David Cha


Wannett says of Cha, "When he ended up on the doorstep of Warren High School six years ago, was it divine intervention or luck? David immediately went to work on all of us extolling the virtues of the AVID methodologies for classroom instruction. The fortunate thing for Warren High and its students is the fact that David did not give up easily. He was, shall I say, 'Like a dog with a bone.' He talked Sacratic seminar and Cornell note-taking to anybody who would listen, or even if they wouldn't listen. Slowly but surely, without financial support, he began to build a program. When given the opportunity to earn money for the program through a Saturday testing program, he was more than eager to make it his project. He has won over the entire staff and has recruited a cohort of teachers who are as (crazy) passionate about AVID instruction as he is."

Ferraro goodbye at Board meeting

DOWNEY—The Board of the Downey Unified School District, noting it was Betty Ferraro's last Board meeting Nov. 15, had some fond words for the tough little board veteran.

One after another said how she has been a mentor, a model for them to use for conduct. Board President Barbara Samperi in particular stressed how much Ferraro has meant to her through the years on budget wars.

Ferraro's contribution through her support for the Gangs Out of Downey program (GOOD) was mentioned, as was her advocacy of the Kids on the Block puppets for youngsters.

Ferraro, on her behalf, said the Board has been a source of fond ties through the years, and promised to come back often.

Guidance

William Gutierrez and Tod Corrin said Ferraro has been one they could always look to for guidance, and Mark Morris said she has maintained high standards and honor.

The Board heard Bob Becker, head of the DEA/CEA teachers union, thank them for a relatively easy bargaining session in the reopener of the Master contract which resulted in a 3.75 percent wage increase which the Board approved Tuesday. And Becker added he sensed a new alliance on the part of the school board and union in terms of a common threat in Sacramento (Arnold Schwarzenegger).

The Board also presented Andrew Harrod with a special award for more than 30 years of service to the district. Retired from service with the maintenance department in 1983, he returned to serve the district as a special checker of student addresses and other special tasks.

The Board also noted the presence of the victors in the recent election, Nancy Swenson and Martha Sodetani, Tuesday.

And Gutierrez and Corrin congratulated Downey High for athletic achievement in football and water polo.

Man shot dead on Quoit Street

DOWNEY—A man who was standing by his car in a driveway in the 8200 block of Quoit Street was fatally shot by a male gunman who fled in a light-colored SUV driven by an accomplice.

The shooting occurred Friday, Nov. 11 at about 7:10 p.m., police said. Bavdelio Chaidez, 32, was rushed to St. Francis Medical center where he was pronounced dead.

The gunman was described as a husky 5-foot 10 inch tall Latino with a shaved head, who wore a black sweater and dark baggy pants.




Volunteers needed for Rancho Gift Shop

Chipotle Mexican Grill opens shop in Downey

DOWNEY – Chipotle Mexican Grill, the self-proclaimed "gourmet burrito joint," opened last week in Downey at the corner of Firestone Blvd. and Brookshire Ave. across the street from Downey High School.

Chipotle (pronounced Chi-POAT-lay) marked its opening day with a fundraiser for Downey High where 100 percent of the day's sales were donated to the school to help renovate the lunch/break area.

"When I opened the first Chipotle more than 12 years ago, I wanted to show that something served fast didn't have to be a typical fast-food experience," said Steve Ells, founder and CEO of Chipotle. "From the food we serve to the design of the restaurants and our support for local communities, we look to put our own twist on everything we do."

Food preparation at Chipotle more closely resembles that of higherend restaurants than typical fast-food. From toasting and crushing whole, premium spices; making guacamole in-house daily with grade A Haas avocados; continuously grilling never-frozen, marinated meats; preparing tortilla chips seasoned with fresh lime juice and kosher salt; to steaming a new batch of rice every hour – or more often – before tossing it with freshly chopped cilantro and citrus juice, the menu at Chipotle is a reflection of Ells' tastes and cooking styles.

Customers at Chipotle watch, rather than wait, as their orders are prepared and servers pile selected ingredients onto soft, hot tortillas (or sans tortillas for a burrito bowl) and roll them into a burrito or taco, for the price of about \$6. Or choose a salad made with your choice of ingredients on a bed of fresh cut romaine lettuce and topped with a Chipotle-honey vinaigrette, made in-house daily.

Chipotle secures most of their pork from Niman Ranch, a network of family-owned hog farms. All Chipotle restaurants serve naturally-raised pork, with naturally-raised chicken in 45 percent of its restaurants and naturally raised beef in more than 30 percent. All of its naturally-raised meat comes from animals that are fed a vegetarian diet and never given antibiotics or hormones, according to the restaurant.

In all, Chipotle says it serves more than 15 million pounds of natural-

Downey family indicted in sensitive data theft

LOS ANGELES—A grand jury in Los Angeles has returned an indictment charging a Chinese-American engineer from Downey, his wife, and his brother of acting as agents of a foreign government, in this case China, without first notifying the U.S. Attorney General. The three allegedly conspired to steal sensitive information about Navy warships and smuggle it to China, according to charges filed by the U.S. Attorney's office.

