

Council hears good status reports by NASA developers

All good except for weather

DOWNEY-Status reports by the three developers of the former NASA property brought smiles to the faces of the City Council Tuesday.

The reports delivered in a special session before the regular Council meeting was very upbeat with Doug Gray, representing Downey Landing, the major retail portion of the development, promising to have his first major stores open before Christmas, with more to follow shortly.

Elevated sketches

He gave the Council elevation sketches of some of the stores he expects to be part of the new retail development including an Elephant Bar and Restaurant, a PetsMart, a Ross Dress for Less, Best Buy, and a Chili's. Kaiser Permanente spokesmen had good news as well. The only setback has been the weather, and the hospital complex set on 30 acres of the former NASA/Boeing site is proceeding well. The hospital, one of three major structures slated for the Kaiser site-the other two being office medical buildings— is slated for an expected completion date of 2008.

Downey Studios

A spokesman for the third developer, Downey Studios, said things appeared good with power being installed in the back lot and filming continuing on several major motion pictures, and about to begin on two TV pilots.

It was pointed out that no other studio facility in the Southland offers the spacious facilities and flexibility than that of which Downey Studios can boast.

The bottom line in terms of the studio facility will be the many satellite shops and functions expected to move in and fill up around the major filmers when completed.

It was suggested that since Downey Studios is a major weapon in the U.S. and California's arsenal to keep filmmakers from being lured abroad, that Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger be invited on a personal tour here. The governor has made keeping filmers in the Southland area a battle-cry portion of his economic recovery package.

Can sheriff hike fees for service?

DOWNEY-The Downey City Council has adopted a resolution asking the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors for a fair audit of sheriff's costs charged to taxpavers of the contract cities that use the sheriff's services.

The action was at Tuesday's Council meeting.

As background, on Feb. 16, Mayor Pro Tem Meredith Perkins attended the monthly Board of Directors' meeting of the California Contract Cities Association (CCCA). At the meeting the Association adopted a resolution in opposition to the L.A. County's desire to charge both contract and noncontract cities a higher rate for sheriff's services. At the meeting the Executive Director of the CCCA asked that member cities adopt a resolution in support of the CCCA's action.

While the City of Downey does not contract for sheriff's services, the city does use the sheriff's department for issues that it does not have either equipment or specialized units for. Such operations would include officerinvolved shootings, crime lab, jail system, etc.

The Los Angeles County Auditor Controller is studying whether cities such as Downey can be charged for these services.

Suggested uses for HUD funds are heard

DOWNEY—The City Council held a public hearing Tuesday during its regular meeting to receive public comment on its five-year consolidated plan for the Community Development Block Grant and HOME Partnership Investment Grant programs.

The City is entitled to receive \$1,726,626 in federal CDBG funds and \$789,496 in HOME funds in the next fiscal year, but in order to receive the funds the City must have an approved five-year Consolidated Plan and a new one-year Action Plan for allocation of the funding.

Staff is currently working with the consultant firm of Castaneda and Associates on the new 5-year plan which will start July 1, 2005 and run through June 30, 2010.

The Consolidated Plan attempts to assess the City's need for affordable housing and supportive housing services for low and moderate-income residents. HUD requires that the plan include an analysis of the housing market and a five-year strategy of priorities, and an annual investment or Action Plan.

Low and moderate income

Both grants require the primary beneficiary be households that are low or moderate income, elderly, disabled or homeless. No less than 70 percent of the CDBG funding and 100 percent of the HOME funds must benefit low or moderate income persons. The City can use up to 20 percent of the CDBG funds for general administration costs, but only 10 percent of the HOME grant funding may be so used.

Among those appearing before the Council Tuesday for a share of the funding was Kevin MacDonald of the Arc of Southeast Los Angeles County, which runs educational and job training programs here for the developmentally disabled.

This was the first of two public hearings on the suggested allocation. In other action the Council:

*Presented the Mayor's Award for Service to the City to Michael Medina, Residential Rehabilitation Supervisor for the Housing Division.

*Presented Certificates of Appreciation to certain members of the Citizens Emergency Response Team (CERT) and Emergency Preparedness Committee.

Shared parking

*Held a Public Hearing and then approved a resolution allowing shared-use parking between Downey's Billiards at 8606 Firestone Blvd., Storm Force at 8222 Firestone, Net Electronics at 8224 Firestone and Lulu's Bakery at 8228 Firestone.

*Approved plans and specifications, then granted authority to advertise for bids for miscellaneous concrete work including wheel chair ramps,

Noe Garcia murder suspect arrested

DOWNEY-The suspect in the shooting death of 20-year-old Noe Garcia, of Downey, and the wounding of Juan Garcia, age 19, of Los Angeles and a female juvenile, of Bell, on Sunday, Feb. 6, was arrested without incident last Friday, Feb. 18 in front of the Fry's Electronics Store, located in the City of Industry.

