City planner will miss the people

DOWNEY—When asked what makes retirement most difficult, Ron Yoshiki didn't hesitate.

"It's the people," the City Planner/Assistant Director of Community Development said. "It's the people within the Planning office, but also the people that make up the development activities (such as) Building, Public Works. But then also, it's the citizens of the community, too."

"But without a doubt," he continued, "the people in City Hall—the staff—oftentimes does not receive the credit it really should be getting..."
Yoshiki has retired after 28-plus years in the Planning field.

He was hired in Downey in 1977, then left to work on the city of Buena Park's Planning staff for four years. During that time, Yoshiki worked on enclosing that city's regional mall, which he said was similar to Stonewood Center; worked out some of the new attractions for Knott's Berry Farm; worked on an entertainment court on Beach Boulevard; and was involved in the planning of major industrial parks, among other projects

Yoshiki returned to Downey in 1982 to become the Assistant City Planner for then City Planner Fran Carter.

Neighbors ask what triggered arson?

DOWNEY—The remnants left by early morning arson when an 85-year-old Downey man apparently ran amok and tried to burn down two neighbors' homes before he retreated and himself was engulfed by the flames, still cast a somber pall over the Downey cul-de-sac called Bergman Lane.

Neighbors say Gene Berger kept to himself most of the time, and had lived quietly there for many years.

Whatever the spark that set him off, he apparently lit firebombs on the front porch of two neighbors' homes about 4:45 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 8. He apparently also burned his own arm, which was clearly aflame when police and firefighters arrived. When confronted, he ran back to his own home which also was soon engulfed by the flames. Firefighters were at first stymied by the fact he was armed with two pistols.

He died in the flames of his barricaded home, which is a total loss. Firefighters and police said one other home was badly damaged and another neighbor's home had apparently been targeted, but a tank of gasoline placed in its front yard failed to ignite.

Neighbors said when first confronted, he fired a pistol at them. The shots were why firefighters were kept from saving him in his blazing home.

Authorities evacuated about 20 homes in the immediate area, as well as a nearby strip mall. Power was also temporarily lost in the area.

Berger lived alone and had few friends. Neighbors said he kept to himself most of the time. He had, however, complained to police about the parking problem on the small cul-de-sac. He was one of the long-time residents. His home and yard were fenced, with signs reading "keep out."

The coroner's office delayed positive identification due to the fire, and was awaiting dental or hospital records.

A dozen fire engines from Downey, L.A. County, Montebello and Vernon responded to the scene.

"And then when I came back, I was here when we enclosed Stonewood in the late '80s. At the same time, we were also working with the county, and we did the Rancho Business Center over there on Rancho Los Amigos, on the south side of Imperial."

Yoshiki said the Business Center was an asset because it brought good jobs, good people, and revenue to the city.

When Fran Carter retired, Yosiki interviewed for his position, and became City Planner. Then, Yoshiki said, in 1991 he was promoted to City Planner/Assistant Community Development Director.

Yoshiki reflected on the most significant change he's seen concerning the city during his years with Downey.

"It's now, I think, with Downey Landing, along with the Downey Regional Hospital, I think it's coming to the realization that it's more than just a pristine residential community; the fact that it's a balanced community, having good residential, good commercial, and reasonable industrial opportunities."

And Yoshii commented on his successor's staff, saying he or she has a good team. And the team can succeed and be beneficial..."

Yoshiki said one thing he will like about retirement is what he heard from another retiree: "...the fact that you can wake up in the morning and say to yourself, 'What do I want to *do* today?' rather than say, 'what do I *have* to do today?'"

No doubt, many endeavors await Ron Yoshiki that he *wants* to pursue.

Art Morris gives hospital \$1 million

DOWNEY—Downey leading citizen and Downey Regional Medical Center Board Member J. Arthur Morris has donated \$1 million to the Downey Regional Trust Foundation for the purchase of a new computed Tomography (also known as CT or CAT) scanner.

