DOWNEY—Six alumni of Downey High School, all with sterling credentials, and all distinguishing themselves in their chosen careers and in the arena of life, will be inducted today, May 27 into their alma mater's Alumni Hall of Fame.

In the order of their induction, to be staged at the Downey High School library starting at 10:30 a.m., are: Dr. Kenneth Ferraro ('60), D.D.S., Kent Halbmaier ('62), Hon. David A. Hoffer ('81), Dr. Michael E. Hoffer ('80), D. Mark Morris ('65), and Dr. Richard L. Thompson ('44).

Family and friends are expected to watch the ceremony. Past honorees have also been invited. A total audience of some 90-100 people is anticipated. A luncheon has been prepared, with entertainment provided by the Viking Jazz Choir. There will be a social time at 10 a.m.

Dr. Ferraro is a graduate of the Washington University School of Dentistry. Immediately after his graduation, he returned to his hometown of Downey and opened an office here. He holds a patent for the use of Kevlar as dental floss, the fiber used in bullet-proof vests. In addition to his dental practice, he is an active member of the Downey community. He is past president of the Downey Kiwanis, past director of the Downey UNICO, and past president of the "12:15" Club at the Downey Community Hospital. He served on the city of Downey Theatre Board of Directors, and is presently on the Downey YMCA Board of Managers and the Chairman's Round Table. He offers free dental exams for Downey school children, and contributes to numerous local organizations.

Halbmaier received a Master of Arts degree from CSU-Los Angeles. He began his professional career with the Downey Unified School District in 1981 as a Program Specialist. Since 1993, Kent has served as the Special Education Program Director. He is also an adjunct professor who teaches Special Education Law and Services for National University. Finch to finish year here as a part-timer

Described as 'win-win' situation

DOWNEY—The Downey City Council has approved a new part-time contract with Police Chief John Finch, who announced his intention to retire in the May 6th edition of the Downey Patriot.

Finch originally expressed the intention to step down starting July 15, but under the new terms approved by the Council Tuesday, agrees to stay on in a part-time basis until Dec. 31, 2005.

Under the terms of the new part-time agreement Chief Finch will stay on and provide a smooth transition for the new Chief, who has not yet been named.

Hourly rate

Finch will work a reduced schedule for an hourly rate of \$83.07 an

The City will save \$5,513 per month during the time Finch serves parttime, according to a staff report.

The agreement stipulates that Finch work under the direction of the City Manager, attend City Council meetings and respond to questions

relating to law enforcement, while working to maintain good labor relations. The vote of approval was 4-1 with Councilman Meredith Perkins opposed. Perkins said his vote was not in opposition to Finch, whom he likes, but rather his opposition to the procedure.

Win-win

City Manager Gerald Caton described the measure as a "win-win" situation for both the City and the Chief. And Caton said he will select the new chief from within the department. Discussions with Finch have already begun with this in mind.

Council applauds many 'fun events'

DOWNEY-Kidsday, the Walk-for-Life, Family Fun Night at Downey High School and the Arc Pancake Breakfast all were applauded by members of the Downey City Council at Tuesday's regular Council

Councilman David Gafin used Kidsday as an example of the kind of community event that draws people together. He said it was fun and good for all who participated in it. He gave special mention to the City's Bonnie Kehoe who organizes this event annually.

Fun Night

Councilman Kirk Cartozian applauded the Fun Night at Downey High for much the same reason, and he noted that Principal Allen Layne is retiring, with a party in his honor at Rio Hondo June 24.

Mayor Anne Bayer said she enjoyed the Arc pancake breakfast. And she also applauded the Walk-for-Life which raised more than \$50,000 for the war on cancer.

Councilman Rick Trejo liked Kidsday, and called the Council's attention to the growing parking problem at Downey Regional Medical Center. He would like a study.

The recent Coordinating Council Awards also won favorable mention. Anti-graffiti

It was noted that the City's anti-graffiti girl was in the Council audience. Cartozian said he would like a plan to help local businesses who move here to deal with the graffiti problem, which can be costly.

The Council extended an invitation to the public to attend the free ceremonies on Monday, Memorial Day at 11 a.m. at the Downey Cemetery.

Presentations from the audience included a homeowners plea for a way out of requirements costing more than \$50,000 to install a fire prevention sprinkler system, and a challenge over travel expenses of Cartozian for a trip to Las Vegas. (He explained there were none since he stopped on his way back from a trip to Florida which was at his own expense). The Vegas stop was to attend a convention on community development.