The accused are 65-year-old Chi Mak, his 62-year-old wife, Rebecca Lai-wah Chiu, and his brother, Tai Wang Mak, 56.

It was learned that Chi Mak, lead engineer on a sensitive research project involving propulsion systems for Navy warships, allegedly took computer disks from Anaheim defense contractor Power Paragon. The information was then "burned" onto CDs and delivered to Tai Wang Mak. Mak and wife, Fuk Heung Li, were scheduled to depart on Oct. 28 for Hong Kong, from where Mak presumably planned to travel to Guangzhou, China, to meet a contact.

The three have not been charged with espionage, which is a more serious charge.

I was so moved by Allison's reflections that I wanted to share them with your readers. Allison has lived in Downey all her life. She is spending this year in Colorado, at Covenant Bible College. The school made a trip to Mississippi to help the victims of the hurricane, and this is Allison's record of that trip.

"Hey y'all! I'm back from the Deep South and missing it mucho. It was such a great experience. My time there really set me back a few paces as to where I really am in this whole wide world and how small I truly am in this place we call home.

The clothes I brought, for instance, were my 'grunge clothes' and I had gotten them for the purpose of being able to ruin them. I had a shirt for every day of the week plus extra for after work, I had jeans and different pairs of shoes and other things that the people there only knew of as soggy memories. When we got there, we saw people with the one outfit that they had saved (the one they had been wearing during the flood) or picking out mismatched clothing from cardboard boxes donated from who knows where.


We started the mission trip in prayer and a 28-1/2 hour bus ride. Cramped seats and a stuffy atmosphere hit our spoiled butts pretty hard. We slept periodically and rested never. We had McDonalds for meals and then climbed back into the bus to let the grease sit. We were exhausted when we got off the bus and we hadn't even started the labor.

We thought we were going to have to eat M.R.E.s but it turned out to be a Red Cross-like truck that served us food. It was really humbling and honoring at the same time to stand in line with some of the survivors waiting for our portioned helping of food; to hear some tidbits of their stories, to look in their faces and see only a part of their suffering.

We saw first-hand some things that no one should ever have to go through. We mucked out houses that had been in families for a hundred years. We had to throw out soggy Bibles, moldy teddy bears and ruined family photos. It was heart-wrenching to hand stuff to the owners and in turn, see them break down and cry over the dismal remains.

I was exhausted by the end of every day. Physically, I had never been pushed so hard. I had to lift and carry things heavier than I ever thought was possible for me, push and pull water-logged carpet out of houses, take out drywall and insulation with usually just my hands, destroy sinks and marble counter tops, raze trees that had been knocked into the house, tear down roofs, and sweep for an hour after everything so my hands were blistered and bleeding. It was 100 degrees with 100 percent humidity and I am not sure I have ever sweated so much in my life. I was sore and tired and uncomfortable in the damp and sticking jeans. I smelled like sweat and mold and I couldn't breathe normally for a couple minutes after every house. It took all I had to not give up, sit down and let the others do the work for me. I was banged in the head multiple times and was shocked by an outlet. I lost sight in one eye for about an hour from some dust that got in. A lot of the students were throwing up, fighting fevers, and just getting sick from the black mold. We had fiberglass all over us and we were in prickly pain from the rashes. We were hungry and tired and hot and sore.

Spiritually, I was exhausted from helping all these people whom I had never met with matters that seemed trivial. We would sweat over a house for a day only to have it condemned the next. I was tired of praying and saying it was going to be allright and comforting others when I was suffering too. I was challenged to stay positive and prayerful with the many things that were so incredibly out of my control.



let paper, towels, cleaning supplies, food and more. I had to sort and decide who got what and I had to decide it in seconds. I made decisions as to what could be given out (quantity plus quality) and what couldn't. I was in charge mainly because everyone was a volunteer and no one knew exactly what they were doing. I was sweating and pacing and hurrying and making decisions and hurting for the people I couldn't give more to.

On a happier note I did get to play with some kids. I got to give out some lollipops and little plastic games to take their minds off the flood for a while. We 'adopted' a cat for the week which someone sardonically named Katrina. We laughed a lot during the week, most likely due to fatigue-turned-silliness. We played cards and pool at night and almost everyone slept soundly during the short nights. We went fishing, caught bass and trout and catfish. Unfortunately, the water was toxic and we had to throw all the fish back and were warned many times not to touch the water. The sunrises were something else there. It was over the ocean and a group of us would wake up at about 5:30 just to hike down there and wait for it to come. The sunsets (also breathtaking) set in the ocean too because the ocean faced the south. This reminded me a lot of home. This brings me to my last bit of info from Colorado. My nostalgia really kicked in during the nights in Mississippi. I would toss and turn thinking about home and how long it would be before I could be with my family and friends again. It hit really hard knowing that, instead of coming home after the mission trip, I would be coming 'home' to my dorm room. No parents to greet you when you tumble out of the van, no home-cooked meals or hugs or my own bed. Not until Christmas. With all my strength thrown into the mission at hand, I was not prepared for the emotions of homesickness that overcame me every night. I want to go home...I want it to be the middle of December. Don't get me wrong, I love it here. It's beautiful and comfortable and safe. I love the people and the relationships I have built that grow stronger every day. But it's not where my heart is and we all know the saying. Isaiah 41:10 says, "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." May I be reminded of that every day. May I have the strength He provides me with to do with each day as He desires. Thank you for all your continued prayer and support. I feel them every day.

