L.A. Concertmaster plays here Jan. 29

DOWNEY—In its next concert scheduled for Saturday evening, Jan. 29, the Downey Symphony will present a program of Bartok Folk Dances, Haydn's "London" Symphony, and Dvorak's Violin Concerto, featuring soloist Martin Chalifour, Concertmaster of the Los Angeles Philharmonic. When the LA Phil gave its last concert in the Music Center's Chandler Pavilion just over a year ago, it was Chalifour who played the orchestra's final notes heard in that hall. The work was Fanz Joseph Haydn's "Farewell" Symphony, written in 1772, and there is a little story around that famous "farewell."

Haydn and his musicians had not had a vacation for many months from their intensive gig for a wealthy patron who kept them continually busy, composing, rehearsing and performing. They had not been home to see their families for a long time. So Haydn came up with a small conspiracy to drop a hint in his patron's ear. He wrote a symphony whose fourth movement gradually thinned down to nothing, no sound, no performers to make a sound. Following the score as written, the musicians began, one by one, to quietly leave their chairs, snuffing out candles on their music stands, and walking out of the room. Finally only one musician remained, the principal violinist. Soon he too played the last notes of the symphony, poofed the candle and departed. It was the farewell symphony which the LA Phil presented as its final work in the Music Center Pavilion before moving into the new Walt Disney Concert Hall.

And as Martin Chalifour's violin was the last voice from the Los Angeles Philharmonic heard in the Pavilion, it became the first orchestral voice heard in the new hall across the way. Standing beneath the glorious visual exuberance of Disney Hall's organ pipes, Principal Concertmaster Martin Chalifour played a solo work of Bach to open the inaugural gala program.

It will be our privilege to hear him, accompanied by the Downey Symphony under conductor Thomas Osborn, in a performance of Antonin Dvorak's Concerto for Violin that has no intention of thinning out at the end.

The orchestra's concert begins at 8 p.m. in the Civic Theater, at the corner of Firestone Boulevard and Brookshire Avenue. Dr. Osborn's preview discussion of the evening's music is at 7:15 and is free to ticket holders.

Reserved seat tickets to this program are \$10 to \$25 and may be purchased at the theater box office on Wednesday, Jan. 26, between noon and 4 p.m., or from 6 p.m. prior to the performance on Jan. 29. For information, call (562) 403-2944.

Symphony to honor Dr. Jordan Phillips

DOWNEY—Dr. Jordan Phillips, physician-educator, innovator, humanitarian, and a Downey resident of many years, will be honored for his contributions to the Downey Symphony at the orchestra's concert on Saturday evening, Jan. 29 in the Downey Civic Theater.

"On this occasion, we want to recognize Dr. Phillips," stated Harold Ttseklenis of the Symphonic Society, "as an internationally known philanthropist and a community benefactor. His recent generous gift has largely underwritten this performance, the second in the orchestra's 47th season."

1960...

Dr. Phillips' involvement with our local orchestra began in about 1960, when his wife, Ellie, "Downey's Grand Dame of Music", founded the Women's Committee for the Downey Symphony, now known as the

Symphony Guild, a fund-raising arm for the orchestra.

According to a history of the orchestra, one of Ellie Phillips' goals was for the Downey Symphony to present a concert in the Music Center's Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, "an ambition realized in 1977. As a birthday gift to his wife, the event was arranged by Dr. Jordan Phillips.... a second such concert was arranged in 1978, shortly following the death of Mrs. Phillips, as a tribute to her."

In the succeeding years, Dr. Philips has maintained an incredibly active schedule involving speaking engagements, lectures, conferences, writing and editing, always traveling, traveling, traveling.

Alternative uses for freeway water

DOWNEY—The large amount of water currently being drained from beneath the I-105 freeway and then dumped in the drainage system where it then runs to the sea may yet be put to good use if a study paid for by the Water Replenishment District of Southern California is positive.

The WRD, a regional water agency in charge of maintaining ground-water levels in the area, is financing the study by Carollo Engineers at a cost of \$389,743. It will study the 13 wells currently pumping water from beneath the freeway to determine if it can be used for non-drinking purposes at the Dominguez Gap Barrier in Wilmington.

Use of recycled water instead of fresh would mean less cost and more conservation of fresh drinking water.

The State Department of Health Services tentatively approved the project last March, if the study indicates the water is good enough for such use. The study itself will begin soon and take about eight months.

If it is approved by the state, the water will be pumped into a series of wells along the Dominguez Gap to block a threatened salt water intrusion from the sea that otherwise will eventually pollute the underground water supply.

