Fleeing business effect 'negligible'

A commonly heard theme in recent public debates is that California's economic problems are compounded by a hostile attitude to the needs of business, and that businesses are fleeing the state in ever increasing numbers

An edition of California Economic Policy, a publication of the Public Policy Institute of California, recently looked into these assertions. The findings were surprising. A summary of the publication by David Neumark, Junfu Zhang and Brandon Wall, found that:

*California does in fact lose businesses and jobs because of relocation, but the effect on employment is negligible. In any year from 1993 to 2002, the net job loss from business relocation was never higher than one-tenth of 1 percent of the total number of jobs. At that rate, it would take more than 10 years for California to lose 1 percent of its employment. Moreover, California is an importer of jobs from certain states.

*Employment change is primarily driven not by interstate relocation but by the expansion and contraction of existing businesses and by the births of new businesses and the deaths of existing ones. On average, 71.4 percent of job destruction in the state from 1992 to 2002 stemmed from the death of business establishments. 25.9 percent from existing businesses shrinking, and only 1.6 percent from relocation out of state.

*When they do move, businesses are much more likely to move locally than across state boundaries. Out of state relocations account for less than 4 percent of all the moves captured in their database.

Relocation has relatively little effect on employment change. On the average, 62.4 percent of jobs created came from new establishments, 36.7 percent from growth of existing establishments, and only 0.9 percent from establishments moving to California. Similarly, 71.4 percent of job destruction stemmed from establishment deaths, 26.9 percent from contraction, and only 1.6 percent from establishments leaving the state.

The Downey Police Officers Association, Cafe n' Stuff and the them they had been selected drew an overwhelming response of appreciation.





Resident charged in mortgage scam

Ran local real estate company

DOWNEY—Downey resident Martha Rodriguez, 33, and Edward Seung Ok, 39, both of whom ran real estate and escrow companies in Downey and Seal Beach, have been charged by federal authorities with conspiring to defraud homeowners who faced foreclosure.

The couple allegedly assured the homeowners short-term loans to stop foreclosure can be arranged if the homeowners signed documents turning the title of their homes over to them. They operated under businesses named Silvernet Properties, Bellasi Escrow, Deko Ltd., and Silverfunds Mortgage Inc. The defendants would apply for mortgage loans and ask the banks to wire the funds directly to their escrow accounts.

In some cases, the couple allegedly paid a fee to individuals posing as buyers of the properties. In others, they would use the information and forge the signatures of past clients. In any case, the homeowners would end up getting only a small portion of the proceeds.

Anyone who has been approached by either Rodriquez or Ok, or who feels they've been victimized in the fraudulent scheme, is asked to contact the FBI at (310) 477-6565.

Notes on the mansionization debate

Dear Editor:

This is a transcript of my remarks to the City Planning Commission and Urban Revitalization expert Mark Brodeur, delivered at the study session which took place Nov. 16 at the Downey Theater. I submit this address in hope of publication in The Patriot. Many thanks for your consideration.

"As I see it, there are a number of issues that center on our mansionization discussion tonight. On the one hand, we have the question of libertarian freedom and economic rights. On the other, we have the question of esthetics and community. The late House Speaker Tip O'Neill used to say that "All politics are local," and, rightfully, we're assembled here to hash out matters that literally take place in our own back yards. But as we've seen in today's New York Times and in other recent news, mansionization has become a national concern.

Let's take the first issue. In the history of our country, we declared our independence in the 18th century and strenuously enforced our individualism in the 19th, pushing back borders of every kind—not just geographic. Indeed, the light with which America beckoned the world was beamed on the principles not just of equality but freedom. America was where you came to realize your dreams, to improve you lot Anything was achievable. We still feel that way. It's part of our optimistic character.

But over the past century, we've begun to realize that there are limits. Borders have been reached. Populations have swelled. We've come to realize that air and water, land and space are things we must manage if we want to survive. The terms of freedom have shifted, so that the question becomes: How do we maintain the individual freedoms that are essential to our future, our creativity, our very being, without impinging on others who want the same things, only in different ways?

So. You have a parcel of land, and a house. Remember the end of the play, "Death of Salesman," where Linda Loman stands over the grave of her husbandnd crying, "We're free and clear, Willie. Free and clear!"? Their house is their symbol of freedom, their temple. Why shoudn't the family do what they want with it? Maybe their heirs, in need of money, might decide to build it to the legal limit of their lot and flip it in a hot market. Maybe they have extended family from abroad making do on little, or kids in college on student loans. Shouldn't they have the right to take care of their own? Don't they have the right to share in the now sacrosanct belief that making the most money you can is a social imperative?

If their neighbors complain about loss of light, space and privacy, well, they can build to their limit too. And if in time nobody has light, space or privacy, they can just call it New York and get on with their lives.

Still, there's the esthetic question. Why is it that untrammeled commercial growth has to result in such ghastly ugliness, with strip malls and service franchises that replicate each other with such monotony that the nature of neighborhood and place is vanquished and we drive around as if in the middle of nowhere? How is it that that esthetic has gone residential, so that every new in-your-face flesh-colored architectural monstrosity now rises in a towering pretentiousness toward Mediterranean luxury—which we know to be false? I'm deeply sympathetic to homeowners who plunk down their life savings and mortgage their future to a house, only to be told what they can't build on it or even what colors they can't use to paint it. To me, that's outrageous. But these new, rude McMansions—why are they such eyesores? And why must they all look the same?

