## Schools open soon; drive carefully

**DOWNEY**—With millions of children heading back to school over the next few weeks, the Auto Club of Southern California's Downey district office is reminding motorists to slow down and pay more attention when driving near schools and school zones.

In 2003, California children under 13 years of age accounted for 9 percent of the number of pedestrian fatalities (61) and 26 percent of pedestrian injuries (3,572). National figures indicate that traffic collisions are the number one cause of death and injury for children under 15 years of age.

#### Look out for children

"Motorists driving through residential streets need to look out for children walking on their way to school or to their school bus stop," said Hend Hasrouni, the Auto Club's Downey district manager. "Parents and teachers also can help reduce injuries and fatalities by working together to teach children about safe walking and biking behaviors.

"Much of the danger comes from the fact that children are smaller and harder for motorists to see," Hasrouni said. "Children sometimes make the mistake of assuming that if they can see a car, the driver can see them."

This is the 23rd year AAA has conducted its "School's Open—Drive Carefully" campaign. Each fall, the Auto Club makes available 100,000 bumper stickers to school principals and law enforcement officials reminding motorists to drive with extra care at this time of year.

To help protect children, the Auto Club urges motorists to follow these safety tips:

\*Drive slowly in and around school and residential areas.

\*Obey school zone speed limit signs.

\*Always stop for school buses that are loading or unloading children. \*Drive with your headlights on—even during the day—so children and other drivers can see you.

\*Drive without distractions. Don't use cell phones, eat, apply makeup, shave or do anything that could take your attention from the road.

\*Scan between parked cars, since children could dart into the street.

\*Leave for your destination early enough so you don't have to speed to arrive on time. Take the possibility of traffic jams into consideration when planning a departure time.

Pedestrians should remember the following safety tips:

## Police on lookout for DUIs holiday weekend

**DOWNEY**—The Downey Police Department will be conducting roving DUI patrols during the evening hours of Labor Day weekend, Sept. 2-4. Drivers found to be under the influence will be arrested.

The patrols are part of the department's traffic safety education and enforcement campaign, calling for several Sobriety Checkpoints in 2005 and 2006, and high school education programs such as the popular "Every 15 Minutes" presentation. The program is paid for by a \$115,000 grant from the Office of Traffic Safety through the Business, Transportation and Housing Agency.

"Alcohol-related deaths and injuries are totally preventable, and this grant is a major step in the right direction to provide resources for the department and the public," said Downey Police Chief John Finch.

### Downey aviation

#### By John Adams Second in a series

As stated in a previous story, the history of aerospace in Downey dates to 1911 when E.M. Smith, who started with a plant manufacturing transmissions and brakes, decided to try his hand at airplanes and bought the Albatross Company of Long Beach. He then needed an airfield, and bought 71 acres of land from James Hughan. The land was largely orange trees and castor beans.

The timing was terrible, with the stock market crash just two months later, and Smith leased the plant to the Champion Aircraft Corporation in 1932. Champion built safe but rather ugly planes that were often compared to bathtubs. They featured a tandem seat design and were designed for low altitude and speeds as low as 10 mph.

Sales were not good, and within seven months the plant was turned over to Curtiss Manufacturing of Los Angeles which planned to build trucks. Before that plan developed the Security National Aircraft Corporation owned by Walter B. Kinner stepped in.

Kinner had built the Kinner motor, as well as two planes for Amelia Earhart. The first was called "The Canary," and the second was bought by her in Boston in 1925 when she invested money in his company.

Kinner dreamed of becoming the Henry Ford of aviation. He focused on folding wings and side-by-side seating and planes that fit in a garage. He flew the plane in the 1933 Air Races in Los Angeles. He called it the Security Airster.

Kinner decided to move his operation to Van Nuys Airport and sold the Downey plant to the Baker Oil Tools Company. Baker used it for storage.

