3rd-graders take classical sounds

DOWNEY—Third-graders are a terrific audience for classical orchestral music. Downey's third-graders, that is.

Last Wednesday morning, Oct. 26, every eight-year-old student in the city sat courteously in the Civic Theater's plushy seats listening attentively to a program performed by the Downey Symphony under Thomas Osborn. They heard music by Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky, Benjamin Britten and Leonard Bernstein, none of it light-weight stuff. They applauded in the right places and their enthusiasm bounced off the walls.

Provided by the Symphonic Society's Music in the Schools program, funded generously by Downey Savings & Loan and the City of Downey, and wonderfully assembled by the Downey Unified School District, this annual operation has become a miracle of coordination, learning and excitement.

The school buses roll in, the students pile out and are escorted in neat lines to their seats. The orchestra plays, the kids drink it in, the music is over, they exit the theater to return to their buses, just as children from the second group of schools take their seats (undoubtedly still warm.)

More than 1500

By the time the third group of schools has heard it all, more than 1500 youngsters have experienced a concert by a full symphony orchestra in an elegant theater setting.

Prepared by their teachers and the orchestra's quintet that makes yearly appearances at all our elementary schools, these third-graders understand what they're hearing. One Ward Elementary student, Nicholas, was asked what his favorite instrument was, and his dark eyes lighted up. With no hesitation he announced, "The harp!"

And four girls, asked what they especially liked about the concert, agreed it was the part from West Side Story when instruments depicted a fight scene. What were those instruments? "The percuh...the percuh..." they struggled for a minute. "The PERCUSSION!" Four big grins.

Well, it always takes a lot of doing, the special concert morning for these kids. And every year, everyone involved has the same assessment. Kids, you're welcome. And you're worth it!

Symphony's strings 'wondrously fine'

DOWNEY—The Downey Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Thomas Osborn, teamed with French horn genius Richard Todd for an evening of glorious music at the Downey Theater Saturday, Oct. 29.

Todd, who is internationally known as one of the few artists with complete command over the difficult French horn, demonstrated his mastery in a performance of Reinhold Gliere's Horn Concerto in B-flat Major, Op. 91. He was truly outstanding.

Magnificent Tchaikovsky

And the Downey Symphony took an old Russian chestnut from the fire and gave it new life and splendor through the thorough application of its wonderful string and percussion sections. We refer to Tchaikovsky's 4th Symphony.

We have often commented on the quality of Downey's string section, which is head and shoulders above other symphonic groups on the community symphonic level. It is time to go further, and say that seat-for-seat Downey can match up with all but the professional L.A. Symphony and its like.

The Symphony No. 4 in F Minor by Tchaikovsky has been played often locally, but seldom with more verve and élan that Downey gave it Saturday.

Comic twist

The evening closed with a comical twist, the Troika from the film score Lieutenant Kiji by Sergi Prokofiev.

Today, people come to Canada from crowded cities to get back to the roots of their collective memories. The commonplace is left behind in this land that too few see. In this program we explore the natural heart...the true spirit...of Canada's parks.

Downey resident killed in traffic collision

DOWNEY—A 42-year-old Downey man was killed last week when his van collided with a Chevy truck in an early morning accident at the intersection of Downey Avenue and Imperial Highway, Downey Police said.

Based on a preliminary investigation, both vehicles entered the intersection at about 4:30 a.m. on Oct. 27 and collided, with the Toyota Previa broadsiding the Chevy S-10. The Downey man, identified as Arthur Cuellar, 42, was transported to the Downey Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced dead. The female driver, from Los Angeles, was transported to St. Francis Medical Center, with non-life-threatening injuries. The accident is still under investigation.



Messiah Lutheran has long history in Downey

DOWNEY - Messiah Lutheran Church, incorporated in 1944 when Downey's population was barely 1400, held a ribbon-cutting celebration for their recently remodeled sanctuary.

The church began its ministry as a storefront at 111 E. Third St.; its present location was purchased for \$3,500 in 1945. The building was dedicated in 1947 and the cornerstone still contains the name of the Chamber of Commerce president at that time.

The church was last remodeled in 1973, when an office was added. The latest remodeling included new pews and chancel furnishings, an enlargement of the chancel area with a raised area for the Praise Band, new carpeting in the sanctuary and narthex/church lobby, new tile, enhanced lighting and sound, new ceiling with insulation, two skylights, a lighter color scheme to brighten the worship center and benches on the patio to facilitate visiting at church events.