The suspect has been identified as Daniel Pallan, age 22, and allegedly a gang member from El Monte. He was arraigned on murder and attempted murder charges on Wednesday, Feb. 23.

It was at about 1:38 a.m. Sunday, Feb. 6 when Downey Police were dispatched to the 7300 block of Benares Street regarding a call of gunshots. Upon arrival at the scene, they located the three gunshot victims. Juan Garcia and the female juvenile victim were treated by Downey paramedics and transported to a local hospital, where they were listed in stable condition. Noe Garcia succumbed to the injuries and was pronounced dead at the scene. The suspect had earlier fired several rounds with a handgun after an altercation at a party in Downey. The suspect fled the scene on foot after shooting the victims.

Pallan is being held at Men's Central Jail with bail set at \$1,000,000.

DOWNEY---The Downey Civic Light Opera Company offers "Bye, Bye Birdie" at the Downey Theater through March 6, but this one-time hit musical that opened on Broadway in 1960 seems odd and irrelevant to today's world.

Sure, one finds oneself tapping one's foot to such light musical offerings as "Put on a Happy Face," and "One Last Kiss" or "A Lot of Lovin' to Do," but one also asks why bother with this saga of the quasi-Elvis star named "Birdie" and his induction into the army along with "One Last Kiss."

The audience at the end of the evening finds itself wanting to reward the cast of actors on stage with applause, yet when it does, it is a half-hearted effort that fades into the night.

It is a shame too, because there is some talent on stage that should be recognized.

Sure, it is fluff Dink O'Neal is pushing from wing to wing this time, but he does it with flair and fire. He last appeared here as the Devil in the rollicking DCLO production of "Damn Yankees," certainly a more successful resurrection than "Birdie."

Kristen Beth Williams is lovely both in face and figure, but gets blown away by O'Neal in their shared numbers on stage.

Brenda Cox plays Mrs. Peterson, and is a sheer delight. It's a pity she couldn't have been on stage more of the show.

And Stephanie Wall is a coming talent as the 15-year-old Kim MacAfee who is bound to give "Birdie" a farewell kiss as the Elvislike star prepares to enter the U.S. Army.

I still felt confronted with the same question throughout this long evening...who cares?

There are simply some Broadway hits of yesterday that should be left there. Surely the DCLO can find something more relevant.

Bye, Bye Birdie, indeed!

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



Space museum flap

Councilman David Gafin responded Tuesday to last week's column which raised the question of why no one from the Aerospace Legacy Foundation (ALF) was named to the Commission for the new Learning Center/Space Museum to be built on a portion of the former NASA property.

The Commission is primarily a fund-raising body, said Gafin. A second commission is envisioned for later, when planning details of display and acquisition need direction. Gafin sees a member of the ALF sitting on this second administrative body.

This may all be true, but it seems like an oversight not to explain it to members of the ALF, who have championed the creation of a space museum and learning center since their first meeting in 1996. They have spoken before many groups and organizations, pressing their dream of having a museum at the site where the development of the Space Shuttle and Apollo Programs began.

We hope the matter can be resolved by recognizing ALF with an official seat on at least one, or possibly both, commissions.

The dream is difficult enough to attain without divisiveness among those who champion it.

This discussion must not be allowed to detract from the two outstanding citizens already selected for the "first" commission. Raul Lopez is a hard-working businessman (insurance) who has been seeking a way to give back to the community. He will be a most effective fundraiser. And Orlandus Waters is well tuned to the business field and his fund raising efforts will be helped by his longtime connection with the Boeing community.


SCAG lobbies for key investments

WASHINGTON, D.C.—In a strong show of regional unity, transportation leaders from the six counties that make up the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) region met with congressional representatives last week to advocate for its 2005 Consensus Program, a mutually agreed upon package of priority transportation projects. The projects involved improvements to core transportation programs, such as light rail, rapid transit systems and enrichment of the region's goods movement network.

"We are bringing to Congress a powerful message of consensus and unity on a series of mutually agreed upon transportation investments vital to our region and the nation," said Temecula mayor pro tem and SCAG president Ron Roberts. "This unified approach will go a long way in helping us get these vital projects funded, from roads and mass transit service to critical goods movement improvements."

Congress is currently in the process of reauthorizing TEA-21, the primary federal transportation legislation that will authorize funding for key transportation projects across the country.

