Commentary Stewart and Gray death is said a suicide

DOWNEY-The County Coroner's Office found Tuesday that a man died from a single self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head after a standoff escalated to a shootout with sheriff's deputies at a home in the 9100 block of Stewart and Gray Road here Sunday.

A caller to this paper Wednesday asked that this story reflect something positive—but he could not say just how.

But he wanted a positive turn in the story of the life and death of Daniel Balarie, who the Coroner's office ruled Tuesday shot himself in the head after a standoff escalated to a shootout with sheriff's deputies at his parents' barricaded home in the 9100 block of Stewart and Gray Road Sunday.

DOWNEY-Downey Police officers responded to reports of shots in the 7300 block of Benares Street at about 1:38 a.m., Sunday, and found three gunshot victims, Noe Garcia, 20, of Downey; Juan Garcia, 19, of Los Angeles; and a female juvenile of Bell.

Juan Garcia and the female juvenile were treated by Downey paramedics and transported to a local hospital where they were listed in stable condition. Noe Garcia was pronounced dead at the scene.

Witnesses told police an altercation took place at a party. A suspect described as a male Hispanic 18 to 20 years of age produced a handgun and began firing, bullets hitting the three victims. He fled the scene on foot.

Board of Directors named for Space Learning Center

Community leaders Lopez and Waters

DOWNEY-The Downey City Council has named the first Board of Directors of the Downey Memorial Space Science Learning Center.

The action at Tuesday's regular Board meeting creates a panel of five members to oversee the operation of the Learning Center. They are the Community Services Director (or designee) who will serve as Board President; the City Manager (or designee) who will serve as Treasurer; the Mayor who will serve as Secretary; and Board Members Orlandus Water and Raul Lopez.

Collaborate

The City Staff recommended the above-named with the purpose of the forming of a Foundation which will, "work collaboratively with the City of Downey to promote the betterment of the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center, a public museum to be owned and operated by the City of Downey. Such collaborative work will include, but not be limited to, providing financial and other related assistance to promote the activities of the Center, and to perform all other charitable, scientific and educational corporate purposes consistent therewith."

At first a three-member board was visualized, but staff later changed it to include five. It is expected that Lopez will benefit the board through community involvement and business knowledge, and Waters has extensive connections with former employees of the Rockwell/Boeing era and will be able to assist the Board in tapping that resource.

The Mayor's appointment will be concurrent with the present term and will rotate on a yearly basis. By having the Mayor and two staff members on the Board it will keep the Foundation closely allied with the City which owns the project.

By-laws next

The new Board of Directors must next approve by-laws and file same with the federal government to establish a corporation. Once filed, the Board will then be tasked with soliciting funding to assist with construction of the facility and purchase of exhibits. Staff voiced optimism that the potential is there to wean the learning center from the City and its resources in time. Councilman Rick Trejo said he was glad to see the panel take shape. Councilman Kirk Cartozian said he hopes the subcommittee on which he now serves can help.

DOWNEY-The City Council, acting as the Community Development Commission, has certified the annual election of the Project Area Committee.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Community Development meeting. The staff report noted that the PAC election was conducted Oct. 5, 2004. The results were received by City staff Jan. 13, in the form of a letter from the PAC Secretary.

The results recognized two re-elected and seven newly elected members to the Committee. Since the election three of the newly elected members have been removed due to lack of attendance, leaving four newly elected members.

The results include in the business category re-elected Guy Sterner and newly elected Jose Bourdaa; in the resident owner category, re-elected Aostara Kaye, and newly elected Fernando Wang, Lilia Bramont, and Esequiel Bramont (alternate). There were no elected members in the resident tenant and organization categories.

In addition, the PAC Committee elected Michael Sullivan as Chair, Guy Sterner as Vice Chair, and Aostara Kaye as Secretary.

The letter from the PAC Secretary identifies only the net results of the election and does not detail removals, resignations and appointments to the committee.

At a following meeting, in the organization category Michael Hutchinson was appointed to fill the resignation declared by John Matarazzo. Over the course of the year member resignations were received and honored for Miguel Lopez, Bill Harrison and Lennie Whittington.