In its 62-year history, only seven pastors have served the congregation. The Reverend Norm Stoppenhagen, the present pastor, has served the church for over 20 years. The Reverend Ramon Contreras accepted a position as Minister in Spanish ministry in December of 2004.

Messiah Lutheran Church, affiliated nationally with the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, has a present congregation membership of 285.


Breath of God Thanksgiving events

The Downey Symphony played before a less-than-full Downey Theater Saturday, Oct. 29, and the problem was certainly not the quality of the music, which was superb.

The vacant seats were not in the late walk-in seating toward the back, but up front where the season ticket-holders are usually seated.

The problem was that the Downey Regional Medical Center held its Charter Ball fund raising gala also on the evening of the 29th, and many members of the community support both the symphony and the hospital. They were faced with a choice. Since the hospital gala is once a year, and featured Don Rickles, Three Dog Night and a rich menu, it is not hard to see why many chose the ball over the symphony. It's a shame really. Those who weren't there missed a fine Tchaikovsky and superb French horn.

But why were the dates of the two events in conflict? After all, don't we have a Coordinating Council to troubleshoot just this kind of problem?

We asked some sources close to the symphony and discovered that the glitch started there. Apparently the Charter Ball was scheduled first, and the symphony scheduling was not checked thoroughly enough due to time pressures involving printing of programs, etc.

We understand, but it's a shame such fine music should be wasted on even one empty seat.

Dr. Mary Stauffer came to us months ago and asked if the newspaper could check the scheduling of events in the city for conflicts like this one. The answer is no. Our staff is stretched to the nth degree now, and the Coordinating Council is already in place.

We don't wish to belabor this point. Once it is out in the public eye, we are sure more attention will be paid to it in the future.

Last Friday, Oct. 28, 140 people paid \$25 for lunch at the Rio Hondo Events Center in Downey. This was a fundraising event for True Lasting Connections Family Resource Center (TLC), a program of the Downey Unified School District. All attending were investing \$10 in the TLC emergency services.

Counseling services are available throughout TLC using Graduate Psychology Interns to assist students in need of counseling services. The MRS foundation funds scholarships for the interns allowing them to counsel the students without resources. The Exchange Club Family Resource Center works very closely with the counseling programs and is available to advise TLC staff on proper methods of handling crisis interventions and providing parenting classes.

Rose Boland, a retired DUSD school nurse, was hired by Stan Hanstad to do something and something she did. She secured the site, the module and finances with the help of many dedicated assistants. She hired two wonderful bilingual girls, Luz Perez and Claudia Garcia, to be on site and run the programs. These very capable girls give of the talents and heart to make everything work well. Their job description seems to be "do what is needed." They do the scheduling and make many referrals. The program which started at two elementary schools now provides services to needy children throughout the school district. The TLC Center has evolved into what the community really needs. It has become a community center helping the students and their parents in academic, health, and personal needs. It is supported by the Downey Unified School District, the city of Downey, grants and private contributions. All contributions may be sent to TLC, c/o R. 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Center in Downey. This was a very informational and enthusiastic annual stockholders meeting of TLC.

Superintendent Wendy Doty introduced Don Knabe, our great LA County Supervisor, Alan Lowenthal, our State Senator, Anne Bayer, Downey Mayor, Dave Gafin and Meredith Perkins, Downey City Councilmembers, school assistant superintendents, school teachers and school personnel, PTA and other supporters. She allowed once clap after each introduction. What a hand-saver.

Five years ago, Stan Hanstad, then director of pupil services, hired Rose Boland, a school nurse who had recently retired from the school district to act as Special Programs nurse and fundraiser to TLC. She was hired for two days a week but she devoted time and a half plus her whole heart. She hired two very capable bilingual women, Luz Perez, coordinator and family advocate, and Claudia Garcia, clerical assistant, to run the unit. These three dedicated women have turned TLC into a community center to help many marginal families with a multitude of problems.

