Street Fair to feature array of festivities

DOWNEY—An array of festivities will liven the streets for one of Downey's largest community events at the 12th Annual Downey Street Fair on Saturday, May 7 from 9 a.m.-5 p.m., located at and around the Downey High School parking lot between Firestone Blvd. and Brookshire Ave. The Warren High School marching band and color guard will kick off the daylong extravaganza of food and entertainment for all ages.

First to perform at 9:30 a.m. will be the award-winning Southland Harmony Chorus of Sweet Adelines International returning again this year to perform their "oldies, but goodies" barbershop style music. Originally charted as The Downey Chorus, the chorus still calls Downey "home" and regularly performs at community functions, including its annual show at the Downey Theatre.

Shifting the theme will be the gentle rhythms and graceful movements of Polynesia performed by The Ku' uipos O Hula, a local group of dancers from ages 6 to 82. They have performed dances from Tahiti, New Zealand and Hawaii in many events, including county fairs, private weddings, and company picnics. On stage at 10:15 a.m., they will bring the mood of the islands with their dance routine from the movie, "Lilo and Stitch."

Downey's own Class 6 Band will start the 11 a.m. hour with classic rock cover favorites, including Jimmy Hendricks, Deep Purple, JAC/DC and Alice Cooper. The band, which has been playing for over 10 years, and includes Downey residents Chris Baumann, Scott Charitan and Rick Martinez.

Country music fans will love the Country Kickers, returning again this year with their fast-paced, western foot stomping music and dance at 12:15 p.m.-12:45 p.m. Under the direction of Janet Karter, the troupe performs both line dances and partner dances such as waltzes, western cha cha, and two-step.

Flight, a five-piece dance band, will display their musical versatility at 1 p.m. with a challenging repertoire spanning six decades of music, including swing, country, T and B, surf, disco, pop, funk, blues, jazz, and rock. Punning on the group name, leader Lou Apodaca invited everyone to "fulfill your entertainment needs and take Flight with us at the Street Fair."

Performing the final act from 3:45-5 p.m. will be All About Me, a local rock 'n roll band, featuring high energy rock from the 70's, 80's and 90's, and selections from their own original repertoire.

In addition to music and dancing, The Kid's Zone will provide rides, game booths, and other attractions for the younger crowd. Kiddie rides will include a moon bounce, super slide, swings, Jacob's Ladder and a train. For pre-teens and teens, there will be wall climbing, combat jousting and more. Tickets will be 50 cents each and will vary in number required for each attraction.

Car enthusiasts will also find an eye-candy showcase of shiny classic cars displayed by their owners at the far end of the high school parking lot. Spectators will have the opportunity to vote for their favorite vehicles. Two "People's Choice" awards will be given, as well as trophies for Best of the Show, Best Paint, Best Interior, and Most Original. Winners will be announced and awarded at 3:15 p.m.

Finally, since no fair is fun without food, local groups and restaurants will feature an appetizing array of dishes to please every palette. The Downey United Methodist Church, B.B.Q. Housing problems discussed by SCAG

LOS ANGELES—With median home prices nearing \$500,000 and household annual incomes remaining around \$55,000, residents are being forced to devote increasing portions of their income to housing.

Southern California's population growth continues to far outpace construction, placing additional pressure on the household market and resulting in higher costs and increased congestion. More than 250 policymakers and housing leaders from across the region convened at the Southern California Association of Governments' (SCAG) 5th annual Housing Summit recently in an effort to devise new approaches to address the growing housing crisis. Summit leaders emphasized the need to think "outside the box" and implement cost-effective, sustainable strategies such as mixed-use development in urban areas and controlled development in open areas.

Rialto City Councilmember Deborah Robertson, chair of SCAG's Community, Economic and Human Development Committee, and Executive Director Mark Pisano discussed how Southern California Compass, SCAG's growth visioning initiative, provides a blueprint to accommodate housing and population growth over the next 30 years by

Move to control 'Mansionization' back to planning

DOWNEY—The Downey City Council after a public hearing, bowed in response to 20 speakers who opposed an ordinance to control the trend of massive and bulky "mansionized" homes here, sending it back to the Planning Commission for further study.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

According to staff, the proposed ordinance already recommended to the Council by the Planning Commission is the result of complaints by many residents concerning monstrous new homes that impact views of neighboring residences; do not improve property values, increase the number of persons per dwelling, increase parking and traffic, as well as noise.