Another member of the audience noted the impossibility of communicating by phone to get a hearing over a no-parking to make way for tree cutting. The City Manager is looking into the matter.

Judge David A. Hoffer was the 1981 Class Valedictorian and was voted by the class as "Most Likely to Succeed." He has lived up to his classmates' expectations. Upon graduation from the University of California at Berkeley, Boalt School of Law, he was awarded the Order of the Coif (top ten percent of law school class) with the Juris Doctor degree. For four years he was in private law practice before accepting a position as federal prosecutor, and he remained in that assignment for 12 years. In 2003, he was appointed by Gov. Gray Davis to the Orange County Superior Court as a Superior Court Judge in Santa Ana.

Dr. Hoffer received his Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of California School of Medicine in San Diego in 1988. His postgraduate training focused on the area of Otorhinolaryngology - the branch of medicine that deals with the ears, nose, and throat. At the present time he is serving in the U.S. Navy at the Naval Medical Center in San Diego in the Department of Otolaryngology. He has authored or co-authored over 120 research articles related to his specialization. In addition to his responsibilities at the Naval Center, he lectures at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, and is Clinical Assistant Professor, Department of Surgery, Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences.

Morris graduated from Cerritos College, CSU-Fullerton and received the Juris Doctor degree from Western State University College of Law. He has served on the Downey Unified School District Governing Board for 24 years, he is past director of the Los Angeles School of Boards Association, and a member of both the California School Boards Association at the National School Boards Association. In addition to his dedication to education, he is involved in numerous community activities, He is past president of the Downey Water Board, past chairman of the Frontier District of the Los Angeles Council of Boy Scouts of America, member of the GOOD Committee, and an active member in his church.

He is highly regarded worldwide for his contributions to dentistry. He was founder and director of the Stuart Gnathological Group, the most advanced dental research group at the time. He taught and trained hundreds of dentists. He was awarded the title of "Fellow of the American Academy of General Dentistry" prior to his retire-

City economy move on police alarm permits

DOWNEY—The City Council has introduced an ordinance moving the expiration date for police alarm permits from June 30 to Dec. 31. There will be no change in fee amounts or other requirements.

The action was without comment as part of the consent agenda at Tuesday's regular meeting.

Purpose

The purpose of the change is to consolidate the business tax system with the police alarm permit system so the City can replace two mailing and renewal dates with a single mailing and renewal process. In addition, the City will save on staff time for both renewal procedures. Since all businesses with police alarm permits must also pay a business tax the consolidation seems logical.

In order to phase into the new program, the current police renewal notices to businesses will include the message indicating the permit will be for six months and only half the annual fee will have to be paid. When the business tax process is done later in the year businesses will receive bills for and pay for a full 12 month alarm permit.

Savings are estimated to be \$300 per year to the City.

Congresswoman lands funds for local projects

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard (CA-34) announced today the May 24 passage in the House of Representatives of the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act for 2006 that includes funding for major projects in the Los Angeles area. Through the congresswoman's efforts, the measure includes continued funding for the dredging of the main channel of Los Angeles Harbor, the Harbor South Bay Recycled Water Project, and a feasibility study for a recreation and development project at the Cornfields site along the Los Angeles River.

"I am pleased that significant funding for several key projects in Los Angeles won approval in the House of Representatives this week," Congresswoman Roybal-Allard said.

Congresswoman Roybal-Allard obtained \$1.3 million for the Corps of Engineers to work with the City of Los Angeles and local groups in planning parks, recreation, and community improvement projects at the Cornfields site along the Los Angeles River. The funds are to complete a feasibility study to convert the abandoned industrial site called the Cornfields into parks or other community uses.

"I have worked for several years with City Councilman Ed Reyes and local stakeholders to explore ways to convert the land adjacent to the Los Angeles River into parks, housing and economic development for our local communities," Congresswoman Roybal-Allard said. "The Cornfields site is one of the most promising opportunities for these types of initiatives, and I am pleased that we can move forward with a feasibility study to lay out some of the possibilities."

The measure also includes funding for an ongoing dredging project in the Los Angeles Harbor.

"The \$2.7 million included in the House version of the measure for the dredging of the main channel of Los Angeles Harbor is the minimum amount needed to keep this important project moving forward. I will continue to work with Senators Feinstein and Boxer to increase funding for this critical project before the bill is finalized. This project will enable the harbor to accommodate new and larger container vessels which, in turn, will enhance manufacturing and business opportunities and spur job creation in the Los Angeles area. That's why this project is a high priority — not just for our region, but for the continued vitality of our nation's commerce."

The Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach comprise the largest port complex in the U.S. and the third largest in the world. Approximately 35 percent of containerized trade entering the U.S. currently comes through the port complex, located on San Pedro Bay.

The measure also includes \$4 million for the Harbor/South Bay Water Recycling project, which is a cooperative effort between the Corps of Engineers, and West Basin and Central Basin Municipal Water Districts. The project will develop up to 48,000 acre-feet of recycled water for municipal, industrial, and environmental uses in the Los Angeles area.

In addition, Congresswoman Roybal-Allard worked with a group of local lawmakers to secure \$150,000 for the Bureau of Reclamation to fund a study to be conducted by the Los Angeles and San Gabriel Rivers Watershed Council. The study called "The Los Angeles Basin Watershed Water Supply Augmentation Study" is looking at ways to capture stormwater runoff in the Los Angeles area in order to reduce pollution at local beaches. The recycled stormwater would be used to supplement and recharge groundwater supplies.

The bill, which passed by a vote of 416 to 13, is the final House version of the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2006.










Marguerite Allison Graf Services held May 25 was 51-year resident

Max Liebermann art exhibit at Skirball

LOS ANGELES—For the first time in the U.S., the art and life of German painter Max Liebermann (1847-1935), the premier artist in Berlin from the mid-1880s until the Nazi takeover in 1933, will be the subject of a major museum exhibition, "Max Liebermann: From Realism to Impressionism," organized by the Skirball Cultural Center. The landmark retrospective—featuring more than 70 paintings and a dozen works on paper from public and private collections in Europe and the United States—will be on view at the Skirball from Sept. 15, 2005 through Jan. 29, 2006. The exhibition will then travel to The Jewish Museum in New York City, its only other venue, where it will be on view from March 10 through July 9, 2006.

The exhibition spans the stylistic and thematic phases of Liebermann's prolific career, from his renowned Realist interpretations of Dutch peasant life to his singular approach to Impressionism, and examines the relationship between the many phases of his art and the changing social and political climate in which he lived and worked. The great majority of the collected works will be new to American viewers. The exhibition catalogue (Skirball Cultural Center, \$29.95 paperback), also entitled "Max Liebermann: From Realism to Impressionism," will be the first monograph on Liebermann in English.

Liebermann, the descendant of a well-established German Jewish family, was a celebrity in his own day. He was famous not only for his art but for his robust leadership in the cultural life of Berlin. He served as president of the Berlin Secession from 1898 until 1910 and was ultimately honored with the presidency of the Prussian Academy of Art from 1920 through 1932, during the Weimar Republic. Attaining such a position of civic authority was possible for a Jew only during this brief democratic period of German history. Upon Adolf Hitler's ascension to power, however, in 1933, Liebermann was forced to resign from this distinguished

Considered the greatest German painter of his day, he died in 1935 as a non-citizen, with no notice taken of his death in the German press.



UCLA seeks adults for memory study

WESTWOOD—Although it has been found that the drug Aricept delayed patients' progression to Alzheimer's disease by a year, UCLA says more research needs to be completed to further assess Aricept's role in delaying the disease. UCLA is thus seeking healthy adults 40 to 90 years old for a study evaluating the effectiveness of Aricept compared with a placebo in helping to delay age-related memory loss. Investigators also will study the genetics of memory loss.

To participate in the 18-month study, adults must have memory loss complaints. An initial screening will involve a physical exam, electrocardiogram and blood test—including an optional blood test to analyze the presence of a gene that may be related to Alzheimer's disease.

At the beginning (and end) of the study, participants will receive a Magnetic Resonance Imaging Brain Scan (MRI), a Positron Emission Tomography Bran Scan (PET) and neuropsychological testing to evaluate ability to concentrate, think and remember.

Next, volunteers will be randomly assigned (similar to the flipping of a coin) to one of two groups. One group will receive a 5 mg. daily dose of Aricept, which will increase to 10 mg. after six weeks; the other group will receive a placebo.

The most frequent side effects of Aricept include nausea, diarrhea,

trouble sleeping, vomiting, muscle cramps, fatigue and decreased appetite. Volunteers will receive up to \$275 for participation in the study. For more information, contact the UCLA Aging and Memory Research Center, (310) 206-7392.






