Downey firefighters dispatched to Biloxi *Fire department schedules fundraiser tomorrow*

DOWNEY—The City of Downey Fire Department has sent six firefighters to Mississippi to deliver disaster relief services. The teams will be deployed for 30 days.

Upon arrival in the hurricane disaster area, they were expected to take care of themselves (shelter/food/water) until the federal logistical resources catch up to them. Each team was advised to bring only the equipment they could carry 'on their backs' with them. They were advised they would be required to spend most of their duty time walking and evaluating the heavily-damaged areas.

The request from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for 1,000 firefighter teams (two FFs per team) from the municipal fire departments was received on Wednesday afternoon (Aug. 31). A very brief application period was held on Thursday morning. Late Thursday night, the first notifications of acceptance from FEMA were received. By mid-morning on Friday, Fire Captains Boyd, Croom and Haupt, Fire Engineers Davis and Matsumoto and Firefighter/Paramedic Hapke were all accepted. By early Friday afternoon, the six members of the Fire Department were on a plane bound for Atlanta. Once in Atlanta, the teams received a day of additional disaster relief training from FEMA.

On Sunday, the teams traveled to Jackson, Mississippi.

On Monday the teams began their deployment to the Biloxi, Mississippi area as representatives of FEMA. The early reports from the teams have been as expected. There is little standing in the areas they have worked. As a result of the horrific storm, the cell phone coverage is poor. Hence the reports from the teams back to the fire department have been brief and sketchy.

Several other local fire departments have sent firefighters in response to the FEMA request. Santa Fe Springs, Long Beach, Monterey Park and Montebello are all participants in the effort to deliver relief to those impacted by Hurricane Katrina. FEMA has a reimbursement program in place for the participating fire departments.

The great Vultee war years in Downey

In the first two parts of this series we reviewed the fact that aerospace research and development in Downey dates to the EMSCO company of E.M. Smith, who decided to expand operations from asbestos products manufacturing to aircraft and bought a 73-acre tract of land for a plant and airstrip.

The depression hit in 1929, and the property went through several numbers of manufacturers until Jerry Vultee leased it in 1936 and moved his Aviation Manufacturing Corporation here from Glendale.

But Vultee and his wife died in a tragic air crash in Arizona while enroute to Washington D.C. in 1938.

He was succeeded as president and general manager of the Vultee Plant here by Richard Palmer, who in 1940 also became chief engineer, when the plant was formally named Vultee Aircraft.

V-12-C

A new plane known as the V-12-C drew 26 orders from the Chinese in 1939, and the U.S. Government ordered training planes worth \$2,986,000 from Vultee the same year.

The plant had to be redesigned to meet the new production demands, and as World War II neared it was clear more growth would soon be needed.

Employee recreational needs were met by many outlets including a baseball team. Notable players included Ewell Blackwell and Spider Jorgensen both of whom went on to major league stardom.

Modernization and expansion continued at the plant. At this time, 1940, three notable aircraft were produced, the Valiant 51, a basic combat aircraft, the Valiant 54, a basic trainer; and the Vanguard, a pursuit-interceptor. These in addition to the attack bomber added up to orders in excess of \$20 million.

Vultee became famous for its retooling and ability to produce planes in large numbers.

Air marshals, brass hats from the Army Air Corps and even Lady Halifax came to Downey to see how this was done.

When war was declared and many men went off to fight, hundreds of women took their place on the assembly lines. They were known as





Warren opens stadium, Downey new season

DOWNEY –Warren High School has big plans for their 50th anniversary this year. And, if they have it their way, the celebration will begin tonight with a victory over Long Beach Millikan at the Bears' recently renovated on-campus football stadium.

Game time is 7 p.m.

Fans are advised to arrive early as seating will only be available on the visitor's side due to ongoing construction.

Warren opened their season last week, losing to Northwood High School, 31-7, in a game played at Irvine High. They figure to have an easier time versus Millikan, bottom dwellers in a league that includes powerhouse Long Beach Poly and Lakewood.

Though the Bears struggled in putting points on the board – their lone touchdown came on a one-yard rush by Josh Lee in the fourth quarter – they had more total yards than Northwood (283) and fewer penalties.

Warren's defense struggled and the Bears trailed 21-0 at halftime. A Northwood field goal in the third quarter made it 24-0 and the Timberwolves later forced and recovered a Warren fumble in the end zone to make it 31-0.

It may be a long night for the Vikings.

Downey opens their season tonight at La Habra, Freeway League champions last year and winners of five titles the past six years.

