Downey Landing is being sold

DOWNEY—The City Council has taken the first steps to allow the sale of the Downey Landing Retail Center (parts of which are yet to be completed) from Downey Landing LLC, to Investec Properties (dba Levon Investments.)

The name of the latter property owner-management group is yet to be determined. If all terms of the sale of the huge purchase are agreed to it could clear escrow the first week in May. The Purchase and Sales Agreement and Ground Lease provided for related documents which were signed in 2004 to provide the City with between \$4.9 and \$5.6 million as its portion of the sales.

Five arrested in failed march try

DOWNEY-Downey police booked five persons Monday as an attempt to emulate Sunday's huge Hispanic Power march which drew an estimated crowd of half-a-million to downtown Los Angeles got out of hand.

Police said they received phone calls about 8 a.m. Monday that about 200 carrying a Mexican flag and banners were marching through streets and front yards apparently bound for Warren High School.

Unlike Sunday's march

But unlike the orderly marchers in Sunday's huge Los Angeles march, Monday's demonstration here appeared bent on trouble. They apparently were set on getting students to leave school and join their street march on Cesar Chavez Day (a state holiday).

Quick action by Downey police blocked this plan. Downey Unified School District spokesmen said only a few students left class and joined the march. But the danger of it growing was still evident as it turned toward nearby Downey High School.

The attitude of the demonstrators was far different from those at Sunday's huge march in Los Angeles. The youngsters in Downey's march yelled epithets as they marched through yards and across and over fences.

One man (see Letters to the Editor, page 5) said his wife and he became the object of verbal and signed abuse when they protested the intrusion of their usually quiet neighborhood and it was noted an American flag flew from his front porch.

Downey Police Chief Roy Campos told The Downey Patriot that his feeling is that "children belong in school," and that was the aim of his officers was to ensure that students remain in their classes on campus and not join the demonstrators.

Downey Unified School District Superintendent Wendy Doty said the schools want the student in a safe environment making academic progress each day. "Therefore, it was a high priority for us to return the several hundred secondary students to their classrooms that chose to protest the immigration bill before the Congress. By and large, these students remained peaceful and respectful as they walked the streets of Downey expressing their opinion regarding immigration. However, those students received truancy and in many cases citations for missed classes on Monday.

Tension Tuesday

Tensions remained high as rumors persisted the demonstration would be repeated Tuesday. There was an apparent attempt Tuesday, but school officials and police quickly controlled it.

The escrow cannot go through unless the City's money is in the hands of the escrow company, per the 2004 agreement.

The Ordinance and Resolution won approval Tuesday and will facilitate the sale, which is seen as financially beneficial to the City. The City is waiving the requirement that 325,000 square feet of building be completed before the sale takes place. Other elements of the Purchase and Lease Agreements remain the same.

Friction

Some friction between the City and the developer was noticed at Council meetings earlier last year as opening dates were missed due to 55 days of terrible weather which delayed construction and needed road improvements.

*Appropriated \$4,800 in federal grant funds for emergency equipment. *Adopted a resolution declaring the intention of establishing an Underground Utility District the length of Lakewood Boulevard from 5th Street to Gallatin Road: District 21, and set a Public Hearing in the matter for May 23.

*Adopted a Resolution revising Class Specifications and establishing a new salary range for Fire Network Administrator.

*Approved the second reading of an Ordinance revising code standards for mansionizing huge buildings on single-family zoned lots in the city. And adopted a negative declaration.

*Adopted an Ordinance setting speed limits on Regentview and Washburn Road.

The next public meeting of the City Council will be at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 11 at City Hall, 11111 Brookshire Ave.

Focus on character education in schools

DOWNEY-Without much fanfare, a committee composed of representatives from the Downey Unified School District, the city of Downey, the Family YMCA, and local service organizations has been meeting regularly to lay out an intensified program of Character Education in the schools ever since the DUSD board first set it as a formal District goal last year. The committee is led by DUSD superintendent, Dr. Wendy L. Doty.

Dr. Sara Cairns, DUSD director of secondary education, advises us that the committee wants to stress and "build a culture that good character is important" (hardly a new idea, anyway) and convey the message that "being a good person and treating others with respect is the right thing to do whether you are a student, a parent, or community member." The program thus involves the whole community. She says this is the program's first year of implementation.

Towards this end, as an initial step, each school has been asked to select the best essay written on the subject by its students, for publication in *The Downey Patriot*. We also learned that, by a happy coincidence, the Stauffer Foundation was concurrently holding an essay contest among the schools on the same subject.

