He closes with "We are fortunate to live in a city with good leadership in the elected area as well as the people who work for-the city. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!"

Cartozian

Councilman Kirk Cartozian was prompt in responding to the Downey Patriot's request for goals in 2006. He leads off with the need for a fair and balanced resolution of the residential building code. No. 2 for Cartozian is a concentrated City effort to stimulate mixed-use development in the Downtown.

Rancho development

As No. 3, he asks for a specific plan for partnership with the County to develop the 40 acres on the south campus of Rancho Los Amigos. He adds that this is a rare opportunity to transform this into a major economic development project.

No. 4 for Cartozian is a continued emphasis on incorporating the proposed Orange Line including a Maglev 110 mph magnetic levitation transportation system which could drive the economic development of member cities between Santa Clarita and Irvine.

And lastly, he wants to put to rest the overstated differences between himself and City Manager Gerald Caton. "Though we have had differences in the past about City priorities, we put those behind us a long time ago and currently have a healthy working relationship for the betterment of the City of Downey.

Gafin

Councilman Dave Gafin said he wished he could drive down Lakewood Boulevard "without needing my car realigned." And he wished the Kaiser Hospital pile drivers would take a day off so he could sleep.

"But, seriously, I wish Bonnie Kehoe (Community Services Director), Ron Yoshiki (City Planner) and John Finch (Chief of Police) much joy in their retirement," said Gafin. "I wish for the continued economic growth we have experienced. For this growth is what will provide additional police officers for our safety and additional services for our residents. I wish for our residents to continue to reinvest in their homes, (for) pride and a sense of community follows. I wish for our schools to maintain their high level of achievement: our youth is our future and our future leaders.

"I wish for cooperation within our City Council to do what is right for the future and not just for today. Most of all I wish all citizens of Downey a safe, joyous and prosperous New Year."

Cerritos College taps into new millennium

The following is the final article chronicling Cerritos College's first 50 years. Find previous stories at www.thedowneypatriot.com.

NORWALK – By the beginning of the new millennium, education had changed dramatically since the college first opened its doors. Computers terminals and related technology are now common in many classrooms, and more students are enrolling for online classes.

The decade began with several changes in college leadership. In 2000, Dr. Fred Gaskin left Cerritos College to become chancellor of the Maricopa Community College District. In the years to follow Dr. Morgan Lynn (former vice president of Academic Affairs), Dr. Jane Harmon (former president of Adirondack Community College in New York) and John Grindel (former vice president of Academic Affairs) would occupy the president/superintendent chair until the appointment of Dr. Noelia Vela in

Budget Cuts

In February 2003, Governor Gray Davis proposed a \$215 million midyear budget cut to community colleges, resulting in a \$7.4 million reduction in funding to Cerritos College for the 2002-2003 fiscal year. This forced the college to look for creative ways to cut costs without limiting service to students or closing classes.

Staying focused on students, the college attempted to combat the budget cuts by a more sparse use of adult hourly employees, elimination of all classified overtime except for emergencies, a reduction of all non-instructional equipment and all site building improvements, and the elimination of almost all of the remaining travel and instructional equipment budgets.

The college made it through the crisis with flying colors, and Governor Davis was recalled and replaced by actor Arnold Schwarzenegger. Ironically, in the fall of 2003—the year that it was to take the hardest financial hit—the college reached an all-time high enrollment of 24,000.

Distance Learning

In the fall of 2002, the college took its technological commitment to a new level by offering online registration, allowing students to register from the comfort of their own home, or on campus without having to wait in lines. Following this, TalonNet—the Cerritos College in-house course management system—was introduced allowing students to attend classes via the Internet without being on campus. These classes filled quickly and were ideal for students with full-time jobs and children.

Athletics Teams Going for the Gold

As recently as the 2004-05 school year, the Falcons saw 9 of their 19 teams win conference championships, led by the men's soccer team which advanced to the state championship game for the first time in school history. The Falcons beat previously undefeated, the nation's #1-rated team, Santa Rosa College in the semi-finals. Although unable to win the state title, the soccer team concluded the year ranked #3 in the country and #2 in the state.

The men's water polo team also made history with their first conference title in over 20 years, and reached the state championship tournament for the first time since winning the 1966 title. Under second-year head coach Joe Abing, the Falcons set a new school record with an 18-game winning streak in 2004.

Student athlete Christopher Richardson became the second person in California community college history to win the decathlon state title two years in a row. And, female decathlete April Brown won the 100 meters in both 2002 and 2003 to become the first woman to accomplish this.