Initially, the TLC Center was started for at-risk elementary students at Pace and Price Elementary schools. One of the programs initiated by Luz Perez assists students at Pace and Ward Elementary Schools who are at risk of failing to pass to the next grade. Big buddies from both Warren and Downey High Schools were selected and instructed on tutoring. They became connected to one elementary student needing help to pass. The tutor and student were connected for the semester under the guidance of dedicated teachers. They worked together for a common goal and this relationship became a true lasting connection. All of these 75 students passed to the next grade. Wow! What an investment with 100 percent success. Don Knabe, MC, trained the crowd to one wow instead of clapping. What fun!

It was soon found that these at-risk children needed more than tutors. They needed glasses to see. The Rio Hondo Optometric Society pays an optometrist to come to the TLC eye clinic to check all Downey students that are referred by the school nurses and parents. Most need glasses and are given a prescription which is paid by the Gypsy Johnson Auxiliary. It is the only school district in the state that has a fully operational eye clinic and that is able to supply glasses to all that need them and cannot afford them

Another program at TLC utilizes the Downey Dental Academy with the assistance of Dr. Ingwreson and Dr. Wilcox, dentists, to screen students for dental needs using a fully-equipped mobile unit donated by the PTA. The Assistance League paid \$10,000 last year for dental care for children with identified dental problems, some so bad that the children needed sedation.

Twice a month Kaiser physicians donate their services at the TLC Medical Clinic to see and treat sick children. Jaime Garcia, Kaiser Community Relations, has been very helpful in linking TLC to Kaiser for money, care and educational programs.

A very important part of the TLC services includes health insurance enrollments for children without access to insurance. More than 294 children were enrolled last year by the staff at TLC. Such a service enables children seen at TLC to receive ongoing health services leading to improved attendance, school success, and decreased costs to local medical

Ask the Contractors Board

By Bert Sandman, Chair California Contractors State License Board

Q: I am having my kitchen remodeled and one contractor I am considering wants me to get an owner/builder permit for the project. He said this would save me money. Is this true?

A: Yes and no. If everything goes right, you might be able to save some money. But, for the vast majority of homeowners, the risk and responsibilities aren't worth it. Getting an owner/builder permit means the homeowner becomes the general contractor and assumes all responsibility for the project. If the contractor is not licensed, this includes withholding payroll taxes for everyone on the job, as well as providing workers' compensation insurance. The homeowner is also responsible for making sure the project meets all building codes and is inspected. If there's a problem, you, not the contractor, are responsible for making sure everything is fixed.

Some who talk you into being an owner/builder call themselves "consultants." Many times they're unlicensed, aren't qualified to get a license, or have had their license taken away by the CSLB. Plus, any contractor who asks you to apply for such a permit should be considered to be a warning sign that this contractor may not be totally above board. I'd recommend staying away from being an owner/builder unless you've got experience in construction.

Q: *A* mechanics' lien has been placed on my home, but I paid my contractor in full. Why did this happen?

A: A mechanics' lien is a "hold" against a homeowner's property because of an unpaid bill. Often a homeowner hires a general contractor to serve as a prime contractor for a project. They, in turn, hire subcontractors to perform more specific work on the project, like electrical, plumbing or landscaping. They also purchase materials like roof tiles or plants from suppliers. Problem can occur when a homeowner pays the prime contractor, but the prime contractor doesn't pay the subcontractor or supplier. Those people may be forced to file a mechanics' lien against the property in order to get paid.

If that happens, you could have to pay the subcontractor or supplier, even if you have already paid the prime contractor. If you don't, a "cloud" may be placed on the title of your property making it difficult, if not impossible to refinance, borrow against or sell your home. Ultimately, foreclosure may result if you don't pay off the lien or can't afford to do so. Before anyone can file a mechanics' lien against your property, they must first send you a preliminary lien notice alerting you that they have the ability to file a mechanics' lien if they are not paid for their work or materials. Keep a record of all preliminary lien notices you receive.

You can protect yourself from unwarranted liens by carefully selecting a licensed contractor. Get a list of all subcontractors, laborers and materials suppliers and make sure the subcontractors are licensed. Verify that all licenses are valid on the CSLB website, www.cslb.ca.gov, or by calling 1-800-321-CSLB (2752). You can also check with your local courthouse to see if the prime contractor has a history of litigation. Check with the suppliers and workers to see if the prime contractor has a good history of paying his bills Depending on local laws, you may be able to add a releaseof-lien clause to your contract, requiring the contractor or subcontractors
