Chief's report on Downey crime

DOWNEY—Chief of Police John Finch has released his Annual Report for the calendar year 2004, with violent crime showing another drop.

Of the seven crime categories used in measuring crime in the community, increases were noted in two: Robberies were up by 10 percent and Theft up 16 percent. But decreases were reported in five categories: Rape down 17 percent, Aggravated Assault down by 25 percent, Burglary down 7 percent, Vehicle Thefts down 6 percent, and Homicide—for the first time since 1967 (and only the second time in the Department's 46 year history) there were no Homicides here.

Viewed from a different angle property crime increased by 5.1 percent, while violent crime decreased by 10.2 percent, when compared to the previous year.

The Chief's report notes:

"To further our continued commitment to provide a high level of professional police service and to safeguard the Department's integrity, the Professional Standards Unit reviewed every incident where officers used force to ensure policy compliance and that appropriate procedures were utilized. Internal audits of our Property Room and Mobile Digital Computer transmissions were initiated, as well as data analysis of our officer-involved traffic collisions and holiday season residential burglaries.

At year's end, the Professional Standards Unit noted the following accomplishments.

*No force was used in 99 percent of our more than 4,200 arrests. This was achieved despite arrests in 2004 increasing 26 percent over last year.

*Tasers were used in 24 percent of the incidents where officers were compelled to use force and have proven to be an effective tool in apprehending combative suspects. To ensure that these devices were being used responsibly, the Professional Standards Unit critiqued each incident where the Taser was used and revised our Taser deployment policy to clarify the

*Thirty-one of the 50 uses of force resulted in training recommendations being made by the Professional Standards Unit. These were focused on reducing liability, increasing effectiveness, and keeping officers and the community out of harm's way.

*An officer-involved traffic collision audit and associated PowerPoint presentation completed in 2003 were updated to reflect the latest statistics, causes and trends. Supervisors then used this information to emphasize safe driving with their employees in an effort to mitigate future occurrences, injuries and liability.

Firing Range

Meanwhile, the Department's Range Program continues to provide police personnel with the most comprehensive training available, with focus on the importance of threat assessment during carefully designed real-life scenarios, and using a wide variety of training modes constructed by the Department's 10 state-certified Range Instructors.

Among training methods introduced were nighttime range instruction, FATS (Firearms Training Simulator) instruction using the latest in video interactive training, and simulations in which officers work through a host of role-playing exercises with paintball cartridges if needed.

The continuous instruction included MP-5 and AR-15 range training

DRMC responds to council comments

DOWNEY – Officials at Downey Regional Medical Center responded this week to reports that the hospital is eight months late in submitting copies of its audit for fiscal year 2004 to the city, a violation of the terms of the hospital's lease from the city.

"Every year, the hospital's financial statements are audited by an independent, outside accounting firm, who then must certify the statements as being accurate and complete," said DRMC CEO Allen Korneff, who cited several reasons for the report's delay. "This past year, we brought in a new auditor, KPMG, which caused some lag time as they became familiar with our operations. In addition, the auditing methodology used for the FY2004 audit changed, with the DRMC Finance Department now performing many functions previously done by the audit firms. Tracking and providing this data, using new computation formulas, has also slowed the report."

City councilman Meredith Perkins, at last week's council meeting, said that numerous letters to the hospital have gone unanswered. He also threatened legal action to force DRMC to provide the reports.

Korneff assured that the report will be submitted to the city within 'the

"We deeply regret the delays and understand the concerns voiced," he said. "We are, however, pleased that KPMG has been extremely thorough and deliberate to ensure the accuracy of the financial statements. We are communicating with the City and doing all we can to rectify the delay while ensuring complete accuracy."

Korneff also addressed comments by Perkins that the hospital is losing \$1 million a month.


The music will begin promptly at 8 p.m.



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


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The plot at Bosco

After the shooting at Columbine High School in Colorado in 1999 they said it couldn't happen here. But the sound of a an alleged plot which was being methodically acted out by two young Students at St. John Bosco High School in nearby Bellflower was real enough to get the police and FBI's atten-

The two 16-year-olds were arrested March 7 and are scheduled for a pre-trial hearing March 24. They are being held in Los Padrinos juvenile facility in Downey. The two pled not guilty March 10. Their names are withheld since they are both minors.

Sheriff's spokesmen told the press that the alleged plot came to light after the two discussed the scheme with friends, and word of it spread. Eventually it reached the ears of a school counselor.

