# Dale Lostetter will retire after 32 years

**DOWNEY**—All good things must come to an end, and Dale Lostetter has announced he is retiring from the Downey Unified School District after 32 years of dedicated service to the district and its children.

Lostetter, one of the district's most loyal employees, grew up in Downey and was educated in the Downey school system. He graduated from North Junior High School (known today as Griffiths), and went on to be a member of the sixth graduating class from Warren High School.

His interest in helping youngsters was evident early by his work in after school programs through the Downey Park and Recreation Program. After attending Long Beach State, he was drafted into the army and spent a tour in Vietnam.

On returning home he attended CSU-Los Angeles where he graduated in 1974 with a B.A. degree.

He worked at West Middle School teaching physical education and science and then at East Middle School, where he was loved and respected by the students.

Always striving to be the best, and determined to carry out his love for youngsters and education, he studied at Pepperdine University where he earned a Masters Degree. During his years with the district he worked as vice principal of South Middle School in 1978; assistant principal at Downey High School in 1983; and assistant principal of Columbus High School in 1985, then returned to South in 1987 as principal.

In later years, he responded to a need and a job where he could definitely make a mark as the Director of Alternative Education in 1994. Throughout his many years of dedicated service to the district, none showed his courage and stamina more than when he was coordinator of the Carnival of Champions. Early in April 2002, the morning of the event, Dale stopped at an all-night market to buy additional items for the students, when a man stepped out of the shadows and demanded money.

# **Mansionization** moratorium asked

**DOWNEY**—Two well-known members of the Downey community, George Redfox and Harold Tseklenis, used the time set aside for public comment at Tuesday's Council meeting to urge a moratorium on the construction of "mansionized" homes here which often do not reflect well on their neighborhoods.

The matter is considered complex and will take time to study, according to staff, but a moratorium would control the sudden rise of these multistory goliaths until codes can be modified to handle them. Analisa Hungerford also spoke out against the giant structures.

The moratorium was suggested for consideration at the next regular Council meeting June 28.

Council comments included a question from Rick Trejo on when the Lakewood Boulevard Improvement Project will be completed. Desi

# Mothers protest over sex offender

**DOWNEY**—-An estimated 30 mothers and friends, outraged over the discovery a convicted sex offender has been living across the street from West Middle School, took their protest to the Downey City Council meet-

They also protested the firing of a school crossing guard who had helped bring the matter to light by passing out flyers.

Flyers passed out by protestors outside City Hall Tuesday read: "Voice Your Concerns," "This is to address: Why we were not educated about sex offenders near our schools!"

About 15 spoke at the meeting inside. Police Chief John Finch responded to their complaints. He said there are 97 known sex offenders living in Downey today. Sex offenders are listed in three categories. Of these 96 are considered type 3 or the least likely to be involved in a recurrence. One is a type 2. None are type 1 or "predators."

The Chief said he would prefer all of them live somewhere else, but by law if they file their status and remain legal there is nothing the police can

The protestors then challenged why it is difficult to get the names and addresses of local offenders. Finch said the names are available through the Norwalk Sheriff's office under "Megan's Law."

# Doctor pleads for office space

The City Attorney advised the Council that to allow a special case such as this one to occupy the building before requirements and standards, which include a street light be operational, would create a legally unsound position.

Bob Goldstein, speaking from the audience, noted it is not a good thing to drive out doctors, and that this one seems to want to stay here.

Councilman Rick Trejo did not speak nor vote on the matter since he is employed by the hospital building the medical offices, Downey Regional Medical Center.

DRMC also appealed the delay in occupying the building at a Council meeting three weeks ago.

Sam's Club originally moved into the Florence Ave. location in 1994, taking over operations from Pace Warehouse.

The business remained until 1999, when the store moved to its present location at the Long Beach Towne Center.

Wal-Mart officials said they currently have 130 vacant store properties throughout the United States but are working to fill them. In past instances, former Wal-Mart and Sam's Club stores have been transformed into industrial facilities, churches, schools and even courtrooms, officials

# Downey Fire captain caught in hazmat sting

**DOWNEY**—A sting operation recently conducted by the California Department of Toxic Substances Control and the Orange County district attorney's office is said to have resulted in the arrest of Downey Fire Captain Edward Lewis Haupt, 44, and nine other suspects who were caught as they tried to haul hazardous waste illegally.

Downey Fire officials declined to comment on the case.

Illegal disposal of hazardous waste and chemicals is a problem all over the state, authorities said.

Reports quote O.C. District Attorney Tony Rackauckas as saying such "hazardous waste as oil, acid, paint, harsh solvents, petroleum products and other toxic chemicals are being hauled and disposed of improperly. The waste containers are being left in various different places, including the sides of freeways and in alleys in residential areas. This poses serious problems to the environment and becomes dangerous to people."

Rackauckas said the suspects face misdemeanor charges which could mean jail time of 6 months and \$2,500 in fines if convicted. Those arrested include an Orange County Animal Control officer. They range in age from 21 to 52 years.

The suspects responded to Penny Saver ads which undercover agents placed asking if someone could haul hazardous waste. The agents then handed the unsuspecting responders hazardous wastes that were 'lowlevel' toxic. They then arrested the suspects after they drove off a short distance.