Beauty is in the eye of the beholder, of course. But I would suggest that the root of beauty is proportion. I draw you attention to the two large post-modernist structures located on the west side of Brookshire just south of Florence. They don't seem to belong to the neighborhood. They're grey and black, built up of processed stone and concrete. I think they're Japanese-designed and are used for Japanese social and business functions—nobody lives in them. At first I thought they appeared toweringly self-contained in a cool, mysterious, somewhat alien way. But the more I drove by the more I appreciated them for the way they harmonize their colors and their planes of circle and triangle, and especially in how they yield to the equally artful space in front of them.

They're beautiful in their way, partly in their design and mainly because they don't look like anything else.

I don't know if Mark Brodeur, who's advising us on the mansionization issue, lives in Downey. I don't know what residential codes the City Council will decide on, and I wonder if any of them have chosen to take a Saturday morning or Sunday afternoon to drive around his or her district to see how many mansions are going up, and have taken down the numbers of their realtors to find out whether they're just being built for quick turn-around or how they'll b used.

Clearly the question here is of individual versus community. And I'll tell you the anecdote that brought me to this meeting to give an opinion. I was in a supermarket checkout line after the last public hearing on this issue took place. Ahead of me was a woman, clearly distraught. She'd been to the hearing and either was a mansion owner herself, or at least was in favor of building them. She said to the checkout clerk, and I quote:"It s just all these old people who're opposed. They don't want progress. They should be happy for new neighbors. All their friends are dead."

It was at that moment that it occurred to me what's at the heart of this issue, and why it's provoked such resentment in the community. That person's sentiment was a perfect expression of the self-serving, egotistical aggression that's taken over the public conversation in American life. It's part of a larger climate of ugliness we live in now. Like the ponderous SUV that takes over the road, it says the same thing: Mine is bigger than yours. Get out of the way!

Change and progress are not always the same thing."

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
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Barbara Dye Callarman, 79, researched lineages

DOWNEY—Barbara Dye Callarman, who was a charter member of the Downey Historical Society in 1965, passed away on Nov. 27 at Kaiser-Permanente Hospital in Bellflower. She was 79. Her husband of 57 years, Don Callarman, daughter Leslie Callarman and son Bruce Callarman, were at her bedside. She also leaves two grandsons, Matt Olay and Angus Lyne; daughter-in-law, Paula Fujiwara, M.D.; sister, Dr. Joan Gussow; and two nephews.

Barbara Dye, daughter of Chester and Joyce Fisher Dye, was born in Alhambra. At a young age, she developed a keen interest in history, writing, and "how things worked." She graduated magna cum laude from Pomona College and was a member of Phi Betta Kappa. She and Don met at Pomona College and were married in 1948. After a brief teaching career, she devoted her time to raising the couple's two children. The family moved to Downey in 1961.

One of Callarman's abiding interests was genealogy—tracing her Dye-Dey-Duyts and allied lineages to 17th Century New York and The Netherlands. She spent untold hours in libraries documenting the Dye family in America and shared her research generously with others.

When she moved to Downey, Callarman became interested in the history and genealogy of Downey's founding families, as well as that of John Gately Downey, an Irish immigrant who became California's first Civil War-era governor and the city's namesake.

From 1965 Callarman spent the next 40 years immersed in its volunteer projects and operations as an officer and board member. In 1968 she volunteered to head up a museum committee, and never detoured from the goal of a history and research center that became a reality in 1984, with the opening of the Downey History Center in Apollo Park.

Callarman's voluminous notebooks on "Los Nietos Valley Pioneers" have helped many other family researchers find their "roots." She was also deeply interested in historic preservation, lending her expertise to causes including the Dismukes Cottage and Downey's Speedee McDonald's Drive-In.

Finding a shortage of reliable information for documenting photographers whose early works are in the Society's photo collection, Callarman researched and published 19th Century Photographers of Los Angeles County, a reference book valued by scholarly libraries.

No funeral services are planned. A memorial service will be held at a later date. The family suggests any memorial contributions be addressed to the Rancho Los Amigos Foundation, Inc.

The Clock Is Running: Time To **Revisit Your Tax Strategies**

Even after a succession of federal tax cuts since 2000, Americans still bear a substantial tax burden. In fact, the nonprofit Tax Foundation estimates that the average person will need to work 70 eight-hour days this year to pay federal taxes alone, compared to the 84 days they had to work in 2000 to cover federal tax obligations. State and local taxes are expected to cost the typical taxpayer an additional 37 days of work in 2005, versus 39 days in 2000. As these numbers indicate, lower tax rates may put more money in your wallet, but they do not negate the need for careful tax planning throughout the year.

Before the year ends, look for additional deductions, such as charitable donations and deductible contributions to a traditional IRA, that can be claimed for 2005. The maximum contribution to a traditional IRA is \$4,000 for 2005, an increase of \$1,000 from last year, and deductibility is based on income and other factors. An additional catch-up contribution of \$500 is available for those aged 50 and older. The deadline for IRA contributions for tax year 2005 is April 17, 2006.

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

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