The defense will have to work to contain senior quarterback R.J. Benedict, who, at 5-feet-11, 215 pounds, threw for 1,161 yards and 11 touchdowns last year, while rushing 43 times for six more scores.

Downey, playing in the San Gabriel Valley League, qualified for the playoffs last year but lost in the first round, 58-0, to Notre Dame.

The Vikings are ranked ninth in the latest CIF Southern Section Preseason Poll.


Teens will learn about these fascinating creatures through a slide presentation and an appearance by a live bat. Conducting the educational program will be bat biologist Diana Simons.





LETTERS TO THE EDITOR: *'Mansionization' not*

Dear Editor:

Every week we read about the subject called "mansionization" and if any of you believers or non-believers of this subject have not been paying attention, Downey is not the only city having this problem, and this whining is getting old.

I understand the situation of both sides and believe there is and can be a medium that should satisfy most people. Let's face the facts - you can never please everyone.

Checking into the "mansionization" or "McMansionization" of home dwellings via investigative research, you will find that this is a hot issue from California to Connecticut and Illinois to Pennsylvania.

There is a proposal that has been written by Dr. Charlotte Laws of The Valley Glen Council here in Southern California. She has also addressed the subject of "mansionization" in a series of articles such as the one I read called Much Ado about McMansions in the L.A. Daily News on Sunday, Aug. 13.

Following are her recommendations regarding the mansionization in Los Angeles. The proposal – which many call a "compromise" – is based solely on objective (rather than subjective) factors.

"Dear L. A. City Councilmember,

1. Three-story homes should not be allowed due to daylight and privacy deprivation for adjacent homes except in areas that already have a preponderance of three-story dwellings (to be determined by the L.A. Planning Commission with input from the City Councilmember and the Neighborhood Council of the area).

2. There should be no size restrictions for one-story homes. There is no negative impact for nearby homeowners when a one-story home encompasses a large portion of a lot.

3. When a two-story house is constructed, its total square footage, including garage, should not be more than 60 percent of the lot size unless the second-story home owner complies with at least a 10-foot setback from the side (adjoining) property lines for all second-story additions which exceed the 60 percent limit. Permission from the adjoining homes (at the side yards) is grounds for a variance. This is to assist the neighboring home with access to daylight and privacy.

What do these numbers mean? A two-story home on a 50 x 120 lot (6000 square foot lot) including garage could be no more than 3600 square feet unless the owner/builder provides all second story additions in excess of this 60 percent with at least a 10 foot setback from the side (adjoining) property lines.

If a homeowner or developer honors the ten foot side setbacks (as advocated in this proposal) and still wishes to eliminate most of his backyard (as long as he is in accordance with building requirements), then he should have this right. Neighbors will not be severely impacted because much of their privacy and daylight will be retained.


4. The owner/builder should also be mandated to add privacy plants on the side of the fence in which new second-story additions are being built.

5. Developers and homeowners who wish to build or add a second story to their single family residences should be encouraged to present their pre-construction ideas to local councils. This opens the dialogue and lets stakeholders know they have input on the direction of their community.

This proposal is meant to be easy for plan checkers, contractors and homeowners to understand and apply citywide. It focuses on objective factors such as privacy issues and sunlight deprivation, while making no recommendations regarding style.

These ideas may seem lax to those who fight so hard to retain neighborhood "character," yet stringent to libertarians and builders who feel they should not be restricted in any way.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR: *'Sprinturf' vs. 'Astroturf' fields*

Dear Editor:

I am writing in response to Andrew Kelly's letter of 8/12/05 regarding the "Astroturf" field.