In other action the City Council Tuesday:

*Considered additional criteria for policy dealing with naming of City facilities, then by a 3-2 vote decided to not consider the matter further, Cartozian and Gafin dissenting.

*Adopted an ordinance amending the speed limits on Lakewood Boulevard. The limits will remain the same.

*Adopted a resolution approving the destruction of certain obsolete records by the Fire Department.

*Approved the final initial study/environmental assessment for the Park and Columbia Space Learning Center to be located at Lakewood Boulevard and Clark Avenue.

*Approved the appropriation of \$3,500 for the City to host the Board of Directors of the California Contract Cities Association dinner meeting in March.

*Set a public hearing for Feb. 22 on a proposed shared use agreement at 8206 Firestone, Downey Billiards, 8222 Firestone, Storm Force, 8224 Firestone, Net Electronics and 8228 Firestone, Lulu's Bakery.

Council applauds fine

DOWNEY—The City Council has passed a resolution approving the final Study/Environmental Assessment for the Columbia Memorial Space Learning Center and Downey Landing Park.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

The city in September 2004 entered a professional agreement with Camp, Dresser & McKee. Inc. (CDM) for the preparation of environmental and review documents.

Plans are for an 11-acre park and two-acre aerospace science learning center on a portion of the former NASA site. CDM prepared documents to address concerns of the State Environmental Quality Act and the National Environmental Protection Act.

Comments from both the City and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development included, and the documents were completed in December.

A Mitigated Negative Declaration/Finding of Non Significant Impact was found appropriate to this project. Fifteen copies were then submitted to the state Clearinghouse which distributed them. No state agencies submitted comments.

Public notice was also made in the Press-Telegram. No comments were received from the public.

Per CEQA, an antiquated negative declaration is appropriate for the project. The Council resolution has no direct financial impact.







SUICIDE

Daniel Balarie was from a strong family. The caller said the family came to this country to find a better way, and succeeded through hard work. Family members were honored in recent years by a presentation of the City's Parents of the Year Award.

But for Daniel, age 35, it never quite worked out. Despite academic achievement comparable to other members of the family, police said Daniel appeared to have recurring problems with authority.

Downey police who were called to his parents' home Sunday morning said he had crossed their paths several times in recent weeks, and had actually gotten in a physical struggle with an officer on one occasion.

What police found when they arrived at the home about 7:45 a.m., was near chaos.

Daniel's father and a friend of the family had apparently tried to reason with him. The family friend suffered a 22-caliber bullet wound to the back fired from a handgun by the troubled man.

When police asked his whereabouts, they discovered he had barricaded the house by nailing the doors and windows shut.

Downey Officers then called for reinforcements from the county sheriff's Crisis Negotiation Team.

The neighborhood was evacuated and a period of negotiation extended until about 2:40 p.m., as crisis negotiators and a psychologist tried to work out a peaceful solution.

At about 2:40 p.m., the shootout erupted. About 90 minutes later the special team members entered the home and found Balarie's body.

At first it was unclear whether death came from sheriff's deputies' bullets fired during the exchange or from his own weapon. The coroner's office ruled it a case of suicide Tuesday.

Neighbors said the owners of the home, Ion and Maria Balarie, the dead man's parents, had been polite and friendly, but appeared to know little about their son's recent troubles.

Homicide detectives said the investigation continues.

Positive aspects might be considered to be the fact that neighbors were successfully evacuated and put up at the Community Center by the City's Community Emergency Response Team during the day-long episode, and that no officers were hit by bullets. But what seemed so desperately needed here was intervention that might have averted the deadly shootout. Intervention when letters and actions first indicated there was a real problem.

Weekend violence hits too close to home

When it rains, it pours.

This week, the city of Downey was scene to two fatal shootings, vastly different in execution and motive, but identical in their degree of senselessness

Sunday morning, a 35-year-old man barricaded himself inside his Stewart & Gray Road home, initiating a police standoff that ultimately led to his being shot and killed. An autopsy eventually confirmed a suicide.

Reports have the man, Daniel Balarie, as being mentally disturbed and recently fighting with police at the city library.