Early in the spring of 2000, Baseball America Magazine named retired baseball coach Wally Kincaid the National College Baseball Coach of the Century. Later this same year the football team was ranked #4 in the nation. In December 2002, the wrestling team won the state championship, tying the school record by winning four individual state championships. Two years later the softball team won their first South Coast Conference championship in 14 years. Additionally, the women's tennis team was undefeated for the second consecutive season and won their second straight conference championship.

Cerritos College Foundation

In its twenty-five year history, the Cerritos College Foundation has experienced substantial growth. Today the foundation offers more than 65 scholarships and financially supports numerous programs, while continuing to work closely with the business community.

In 2002 the Cerritos College Foundation received a \$125,000 grant from the Boeing Charitable Trust to partner with Boeing on two events—Summer Science Camp and Educator Enrichment Day. The camp is a six-day program for students in grades K-12 that provides hands-on activity during every ten minutes of lecture. In a week-long camp, students receive a year of science training. Educator Enrichment Day is essentially the same program—but for college or K-12 teachers. The program encourages teachers to experience and think about their subject in new and challenging ways.

In 2003, Cerritos College was one of 12 community colleges in the nation selected as a Microsoft IT (Information Technology) training site. The college received a \$75,000 grant for the five-day program with the primary focus on giving community college faculty high-tech training.

A third prestigious partnership was established that same year between the college and Lockheed Martin. The Cerritos College Center for Applied Technologies (CACT) and the Cerritos College Composites Training Center (CTC) provide composites training for both new and current Lockheed Martin employees. Lockheed Martin is a leading manufacturer in military airplanes for both the United States and its allies. The partnership proved to be fruitful for both Lockheed Martin and Cerritos College students

Looking for ways to expand its sphere of influence, the college has pursued additional partnerships and programs that will expand the college's relationship with the local community and beyond. On October 1, 2002 Cerritos College received a one-year \$300,000 grant from the United States Department of Education for its partnership with the Pacoima Learning Center (PLC). The grant was awarded through the highly competitive Community Technology Center Program and was used to establish an online AA (Associate of Arts degree) program within Pacoima.

Faculty Excellence

Cerritos College faculty have shined as their achievements are recognized on a local and national level. In 2000, Bob Colgan received both the Educator of the Year Award from the Woodworking Machinery Industry Association (a national award), and the Vocational Educator of the Year award from the Los Angeles County Industrial Technology Education Association (LACITEA). Colgan simply says he is "passionate about teaching and building, whether it's a chair, a winning team or the finest woodworking program in the country." Colgan is former Professor of Woodworking Manufacturing Technologies.

In 2003, The California Association for Postsecondary Education and Disability (CAPED) recognized Professor of the Physical Therapist Assistant Program Marijean Piorkowski as Teacher of the Year at its annual convention. Presented each year, this award is given to an outstanding instructor who recognizes their responsibility for the education of all learners, and has made extraordinary efforts to meet the needs disabled learners in their classroom through the use of innovative instructional techniques and accommodations.

Sue Parsons, Director and founder of Teacher TRAC, received the Association of Community College Trustees Outstanding Faculty Member of the Year award in 1999, and in 2005, she received the CSULB Distinguished Alumni award. During her career, Parsons has secured more than \$2.5 million in state and federal grants. She, along with her Teacher TRAC colleagues, celebrates the "insightful perspectives brought to the teaching profession by students who complete the Teacher TRAC program"

Only ten years earlier Diane Keenan, Professor of Economics, was named the Carnegie Professor of the Year for community colleges in the United States. In 2001, Keenan played a significant role in the development of the college's Women's Studies program and Associate of Arts degree

Innovative Programs Focus on Student Success

In 2002, Cerritos College was awarded one of only 33 Department of Education Title V Grants given to developing institutions where at least 25 percent of the population is Hispanic. The grant amount is over \$2.1 million (\$2.126,774) for a five-year period.

This grant enabled the college to develop and launch Project HOPE (Health Opportunities and Pipeline to Education). Project HOPE is designed to support under-represented students in math, science and health courses. The project works to expand the pipeline of students entering and succeeding in these courses, as well as provide these students a career track into the health professions.

