## Haydn's last symphony featured tomorrow

DOWNEY—The great Franz Joseph Haydn was on a roll. Had been for years. By the middle of 1795, he had composed a prodigious body of music, sonatas, quartets, concertos, operas, masses—plus a mere 103 symphonies. He was widely praised on the continent and in England, an industrious, playful, successful genius, kindly Papa Haydn.

But he hadn't spoken all his music yet, not by a long shot. Fresh material kept flowing from mind to pen and in the same year that the 103rd symphony was completed, the 104th sprang into being also, written in London. It would be his final symphony, and it is among the works being performed by the Downey Symphony Orchestra on Saturday evening, Jan. 29 in an 8 p.m. concert at the Downey Civic Theater.

Under artistic Director and Conductor Thomas Osborn, the orchestra opens with Bela Bartok's marvelous Rumanian Folk Dances, followed by the Haydn, and Dvorak's Violin Concerto with Martin Chalifour, Principal Concertmaster of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, as soloist.

A rich feast indeed, and for the dessert course, Dr. Osborn has programmed Rimsky-Korsakov's familiar, always fun "Flight of the Bumblebee." Rimsky was such a consummate master of orchestration, the art of composing and arranging for that intricate entity called "the orchestra," that his textbook on the subject is still in use today, nearly 100 years after his death.

This will be the second concert of the orchestra's 47th season, and is dedicated to Dr. Jordan Phillips for his many years of support and the generous underwriting of this evening's performance. Dr. Osborn's preview discussion begins at 7:15 p.m. for all ticket holders.

Tickets priced at \$10 to \$25 are available after 6 p.m. Jan. 29 at the theater box office, 8435 Firestone Blvd., at Brookshire. Ample free parking surrounds the theater.

# Downey Rotary goes international

NAIROBI, KENYA – A news article in the Orange County Register last month piqued the interest of Downey Rotary President Doug Baker. The story, dated Dec. 2, 2004, told of a crisis in Kenya, Africa. AIDS was ravaging the country (the continent, to be entirely accurate). An estimated 600 to 900 people were dying every 24 hours, and what once were sprawling city hubs were slowly being transformed into desolate ghost towns, ruining the country's already fragile economic footing.

Horrible news, for sure, Baker thought, but what was happening to the children?

And so that is how another Rotary project came to be, the group identifying a problem and working quickly to tackle it. In this case, Downey Rotary worked in conjunction with Rotary of Redlands and Kenya Rotary and provided funding to establish a sanctuary for orphaned girls, who are customarily considered of less value than boys.

Yes, take the one-and-a-half-day plane trip to Kenya and you'll find hanging outside a rustic two-story colonial house, with cows lulling lazily about, a banner that reads: "The Shepherds Home – Segona, Kenya – A Partnership with the Rotary Club of Downey, California." A global organization, indeed.


At the orphanage, the girls are afforded an education, health referrals and psychological counseling, among other benefits. And because in Kenya the death of a parent to AIDS is not a matter of if, but when, children are trained how to become responsible heads of households.

Downey Unified School District Superintendent Wendy Doty recently returned from a trip to Kenya, where she toured the orphanage and mingled with its 23 habitants.

"The house has a tin roof, with no water and no plumbing," Doty said, visibly emotional. "But to see the house the kids live in, they are far better off than where they'd be otherwise."

Before coming home, Doty took in a song and dance performance

# Synthetic grass eyed by Council

DOWNEY-Councilman Dave Gafin told City staff Tuesday he wants a close study of the newly developed synthetic grass which the Water Replenishment District of Southern California is touting as a new tool for water conservation.

Gafin told the Board that if it is as good as the Water District suggests in press releases and news stories he would like to see it used in future medians installed in Downey.

On other subjects, Gafin said he enjoyed the anniversary luncheon Friday at the Rio Hondo Country Club honoring Chamber past presidents and the Chamber of Commerce's 102nd birthday.