Jerry Vultee, finding financial support from Erret L. Cord (of Cord auto fame) designed the Vultee V-1 prototype, an eight passenger commercial air transport. Due to revised requirements by the Aeronautical Branch of the Department of Commerce, the V-1 became the V-1A with accommodations for two pilots in the cockpit. The plane was an immediate sensation and was purchased by American Airlines. But by 1936, its orders were dwindling, and Vultee looked toward the military market by designing the V-11 attack bomber.

Recalling the EMSCO plant in Downey where he had worked for a year, Vultee leased the plant from Baker Oil Tools in 1936 and moved his Aviation Manufacturing Corporation from Glendale to Downey.

His first customer for the V-11-G and V-11GB was the Chinese National Government which ordered 30 V-11-Gs. The Soviet Union ordered one, and the Turkish Government ordered 40 V-11-GBs, while Brazil took 26 V-11-GBs.

Tragedy struck when Vultee and his wife were killed in an air crash in Arizona while en-route to Washington D.C. in January 1938.

He was succeeded as president and general manager of the Vultee plant by Richard Palmer who became chief engineer in 1940, and the plant was named Vultee Aircraft. A new plane known as the V-12-C was ordered by




## Cerritos football coach faces felony charges

**NORWALK**—Patrick Callahan, the Cerritos College assistant football coach who has remained free on bail after his arrest Aug. 1 for allegedly obtaining federal financial aid fraudulently for 13 of his players, pleaded not guilty at his arraignment Tuesday in Los Angeles Superior Court.

He was charged with 26 counts of felony conspiracy and grand theft, after a five-year investigation conducted by the U.S. Department of Education on suspicion that he illegally doctored the players' requests for federal Pell Grants between 1999 and 2004.

The 57-year old Artesia resident could get up to 11 years in state prison if found guilty.

#### Kyser reports his economic outlook

Dear Editor:

We are grateful to the Downey Patriot because through you we have a voice.

Mr. Smith wants to return to English common law. Yet we are accused of being back in the 19th Century. The type of architecture they are advocating goes back to the 15th Century.

I'm getting mixed messages about the occupancy of these "mansions." When I spoke with Mr. Yoshiki, he told me they were beieg bought by multiple families, as they were too expensive for one family to buy. My reply was, "You're telling me that they are nothing more than glorified apartment houses using a common kitchen." He neither confirmed nor denied this. Then the builders, etc., are saying they are bought by rich doctors. Someone who is on the inner workings of the hospital said, "Most of the doctors are moving out of Downey." What I see happening is not an owner-builder improving his home, but rather most of all of them are deciding, for one reason or another, that apparently it wasn't their "dream" home, because they can't seem to wait to sell it.

The total could range from 2 to 18 persons in one home. Please tell me who in Code Enforcement is going to check to see if this code is enforced. When I know that this is being thoroughly enforced, I might feel differently.

It was very obvious at the City Council meeting that everyone who spoke in favor of Mansionization, except one lady, were realtors, builders, contractors, loan officers, etc. One man was so concerned that Downey "go forward" that he came from Redondo Beach to "help" our city out. All of these had something to gain financially. I'm "sure" they would feel the same if no money were involved!

The others were there to try to protect Downey from high-density population.



Who needs a TV soap when you're got this kind of material in your local rag?

It seems that Money waves its ugly head once again, and as usual, other heads look the other way. I'm from the old school and that form of education said that rules were made to be broken. I assumed it meant that there were exceptions to every rule, and that if it were by perhaps ignorance of any existing law or "Code" in this situation, then that is where the human element entered the picture and the problem could be solved to everyone concerned's satisfaction. Authority figures could sort it out and hopefully come up with a workable solution. Many people occupy positions of authority but don't necessarily have the ability or expertise of problem solving. When we find these authority figures that say, "Nothing can be done," we usually wind up with law and code enforcement quotes. Money being the measuring stick here, the little person with a smaller issue usually comes up on the short end of the stick (if you get my drift).

