A little change goes far in battle against cancer

DOWNEY – What event could silence a crowd of 1,200 high school students? At Downey High School's recent Pennies for Patients assembly, a 10-year-old girl named Cookie Sheehey kept the audience spellbound as she spoke about her fight against cancer. She has beaten the cancer twice already, and is now battling leukemia for the third, and hopefully last,

Her incredible story inspired Downey High students to support the "Pennies for Patients" campaign again this year, hoping to raise as much money as possible to help this noteworthy cause.

Over seven years Downey High School has donated over \$85,000 to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society to help unfortunate patients like Cookie. More than 17,000 schools nationwide have participated in this fundraising event. Last year alone, Downey High School raised \$15,375.13 and finished fourth in the nation. The money raised by the student body and the community will provide for research and treatment, and will help reach the ultimate goal of finding a cure for Leukemia and other blood related cancers.

Art in Public Places Committee

DOWNEY—The City Council has approved the appointments to the new Art in Public Places Advisory Committee. Council District 1 will be represented by Vivian Durkee; District 2 by Katherine Bode; District 3 by Harold Tseklenis; District 4 Bob Goldstein; and District 5 will be represented by George Redfox.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

The committee will act in advisory capacity in assisting the Council on public art which will be financed through allocation of a 1 percent builders' fee. What is public art—or what should be considered as fundable public art, has been discussed at length before the Council, and will be closely watched by the five members of the advisory committee.

The question has been seriously addressed in a handbook published by the City.

The new advisory panel was created by passage of an Ordinance at a previous meeting.

In other action Tuesday, the City Council:

*Held a public hearing for input on the Federal Community Development Block Grant and Home Investment Partnership programs. Laura Miller, executive director of Rio Hondo Temporary Home, stressed the temporary shelter's critical need for increased funding requirements just to keep pace with the rise in the cost of living. Kevin MacDonald, executive director of ARC of Southeast Los Angeles County, thanked the Council and the community for their continued support of ARC's projects. One gentleman suggested more money be channeled to better code enforcement and police activities.

*Presented the Mayor's Soaring Eagle Award to Police Officer Carlos Bejines.

*Applauded a presentation by the Auto Club of Southern California and the CHP honoring Downey Police for outstanding efforts at recovering stolen cars. Honored were Corporals Nathan Weinrich and Justin Prentice, and Officers Jason Klevos, Chris Kurtz, Christopher Bedoka, Jonathan Yepes abd Ethan Roberts.

*Heard a presentation by Albert Perdon, Executive Director of the Orangeline Development Authority, on the benefits of the proposed Maglev (magnetic levitation) technology, patterned after the Shanghai model, which would considerably cut down commute time between designated stations. The futuristic transpiration project will run from Palmdale to the north and Irvine to the south, traverse 14 cities (touching Downey at its southwest end) and reaching maximum speeds of over 300 mph. It is believed that support for the project is firming up.

*Approved the plans and specifications and authorized the advertising for bids of payement rehabilitation on Stewart and Gray Road.

*Approved the purchase of a restroom building for Rio San Gabriel

Park, 9612 Ardine St, at a cost of \$200,000.

*Adopted a resolution ordering the City Engineer to prepare a report on assessments within Lighting and Landscaping District AD 121 for fiscal year 2006-07. Adopted a resolution approving the final parcel map for 8334 Lexington Road, approved the subdivision and accepted a cash deposit as surety.

*Adopted a resolution approving the destruction of obsolete records by the Police Department.

*Approved the appointment of Luis Marquez to the Cable TV Advisory Committee representing District 1.

*Approved a resolution establishing Matron Pay for part-time Police Record Specialists I and II.

Restroom approved for San Gabriel Park

DOWNEY—The City Council has approved the purchase and installation of a restroom building at Rio San Gabriel Park.

The action at Tuesday night's council meeting approves the allocation of \$200,000 for the cost of the building to be paid for by Restroom Facilities, LTD.

A total of \$480,000 is available to the City as a result of the 2002 California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection Act per Capital Grant program. Staff recommended \$200,000 of this funding be used to replace the old building which was demolished earlier at Rio San Gabriel at the southwest corner of the park.

City eyes bids for Stewart and Gray Road

DOWNEY—-The City Council has approved plans and specifications and granted authority to advertise for bids for a cash contract for pavement rehabilitation on Stewart and Gray Road.

The action was at Tuesday's regular Council session.

The work includes two arterial segments, one from the West City Limit to Old River School Road, and the second from Bellflower Boulevard to Woodruff Avenue.

Construction work includes manholes, and utility valve covers to grade, signal loop detectors and curb and gutter reconstruction.

Estimated cost of the project is \$1,100,000 which includes administrative and inspection costs.