"Art Morris has been a huge supporter of the hospital and a true community leader for many years," said DRMC CEO Allen Korneff. "To recognize his generosity of time and spirit, we plan to rename our Radiology Department the 'J. Arthur Morris Radiology Department."

In making the gift, Morris commented, "I have found that if you give of yourself you get it back a hundred fold. I am hoping this donation will open the floodgates for other contributions to the hospital. DRMC is a precious community asset that needs to be supported and it's time for all who can to do so. We must not take it for granted."

Ivan Barrett, M.D., DRMC Medical Director of Radiology, noted, "Our current CAT scanner, which has had an excellent track record, is 14 years old. and replacement parts are becoming difficult to find. We are very excited about selecting a new system that will provide us with outstanding imaging for many years to come."

CT scanners, in use since the 1970s, are doughnut-shaped machines that use a special advanced x-ray technology to take pictures of cross sections of the body, called "slices." Special x-ray equipment collects hundreds of images from different angles. These images are then processed by computer and 'reconstructed' to show soft tissue, blood vessels and bone with great clarity. CT aids in the diagnosis and treatment of a variety of diseases, including cancers, cardiovascular disease, stroke, infectious disease, trauma, and musculoskeletal disorders. CT makes it possible to diagnose certain diseases earlier and more accurately than with other imaging tools. Because most diseases are better treated when found early, CT scans can help save lives.

"For the past 40 years this hospital has been on the leading edge of technology and innovation," Morris stated. "We need to stay on the leading edge. Although in recent years the economics of the healthcare system have become very difficult, I am very encouraged by the current and future state of the hospital. It has been here for 86 years and I want to see it continue serving the community for another 86 years."

Morris' family has been involved with the hospital since 1934 when his father, Arch Morris, was brought in as an accountant to save the then struggling hospital, and became the hospital administrator. His mother, Marguerite, organized the hospital's Auxiliary of volunteers. "My life has been this hospital," he said.

When he was 16, Art joined the merchant marines and set off on a three-month voyage on the President Wilson, a passenger and cargo ship. It was then that Art's lifelong passion for photography was born. One of his photographs of Japanese school children in quasi-military uniforms in front of a Buddhist shrine was so striking and timely that it was soon carried over the United Press International photo wire. Upon returning home, Art enrolled in and graduated from the photography program at the Art Center College of Design, now in Pasadena. While in school he worked at DRMC as a licensed Radiology and laboratory technician. World War II interrupted his budding photography career, however. Along with many physicians that the hospital lost to the war effort, Art joined the Navy. Although he hoped for an assignment as a photographer, the Navy was more interested in his medical experience. Art returned to the South Pacific, serving at amphibious air and base hospitals. He closed his four years of service stationed back in Southern California chief of radiology at the Long Beach Naval Hospital. His permanent rank is as Chief Pharmacist Warrant Officer. The horrendous injuries and illnesses that he saw during his tour of duty convinced him to go back into hospital work.

Following Naval Service in World War II, Morris returned to Downey as an assistant administrator and eventually became its administrator. In 1956, the Morris family, which then owned 83 percent of the hospital, generously presented the hospital to the community so it could become the non-profit institution it remains today, governed by a voluntary board of community leaders. Morris has served as a Hospital Board member since 1973. "From a boy who took x-rays using what we now see as very primitive equipment, I'm astounded by all we have accomplished here," said Morris.

At age 86, Morris admits his doctors are telling him to "cool it." However, along with hospital board work he remains involved in Rotary, and in December served as the Downey Holiday Lane Parade Grand Marshall. Also in 2005 he received the "Spirit of Service" award from the Human Services Association, a community-based agency providing social services to residents of southeast Los Angeles County.

Morris is also the founder, chair of and major contributor to the Henderson-Goergen Scholarship Fund, which in its 30 years has helped hundreds of men and women employed at DRMC, to remain and further their patient career education and training.

In addition to the family's hospital legacy, in 1957 the Morris company was a founding investor and Arch Morris was a founding director in Downey Savings and Loan. When his father passed away in 1968, Art joined the financial institution's board. Today, he is a director emeritus and area ambassador for the bank, which he describes as "a wonderful success story" with nearly 300 branches in California and Arizona. He remains friends with the institution's chairman, Maurice McAllister.

