### New fields are said sunflower-vulnerable

DOWNEY-Downey Unified School District Superintendent Wendy Doty called the Board's special attention Tuesday to student art from entries in the recent Congressional Art competition of Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard which are now on display on the walls of the main office of the School Administration Center, 11627 Brookshire Ave.

And Doty gave special thanks to Stan Hanstad and Jennifer Boose for taking time to hang the pictures with such skill.

The Board then turned to discussion of the new stadiums at the two high schools.

#### Seed problems

The Board briefly discussed the problem with the new surface of the fields at both Downey and Warren High School. It seems the artificial material is vulnerable to sunflower seeds, as well as chewing gum.

#### Stadium access hours

The discussion extended to what hours the facilities at the new stadiums at the high schools should be made available to the public. The Board's Tod Corrin said the public, which paid for the new stadiums through a public bond measure, should have some added access, but he asked "how much" with the problems of graffiti and vandalism so serious today.

The Board's discussion favored access weekdays until dusk, but not weekends which would require additional staffing expense. Betty Ferraro was adamant that the new stadiums be protected.

Buck Weinfurter, who is in charge of construction and transportation, suggested the "weekdays until dusk" policy as a good compromise. The policy will be voted on at a future meeting.

The Board also expressed hope that once public hours at the new facilities have been established, that they be made known through the pages of local newspapers such as the Downey Patriot.

In other matters, the Board's Donald La Plante said this is one of the worst state budgets "ever."

And Board President Barbara Samperi gave special thanks to the Assistance League for contributing \$15,500 to the operation of the TLC Center.

#### Sports teams

The Board's William Gutierrez wished the district's sports teams which have begun fall practice "good luck" in the upcoming season.

### Learning Center concept approved

DOWNEY-The conceptual design submitted by the architectural firm, Arquitectonica, for the new Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center, has been approved by the Downey City Council.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

When completed, the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center will accommodate the following elements:

- \*The Challenger Learning Center
- \*An Interactive Exhibits Area
- \*A History and Educators Resource Center
- \*A Robotics Lab
- \*Meeting and Program Rooms
- \*A Retail Store
- \*Administration and Support facilities

The Center will occupy a 20,000 square foot building site at the northwest corner of the proposed new city park at the former NASA site. Arquitectonica, which has designed a number of museums and educational facilities, including the Discovery Science Center in Santa Ana, will now proceed with the preparation of plans, specifications and cost estimate for the project. The City Council approved an agreement setting aside \$587,875 for this purpose.

#### **Council reaction**

Councilmember Rick Trejo said he was pleased with the overall configuration of the museum/learning center. Councilmember Dave Gafin suggested the architectural firm incorporate ecological considerations in the design. When Mayor Pro Tem Meredith Perkins asked how much will it cost to run the Center, it was pointed out that Arquitectonica was just submitting a diagrammatic scheme at this stage, and that plan details will be submitted later that would incorporate suggestions/other ideas. Councilmember Kirk Cartozian was assured that Arquitectonica would be working very closely with the contractor during its construction.

\*Adopted a resolution approving the appeal and denying a conditional use permit for a combination gasoline fuel sales/convenience market/take-out restaurant on property located at 8801 Lakewood Blvd.; it also approved the appeal and denial of a zone variance on the same property.

\*Adopted a resolution adopting class specifications and establishing salary ranges for secretaries to the City Attorney/Development Services and City Clerk, Public Works Technician, Equipment Maintenance Leadworker, Keep Downey Beautiful Coordinator and Senior Building Permit Technician.

\*Heard a presentation by Downey Fire Chief Mark Sauter on the Emergency Room crisis developing in Los Angeles County.

#### Travel, meeting policy nixed

\*Took no action on the draft of a proposed Travel, Conference and Meeting Expense Policy which would have applied to Council members, City staff and Commissioners.

\*Presented the Mayor's Award for Service to the City to Sonya Meacham, ASPIRE Program Supervisor with the Community Services Department.

\*Presented proclamations to Dave and Vicki Gunderson, representing Downey High School; and David and Pam Langford, and Steve and Ruth Ruckman, representing Warren High School, as Parents of the Year.

\*Presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Cristina Rodriguez, Rio Hondo (Boys and Girls Club) Teen Center member and volunteer.