Councilman Meredith Perkins said he also enjoyed the chamber event. And he said he wants a follow-up report in a year on the sums paid the city lobbyist in Sacramento.

#### Permit process

Councilman Kirk Cartozian said he wants a report on how the streamlining of the permit process at City Hall is doing.

Members of the Downey City Council were unanimous in congratulating city staffers, committee members and all who contributed to the Downey Vision 2025 Report.

Former City Councilman Keith McCarthy spoke in behalf of the Orange-Line rail proposal, saying he knew it was futuristic but after some study he had been turned into a believer.

Representatives from the Bellflower and Cerritos City Councils also spoke in favor of the Orange-Line.

# Council adopts plan for 2025: A vision of hope for the future

DOWNEY—The City Council, after a public hearing, has adopted Downey Vision 2025, a comprehensive update of the City's General Plan which includes chapters on land use, circulation, conservation, safety, noise, open space, design and economic development for the next score of years. It also certifies an Environmental Impact Report.

The action was at Tuesday's regular council meeting.

**Intensive study** 

The plan is the product of long, hard work by members of the City Council, Planning Commission, a General Plan Committee appointed by the Council, and city staff. The goal is to enhance Downey's role as the quality city in the southeast Los Angeles County while providing housing, education, employment and recreational opportunities and a safe and affordable environment.

It is noted the past decade has seen an increase in average household size in Downey, which is expected to continue, though at a slower rate of increase. Population is expected to reach 118,552 by 2025.

**Balanced uses** 

The plan attempts to maintain a balance of land uses while retaining open space that remains available and still encourage jobs.

One aspect of the plan is the completion of Downey Landing on a portion of the former NASA/Boeing property. The former 168 acres of land will also include a 30-acre Kaiser Medical complex, a motion picture production lot known as Downey Studio, and a park, museum and space learning center.

The significance of the Green Line Station on Lakewood is also stressed, which allows transition to transit-oriented development.

The plan sets forth advanced livable community concepts to promote pedestrian, transit and alternate modes of travel to the automobile.

It also seeks to promote the downtown as an entertainment, dining, civic and shopping area.

**Trends** 

It tries to take into account changes in land use trends, noting that the existing development standards in the Downey Municipal Code date to 1977. It also aims to coordinate and monitor actions by state, federal and regional agencies on issues that may impact Downey.

Above all it tries to maintain and upgrade the neighborhoods that have ovided local residents a high standard of life for many years here. Mansionazation is addressed by using floor area ratios.

Traffic congestion is addressed with a goal of maintaining traffic circulation along a system of arterial, secondary arterial and collector roads and local streets including a Signal System Master Plan and improved turn lanes at key intersections.

#### Alternate travel means

Alternate means of travel are promoted to avoid congestion. Truck traffic, particularly on the 710 Freeway, is addressed. Truck routes will be strictly enforced, as well as street parking of big-rigs.

Cooperation with the Joint Powers Authority to solving the problem of increased traffic on the I-5 freeway is noted.

Railroad delays at rail crossings are also a continued problem.

The City faces a problem in costs of upgrading its aging infrastructure including water, sewers, roads and energy. The plan suggests prioritization wherever possible.

Downey draws water supplying 95 percent of its needs from local wells. The basin is naturally recharged, but also receives supplemental allocated water as determined by the Water Replenishment District of Southern California, which determines the amount of recharging needed. Water conservation is stressed as a future as well as present need.

#### **Stormwater runoff**

Stormwater contamination through runoff is an increasing problem, and the City faces tough new storm runoff regulations. Worsening air quality is noted, as is the need for solid waste disposal.

# City loans \$800,000 to Development Agency

**DOWNEY**—Acting as the Community Development Commission, the City Council has approved an agreement for the City to loan \$800,000 to the Community Development Agency to finance future projects and operating procedures.

The action was at Tuesday's Community development portion of the City Council meeting.