I just recently went though a yearlong process appealing an ownership issue with the Los Angeles County Tax Assessor. I understood the "letter of the law" and questioned their application of that rule. I felt I had been "victimized" by it, and that the original framers of that rule had something completely different in mind. Rules and codes for the most part are pretty much self-explanatory, but exceptions can and do occur. I was re-assessed back to 1998 on such a technicality and levied over \$10,000 in back taxes and penalties, and my annual tax stipend tripled! But like I mentioned above when authority figures like appeal panel members lack the problem solving ability, they do one of two things: they pass the buck and wait for one of the others to come up with a solution equitable to all, or simply do what the less acceptable way out is and quote the textbook version. What we need today in government is compassionate understanding. We are, after all is said and one, human beings trying to survive in a most difficult system of Capitalism, where "inflation" constantly raises the bar for everyone, and demands its inhuman compliance. There is a limit to our ability to comply, and demands do dictate. Some pour driveways, while others have to keep their money busy making more money. This money disease can be contagious. Over 60 people crowded into the meeting room in Furman Park for the 3rd Downey Homeowners Alliance meeting on Monday, Aug. 22. The meeting provided an opportunity for neighbors to voice their frustrations as well as offer input in the 'Campaign to Stop Mansionization.'

The group continues to compile materials to present to the subcommittee and city council to validate their belief that the current code is being violated. They also will be drafting a document intended to help the subcommittee in its determination on the mansionization issue that will suggest additional items for consideration in better serving the interests of neighborhoods.

The main focus of the Downey Homeowners Alliance at this time is to see that the Planning Department upholds the existing code and discontinues issuing permits on mansions that are overscale and out-of-character with the neighborhood.

An effort is being made to document which tracts in Downey have covenants, conditions and restrictions (CC&R's). CC&R's are enforceable legal documents which are recorded on the title and pass with the deed. Some tracts have a similar deed designation of Homeowner's Association rather than CC&R's. A new meeting site will be sought due to overflow crowds. DHA meets again next week.





#### East West Players to present 'Stew Rice'

LOS ANGELES-East West Players, the nation's premier Asian American theater organization, begins its historic 40th Anniversary Season with the return of the Hawaiian favorite, Stew Rice, by Edward Sakamoto, directed by James A. Nakamoto.

Beginning in Hawaii during 1957 and ending in 1978, this comedy centers around three young men and their female counterparts as they finish high school, examining what happens to friendship when time and distance have their way. But more importantly, what happens when someone moves away and no longer relates to "home." East West Players' 1987 production of Stew Rice was one of the most successful in the theater's history, running for almost three months after being extended twice.

Stew Rice's theme of leaving home and returning years later to discover how people and places have changed is a universal experience that strikes a chord with all audiences. Everyone leaves home at some point in their lives to face a new set of challenges and reach new goals. And everyone knows how hard it is to go back and realize that home has changed. But sometimes the most difficult part is realizing that we have changed too," East West Players Producing Artistic Director Tim Dang said.

Playwright Sakamoto has written 16 plays, 11 of which have Hawaii themes. His plays have been produced in Honolulu, New York City, Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles, among others. He received the prestigious Hawaii Award for Literature (1997) from then Gov. Benjamin Cayetano. University of Hawaii Press has published six of his plays in two books: Hawaii No Ka Oi, the Kamiya Family Trilogy and Aloha Las Vegas and Other Plays - the "other plays" are Stew Rice and A'Ala Park. He received L.A. DramaLogue awards for Stew Rice and Chikamatsu's Forest. Hawaii State Theatre Council presented Sakamoto with Po'okela awards (best original plays) for "Our Hearts Were Touched with Fire" and "Aloha Las Vegas." Sakamoto has also received the Rockefeller Foundation American Playwrights in Residence fellowship and an NEA grant.