A previous study by Caltrans and the City of Downey found that the water cannot be used for drinking unless it is extensively treated. Downey decided last year that it would be too expensive to build a treatment plant beside the freeway and transfer treated water to Downey's system.

The need for pumping the water from beneath the freeway which was completed in 1993 has caused a series of repair plans, finally resulting in the costly system of wells and pumps.

Caltrans has studied the alternative of building an eight-mile long pipeline to Wilmington and awarded \$8 million to finance it. It would run through Paramount, Lynwood, Compton, Long Beach and Carson, and carry about 8,000 acre feet a year.

DOWNEY—The Board of the Downey Unified School District heard presentations honoring Certificated employee Cherry Marks of Griffiths Middle School and Joyce Pitts, Classified employee, for their outstanding service in the area of Personnel to the District.

Inland truck depot said freeway answer

LOS ANGELES—At its Governing Board meeting Jan. 13, the Alameda Corridor Transportation Authority (ACTA) approved an ambitious new initiative to promote developing an inland truck depot as part of an expanded mission to reduce port-related congestion and solidify Southern California's position as the nation's pre-eminent trade center.

The proposed depot would provide a facility where containers being shipped during expanded port hours can be parked prior to their daytime delivery to distribution centers throughout Southern California.

Reduced traffic

"The development of an inland truck depot will go a long way toward reducing port-related traffic and addressing one of the most important issues associated with expanded port hours," said Los Angeles City Councilwoman and ACTA Board Chair Janice Hahn. "ACTA is taking a lead role in the development of this and other critical elements of a regional goods movement network for Southern California."

"While considerable work remains, we are very pleased with the progress being made to implement ACTA's expanded mission," said Long Beach City Councilman and ACTA Board Vice Chair Frank Colonna. "Adding the development of an inland truck depot will only enhance overall efforts to make the critical investments our region needs to keep up with current and future cargo demands on Southern California's trade network."

Pier Pass program

ACTA is already supporting efforts by the marine terminal at the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach to implement the "Pier Pass" program to extend the hours of operation at both ports in an effort to reduce truck traffic during peak driving times. The ACTA Governing Board also authorized ACTA management to begin the implementation of a shuttle train demonstration project to further increase the use of rail facilities to move goods in and out of the ports and reduce freeway congestion. Finally, ACTA, in cooperation with Caltrans, has nearly completed the environmental documents associated with developing a four-lane elevated expressway on State Route 47 to alleviate truck congestion. The documents are expected to be completed by the end of the year. ACTA will pursue various federal, state and local funding opportunities over the course of the coming year to implement that critical project.

Already in service

The new inland truck depot initiative will augment these and other elements of the expanded mission adopted by ACTA last year. Similar facilities are already in service near the ports to relieve storage-related congestion, and an inland facility would further reduce the number of trucks using area streets and highways during daytime hours. The inland facility could also hold some of the cargo handled by the shuttle train demonstration project as well as provide another facility to temporarily house empty containers.



Grant to go towards DRMC nursing program

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


- Make six separate "rolling stolen" (suspect occupied) in-custody arrests;

Medical Books for China

And all this does not even touch the great work he founded 25 years ago, Medical Books for China. Since 1981, this organization has shipped medical books, none older than 10 years, to more than 1,000 medical libraries in China. The number of volumes can't be counted any more, nor even the number of tons of books collected, sorted, shipped and distributed. Dr. Phillips and his wife, Mary, accompany many of the shipments.

Phillips

These books cover all disciplines, and that translates to basic medical practice, nursing, dentistry, psychiatry, animal lab science, veterinary medicine, rehabilitation, physical therapy, public health, opththalmology, bio-medical research, hospital management and hospital architecture.

With all this going on in his life, how can a man remember that there is a little pervasive problem at home, that his city's very good orchestra, one of few remaining in Southern California, still struggles for financial support? It is indeed an indication of Jordan and Mary Phillips' commitment, to further both the health of the human condition and of the human spirit, that they do remember.

Last September, when Dr. and Mrs. Phillips visited the Board meeting of the Downey Symphonic Society to present their check for \$10,000, Dr. Phillips mentioned rather casually that he had been nominated three times for the Nobel Peace Prize, and he added, with twinkling eyes that he feels ready to accept it any time. If it informs the Nobel Committee at all, the Symphony Board would greet word of such honors with a standing ovation and second the nomination heartily.


The play is said to have had an impact on children and students who have seen it as part of BFA's Introduction to the Classics education series.