The loan is to be repaid to the City at 12 percent interest, and will pro-

vide working capital for the Woodruff and Firestone Project Areas. The loan to the Firestone Project Area amounts to \$600,000 and is necessary since the Area began the year with \$1.3 million and is expected to incur expenses of \$792,000. \$600,000 is believed to insure a reasonable level of operating capital.

A similar loan of \$200,000 is needed since the Woodruff Area began the year with \$151,000 and is expected to incur expenses of \$130,000. \$200,000 is expected to provide a reasonable margin of operating funds.

It was noted the 2005-05 budget includes a provision for this \$800,000 loan. Estimated revenue from the Firestone Project Area is \$2,673,000,



# Local student named Spotlight semi-finalist

the children and met with the president of Nairobi Rotary. Together, they discussed their hopes of bringing running water and other very basic functions to the orphanage.

"Last year, a woman in Nairobi, Kenya won the Nobel Prize," Baker, Rotarian president, said, referring to Wangari Maathai, founder of Africa's largest community-based environmental organization. "There's no reason to believe that one of the girls going through our sanctuary won't be the second. People will say, 'Well, gee, Doug, shouldn't we be putting our money into our community?' It's Rotary International, not Rotary Down the Street.

"This project isn't about AIDS. It's about children who have no parents. No one to hug them, no one to tuck them in at night. It's about them. We can make a difference. This is what it's all about."

Rotarians insist on calling the orphanage a sanctuary, which isn't a stretch of the truth because if not for the home, the children would be on the streets, or worse. Superintendent Doty recalled meeting a 16-year-old girl, banished from her home after her parents died because she was considered too large a burden to support.

It was good to see Keith McCarthy at Tuesday's City Council meeting. Even though he has been forced to step down from the Council by Downey's Term Limits law, McCarthy's experience and acumen have been invaluable in the past.

He addressed the Council Tuesday over the report on Downey Vision 2025, a comprehensive report on where Downey is headed.

McCarthy took dead aim at area O (the Foster-Edison right-of-way) which was listed in the report as open space. McCarthy, in a letter to the Council, referred to it as weeds that grow to six feet high, which effectively catch trash and debris making it "plug-ugly." He called the area an embarrassing blight, and urged postponement of open space designation until it could be thoroughly investigated.

Councilman Meredith Perkins, in his motion to accept and file the comprehensive report, noted O be changed to medium density housing.

As we said, it was good to see McCarthy still cares and has input.

Other suggestions by McCarthy that show promise included a pedestrian mall running east from the Civic Center to Paramount along Third Street. And the use of the Rives Mansion as an architectural and cultural resource, working with the owners to maximize its usage and appearance.

And the expansion of Apollo Park by the acquisition of a portion of Rancho Los Amigos should the County decide to convert use of the historic rehabilitation center. It seems natural to expand Apollo westward across Rives Street.

The students, their parents or guardians and the art teacher will be flown to Washington for the exhibit opening. The school of the winning student will receive a \$600 gift certificate for art supplies. In addition, posters of the winning entry will be distributed throughout the district.

The second, third, and honorary mention entries will be displayed for one year in Roybal-Allard's office. The winners will also receive scholarships to attend an accredited two or four-year higher education institution, gift certificates, and cash awards.

"The congressional student art competition helps to build self-esteem and provides us with insights into the life experiences, challenges, and joys of our young artists," Roybal-Allard said. "The art competition is also an opportunity to recognize the teachers and those who often provide their own resources to ensure that students have the basic tools to develop their talents."

#### A cry for help

Dear Editor:

I'm a single 53-year-old industrially-injured dock worker struggling to support my family of four. Two years ago my first three-hour surgery fused three inches off my lower neck. I have made a bold recovery after surgery; however my neck is often in disabling pain. My injuries have created a deep weakness in my upper and lower body.