Mary Morris, one of Art's four grown children, shares that her father has always had a generous spirit. "Whether he is a patient or just walking down a hospital hallway, he will make a housekeeper feel as important as the chief of staff. I think it's great that the Radiology department will bear his name."

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Council studying new expense rules

DOWNEY—Among the calendared items approved at last Tuesday's regular meeting, the Downey City Council has directed the City Attorney to prepare a draft policy on reimbursement consistent with the City Charter and related policies and the passage of AB 1234 which was recently adopted by the State Legislature and became effective Jan. 1.

Most cities have not yet finalized a reimbursement policy, and Downey as a Charter City has some unique provisions which already address some elements. Several large cities have challenged whether AB 1234 is even applicable to Charter Cities.

The Downey Charter Section 502 reads: "Compensation. The Members of the City Council shall receive no compensation for their services as such, but shall receive reimbursement on order of the City Council for council authorized traveling and other expenses when on official duty. In addition, members shall receive such reasonable and adequate amounts as may be established by ordinance, which amount shall be deemed to be reimbursement to them of other out-of-pocket expenditures and costs imposed upon them by virtue of their serving on the City Council."

The League of Cities has recently prepared a model policy for General Law Cities (as opposed to Charter Cities) and other aspects of the requirements are currently being analyzed. The City Attorney will consider all of these when drafting his recommendation.

In other action Tuesday, the Council:

*Approved operative agreements 35 and 36 authorizing city loans of \$800,000 to the Downey community Development Commission.

*Appropriated \$270,000 to amend the 2005-06 Budget for funding the State mandated Education Revenue Augmentation Fund Shift.

*Approved the extension of an exclusive negotiating agreement with Primestor Development, Inc. for property at 9066 Firestone Boulevard.

*After a public hearing adopted a resolution denying the appeal of a zone variance allowing tandem parking in conjunction with a 4,160 square foot addition to an existing medical office building at 10800 Paramount Blvd., zoned C-P (Professional Offices) and R-2 (Two Family Residential).

*Approved a cash contract and accepted site clearing and soil remediation work at 12400 Clark Avenue.

Budget calendar

*Approved the budget calendar for the 2006-07 Budget.

*Received and filed the Annual Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for Fiscal Year 2005 ending June 30.

*Approved the Investment Policy for Public Funds.

*Adopted an Ordinance granting an oil pipeline franchise to BP West Coast Products.

1) First, the person has to be hired

2) Then get the person's name and Social Security number from their actual Social Security card

3) Then call Social Security Administration and ask them to verify if the S.S. number and name belong together

4) Keep a written record of our verification check

Information below from Downey City Hall - City Manager's Office

1) If you are suspicious that the person and the Social Security card do not belong together then you meet with that person at the Norwalk Social Security Administration office and have the office verify that the card belongs to your employee

2) When you hire someone to do a specific job for your household you ask to see their required city work permit which you then verify

Call Immigration & Naturalization Service at 714-972-4100 when you find out that a specific person is here illegally.

Costa Mesa taking on illegal immigration

The Costa Mesa City Council voted 3-2 last month to train police officers to enforce immigration laws, sparking about 80 demonstrators to protest outside City Hall this week.

Costa Mesa, population 108,000, will become the nation's first city to authorize its police department to enforce federal immigration laws. Downey has a population of 107,000.

Twenty-nine percent of Costa Mesa residents are foreign born, according to the 2000 census, 66 percent from Latin America.


City officials said that no random sweeps will be made and that emphasis of the enforcement will be on those accused of serious crimes.


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

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

New progressive care unit opens

DOWNEY-A new Progressive Care Unit (PCU) has opened at Downey Regional Medical Center as part of the hospital's continuum for critical care. On Jan. 5, the unit received its first patient, who had undergone open-heart surgery and pacemaker implantation.