'Mansionization' City staff's Ron Yoshiki referred to the trend as "Mansionization," which he said can be controlled by simple requirements limiting second stories, which can be limited to two/thirds the area of the first floor. Second floors can also be limited by demanding greater side-yard area setbacks.

Staff recommended an addition of a paragraph to the building code which at present reads, "The architecture and general appearance of the building shall be in keeping with the character of the neighborhood and such as not to be detrimental to the general welfare of the neighborhood in which they are located."

The addition reads: "Reduction of Building and Mass: for detached

Rio San Gabriel shines in Carnival of Champions

DOWNEY-The Downey Unified School District's 45th annual Carnival of Champions Track and Field Exhibition, held Saturday, April 23 at Downey High School, brought together fourth and fifth grade representatives from nine Downey elementary schools, with Rio San Gabriel Elementary finishing first with 240 points for an incredible record-setting ninth consecutive year.

In second place was Gallatin, with 113-4/5 pts., followed by third place finisher Old River (B)--with 100-2/5 pts. The order of finish for the rest, with points won: 4th--Gauldin (61); 5th--Unsworth (48); 6th--Price (44-2/5); 7th--Rio Hondo (43); 8th--Old River (B); 9th--Carpenter (A); 10th--Lewis (22); and 11th--Carpenter (B).

In winning, Rio San Gabriel established three Carnival of Champion records. Sydney Colenzo broke the fourth grade girls Baskets in a Minute record, shooting 31 baskets. Their fifth grade boys 440-relay team ran 58.55 seconds, breaking a 19-year record, and, finally, their co-ed 440relay team ran 1:00.6 seconds, breaking a 12- year record.

Besides Baskets in One Minute, the approximately 500 boys and girls competed in the following track and field events: Softball Throw for Distance, Standing Long Jump, 50 Yard Dash, 100 Yard Dash, Four-Member-Team 440 Yard Relay, and mixed Coed Relay.


Trejo added, he rode his bike to work one day last week and said there is noticeable construction going up all over the city.

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WILLIAM 'BILL' B. LUND—Served as a Downey Police Officer.


Memorial service held for William B. Lund, 68

DOWNEY—A Memorial Service was held on March 23 at Temecula United Methodist Church for William B. Lund, who was born Dec. 19, 1936 in Canada and died from an accident at his home on March 18. Wellknown as 'Bill', he was 68.

He was raised in Los Angeles and Pico Rivera, graduated from El Rancho High School, then from CSU-Fullerton. He served in the U.S. Army as a Military Police Officer and baseball player. He was a Downey Police Officer, graduated from the FBI National Academy and retired after 29 years as a Lieutenant in 1990. He and his wife Carol raised their family in Downey before moving to Murrieta in 1996.

Lund is survived by Carol, his wife of 44 years; his daughters and sons-in-law Wendy and Rob Mucho, Heidi and Jim Rettela, Tami and Mark Johnson, Cindee and David Rumley, his son and daughter-in-law "KC" and Carla Lund; and eight grandchildren.



Teen stabbing victim in serious condition

DOWNEY-Downey Police detectives report that brothers and Downey residents Cedric Ento, 19, and Mark Ento, 18, were taken to a local hospital after suffering stab wounds last Friday afternoon at the hands of a rival tagging crew. The altercation occurred at about 3:20 p.m. in front of an apartment complex in the 12000 block of Downey Avenue.

Cedric has been released from hospital, while his younger brother Mark, who suffered multiple stab wounds, was still listed in serous condition as of presstime.

Two suspects were arrested in connection with the case. The first, an adult, was subsequently released for lack of causal evidence. Police say the second suspect, age 16, was the one who wielded the knife and stabbed the victims. The juvenile suspect has been booked for two counts of attempted murder and is being held at Los Padrinos Juvenile Hall while awaiting trial.




The Council will act as a unified team in identifying nursing goals and implementing operational plans.

"We are excited about this new direction in nursing leadership," stated Conwell. "The Nursing Leadership Council is charged with ensuring Downey Regional's continued excellence in nursing though a team of experienced directors. Our team will implement a series of changes to make our units run more smoothly, and to improve the quality of our nursing for all our patients."