Emotionally, I was exhausted and thoroughly unprepared for what was coming. We mucked out a couple schools and I was not ready to throw away 1st grader's newly finished and completely ruined projects. One of the teachers had had a picture of every student she had had for 20 years and had to throw each one of them away. The pain in her face was enough to make half the guys break down. I had to clean tiny chairs, tiny desks and tiny mats full of mold and grossness. Being there though unleashed a desire so deeply compressed in me that I had forgotten it was there. My heart reached out for the young souls that would occupy these desks and once again I longed to be the one teaching them. I can't quite put into words the urgency I felt right then; the yearning to watch the students learn and grow. My emotions were havwire that day to begin with and were finally unleashed kneeling over the tiny chair that I had been cleaning. I wept for the children that were going though this traumatic time that would probably scar them. I prayed for the hundreds of souls that would be lost and searching for hope in the dark. And I sat there, thinking of the small yet steady work my community was doing in the lives of the "future generation." We laid a base for them to come back and grow on. God would be working in them long after the 50 of us left. And then I started cleaning again because someone was walking into the room. There was one story of a boy who had lived in New Orleans during the Hurricane Katrina and then barely escaped to come to Mississippi to have Hurricane Rita blow in. He is five years old and now is traumatized thinking that the storm is following him. More stories were flowing in from people who just need an outlet. Some one to hear them talk.

And last and maybe least, I was mentally exhausted. Some of the days I was handing out rations to the neighborhood. They would stand in a long line in front of the church gym and wait to be fed or clothed or other necessary items. I gave out baby food, feminine products, diapers, tissue, toi-

Allard applauds funding of projects

WASHINGTON D.C.- Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard (D-CA-34) has announced that on Nov. 9 the U.S. House of Representatives passed spending measures that included millions of dollars in federal funds for major programs and projects she has championed in her district, which includes Downey.

The funds were for the following projects in the final version of the Science, State, Justice, Commerce, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act for Fiscal 2006.

Dispatch center

*\$50,000 for upgrades to the City of Downey's police and fire department dispatch services, and \$1 million for the City to house a model replica of the Space Shuttle as a scientific exhibit.

*\$250,000 for an at-risk youth program in Bell Gardens, and \$150,000 for that city's police department to expand its communications technolo-

*\$175,000 for the "Safer Cities" initiative in Ramona Gardens in East Los Angeles, a collaborative effort between the City of Los Angeles, the business community, and local social service groups to reduce crime in

target areas.

*\$200,000 for "Phoenix House," a drug treatment residential center, to expand adolescent methamphetamine drug treatment services.

"Despite an extremely challenging budget year, I am very pleased that my colleagues in Congress recognized the importance of these worthy community projects that help strengthen our families, our neighborhoods and the entire Los Angeles region," said Congresswoman Roybal-Allard who sits on the appropriations committee.

In addition, funding was included in the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act for fiscal 2006 for major water projects in the area including:

*\$2 million for studies of the Los Angeles River, including \$750,000 for a study by the Corps of Engineers at the Cornfields site. (Convert land adjacent to the river to parks and housing and environmental projects).

*\$2.7 million for continued dredging of the channel of Los Angeles Harbor

*\$3 million for the Harbor South Bay Recycled Water project.





Gift provides screening for hearing loss in babies

DOWNEY—Thanks to a \$20,000 donation from DRMC's Auxiliary, all newborns in DRMC's Family Birth Center will now receive a hearing test on a highly reliable screening device. Based on the hospital's 1,500 annual birth rate, clinicians expect to find about five cases of hearing loss per year.

Significant hearing loss is considered one of the most common major abnormalities in newborns. Studies show that hearing loss occurs in 1 to 3 newborns of 1,000 in well-baby nurseries and 2 to 4 infants per 100 in neonatal intensive care units (ICU). About 50 percent of babies born with hearing loss have no known signs or risk factors. Reliance on the doctor's or parent's recognition has been unsuccessful in detecting significant hearing loss in the first year of life. The average age of detection has traditionally been 2 to 3 years of age. If undetected, it impedes speech, language and cognitive development.

The new machine tests for two different problems – obstruction in the hearing canal and brain wave malfunction. To test the hearing canal, the microphone probe inserted into the baby's ear sends out tones. This causes the hairs on the cochlea to stand up, telling the screener if the infant is hearing normally. NICU Manager Linda Pace has been certified to train staff and perform the tasting. Nurses and surgical techs have been trained. Testing began in November.

Married to wife Julie for 37 years, they have two sons, Curt and Matt, and two granddaughters, Kaitlyn and Christy.






