### Community takes up fight against cancer

**DOWNEY** – More than \$60,000 was raised last week when Downey Adult School hosted the American Cancer Society's annual Relay for Life, the organization's signature fundraising event that honors cancer victims, survivors and their families.

The Rio Hondo Chapter of the American Cancer Society, with its offices at 9901 Paramount Blvd. in Downey, will be the primary beneficiaries of the proceeds, which it says will go towards cancer prevention, early detection, treatment and patient support.

An estimated 500 people showed up for the overnight event, which featured a continuous walk around the campus track for a full 24 hours. Twenty teams camped out at the school, including representatives from various schools and businesses.

Money was raised through sponsorships, donations, raffle tickets and the sales of candles for a late-night luminary.

Downey resident Melina Contreras won the grand prize raffle, her choice of a 2005 Ford Focus or \$13,000 cash. (She chose the money.)

### Schools applaud ROP medal winners

**DOWNEY**—-The Downey Unified School District Board of Education heard presentations by the Regional Occupational Program District Students of the Year at Tuesday's regular Board meeting.

The Los Angeles County Regional Occupational Program consists of 22 school districts within the Los Angeles county area. Downey is one of these districts that offer job training skills to at least 2,000 students annually. Each year, LACOROP presents an ROP Student Recognition Competition among its 22 districts.

#### Harvest of medals

This year, Downey sent 12 students to compete and they returned with three silver and two gold medals. Two silver medals in Business went to Saddat Adutwum from Web Design and Pablo Rizo from Banking. Both are seniors at Downey High School. Another silver in Creative Arts went to Ernie Gochez from Commercial Photography, a senior at Warren High School. The gold medal in Home Economics went to Dallas Struve from Careers in Education. Dallas is a senior at Downey High School. The gold medal in Trade and Industry went to Mark Brush, from Law Enforcement, a Warren High School senior.

LACOROP only gives out six gold medals in this competition and Downey captured two of them. Members of the School Board congratulated all the ROP students for bringing home such a harvest in gold and silver medals.

stay in the local community, the American Cancer Society said. Another 30 percent goes to research, 10 percent is used for fundraising activity and five percent pays administrative salaries.

By the end of 2005, the American Cancer Society says that Relay for Life events will be held in over 20 countries. The fundraiser originally began in Tacoma, Washington over two decades years ago.

### Dispute over storage of precious runoff

Who should determine how much of the runoff from the very wet year we have just experienced should be stored in the vast underground basins beneath us? That is the question currently being debated by the cities and water agencies in the Southern California region.

Currently, water from rain runoff purchased from the Metropolitan Water District is used to recharge the underground basins while a similar amount is pumped out each year.

But the basin potentially could hold as much as twice the present amount, according to water officials. The vast basins stretch 420 square miles from the LAX Airport to the Orange County border and from the Whittier Hills to the coastline. In a wet year such as 2005, there is potential to store much more until it can be tapped during a dry year. But there is the possibility of problems. What if too much water pumped underground causes unexpected pollution?

Established in 1959 to protect the basin, the MWD assesses water utilities based on the amount they pump from the underground, then uses the income to purchase water to recharge the basin.

Officials from cities such as Bellflower, Cerritos and Lakewood have protested that the MWD does not have the authority to impose these rules. They assert that a 1965 court judgment determined who may pump and how much from the underground basin. Others call for cooperation between the concerned parties.

Meanwhile, as parties talk, precious water flows and is lost in the sea. It is hoped that new interim rules being worked on this week can resolve the differences.



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## Assistance League's new S.A.T. Test class

**DOWNEY**—The Assistance League of Downey is again offering a class to prepare college-bound high school students with the new revised format of the SAT Reasoning Test, considered to be the world's most widely-used college admissions test. The class of 2006 will be the first class to take the new S.A.T. for college admissions.

The program consists of 10 class sessions: Week I is on Monday-Tuesday, June 20-21; Week II runs Monday-Thursday, June 27-30; and Week III is Tuesday-Friday, July 5-8. All classes are held from 8-10:30 a.m. at Downey High School.

Daily rigorous homework assignments are an integral part of the course. At the end of the first week, the parents of students not participating in the course (resulting from either the student's lack of preparation for class or lack of participation in class) will be contacted and asked that their son/daughter not continue with the course. Students daily preparing/participating in the class sessions and meeting the attendance requirement (no more than two excused absences) will receive a certificate of completion.

The new SAT Reasoning Test was administered for the first time on March 12. Changes to the test include the addition of third-year college preparatory math, more critical reading, and a new writing section. The College Board made these changes to better reflect what students study in high school.

Cost (including the textbook) is \$30 if registration is received by June 10, otherwise it's \$40. English instructor is Ms. Bonnie Nishioka, while Ms. Dalyn Miller-Geiser is the mathematics instructor.