For the record, the two fields in question at DUSD are Sprinturf fields and not Astroturf fields-and the difference is more than in just the name. Mr.Kelly is correct that the old Astroturf fields were essentially carpet-laid over a pad and pavement. The newer generation designs such as Sprinturf's are profoundly different. They are "infill" systems-not padded systems. In the case of the DUSD fields, 100 percent granulated rubber from old tires are recycled, ground, triple-washed and then combed into the 2-1/4 inch fiber. About 40,000 tires in all were recycled to support the fields. Athletes are essentially playing on a safe bed or rubber. The performance difference is also significant. These fields won't be harsh or abrasive to skin and a ball will bounce and react just like on natural grass. Mr. Kelly correctly points out that Southern California does not experience much rain and therefore muddy or "puddled" fields are not an issue. However, of equal or greater danger to athletes are hardened and pittled fields. Natural surfaces that are not watered can harden to a G-Max (hardness measurement) of around 200. Serious head or bone injuries can occur if an athlete falls on a surface like this. A Sprinturf all-rubber infill system guarantees a G-Max of under 135 for its eight-year warranty period. Some school systems refuse to let athletic events occur once a field reaches a Gmax of 170 or 180. One of the unfortunate myths of synthetic surfaces is that they cause more injuries than a natural surface. Today's all-rubber synthetic surfaces tend to be safer than natural surfaces because of the "G-max and also due to the consistent planarity of the surface. Synthetic fields do not get "pits," "pot holes" or humps" which can cause an athlete to trip, misstep or stumble causing very serious ankle or knee injuries. Prices for synthetic surfaces vary as do costs for the care and upkeep of a natural surface. Cost comparisons between natural and synthetic show a synthetic surface is actually less expensive over time than a natural surface kept in good, playable condition. One of the overwhelming reasons for a synthetic surface has nothing to do with cost or safety-it is the demand and amount of use a field can withstand. Years ago, a high school's sports program was "boys' varsity football." Today, most schools have vastly more usage requirements (football, lacrosse, soccer, and field hockey) for both boys and girls-Varsity and Jr. Varsity teams. On average, we believe the playing demands on a field are 5 to 10 times what they were a generation ago. Natural fields experiencing that type of use simply break down. As a bonus benefit, synthetic fields are very environmentally friendly. Not only do they recycle old tires, but they eliminate the need for harmful chemical fertilizers and pesticides.

'Stop this (mansionization) madness!' Dear Editor:

One reader claimed that it's "...simply people redeveloping their property as they want..." in converting tract homes into million-dollar plus mansions and states that a homeowner has the right to remodel their home as they see fit. Well, maybe (no deed restrictions here in Downey)."

However, we're not talking about adding a room on here, or pushing a all out there, or a modest second story to accommodate another immediate family member, we're talking about "knock-down remodeling," where only one wall is left standing to make it a "remodel for tax purposes, until the inspector has signed off on the footings and that one wall mysteriously" falls down." This results in a home that is 99 percent new. And who are these "people" that do this remodeling? Lately it seems they are really contractors out to make a quick profit. There are a lot of recently-remodeled homes that sprout For Sale signs as soon as the landscaping is done. Like the "twins" on the corner of Cherokee and Brookshire (site of a once former single family home). Or the "hotel" on the north side of Newville and Florence (once a medium-sized single story home on a corner lot). Or the former tract home on Gallatin and Brock. Or the home on Gallatin and Haledon where the contractor/owner only lived there during the time it took to be sold. The list could go on and on. No, these aren't your average home owners making their home into a "dream house," they are speculators, plain and simple. Ironically in this same issue of The Patriot (page 14) appears an ad for a "new" home, huge of course with five bedrooms and five and a half bathrooms with a master bedroom with a wet bar, fireplace and sitting area, for over \$1,687,000! A nearly two million dollar home in Downey? Sorry, but these homes just don't fit here, aesthetically, financially, or literally, and you can't tell me they have no effect on the overall inflated prices of homes. The only real winners here are the real estate agents (think commission), the contractors (think profits) and the city (think tax revenue). Let's stop this madness. —John Powell, Downey


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



Vultee was famous for paying women and men on the same scale, and produced the first woman flight mechanic, Jean Stevens, in 1942.

Consolidated purchase

Just after Pearl Harbor, Vultee bought 34 percent of Consolidated Aircraft in San Diego.

At Downey, Vultee produced Valiant basic trainers, the Vanguard P-66 pursuit plane; and the Vengeance A-31 dive bomber. Convair at Vultee produced the B-24 Liberator bomber.

As the war wound down, the Vultee Field Division of Convair won a Navy contract for LARK surface-to-air missiles in 1945.

Turning to the missile industry, the Vultee Field Division was awarded a \$1.2 million contract to study long-range missile weapons systems, and focused on the ballistic missile concept. While the government cancelled this contract in 1946, much of the research was reborn in 1950 as part of the Atlas Project.

With wartime contracts a thing of the past, Vultee turned to the peaceful manufacture including prefabricated homes using plastics and aluminum.

North American

In 1947 North American Aviuation, which had a number of contracts to fill, leased a portion of the Vultee assembly plant. North American used Downey to produce the AJ-1 Navy bomber and the T-28 postwar trainer. In 1950 North American purchased the Convair portion of the Downey plant.