Submissions of the top student essays have already started to pour in. By prior agreement with DUSD, the Patriot will publish one essay per week

The first one, "Character Counts," comes from Rio Hondo Elementary, written by Yesenia Barrera, 10, a 5th grader in Mrs. Leonard's class. Dolores Goble, Rio Hondo principal, says of the student's efforts: "We are very proud of Yesenia's efforts and how she has applied outstanding character traits to setting high goals for herself."



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





More time needed to sign up for new plan

By Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard (CA-34) WASHINGTON, D.C.-Since the start of the year, Medicare beneficiaries throughout the country have been eligible to participate in the new Medicare prescription drug program.

While no one should feel pressured into making a quick decision, Medicare beneficiaries need to be aware of the May 15 deadline to sign up. After that, the earliest date to enroll is Nov. 15, at which time seniors will be subject to a minimum 7 percent penalty in their monthly premiums. For seniors who sign up even later, the penalty increases by an additional 1 percent each month. The higher premiums remain in place for the entire duration of the person's enrollment in the program.

Congress passed the measure creating the new program in 2003. I voted against this law based on the firm belief that the drug program is insufficient, far too complicated and designed to benefit special interests more than the seniors it should be helping. To address these serious concerns, I am working with my colleagues in Congress to remedy some of the immediate and long-term problems with the new program.

To give seniors more time to make the best choice, I'm supporting a measure called the Medicare Informed Choice Act that would extend the existing penalty-free six-month open enrollment period that currently ends May 15 to Dec. 31. The measure would also give every beneficiary the opportunity to make a onetime change in plan enrollment at any point in 2006. Currently, for the 2006 plan year only, Medicare beneficiaries who find themselves enrolled in the wrong plan can switch once before May 15. In general, however, under the new program, beneficiaries may only switch plans between Nov. 15 and Dec. 31 each year for coverage beginning Jan. 1 of the following year. The Medicare Informed Choice Act would also protect retirees from being dropped by their former employer's plan in the event they mistakenly enroll in a new private drug plan this year.

To significantly reduce prescription drug prices for seniors, I am fighting to pass the Medicare Prescription Drug Savings and Choice Act. This measure would require Medicare to negotiate with drug companies for lower group prices, which is prohibited under the current law. The legislation would also reduce the complexity of the prescription drug program by giving Medicare beneficiaries the option of enrolling in a nationwide drug plan provided directly by Medicare – not by a private insurance company. The premium, deductible, co-payments, and covered drugs would be uniform across the country.

As I work in Congress to improve the existing prescription drug program and do all I can to protect and improve Medicare, I want beneficiaries to know about the resources available to help them make an informed decision.

Eligible senior and people with disabilities with limited incomes should call the Social Security Administration at (800) 772-1213 or visit http://www.ssa.gov/prescription/help to find out if they qualify for extra assistance. Those who qualify typically pay no premiums, have lower copayments and have no gap in drug coverage.

Medicare beneficiaries in Los Angeles can also speak with counselors at the Center for Health Care Rights at 1-800-824-0780 or the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services at (800) 633-4227. Information is also online at www.calmedicare.org and www.medicare.gov. In addition, my caseworkers in Los Angeles are available to help by calling (213) 628-9230.

Monday, March 27 around 8 a.m. About 30 to 40 high school aged children noisily made their way down my street waving large Mexican flags, walking across private property, yelling and causing traffic congestion on an already too busy residential street. I wondered what they could be worked up about so early in the day. It became clear when I heard their protest chant directed straight at my wife. "This is Mexican Power. you whitey!" They then emphasized their chant with spitting and middle fingers. And those were girls! What had my wife done to provoke their anger? She stood on our porch and waved an American flag. This episode prompted a call to the Downey P.D.. which later told me they weren't aware of the march until they got the first call about it: mine.

Here are my questions. Why should anyone support these children in this type of behavior? If I told someone to " off" while calling them a racial epithet, spit at them and then flipped them off, I wouldn't expect to be taken too seriously or have my cause furthered. What are they protesting exactly? The lack of Mexican flags in the U.S? The lack of white people?

Here are my suggestions: Go back to class, study and make something of yourself. If you're not a U.S. citizen, become one...if you're not here legally, get legal (hint: If you're legal you'll have more people on your side). When you're a U.S. citizen, you can vote to make all the changes you want. Anyone can become a legal resident and then a U.S. citizen. It's not hard. There is nothing preventing you. ..my parents did it and so did my wife's grandparents. Hundreds of thousands do it every year. I have all the confidence in the world that you can too. If you'd rather not do any of these simple things, then just be satisfied with what you have and where you are in life...and stay off my yard with your ignorant disrespectful mouth and foreign flag.