Says Alice Yamada, Assistance League S.A.T. chair: "We have had enormous success with this program for high school students planning to attend college. The quality of instructors that teach the class, and the course itself that prepares the students to become familiar with and take the practice S.A.T. test is the key factor in encouraging the college-bound students to enroll in this class. The test scores are an important source of information that the admission offices use."

Prerequisites are: 1) Evidence of successful completion of Algebra I (completion of Geometry strongly recommended); and 2) Student must enclose a photocopy of a report card which includes his/her final course grade in Algebra I.





In the areas of language skills, 91% rate themselves as above average or superior in reading ability, 76% as above average or superior in writing ability, and 93% above average or superior in English ability. The last survey revealed that 100% of the graduates plan to attend college.



### How Music in the Schools came to be

#### **By Rosalie Sciortino**

**DOWNEY**—How did it all come about—this idea for Music in the Schools? Because 2005 marks the tenth year of its existence, it was decided to contact the lady, Jerry Elicks, whose tireless efforts and foresight made the whole idea a reality.

As Jerry tells it: "Oddly, the initial thought came from years ago when some of my Swiss relatives were visiting Sid and me. Included in the 'itinerary' was attendance at the Downey Theatre where our symphony was playing. They were impressed with the program, but incredulous at the number of empty seats-especially when it was free!"

Jerry goes on to tell that the germ of the idea was planted that night. She thought it was possible that many of the town's residents were unaware that our symphony even existed and thus also unavailable to stu-part of, this kind of music."

With this in mind she approached Dr. Ed Sussman, superintendent of the Downey schools, who referred her to Donna Boose, the assistant superintendent. Jerry continues, "I explained my thought of sending flyers home with the students, inviting them and their families to attend the concerts." She adds, "Donna wisely suggested flyers should go only to elementary and middle schools, as those flyers would actually get home to parents in the student's duffle bags."

Jerry was told that 9,000 flyers would be needed. The Downey Board of Realtors offered to make the flyers. "I picked up the flyers on Friday for distributing to the schools on Monday. The concert was the following Saturday. After distributing all I had to every public school, I discovered I was about 2,000 short! What to do? I went to one of the community's best supporters, Dennis King, of Litho Printing, who printed them for me immediately at no charge!"

The flyers got out and as a result, the auditorium was filled to capacity for the next two concerts.

A plaque was given to the school as well as the individual classroom for the largest attendance of families. "To make it more attractive, the children from the winning classroom with the largest attendance would each receive a voucher for a free pizza, compliments of Frantone's through the effort of Lea Fratello and the suggestion of the man who made the plaques. I regret to say I never went back to tell him he was responsible for our success."

When Jerry mentioned her idea of involving students in the Symphony, Dr. Thomas Osborn, artistic director and conductor of the Downey Symphony Orchestra, decided to try in-school concerts. Jerry quickly adds

that much of the credit for getting this dream going must go to Dr. Osborn, who eagerly became involved "and ran with it."

As he tells it: "During our first year, 1995, we visited only the Downey public schools with only three performers: Carolyn Osborn on violin, Mark Artusio on bass and myself on clarinet and as narrator. When we arrived at one of the schools, a teacher commented to me, "The students will like YOUR music!" When I saw her after the concert, she was dumbfounded that the students had actually loved the program."

In 1996 funding was increased by the Downey Symphony Society and matching support from the Music Performance Trust Funds of the Recording Industry awarded through Musicians Union Local 47. Since then, five performers have been sent to each school representing the four facilities of instruments in an orchestra: string, woodwind, brass, and percussion.

Besides performing in all fourteen of Downey's elementary schools, they also perform in four parochial schools. A second group, a woodwind quartet from the Symphony, gives concerts at the four Downey middle schools. In all, some 7,500 elementary school children will learn how symphonic music is made and get to know "Tom" personally.

Currently, Dr. Osborn rotates between four programs, with a different one each year at the schools. 1) Meter and Rhythm, 2) Melody and Accompaniment, 3) Style in Music, and 4) Motive, Theme and Melody. He also arranges one or two new selections from scores of current movies that the students have usually seen.

For the fifth year, the full Symphony presented three performances in one day at the Downey Theatre for all third graders in Downey. On March 23 all Downey's fifth graders were bused to the theatre designed to inspire and motivate them to take up a musical instrument as they enter middle school and their first opportunity to join a school band.

These concerts are made possible through the generosity of Downey Saving and Loan aand Helen Hoag with the cooperation of the Downey Unified School District.

Donations from individuals, businesses and civic organizations are gratefully received by the Symphonic Society who, with the whole community, are justly proud of the way one remarkable lady, Jerry Elicks, who worked tirelessly to see her dream become a reality, spearheaded this valuable movement which has greatly benefited not only our children, but Downey as a whole. Brava, Jerry.