Two other changes for nursing were announced: one, DRMC implemented the position of House Manager for all shifts. Previously, the House Managers functioned only on the off-shifts. The full-time use of the House Manager position is intended to improve operational efficiency by centralizing the chain of command to a single point of control; two, a new Nursing Education Department was established. Nurse educators now report to a centralized department and that department's full resources are available to unit mangers as they identify the educational needs of their staffs. The goal of this change is to make nursing education more effective than the previous decentralized model.

Downey man arrested in auto theft ring

DOWNEY – A Downey man was one of 10 people arrested this week suspected in stealing 100 cars from Southern California dealerships.

Boonplod Klunchoo, 49, is being held in lieu of \$30,000 bail on suspicion of felony criminal conspiracy along with nine other Thai nationals, Hermosa Beach police said, which initiated the arrests.

According to police, the suspects would use fraudulent credit applications to obtain high-end cars, which they equipped with GPS tracking devices and 'sub-leased' to persons who would not otherwise qualify for legitimate financing.

The thieves would later use GPS to find the car, steal it back and sell to someone else.

Starbucks manager a robbery victim

DOWNEY-At about noon Monday, a manager of a South Gate Starbucks had just left her store and was enroute to a Downey bank to make a deposit when a vehicle with three occupants, following behind her, collided with the rear of her vehicle, feigning an accident. This happened on Firestone Blvd. near Rives Ave.

After the victim parked at the curb with the other vehicle, one of the occupants approached her with a hammer in hand and demanded "the money." The victim, however, had trouble finding the money as the collision had knocked it under the dash. The impatient suspects settled on the victim's purse and fled the location, southbound on Rives Ave

Two witnesses saw what had taken place and followed the suspects. In an attempt to evade the witnesses, the suspects attempted a left turn onto Springer St. but, instead, ended up driving into the front of the house at the southeast corner. The three suspects fled on foot but were apprehended a short time later by patrol officers.

During questioning of the suspects, it became apparent that another suspect was involved, an employee of Starbucks and brother of one of the detained suspects. Detectives arrived at the South Gate Starbucks just prior to the start of the employee's shift and arrested him when he arrived to work.

Booked for Robbery and held on \$50,000 bail were Walter Chica-Mendoza, 19, of Bell; Roberto Lopez, 25, of Bell Gardens; Richard Lopez, 19, of Bell Gardens, and Angel Pilego Jr., 19, of Bell.


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

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Transit fund revenue shuffled by Council

DOWNEY—The City Council has approved the transfer of \$1,060,000 from the City Proposition A fund to the Proposition C Fund in order to reimburse the Prop. C fund for the cost of the City's fixed Route Transit System.

The action, without comment as part of the consent agenda at Tuesday's regular meeting, prevents the possibility of the City having to forfeit its receipts of future transit revenue from the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA).

Both funds receive revenue from the MTA. While both are related to transit projects, they are regulated differently. Prop. A funds are more restricted, and there are requirements that Prop A funds be expended sooner.

Application approved Staff submitted an application to MTA to fund the City's fixed route program with Prop A funds. MTA approved the City application.

The change does not impact expenditure levels of the Fixed Route System. The impact is to reduce the fund balance of Prop. A funding and increase the balance in Prop C funds.

Expenditure levels will stay the same.

In other action the City Council:

*Set a Public Hearing for May 10 on the 2005 5-year Consolidated Plan for the Community Development Block Grant and Home Improvement Investment Partnership grant programs.

*Adopted a resolution approving the destruction of certain obsolete police records.

*Adopted a resolution approving the reappointment to boards, commissions and committees for Council District 5 (Represented by Kirk Cartozian, who was absent).

Lighting assessment

*Approved the city engineer's report and declared intent to collect assessments for Lighting and Landscape District A.D. 121 for fiscal 2005-06 and set a public hearing for June 14 to consider setting the assessments.

*Approved the interfund transfer of \$1,060,000 for the cost of the City's Fixed Route Transit System.

*Accepted a cash contract for improvements and water main work along Lakewood Boulevard at Clark Avenue.

*Sent an ordinance aimed at controlling the continued "mansionization" of large homes being built multi-story single and double family occupancy in Downey, back to the Planning Commission for further study. Sandy Gail honored

*Presented the Mayor's Award for City Service to Sandy Gail, Administrative Clerk in the Finance Department.



two-story single family residential units, second story floor area shall not exceed two-thirds of the first floor area (which includes habitable and nonhabitable square footage). Floor areas shall be determined by measuring from exterior walls of the residence. The following requirements shall also apply:

Setbacks

a)The second floor setback for one wall facing an interior property line shall be a minimum of 10 feet, if one wall uses the existing four-foot side yard setback of the first floor.

b)The second floor may be centered over the first floor; the side yard setback shall be a minimum of eight feet from both the interior side prop-

c)Reconstruction of legal non-conforming residences: If at least 90 percent of a two story detached single-family residence is destroyed or the reconstruction exceeds 90 percent of the current replacement value, then the residence can only be re-established as required by these standards.