Because of low back pain in the morning, I have been incapable of walking about four out of seven days a week. My orthopedic neurosurgeon has requested another surgery to fuse two or three inches off my lower back. Because of my general overall weakness, I fell and broke the steel shaft on my homemade cane made from a golf club. I have fallen down a lot lately. I'm suffering from chronic fatigue syndrome. I gave up most of my driving months ago, and I don't like to go outside often. It's so very hard just to catch and use the bus lines these days. I find myself struggling to sit for 30 to 40 minutes on the cold ground, because bus pick-up points don't all offer benches.

At some time the City of Downey put up temporary no-parking signs on my street, 3rd Street, marking their parade route last month. I asked the police department when the signs were posted, which they did not know. On Dec. 5, Downey Police towed my car with a disabled parking placard swinging from the rearview mirror. I never saw the no-parking signs out there, I never had a chance.

The thoughtful action of towing a car with a handicapped placard cost me \$90 to release my car and \$179 to remove it from the impound yard, and about \$90 in bounced checks. The impound yard charged me \$25 per day to park there – I could have picked up my car sooner, though no one notified me.

I have asked the City of Downey two times to put in more disabled parking for the people of our apartment, the last time being just under two

My apartments, The Vikings, were built over 45 years ago and do not offer any disabled parking spaces. The apartments were built so long ago that the manager isn't required to install them. And I don't think it's the manager's responsibility to fix this parking problem, either. I look to the City of Downey to fix this problem.

I'm alone and really have overtaxed my family and friends with my many requests for help. I have just lived through three years of pain, and it looks like I'm in for more. I have called some friends for help, but as of yet they're avoiding me.

I tend to be viewed by the world as a grouchy bear that lives alone. No, I really don't know where to turn for help or direction. No one knows the pain of abandonment more than the disabled.

I am most grateful for all of the individuals who assisted me that night, and helped to make a horrendous ordeal somewhat bearable.

### Trip to Cerritos Library worth time and effort

"Who knew?" This was the remark heard more than once as the busload of people from Downey marveled at the beauty and size of the Cerritos Library.

Planned as a free outreach project by the Downey Symphony Guild, this outing was an opportunity to introduce the community to what is considered to be the most ambitious municipal library [project ever attempted] in the U.S.

A spectacular saltwater aquarium with a viewing area 10 feet by 21 feet is seen as one enters the building. One side of this attraction can be viewed from the Children's Area, which is filled with fascinating exhibits designed to inpire youngsters to read and use their imagination. This area features an authentic-looking 40-foot-long replica of a Tyrannosaurus Rex fossil named Stan, a lighthouse, a rainforest tree, and a space shuttle.

Themed spaces to stimulate the imagination and interest include a corridor called "Main Street," which captures the concept of honoring the past and imagining the future. It leads patrons from areas of traditional library services to the 2nd and 3rd levels with state-of- the-art information

An Old World Reading Room with rich dark colors, comfortable furniture, and a fireplace with a realistic hologram of a fire, adds to the room's peaceful appeal for patrons who would like to sit and read a book.

A Great Room features Arts and Crafts style furnishings. The Art Deco room houses the Young Adult collection with architectural designs of that period. A wall of etched glass separates this room from the Multimedia Collections which include compact discs, digital video discs and video


Eighty-six computer workstations are located on the second floor and a High-Tech training lab accommodates 26 people in a tiered setting with computer workstations available for each participant.

As if all this were not enough, museum quality artwork can be found throughout the building. Of particular note was the six-part blown glass and installation by Dale Chihuly, an internationally-known glass artist. These amber-toned wall sconces gracing the library's Main Street, look like sea anemones or spun sugar candies and are comprised of 400 individual glass elements.

The curving exterior of the second and third floors is wrapped in a fluid-like, golden skin of titanium. This is the first titanium-clad public building in North America. This material displays subtle color shifts as it catches the sun's rays filtered by changing atmospheric conditions.

Beautiful inside and out, this library affords a rewarding, memorable experience. A short drive to Cerritos at 18025 Bloomfield Avenue will get you there. The phone number is (562) 916-1340. Prepare to be dazzled!