When it became known to authorities that it had reached the extent of certain actions such as the drawing of maps with the location where bombs could be set off, and a shopping trip to look at shotguns, authorities decided it was time to intervene.

The plot was uncomfortably close to that at Columbine where 13 were fatally shot and 23 wounded in 1999.

It is up to the court to decide what is to be done in terms of the penalty and what real crimes have been committed in the alleged incident here. They are charged with conspiracy.

But the very consideration of hatching such a plot here is sufficient cause for worry.

Both of the young men live in Downey.

What can be done to ensure that copycat plots don't continue to pop up locally?

Gangs Out of Downey (GOOD), will hold its annual luncheon Wednesday. April 13 at 11:30 a.m. at the Rio Hondo Country Club. GOOD's goal is to help at-risk students resist the lure of gangs and drugs and to remain in school. It has proven effective in the past. GOOD, since its formation in 1989, has repeatedly contributed funds to the Downey Police, the 10-20 Club (a community outreach youth group), and the Cops on Campus effort. Bellflower and St. John Bosco are not a part of the Downey Unified School District, but the school is right next door and these kids come from homes in Downey. One parent told the press that families pay a lot of hard-earned money to attend a private school, and this is not what they expect to get in return.

This is true, of course, but it takes more than money in this struggle. It takes eternal attention and vigilance.

Read-ins



Neighborhood Preservation

Neighborhood Preservation strives to address the needs of identified neighborhoods through bridge-building between various City departments and residents. Community meetings serve to improve the quality of life in designated "preservation areas." Neighborhood Preservation also helps coordinate inspection sweeps to address property maintenance and building code violations. In conjunction the Department performs outreach to property owners and managers providing education and help where needed. Community Cleanup Days are conducted with volunteers to remove blighting influences. A team of police officers is assigned to each preservation area, and work closely with residents.

Early in 2004 committees were formed to address crime trends in auto, theft, burglary and robbery. These were chaired by detective sergeants and consisted of patrol officers and detectives. They researched recent trends and made recommendations for combating crime types, and emphasized a wide range of options including educating of personnel and the public, enforcement and staffing.

Burglary analysis

Residential burglaries that occurred between Oct. 1 and Dec. 31 of 2003 were analyzed to determine when the majority were perpetrated. The analysis results were shared with patrol personnel to increase awareness of this grinch-type criminal behavior. A 17 percent reduction in residential burglaries was achieved compared to the previous year.

Detective Division

The Detective Division prepared two fliers on crime prevention measures. The first was for auto thefts and the second dealt with fraud schemes used on the elderly.

The Forensics Unit processes crime scenes for evidence using photography, videotapes and fingerprints. All unknown fingerprints are entered into the Automated fingerprint Identification System (AFIS). Last year, 198 positive identifications were made using AFIS, and the unit responded to 1,950 calls for service.

In the 2003 annual report the arrest of a suspect in a 1994 triple homicide, based on DNA evidence was reported. In Aug. 2004 the suspect pled guilty to three counts of homicide and was sentenced to life. Further investigation led to the discovery that three bodies listed as Jane Does had been discovered in the Nevada desert in the mid-1990s. DNA resulted in the remains being identified, bringing the case to closure.

In February 2004, the Gang Unit which was deactivated in 2003 was re-activated. Two investigators are working full-time on gang-related matters.

The Special Enforcement team processed 143 prospective employee applicants, a 38 percent increase from last year. It also conducted nearly 149 alcohol and tobacco compliance checks.

9-1-1 calls

The Communications Center answered more than 30,394 9-1-1 calls, of which 98 percent were answered in under 16 seconds.

Federal and state grant money continues to decline. These include the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant Program which has been reduced by one-half. And funding will be reduced by 25 percent more in the next year's budget. And the Juvenile Accountability Block Grant which has been used to fund the School Police Officer Program now can only supply about 15 percent of the needed funding. The rest comes from the police budget, the Downey Unified School District and Gangs Out Of Downey.

HOSPITAL

"Everyone at the hospital is working diligently to bring us into the black," Korneff said. "However, cost pressures on hospitals are very real, as evidenced by half of the state's hospitals losing money. At our hospital, at least half of this figure can be traced to our making 911 services available as a community benefit. The government has abandoned their funding responsibility and as a result we are incurring great losses for this service."