"In a way I wrote New Rice for those of us who left Hawaii in our youth and still find ourselves on the mainland, separated from friends and family for many years. Leaving Hawaii at the time seemed like the right thing to do. For many, life on the mainland is indeed better, more exciting, more challenging. For others, the mainland is perhaps a trap, since returning to Hawaii is impossible because of career jobs," said Sakamoto. "Like some of my other Hawaii plays, Stew Rice is a nostalgic return to my youth."

All performances are in the David Henry Hwang Theater at the Union Center for the Arts, located in Little Tokyo at 120 Judge John Aiso St., Los Angeles, CA 90012. Opening night is Sept. 7. Performances are Thursday, Friday and Saturdays at 8 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays at 2 p.m. (no Saturday matinee on Sept. 10). Previews are Sept. 1-3 at 8 p.m. and Sept. 4 at 2 p.m. An American sign Language-interpreted performance is scheduled for Sept. 24 at 2 p.m.



## Walter Koskie served in Guam during WWII



## Ask the Contractor

(For most homeowners, hiring a contractor, whether for a simple repair or major remodel can be daunting. How do you know if a contractor is qualified? What kind of contractor do you need for your job? Whose responsibility is insurance? How can you tell if the price being offered is fair? These, and the ones below, are the kinds of basic questions the Contractors State License Board tries to answer for homeowners' guidance).

Q. A contractor came to my door yesterday and offered a free roof inspection. I believed him when he said I needed a new roof, so I agreed. I signed a contract, but am having second thoughts. Is there anything I can do to get out of the contract?

A. Yes, but you must move quickly. California's Home Solicitation Sales Act allows you to cancel the contract or offer by midnight of the third business day after you signed the document. That includes all days except for Sunday and most major holidays. The purpose here is to protect consumers from the pressure they often feel to make an immediate purchasing decision by someone going door-to-door. Unless the contract is negotiated at the contractor's place of business, the buyer qualifies for the three-day right to cancel. The notice must be in writing and can be a letter, telegram or even a FAX sent to the address specified in the contract or offer. You need to be sure you express your intention not to be bound by the contract or offer.

This is an excellent example of why you should never feel pressured into signing a home improvement contract, especially when someone shows up at your front door. You should get at least three bids for any home improvement project. That gives you the opportunity to compare costs and to certify that the contractors are licensed.

Q. I recently hired a contractor to put a pool in my backyard. When they started digging the contractor found hazardous materials in the soil. Can he continue working on the pool and remove the waste himself?

A. The most important thing for you to do is make sure the dirt is properly removed. Your contractor must stop work on your pool immediately. In some instances, a contractor can remove the dirt, but only if he has a Hazardous Substance Removal Certification from the CSLB. You should notify your local health department so they can help determine your course of action. You'll also want to check with your city's building department to make sure all local codes are followed with removing the hazardous materials. This is definitely a time where you'll want the work to be done by experts. Don't try and remove this dirt yourself.

Q. I am having a pool installed and the contractor asked for 40 percent down before work even begins. Is this legal?

A. No, it is not legal. By law, a swimming pool contractor can require only two percent down or \$200, whichever is less. It's also important that you don't pay upfront for materials before they're delivered or for work that hasn't been completed. In fact, be sure that the down payment price and subsequent payment schedule are written out on your contract. This is the best way to protect yourself from being taken advantage of by a fraudulent or unlicensed contractor. 


The Norwalk Clinic was closed by the Department of Health Services several years ago. Due to reopen within the next 3 months, it will be operated by the JWCH Institute as a health center and outpatient clinic. The JWCH Institute is a private nonprofit health agency founded by a group of prominent Los Angeles-area physicians in 1960. The Institute has since managed several clinics targeting under-served residents of Los Angeles County. Once the Norwalk facility reopens, JWCH plans to offer primary care and family planning services. Plans are to expand into prenatal, pediatrics and health education services within a few months.


"When you look at the low-cost services available in this community, you find they are virtually non-existent," said Knabe. 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

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