The projects in the Consensus Program include funding requests for: *Metro Gold Line Eastside Extension: Light rail service in the Eastside and Exposition Park areas of Los Angeles Country

*Improvements to SR-78, SR-98 and I-8 in Imperial County

"Southern California's transportation system is the economic engine driving both the state and the national economies. It delivers the largest proportion of goods and services that link the United States with its global markets," said Pam O'Connor, Santa Monica mayor and Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority board member. "Our package was received positively by our congressional leaders, and we hope that our message will translate into real dollars coming back to Southern California."

"Our delegation carried a very strong message to congress, and I was impressed with the way in which we articulated Southern California's transportation needs," said Victor Carrillo, Imperial County Supervisor and chair of the Imperial Valley Association of Governments. "It is critical that we deliver and maintain our unified message to ensure that Southern California receives its fair share of federal dollars."


In addition to presenting the Consensus Program to congressional leaders, the regional delegation also presented its priorities to the Federal Highway Administration, the U.S. Department of Transportation's Undersecretary for Policy, and the State of California's transportation counsel.

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The other person was Jeanne Dowd (deceased 1998). She was a dedicated teacher for 46 years, a world traveler with her husband Ed, a lecturer in education and an accomplished videographer.

Both of them were very conscious of the part the downsized Downey plant had played in America's space program and the space shuttles. They were all manufactured at the Downey site, along with astronaut training and a backup for the Houston Flight Control Center. They visualized a heritage program that would bring local, national and even world attention to their city with economic side benefits to the city coffers.

They each began contacting individual citizens, commercial interests, educators, scientists and other professionals. The results were immediate, positive and enthusiastic, with offers of help in spreading the word and raising funds. The "public" response remains today, but is tempered by time and the city government's obvious lack of support.

They chose the name "Aerospace Legacy Foundation," formed a group, and started the monthly meetings that continue today. By 1997 the foundation was incorporated as a California non-profit corporation.

During this time both members of the city council and you, as city manager, were approached with the concept as it became clear that N.A./Rockwell, Boeing would be moving to another site.

Jeanne and Gerry were the first to meet with you, Mr. Caton, followed by Gene Myers, founder and CEO of "The Space Island Group," and myself, as co-founder, secretary and treasurer of ALF. You set the tone for those and all future meetings with you or your appointees up to today, when you called us "visionaries without substance," and said we were wasting our time and yours.

Well, Mr. Caton, in the last ten years, ALF and its members have acquired documented knowledge, materials (including museum memorabilia) and a healthy support from virtually every community organization, State Heritage Society, Boeing, NASA, JPL, etc. This has given us your "substance"—a posture in Downey, surrounding communities and even at a federal level. (Note: The requirements in the NASA property transfer documents as well as the seed money from Congress.) We have "earned" our position, in spite of your "rejection."

Since inception, ALF has worked conscientiously for the good of the city of Downey. We have not and do not seek to own or control the sponsored space museum/learning center, but we do seek the opportunity to collaborate with the city or its designees in this project—utilizing our knowledge and abilities.

ALF has highly qualified officers and members who have a working knowledge of the history of the physical plant and of some tremendous people. Coupled with their knowledge is a substantial volume of documentation, physical assets (models, pictures, films, videos, etc.), essential to presentations in the space museum/learning center. All of these valuable assets you have rejected out of hand.

Instead, you have formed a board of directors with intellectually competent and capable citizens to raise funds. You will be committing Downey city tax dollars to this and future endeavors with appointees who lack the knowledge and "substance" that you have knowingly brushed aside for the last ten years—for what possible valid reason?

Dear Editor,

Reading the *Downey Patriot* on February 11, I was shocked to learn about the appointment of the people on the Board of Directors of the Downey Memorial Space Science Learning Center. Even without your editorial about Mrs. Latimer's letter, I knew that a wrong had been committed here because I am familiar with how hard and persistent the Aerospace Legacy Foundation has worked to bring about this Learning Center and Museum.

To totally ignore the people of the ALF by appointing a Board of Directors without including them or discussing it with them and to let them find out in the paper what has happened, is not only an insult but most of all plainly states, "What you have done has not been worth much and we will now appoint people capable of handling this." I did not think that the City of Downey was capable of such behavior; however, it will certainly influence my voting at the next election.

This is a travesty which needs to be changed. Members of the ALF need to be and deserve to be on the Board of Directors.

The ads would educate parents and kids about the risks associated with underage drinking, including: increased rates of teen pregnancy and date rape, youth crime and violence, and increased use of illegal drugs like marijuana and cocaine.

Resident gives economic forecast

He provides sound technology assistance to the Children's Ministry at his church, and was recently appointed to the youth leadership committee. He participates in his church's annual mission to Tijuana.


