very carefully and thought each choice was better served by someone else. Even if this were so, removing him from seven seats would seem excessive. There is also something to be said for continuity.

It didn't have to come to this. But members of the Council have apparently not left the bitterness behind them. This is a real shame, because the Council has some important (even critical) decisions ahead of it including the revamping of the infrastructure to meet demands of the new Downey Landing development at the former NASA site, and negotiations with the County over Rancho Los Amigos.

We can once again, only plead for members of the City Council to leave the past battles and harsh words behind and try to work in a spirit of unity for the betterment of the entire city.

To continue in the spirit of Tuesday night would be tragic.

Congresswomen to visit Cerritos College

CERRITOS – Cerritos College will host Congresswomen Linda (D-39th) and Loretta Sanchez (D-47th) as keynote speakers for the college's recognition of Women's History Month. The Sanchezes are the first sisters and the first women of any relation to serve together in Congress.

Council receives fiscal 04 report

DOWNEY—The City Council received and filed the Comprehensive Financial Report for fiscal year ended June 30, 2004, at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

The latest report differs in presentation, due to implementation of government accounting standards requiring modifications that include the listing of all the City's assets (including streets, bridges, sidewalks and other public right-of-ways), and a new reporting format (believed to be more business-like).

A brief overview of the City's accomplishments for the fiscal year and how it controls its finances is most helpful.

Among accomplishments for the fiscal year are the progress in development of the former 160-acre NASA/Boeing property, of which 30 acres have been sold to Kaiser Permanente for construction of a new state-of-the art 450-bed Medical Center. Thirty-three acres have been purchased for a film production center and studio, with additional acres set for leasing as a studio addition.

The letter also notes the opening of the new Clubhouse facility at Rio Hondo Golf Club (city-owned), completed during the summer of 2004.

Other significant developments underway include the \$2 million Lakewood Boulevard Traffic Signal Communications project; a similar \$1.6 million for Firestone Boulevard; a \$546,000 Downtown Downey Concourse project (completed); a Firestone rehabilitation project budgeted for \$1.3 million to assist traffic for the Boeing project; and a \$7.7 million improvement plan for Lakewood Boulevard and Imperial Highway to facilitate access to the Boeing project.

The City has also sold 20 acres of the former NASA/Boeing site for development of a retail center to be completed in the fall of 2005, and 22 acres are slated for a park containing a Columbia Memorial Space Learning Center and Museum.

The letter vows to assist businesses here through a less intensive business license fee structure and various grant programs.

It also outlines the internal control structure designed to provide reasonable assurance. It also notes the independent audit by Diel, Evans and Company, LLP, included with the report.

It also notes that the City won an award for outstanding financial reporting for its 2003 comprehensive annual report, and that the report for 2004 has been submitted in hopes of similar recognition by the California Society of Municipal Finance Officers.

Financial highlights include that the assets of the City exceed its liabilities at the close of the current fiscal year by \$258.6 million. Of this amount, \$69.9 million (unrestricted net assets) may be used to meet the City's net obligations.

The city's total net assets increased by \$17.1 million. Of this, \$14.3 million is attributable to operations of business-type activities and \$2.9 million from government activities.

The city's long-term liability increased by 0.4 percent (\$256,000) during the current fiscal year.

At the close of the current fiscal year, the City's government funds reported total ending fund balances of \$46.1 million, an increase of \$3.8 million, including a \$5 million transfer out to the Employee benefit fund for future commitments.

For the General Fund, actual revenues (inflows) of \$53.8 million fell short of the final budgeted revenues of \$54.2 million by only \$417,000.

General Fund expenditures (outflows) for the current year were \$81 million. This was \$2.4 million less than the final budgeted expenditures of \$83.4 million.

The General Fund had no long-term debt outstanding at the close of the current fiscal year.



The disaster has provided us at West Middle School an opportunity to demonstrate empathy and concern for the well-being of others.

UCLA seeks adults for medical study

WESTWOOD—UCLA researchers are evaluating the effectiveness of Viagra compared with a placebo in treating pulmonary hypertension and idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis.

Idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis, a progressive disease causing inflammation and scarring of the lungs, affects five million worldwide. Ultimately, the loss of lung function leads to a lung transplant or death. The cause of idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis is unknown.

Pulmonary hypertension causes high blood pressure in the arteries leading from the heart to the lungs, causing a strain on the right side of the heart. The disorder affects over 50 percent of patients with idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis and worsens blood oxygenation, exercise capacity and survival

Dr. David A. Zisman, medical director of the Interstitial Lung Disease Program at UCLA and principal investigator, says: "Viagra widens the vessels supplying blood to the lungs so blood flow is improved. In idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis and pulmonary hypertension, Viagra would help by improving blood oxygenation, exercise tolerance and possibly survival."

To participate in the 4-week study, adults must have both idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis and pulmonary hypertension. Women cannot be pregnant. Some medications may be restricted during the study. After initial screening, participants will be randomly assigned to one of two groups. One group will take a 50-mg tablet of Viagra once, while the other group will receive a placebo tablet or inactive substance. During the second week, the groups switch, those taking Viagra will receive the placebo and those who had received the placebo will take Viagra.

Side effects of Viagra may include headaches, uterine contractions (similar to menstrual cramps), abnormal vision, low blood pressure, stomach upset, nasal congestion, flushing and dizziness.

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Seniors have new tool to stay safe when driving

DOWNEY – A new computer program that will help seniors selfassess their "driving health" in the privacy of their own homes is now available in the Automobile Club of Southern California's Downey district office, 8223 Firestone Blvd.

"Roadwise Review" is a CD-ROM program developed by AAA and other transportation experts. It includes scientifically validated testing of eight physical and mental skills that studies have shown are vital to safe driving. It is available at the Downey Auto Club office for the nominal fee of \$5 for members and \$7 for non-members, and within the next month it will also be available for free use at many local libraries and senior/community centers.

"As we get older, we all start to experience physical changes that can impact our driving abilities," Hend Hasrouni, the Auto Club's Downey district office manager said. "Because these changes often happen gradually, we may not even be aware of them. 'Roadwise Review' gives seniors objective feedback on their driving-related physical and mental skills, and offers specific recommendations so they can adjust their driving habits accordingly."

The Auto Club recommends that seniors use "Roadwise Review" annually to assess their skills, just like their regular doctor's checkup. The entire program takes about 40 minutes to perform and can be paused and

restarted. It is designed to be used with the assistance of a partner, such as a spouse, friend, child or grandchild. It tests abilities such as leg strength, visual acuity, and memory.

"Seniors who have gone through the test have told us it is fun and easy to use," Hasrouni said.

Most seniors are safe motorists. California drivers aged 50 to 60 are involved in fewer fatal and injury crashes per mile driven than any other age group. But after age 60, drivers' crash rates per mile driven start to rise. Lapses in visual and perception skills can increase drivers' likelihood of causing a crash as they age, and they are also more likely to die in crashes because of their increased physical frailty.





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


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