After settling on a shop on the outskirts of Chino Hills, and before taking my seat before the executioner, I was made to sign a waiver declaring that I was not intoxicated or under the influence of drugs or alcohol. (Picture that: some buffoon waking up the next morning, tequila on his breath, gaping at his "Spring Break '99 Rules!" insignia.)

Twenty minutes after beginning, my artist, Goethe, one word like Madonna, was finished. He did a fine job, not a single typo.

The pain wasn't so bad either, not nearly as offensive as stubbing a toe. The trauma is more psychological, as you stand in front of the mirror admiring your new look, wondering what it was exactly that you were thinking when you said you wanted a tattoo.

Yes, the experience was quite memorable and now I'm thinking of maybe getting another. What the heck, a story on laser removal surgery is long overdue anyways.


211 system expanded in light of disaster



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Childrens Hospital researcher gets grant

LOS ANGELES-Vishal Saxena, Ph. D., a researcher in the Department of Radiology at The Saban Research Institute of Childrens Hospital Los Angeles, and assistant professor of research radiology at the Keck School of Medicine at USC, has received a \$517,765 grant from the new Pacific-Southwest Regional Center of Excellence for Biodefense and Emerging Infectious Disease Research based at UC-Irvine.

Dr. Saxena's project will support a state-of-the-art small animal imaging research program for infectious disease (SAIRPID) at Childrens Hospital Los Angeles as a shared resource for the community of scientists. He received both his graduate (1995) and doctorate (1999) degrees from the University of Cambridge in England.

Dr. Saxena's research is an integral part of a \$40 million grant to fund the new Pacific-Southwest Regional Center of Excellence (RCE), one of only 10 centers in the nation funded by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, part of the National Institutes of Health.

The Pacific-Southwest RCE will bolster basic biomedical research into bioterrorism agents, such as those that cause anthrax and botulism, and naturally occurring infectious diseases, including West Nile virus, Hantavirus and dengue. The Center will also provide scientific support, expertise and facilities in response to a national emergency.

Survey says Los Angeles is logged on

LOS ANGELES—A recent survey of technology use conducted by the University of Phoenix found that the area's self-proclaimed Internet addicts are spending substantial time online. The survey reveals information about area residents' reliance on the Internet and demonstrates the need to include technology in education.

Other information the survey found:

*Nearly half of survey respondents (48.5 percent) go online three or more times per day.

* 31 percent of respondents log on more than five times per day.

L.A. spends hours online

*Nearly 66 percent of residents are online for more than two hours per day.

*14 percent of respondents spend at least five hours per day on the Internet.

L.A. can't go without the Internet

*75 percent of residents could not last more than a week without the Internet

*23 percent of respondents couldn't go more than a day without the Internet.

*51 percent of respondents feel they are addicted to the Internet. Technology and education

*55 percent of respondents think that the Internet is "very important" to a person's education; 30 percent says it is "important."



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Long Beach named top university

LONG BEACH—For the second time in a row, CSU-Long Beach has been ranked one of the top three public master's universities in the west by *U.S. News & World Report* in its 2006 edition of America's Best Colleges Guide.

In addition to ranking third among the 64 western public master's universities ranked by the magazine, CSULB once again was included among the publication's first tier of rankings, placing the campus in the top 25 percent of a total of 123 public and private universities in its category in the region.

"The value of students' degrees is always based on the reputation of their academic institution," said Robert C. Maxson, university president. "I am so proud that *U.S. News & World Report* has recognized this campus for the quality education that students receive at Cal State Long Beach. It is especially satisfying because so much of the ranking is based on how we are perceived by our peers."

In U.S. News & World Report's survey methodology, colleges provide data for up to 15 indicators of academic excellence. Each factor is assigned a weight that reflects publication officials' judgment regarding how much a measure matters. Finally the colleges in each category are ranked against their peers, based on their composite weighted score.

Among the indicators used to measure the academic quality of the colleges and universities were: peer assessment (weighted by 25 percent), retention (25 percent in master's colleges), faculty resources (20 percent), student selectivity (15 percent), financial resources (10 percent), and alumni giving rate (five percent).

U.S. News & World Report also ranked CSULB's College of Engineering among the top 50 undergraduate programs nationally for all categories of colleges and universities, and also noted Long Beach's programs for first-year students among "stellar examples" of "academic programs that are believed to lead to student success."

As defined by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, institutions in the universities-master's category provide a full range of undergraduate programs and some master's level programs. They also offer few, if any, doctoral programs.

With an anticipated fall enrollment exceeding 35,000 students, CSULB offers 85 bachelor's degrees, 67 master's degrees and two doctorates.