Earlier that Sunday morning a more tragic, albeit less sensational, story emerged of a shooting at a house party in west Downey that left one person dead and two others wounded.

One person dead and two others wounded. This newspaper isn't used to such reporting.

Perhaps because of the absence of SWAT and crisis negotiators, the party shooting seemed to go largely unnoticed, dismissed as the actions of another wayward youth who slipped, fell and tumbled violently through society's cracks.



SCAG report gives low marks to region

LOS ANGELES—Worsening traffic congestion and air quality, the lack of affordable housing and the loss of high-paying manufacturing jobs present a real threat to maintaining Southern California's quality of life, according to a new State of the Region report released recently by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), of which Downey is a member.

The State of the Region serves as an annual "Report Card" for the 6county SCAG region, and rated its performance in 7 policy categories: transportation (D-), employment (B), income (C-), housing (D+), air quality (C-), safety (B), and education (D).

"Southern California is one of the most dynamic regions in the world, but the challenges we face are significant," said Riverside Mayor Ron Loveridge, who chairs the SCAG task force that developed the report. "We sincerely believe that this report should serve as an alarm bell for the region and for elected officials at all levels of government."

With the region's ranking as the most congested in the country, its air quality grade also declined, as both the South Coast and Salton Sea Air Basins continued to exceed federal standards for particulate pollution. Housing affordability continues to be a significant hurdle, with less than one-third of the region's households able to afford a median-priced home in Southern Calfonira, compared to more than half of the households nationally.

Employment presented a little better picture: after losing 21,000 jobs in 2002, the region achieved a 14,000 increase in job generation in 2003 while the rest of the nation continued to decline. In terms of income, the region plummeted from the 4th highest in 1970 among the nation's 17 largest metropolitan regions to 16th in 2003, with nearly 15 percent of the region's population living in poverty. Education represents one of the report's worst grades: eight graders continued to perform below the national median in reading and math test scores, with large disparities in educational attainment for the Latino and African-American communities when compared to non-Hispanic White and Asian populations. One other bright spot is safety: violent crime rates across the region declined by nearly 6 percent, although Los Angeles county continues to have among the highest rates in the nation.

Lang is a local building contractor and has been a resident of Downey most of his life. He is also the spiritual and administrative leader of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (the Mormons) in Downey and in neighboring communities to the west. As leader of this large group, he has overseen numerous community service projects. These volunteers have worked with Keep Downey Beautiful and PTA HELPS where food is collected and distributed to needy families in Downey. The church volunteers, under Lang's leadership, have fed the homeless one night a month at the Bell Shelter of the Salvation Army. Their ongoing project is in its 10th year. On the projects with Keep Downey Beautiful, Lang can be found working side-by-side with his volunteers.

On three occasions, the Downey City Council has recognized him and the church volunteers for their efforts. Recently, he was presented with a special award for outstanding service from the Downey Coordinating Council. Add to this the Boy Scout's Silver Beaver.



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

The hospital's trauma center is designed to ensure that patients are taken to their local hospital in a timelier manner, and will ultimately increase a patient's chances of survival. The quick response allows doctors to take advantage of the "golden hour" – the 60 critical minutes when a life hangs in the balance.

The acute care hospital serves an average of 200 inpatients daily. More than 53 percent of the California Hospital Medical Center's patient population qualifies for government-assisted health care.

"This new facility is more than a building, it's a symbol for the community, a community that doesn't always have access to healthcare services," said Speaker Nunez. "And it is a symbol that says we are committed to both saving lives, and helping people lead healthier ones."





Story of two rivers depicted in mural

LONG BEACH—A mural exhibit that explores the journey of water from the mountains to the sea, "Rios de la Vida" (Rivers of Life), has debuted at the Aquarium of the Pacific, 100 Aquarium Way in Long Beach. It is free and runs through April 30.

The ceramic mosaic mural surrounds the city of Long Beach's Wave Fountain and presents a tapestry of images that evoke the two uniquely urban rivers-the Los Angeles and San Gabriel. We hope this exhibit inspires stewardship by providing educational information on our local rivers, watersheds, and the animals that depend on them," said Aquarium of the Pacific president & CEO Jerry R. 



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