But after an array of 20 speakers, many of whom have construction plans in the works, said the new rule would stifle construction and hurt those working to improve their homes, the Council saw fit to further consider the matter. Councilman Meredith Perkins moved that the matter be sent back to the Planning Commission, and his motion passed 4-0. (Councilman Kirk Cartozian was absent.)

employing relatively small changes in land use planning decisions to reap tremendous results in housing availability and affordability.

"We need to strategically develop housing where it is needed the most: near jobs, along mixed-use corridors, in downtown and suburban centers and at transit stops and stations," said Robertson. "By focusing more development in these housing opportunity areas, we can reduce commutes and protect environmentally sensitive places in the region."

Summit participants identified a number of legislative and land use strategies to address the regional housing crunch, including:

*Increase coordination of housing development with transportation, water resource management, and other local planning efforts.

*Identify additional state-funding for infrastructure and local govern-

ment general plan development. *Reformulate municipal finance and revenue sources to ensure that local governments have the resources necessary to develop adequate hous-

*Focus residential development in areas near major transit centers or

*Support greater mixed-use particularly in urban areas.

*Reduce zoning restrictions that can add to housing costs.

It's time for a New G.I. Bill of Rights

By Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard, D-34th, Los Angeles and Downey

WASHINGTON, D.C.—In 1944, Congress enacted the original GI sure they have adequate equipment.

Bill of Rights to honor the Greatest Generation that ultimately won World War II. In doing so, the federal government supported our returning troops with educational benefits, loans to buy a home, and medical assistance. In fact, the nearly eight million veterans who went to school under the GI Bill helped to jumpstart our economy and create a strong middle class.

Today, in recognition of the more than one million men and women in uniform who have served thus far in Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom, it is time for a New GI Bill of Rights. These troops

have served our nation with distinction, and it is time for a grateful nation to honor that service. Legislation introduced recently would modernize and enhance the GI

Bill by providing better education, health care and job training benefits for those who have answered our nation's call to duty. The proposed package would also support their families here at home.

For our troops, the package would pay the full cost of college or job training, instead of only 65 percent for those serving four years of active duty. The measure would also provide a \$1,000 bonus to the nearly one million who have served in imminent danger in Operation Iraqi Freedom and in Afghanistan, and would improve military pay for senior enlisted personnel and warrant officers. Bonuses would also be enhanced for the National Guard and the Reserves. These provisions are important to help our returning soldiers become a productive part of a prosperous economy, and they also provide an important recruiting tool to encourage new soldiers to sign up.

The new GI Bill of Rights legislation also includes provisions to ensure that our military has the necessary number of troops and to make

The package would improve veterans' health care, including mental health care, to meet the needs of our returning troops. These brave men and women should be able to rely on the promises of their nation for which they fought. That means providing quality, comprehensive and accessible health care for all of our veterans. The measure calls for an additional \$3.2 billion for veterans' health care and would block any proposed increases in prescription drug co-payments and enrollment fees. Mental health services would also be improved by focusing on early intervention to prevent the development of chronic Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder that may require a lifetime of care.

The measure also recognizes the great sacrifice of our National Guardsmen and Reservists—who have comprised nearly half of our troop strength in Iraq—by expanding military health care to cover all Guard and Reserve personnel. The legislation would also make sure these citizen soldiers do not suffer a pay cut while deployed.

Finally, for military retirees and the families of those who died in the line of duty, the New GI Bill of Rights would fully repeal the Disabled Veterans Tax, and end the Military Families Tax. These unfair taxes penalize our disabled military retirees and the widows of those killed as a result of combat and are unworthy of our great nation.

No group of Americans has stood stronger and braver for our democracy than our troops and veterans. We must celebrate, honor and remember these courageous and faithful men and women through this New GI Bill of Rights.

On the battlefield, the military pledges to leave no soldier behind. As a nation, let it be our pledge that when they return home, we leave no veteran behind. Let us honor their service with a New GI Bill of Rights worthy of our grateful nation.