The PCU is within the scope of DRMC's Definitive Observation Unit (DOU). Care here is more intensive than on the Medical/Surgical unit, and a step lower than the Intensive Care Unit (ICU). It consists of 12 beds and is located on the hospital's second floor. The unit has received state-of-theart monitors, along with fresh paint, new flooring, curtains and mattress-

"Although our PCU patients are stable, they are also acutely and critically ill and at risk for rapid status change," stated DRMC Chief Nursing Officer Heather Conwell. "Our PCU nurses are providing more specialized care that will help improve patient outcomes and satisfaction. We also expect the PCU to help patient flow throughout the hospital, particularly in the frequently busy ICU and ER."


According to the American Association of Critical-Care Nurses, progressive care nurses practice the same standard of nursing as critical care nurses and require the same level of education as nurses who work in the ICU, except with respect to invasive technologies. DRMC's PCU nursing staff has received special training to care for patients requiring close monitoring after receiving invasive procedures, during infusion of cardiac drugs, and coordinating care with various specialties within cardiology.

PCU nurses perform vital signs, blood gases, and patient assessments more frequently than on step-down units but less often than in the ICU.

Californians urged to have landlines in homes

SAN FRANCISCO—With Lifeline Telephone Service (Lifeline), the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) says there is no reason for California homes to go without home phone service. Affordable home phone service is just a phone call away through Lifeline, a CPUC program available to Californians who have low or limited fixed incomes.

The CPUC is urging households to obtain home phone service even if they use cell phones, since landlines offer consistent service, connection to the community and can be considerably less expensive than cell phones. Cell phone users can sometimes experience poor signal coverage, preventing individuals from reaching family, friends and essential services. Additionally, landlines can become lifelines if problems arise with cell phone service during a crisis where cellular networks become overloaded or interrupted.

"Home hone service is as essential as water, gas and electricity and with Lifeline, it is very affordable," said Jack Leutza, director of the telecommunications division for the CPUC. "Home phone service is not only a convenience, but a necessity. It is our reliable link to emergency services, the way we look for jobs and more."

Lifeline makes it possible for consumers who qualify financially to have residential phone service for as little as \$6 a month. Consumers who already have service may also qualify for a reduction in their monthly bills simply by subscribing to Lifeline. The basic service provides calling to local numbers only, including emergency and toll-free numbers, and does not include such optional features as voice mail, call waiting or call forwarding.

More than 3 million households in California are enrolled in the Lifeline program and one out of four households qualifies financially for Lifeline. Lifeline can also be a wise money-saving option for college students with low or fixed incomes if they are not listed as dependents on their parents' income tax returns.

Eligibility for Lifeline is based on a customer's houshehold size and annual income: a 1-2 member household's income must not exceed \$20,600; income for a three-member household must not top \$24,300; for 4 members, income limit is \$29,200. For each additional member, add \$4,900. These income limits are effective from June 1, 2005 through May 31, 2006.*

A customer might qualify even if they have previous payment problems or their home phone service was disconnected. The Lifeline program provides basic local telephone service at low, affordable rates to incomeeligible households in California.

The program is funded through a ratepayer surcharge and is provided by telephone carriers throughout the state. The California Public Utilities Commission administers the program. To apply for Lifeline, consumers in California should call 1-866-272-0349.

UCLA seeks women for study on grief

WESTWOOD—Researchers at the Semel Institute for Neuroscience and Human Behavior, an interdisciplinary research and education institute devoted to the understanding of complex human behavior, seeks women ages 18-65 who have lost a mother or sister to breast cancer in the past five years for a study of the effects on mind and body.

Grief is stressful for everyone who loses a close friend or family member, but for some people the symptoms of depression, anxiety, loneliness and yearning that accompany grief become long-term and debilitating—a condition known as complicated grief.

The study is intended to better understand the relationship between mental and physical responses to complicated grief and move toward finding more effective treatments. Researchers chose surviving female family members of breast cancer patients because the disease often involves a family history that can make grief more acute, and leaves the survivors with feelings of vulnerability about their own health and survival.

The researchers will interview each subject, measure heart rate, test saliva for the stress hormone cortisol and measure brain activity with Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI).