The suspects reportedly charged fees of \$400-\$600. None were found to have the proper certificates or training to handle the materials.



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# A stroke of good luck

DOWNEY – Don Schmidt, a retired Downey resident and husband of Downey Regional Medical Center (DRMC) Hospital board chair Mary Lou Schmidt, can count himself lucky. He had always considered himself in good health, maintaining a low-fat diet and walking every day. His blood pressure readings were fine. But in January, he was shocked to find out about a grave threat to his life.

Schmidt had come to DRMC for a free community seminar and screening on strokes. He wasn't there for his own benefit, but rather in support of the hospital and friends from the Roxanna Todd Hodges Foundation, sponsors of the new, ongoing program. Although he hadn't planned to receive a stroke screening, when a slot opened in the schedule he was invited to have the evaluation, which takes less than five minutes. He lay down on the screening table, a hospital technician applied gel to his neck and moved an instrument called a transducer over his neck area to obtain images on a computer screen of his carotid arteries, measuring the blood flow through the vessels.

Dr. Jack Kennis, who was volunteering at the screening, read Schmidt's computer print-out. It showed that his carotid artery was 80 to 99 percent blocked. Simply stated, Schmidt was a walking time bomb for a stroke. Dr. Kennis explained to the Schmidts what the test showed, and what steps needed to be taken next. Don was scheduled for further testing, which confirmed the blockage. About two weeks later, he was in surgery.

When DRMC chief of surgery Dr. Mark Minkes emerged from the operating table, Mary Lou recalled: "He actually showed us this long string of plaque he had removed." Now that his blood flow has been restored, Don claims to be less tired and have more energy. And since their experience, the Schmidts have told everyone they know to be screened, either through DRMC's monthly programs or by their doctor.

"You never know if it could happen to you, and if you have a chance to be screened, get it done," advises Mary Lou. "Stroke screening is truly a life-saving screening. Even if you survive a stroke, your life is most likely altered forever. Not everyone wants to know if they have a problem, but by finding out, it can be remedied."

The next stroke screening and a seminar entitled "Life After Stroke" will be held at Downey Regional Medical Center on Saturday, July 16, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Physical, occupational and speech therapists will present information and answer questions on post-stroke rehabilitation. The event is free, but registration is required. Blood pressures and heart rates will be checked, and stroke screenings will be available for early sign-ups.

# Council approves lighting assessment

**DOWNEY**—After a public hearing the City Council has confirmed the 2005-06 fiscal lighting and landscaping assessment for A.D. 121. The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

Public Works Director Desi Alvarez noted in a staff report that there are about 5,605 street lights in the City of Downey providing lighting for traffic and pedestrian safety. Of these 858 street lights are owned by the City, 57 are owned by the State, 33 are shared with other cities and the rest are owned by Southern California Edison. Their cost is paid from a combination of assessments on individual parcels under the Lighting and Landscaping Act of 1972, as well as general property

On-street landscaping is also paid from direct assessments under the Act of 1972, and include tree trimming, tree removal and other landscape maintenance along parkways and medians.

# Seven zones

The District is divided into seven zones. The SCE street lighting rates will increase slightly during fiscal 2005-06 compared to 2004-05. Traffic light rates are a combination of SCE rates and Department of Water Resources charges, and a revised traffic control rate took affect April 14,

The estimated cost of operating and maintaining street lighting and landscaping in all seven zones for fiscal 2005-06 is \$1,412,845, which is \$29,333 higher than the projected cost of this year which is \$1,383,312. The Lakewood Boulevard Improvement Project will add over 200 lights that will have to be factored in to electrical costs for zone II. Other zones remain essentially the same as 2004-05.

Thus rates in Zones 1, III, IV, V and VI can be maintained at their cur-

For zone I the rates can remain at zero while projecting a fund balance adequate for existing street lights plus additional lights included in devel-

For zone II rates are adjusted upward to maintain an adequate fund reserve. However, the rates are still less than those in fiscal 2002-03 and less than 40 percent of the maximum allowable increase.

For zone L, tree trimming and removal and installation will continue from year to year. As of June 30, a negative balance of \$23,161 is anticipated. Both residential and commercial properties are currently being assessed at the maximum rate. Therefore, to restore reserves in the future the maximum rate will have to be increased.


To pay for fiscal 2005-06 costs, the district will use \$422,270 in general property tax funds designated specifically for street light maintenance, \$35,000 in interest earned from reserves in the street lighting fund, and \$1,030,579 from direct assessments.

Life is not easy for a 20-something bachelor.

Between the obligatory weekend getaways to the casinos, weekday happy hours at the pub and the everyday charming of truly delectable women, it's hard for a fellow to find some time to relax.

The suave young bachelor learns to play life like a complicated game of chess, orchestrating one deft move after another, lining his pawns into perfect strategic positions until just the right time to strike. The facets of life are hanging from a string and he, through harsh trial and error lessons, learns to become the ultimate puppet master.

Such was life for Charlie Reader (Patrick Rafferty), who proves that, even in the olden days of the 1950s, boys will still be boys.

Rafferty stars in the current Long Beach Playhouse production of 'The Tender Trap,' a cute comedy by Max Schulman and Robert Paul Smith that runs through July 9. Darlene Chaffee directs.



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
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# Lila Mae Schlittenhart survived by large family