In 2000, Cerritos College and California State University, Long Beach were awarded a four-year \$1.3 million PT3 grant by the U.S. Department of Education to implement teacher preparation improvements. Nationally, 127 colleges and universities were awarded the PT3 grant as part of the Preparing Tomorrow's Teachers to Use Technology program. "Our Teacher TRAC faculty will be able to model a technology rich curriculum for our students, and we hope that our future educators will become teachers who can use technology in their classrooms as easily as they use chalk and a chalkboard," explains Professor Cheryl Shimazu, PT3 Grant Director.

Scholars' Honors Program

The Scholars' Honors Program (SHP) enrolls talented and motivated Cerritos College students who plan to transfer to four-year institutions. Program benefits include enrollment into honors sections of important classes; an opportunity to work one-on-one with top faculty members; and guaranteed upper division admission to such institutions as University of Southern California (USC), University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), and UC Irvine, Santa Cruz and Riverside.

In addition, successful SHP students receive priority registration privileges and are automatically accepted into honors programs at local campuses of the California State University system.

Through the SHP program, many students have the opportunity to apply for and receive several prestigious scholarships. In 2001, Jose Cardoza and Kelly Kang both received the USC President's Scholarships worth \$12,000 per year for two years; Joshua Shelton and Juliette Vo each received Dean's Scholarships from USC for \$6,000 per year for two years.

"Yes" on Measure CC

In 2004, as the college continued serving students while the state reduced its budget, the board of trustees asked the surrounding district communities to vote "yes" on a \$210 million bond measure for campus modernization.

Demonstrating support for the college and its mission to serve the community, local citizens cast their vote to support bond approval and the bond passed in March 2004. College President, Dr. Noelia Vela, will lead the campus transformation and position the college for greater success in the next fifty years.

Campus improvement had already began with construction of the new Science and Math complex in fall of 2004, and in February 2005 the college formally dedicated a state-of-the-art Health Occupations Skills Lab (built with budgeted funding). The new 23,000-square-foot facility includes 23 hospital beds, an 18 exam table clinic, a mock pharmacy fronted by a service counter donated by Longs Drugs, a speech language pathology clinic with seven therapy cubicles and a computer lab.

A Bright Future

During its first 50 years of excellence, Cerritos College has grown, matured, expanded, improved, adopted new technology and teaching techniques, won championships, served its community, and always supported students. The college has remained true to the vision of its founders and has provided generations of students with the opportunity to further their education and realize their dreams.

Working with the board of trustees and the Strategic Planning Committee, Dr. Vela is now working to revitalize and focus the college purpose. This includes the establishment of the first computer funding and replacement plan, the adoption and board approval of a strong strategic plan, and a new declaration of the college mission and vision statements.

Early in 2005, the board of trustees adopted a newly revised mission statement: "The mission of Cerritos College is to serve the community by building futures through learning."

Looking toward the future, education will no doubt experience innovative changes, new challenges and budgetary questions and limitations. Without reservation, however, the college remains dedicated to its founder's vision of service to the local community and affordable education for students. Many things will change in the future, but this commitment to student success will remain constant and strong, guiding every decision and shaping the next fifty years.

Resource center to help employers

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard has announced the final approval in Congress of a provision she authored to create a national resource center to help employers address the consequences of domestic violence and sexual violence in the workplace.

The provision, which was approved on Dec. 17, is part of the broader Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) which was incorporated into HR 3402, the Department of Justice Authorization Act.

"I congratulate my colleagues on the reauthorization of the Violence Against women Act (VAWA), and I am very pleased it includes the national resource center provision I authored," said Roybal-Allard. "Every year, thousands of women lose their jobs as a result of domestic violence. This forces them to stay in abusive relationships because they are unable to provide for themselves and their children. The national resource center will provide employers with the needed expertise and tools to assist employees who are victims of domestic violence while keeping them employed. And it will assist employers who, according to the Bureau of National Affairs news service, lose \$3 to \$5 billion annually in lost time and productivity."

The center is authorized to receive \$1million annually for five years starting in fiscal year 2007.

VAWA, the underlying bill, which included the national resource center proposed by the Congresswoman, is a landmark legislation credited with enhancing law enforcement's response to crimes involving violence against women, increasing the prosecution of perpetrators of domestic violence, and providing many critical services and programs to assists victims of such violence.

Congresswoman Roybal-Allard is the author of HR 3185, the Security and Financial Empowerment Act (SAFE) which includes far-reaching measures, including the creation of the national resource center, to help victims address the financial and employment impact of domestic vio-

'Smile of a Child' reaching skid row

Smile of a Child also funds reconstructive surgery for needy children. Recently, the ministry brought medical attention to a Kenyan girl whose face had been terribly mauled by a hyena.