\*Heard State Assemblyman Hector de la Torre reiterate his intent to work closely with the Council, especially with regard to Prop. 42 funds.

The meeting adjourned in memory of Patti LeVar, wife of Building Official and longtime Downey resident Ron LeVar.

The next public meeting of the City Council will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 9.

DUSD Board extends management pacts

DOWNEY-The Downey Unified School District Board of Education Tuesday approved addendums to the contracts of the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent of Business Services, Assistant Superintendent of Instructional Services, and Assistant Superintendent of Personnel Services which extends the contracts to June 30, 2009, except as specified.

Boardmember Donald La Plante noted the action simply extends the terms of the contracts and does not affect salaries.

In other action, the Board approved a Memorandum of Understanding with the Downey Education Association to continue release time for the President of the DEA.

The Board also held a public hearing and then received initial bargaining proposals for reopeners from the CSEA Chapters 248 and 746.



### Underage drinking campaign recognized

**WASHINGTON, D.C.**—Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard (CA-34th) has been honored with the 2005 Outstanding Contribution Award by Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD), in recognition of her sponsorship of "The STOP (Sober Truth on Preventing) Underage Drinkng Act" (HR864) and for her successful efforts to create a national media campaign aimed at parents to combat underage drinking that will be released this fall.

The STOP Underage Drinking Act would make this media campaign permanent. In addition, the measure would also coordinate the efforts of various federal agencies charged with addressing the problem; provide additional funding for the Drug Free communities program; provide competitive grants to states, nonprofits, and institutions of higher education to create statewide coalitions to prevent underage drinking and alcohol abuse by university students, as well as increase federal research into the physical impact of alcohol on adolescent brain development.



Furthermore, despite the clear intent of Congress, federal courts inrecent years have narrowed the scope of the ADA and limited the enforcement of key provisions, especially those related to the workplace and the application of the ADA to state law.


Adding to the problem is the fact that President Bush has chosen judges for the federal bench who have a track record of explicit hostility to the ADA. His Administration has also proposed funding cuts to Medicaid, Section 8 housing, vocational rehabilitation and assistive technology - all of which are essential to fostering independence.

The President also has failed to honor former President Clinton's pledge to hire 100,000 individuals with disabilities in the federal government by 2005. In fact, under the current Administration, the number of federal employees with disabilities has declined.

It's clear that our work is far from finished in meeting the goals of the ADA. We must continue to strive to reach a point in this nation where you can get a job if you are qualified and can do the job.

This is as much a priority today as it was 15 years ago when the ADA was enacted. With thousands of severely injured soldiers returning home from Afghanistan and Iraq, we have a special responsibility to assure them that they will receive the fair treatment they deserve as they attempt to return to work and re-integrate themselves in their communities.

We must bring our nation closer to the ideals of equality and opportunity that are both our heritage and our hope. I am proud to be among the Members of Congress leading the way in our national effort to make those ideals a reality for all Americans.



When an uninsured person is brought to DRMC by ambulance, our Emergency Room treats that patient with the same professional care, courtesy and expertise as a patient who has insurance.

When we apply for reimbursement for an uninsured patient, we usually receive no reimbursement to cover the actual cost of caring for the patient. We, DMRC, must absorb the balance.

Patients admitted through the Emergency Room caused the Hospital to sustain losses of over \$16 million over past two years. We cannot continue to sustain these losses.

Because we know how valuable DRMC's Emergency Room is to this community, we are pursuing every opportunity to solve this crisis. Solutions we are investigating include:

- Receive reimbursement in line with what other LA County hospitals receive
- Limit boundaries for ambulance runs



King/Drew Medical Center receives more money per patient than any other LA County hospital despite well-publicized, serious lapses in patient care and safety.

By contrast, the amount of reimbursement DRMC receives from the County and State is among the lowest of any area hospital. Yet our performance and safety record are exemplary.

We are working with the County and State to provide more funding for the uninsured and underinsured. As a non-profit hospital we are doing our fair share, but we cannot solve this crisis alone.

We are proud of our performance improvement and safety record, and the high quality of our healthcare practices. Downey Regional continues to invest in our staff and facilities to ensure we meet community health needs and exceed expected outcomes. Diligence, commitment and professionalism should be fairly compensated.