Korneff also maintained that the hospital treats a growing number of uninsured patients – made worse by the recent closure of trauma services at Drew King Medical Center – while dealing with a statewide nursing shortage.

Last October, DRMC canceled its Medi-Cal contract with the state, after the hospital reported losses of nearly \$7 million in 2003 in providing care to patients who carry Medi-Cal. While county hospitals were receiving \$2,200 per patient per day, DRMC says it received just \$850, a rate that failed to cover the basic costs of Medi-Cal care.

"We continue talking with the county and state, but so far they are unable to meet our costs," Korneff said.

DRMC also announced this week that Tim Kares has resigned as Executive Vice President & Chief Financial Officer. Bruce Browne, a financial consultant with William Casey & Associates, will assume his duties, which includes completing last year's audit and developing the budget for fiscal year ending 2006.

"The DRMC Board of Directors and management take very seriously the need to be fiscally sound and responsible," said Korneff. "The community needs this hospital and we intend to continue providing our residents with high quality medical care for many years to



Will New Rules Make You A Roth IRA Convert?

Will you need the required withdrawals from an individual retirement account to cover living expenses once you retire? If the answer is "no," then you may be interested in a new rule passed by the IRS that makes it easier for traditional IRA owners to convert to a Roth IRA and thereby avoid distributions altogether. The rule, which went into effect January 1, 2005, states that individuals who have reached age 701/2 and are already taking required minimum distributions from a traditional IRA no longer have to include that money as part of their modified adjusted gross income (MAGI). Why is this signficant? Excluding IRA income from an individual's MAGI enhances the likelihood that more retirees will meet the \$100,000 eligibility threshold for converting to a Roth IRA.

This rule may be of interest to people in their 70s and older who don't need the IRA income and who'd prefer leaving the money to grow tax deferred for the benefit of their heirs rather than drawing it down through required minimum distributions. Keep in mind, however, one of the bigger drawbacks to converting from a regular IRA to a Roth IRA is the up-front tax payment that will be due on the money being converted.

If you are doing a little forward planning and like the idea of no required minimum distributions, be sure you understand how the Roth IRA - and a Roth conversion - might affect you.

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State Contractors Board conducts sting operation

NORWALK—The Contractors State License Board (CSLB) is warning consumers about the dangers of hiring unlicensed contractors following a successful sting operation in the city of Norwalk on March 10. CSLB's Statewide Investigative Fraud Team (SWIFT), in cooperation with the Norwalk Building and Safety Department, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and the Califonira Highway Patrol, conducted the undercover operation to underscore the fact that illegal contractors are operating across Southern California.

SWIFT investigators stung a total of 11 unlicensed contractors in the March 10 undercover operation. The phony contractors were arrested and cited for contracting without a license. Their violations include bidding for jobs that require a contractor license, asking for illegally large down payments, illegal advertising and illegally using someone else's contractors

The SWIFT undercover operatives invited suspected unlicensed contractors to a secret sting location in Norwalk. When they bid on various home improvement jobs, including landscaping, demolition, painting and concrete, ten were arrested and issued Notices to Appear (NTA) in Los Angeles Country Superior Court. They could face a maximum of six months in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine for a first offense. Two others face administrative citations.

By law, all contractors who perform work that total \$500 or more (labor and materials) must be licensed by the CSLB. Because of their noncompliance with the workers compensation guidelines, unlicensed contractors often submit lower bids on jobs. If a worker is injured on the job, the homeowner could be considered liable. And, if a deal goes bad with unlicensed contractors, the homeowner has very few options.

The CSLB urges consumers to follow these tips when dealing with a building contractor:

*Hire only licensed contractors and ask to see the license.

*Don't rush into decisions and don't hire the first contractor who comes along.

*Be especially hesitant when approached by someone offering home improvement services door-to-door, especially when they will use material they claim is left over from another job.

*Verify the contractor's license by checking online at www.cslb.ca.gov or via CSLB's automated phone service at 1-800-321-CSLB (2752).

*Don't pay more than 10 percent down or \$1,000, whichever is less.

*Don't pay cash, and don't let the payments get ahead of the work. *Get three bids, check references, and get a written contract.

*Contact the CSLB if you have a complaint against a contractor.


Kares brought new direction and organization to the finance department at DRMC, and assisted in many process improvements and significant projects, according to CEO Allen Korneff.

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
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
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