After several years of modest inflation, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) has inched up, breaching the 4% threshold during 2005 amid stubbornly high energy prices. The CPI jumped 1.2% last September to a 4.7% annualized rate before easing to 4.3% in October and 3.5% in November as oil prices moderated. The rise in inflation has been a matter of concern to policymakers, with the Federal Reserve repeatedly lifting short-term interest rates to dampen inflationary

Consider how this variablility in inflation could potentially affect the retirement portfolio's ability to generate income over three different 30-year periods. The following example assumes that retirement assests are held in cash (and, therefore, not invested) to isolate the impact that inflation may have on a long-term

For the 30-year period ended December 31, 2004, a retiree who started with \$100,000 cash and withdrew \$5,000 per year adjusted annually for actual historical inflation would see their portfolio last approximately 11 years, according to Standard & Poor's. For the 30-year period ended December 31, 1994, the assets would last about 13 years based on the same distribution assumptions. And going back another ten years (to the 30-year period ended December 31, 1984), \$100,000 in cash would last approximately 16 years. As point of reference, the same \$100,000 would last 20 years if no inflation was factored in. Keep in mind that this example is hypothetical and assumes that the assests were not

It's advisable to keep an eye on inflation trends and adjust your expectations for its potential impact periodically, keeping in mind that the variability of inflation rates can have an impact on future portfolio values as well as a portfolio's ability to generate income.





Daily dose of folic acid can prevent birth defects

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Did you know that many commonly sold over-the-counter multivitamins can play a critical role in helping women give birth to healthy babies?

According to the United States Public Health Service, a daily dose of 400 micrograms of folic acid taken from puberty through a woman's child-bearing years has been scientifically proven in most pregnancies to prevent spina bifida, a leading cause of childhood paralysis, and anencephaly, a neural tube defect of the brain that is almost always fatal.

In response to this 1992 federal public health recommendation, I authored the Folic Acid Promotion and Birth Defects Prevention Act. This act authorized the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to develop programs to educate health professionals and the public about the importance of folic acid consumption. I am very pleased that this bill became law as part of the Children's Health Act of 2000.

The Food and Drug Administration also responded to the need to increase consumption in the general population by requiring the addition of folic acid to enriched grain products like bread and cereal. While new evidence shows that the current fortification level of grains is not adequate for full protections against birth defects, it is important to note that we have made significant strides over the pat 10 years to increase the consumption of folic acid. This national effort has resulted in a considerable decline in the rate of spina bifida and anencephaly.

The fact remains, however, that, last year, approximately three thousand babies in the United States were born with preventable neural tube defects. Recent studies show that despite our efforts only 40 percent of women ages 18 to 45 take a dally vitamin with the recommended level of folic acid. Latina women are at an especially high risk. Latina women have the lowest reported folic acid consumption of any racial or ethnic group and almost double the likelihood of delivering a baby with a neural tube defect. There is no doubt we have considerable work ahead of us in order to adequately protect our newborn babies from preventable neural tube birth defects.

So how do we step up our efforts to get the word out about the benefits of folic acid?

We need to expand our outreach to all women of childbearing age, informing them of the essential role folic acid plays in protecting babies from spina bifida and anencephaly. We must also increase the required concentration of folic acid in enriched grain products as recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the CDC and the March of Dimes. Furthermore, we must encourage manufacturers to fortify cornmeal products - consumed in large quantities by our Latino community - with amounts of folic acid that meet the FDA requirements.

By taking these steps, we can prevent the majority of neural tube defects in this country. I will continue to work with my colleagues in Congress to enact policies to enrich our foods with sufficient folic acid and to strengthen the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's national folic acid education campaign.

Most importantly, I urge women in my district and throughout the country to take a daily multivitamin containing at least 400 micrograms of folic acid. This simple act could prevent serious birth defects and even save the life of a beloved newborn child.

Newspapers, Rah!

It is quite popular today to refer to newspapers as a bygone media of the past, something akin to the stagecoach in transportation.

Yet there are those who believe that despite all the worry the future of the newspaper here is still sound. John Morton writes in the latest issue of the American Journalism Revue, that the latest wave of concern is spurred by the current decline in overall newspaper circulation, the rapid growth of the Internet and uncertainty about its impact on the newspaper industry, sluggish ad revenues and the rising cost of newsprint.

There was concern in November when Knight Ridder turmoil resulted in that company putting itself up for sale. Fears of shareholders and bidders were eventually soothed.

A recurring theme is that with our era of 24-7 action that newspapers can no longer keep up with electronic media.

Morton counters this by showing the news business is highly profitable. The average operating profit for the newspaper operations of public companies publicly reported in 2004 was more than 20 cents on the dollar—more than twice that of the operating profit shown by the Fortune 500 Companies.

Which brings us to the bloggers. Where do they think the news they endlessly rant about comes from? It comes from newspapers, no less for bloggers than for most of the news presented on radio and television.

One can worry about how staff cutbacks, bureau closings and the dumbing-down of content have hurt newspapers. It was once an article of faith that all a newspaper had to do if its circulation shrank was to become a better newspaper. That no longer is true.

The Downey Patriot had some distinct advantages when we set sail on the journalistic seas more than three years ago. We benefited by the experience gathered from nine years of producing the Downey Eagle, as well as from a friendly Downey community. We wish to thank that community for its continued support.

Newspapers will remain necessary because of what they do, and it doesn't matter whether the news they gather is delivered online or in print or in some other way, not yet conceived today.

Once again, God bless you all.

Compete!




