Tinkering needed on Learning Center costing

DOWNEY—The submitted cost estimate of \$6.1 million for the planned construction of the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center was put under a microscope by the City Council in a study session prior to the regular Council meeting Tuesday, against allocated funds of only \$4.9 million.

A reserve fund of \$5.9 million was originally set aside for the purpose, the amount having been realized from proceeds of the sale of the former NASA site property to the Downey Landing developers, but an "unforeseen" expense of \$1 million for soil remediation at the site had to be made. In any case, the City Council enjoined the parties concerned in these budget studies to come up with a revised cost estimate within 60 days.

The Learning Center, when completed, as outlined by Mayor Meredith Perkins, will have 1) a display lobby honoring the memory of astronauts, etc.; 2) a research center; 3) a community learning center; 4) a robotics laboratory; and 5) two groups of Discovery exhibits, featuring such items as a gravity scale, flight simulation sets, and mechanisms to design/test a space capsule and launch a rocket into space, etc. It will be housed in an 18,500 square foot building (scaled down from 20,000 ft. for cost purposes) on two stories. The planned NASA park also underwent scrutiny. The original construction cost estimate from NUVIS, a landscape architectural planning firm, of \$4.8 million had already been pared down to \$2.9 million at the city's request. This includes four sports fields, site work, site amenities, including concrete work, backstop fencing; prefabricated restroom building, site furniture, irrigation system, and planting, including

*Ratified payroll orders for hourly, overtime, civic Center work by classified personnel, Adult School, and Food Services for the month of February.

*Approved an agreement between the Adult School Career Education Center and I-Train for classroom training through the Adult School Licensed Vocational Nurse program.

Billie Barrios

Billie Barrios, was introduced first. She was honored as a "Teacher of the Year" due to her dedication to the Special Education Early Intervention program at Alameda Elementary with which she has worked the last 10 years. She started as a senior instructional assistant in the district Discrete Trial Teaching class at Imperial. After several years as an instructional assistant she realized her dream working in Special Education by completing her credential and receiving her Masters degree. She thanks her husband and children for their support.

She has since pursued her dream, working with autism students to ensure their active participation in education. For the past four years Mrs. Barrios has worked with the Special Education Office establishing a program with applied behavioral analysis. She has a singular ability to work with students who demonstrate challenging behavior. She establishes an interactive environment which engages the student. She feels that all students have the potential to learn, with a natural curiosity despite their disabilities. This allows student success towards individual goals.

She believes in collaboration between home and school and developed parent workshops to this end.

A parent recently said during a workshop, "Mrs. Barrios has given her heart to our family and allowed our son to be successful at school, home and in the community."

Two Downey schools outstanding on API

DOWNEY—On March 22, the California Department of Education released the 2005 Academic Performance Report that included statewide ranking and similar school ranking for District schools. Two Downey schools, Price and Rio San Gabriel Elementary, scored in the 800 range to earn top rankings in API comparisons with other schools in the State.

Price, with a score of 811, will receive State recognition in May as a Title I Academic Achievement Award school. Price was ranked above average (score of 8 out of 10) in the statewide comparison and received an excellent rank (score 10 out of 10) when compared with schools with similar socioeconomic demographics. Rio San Gabriel scored 807 and was ranked at eight for state comparison and eight for similar schools.

Doty proud of schools

Superintendent Dr. Wendy Doty proudly stated that this is their third consecutive year Price has received Title I Academic Achievement Awards. Price earned the recognition by doubling their AYP growth targets for all subgroups two years in a row and exceeded the API expected growth target set by the state. Principal Janice Hobson said, "We are absolutely thrilled to be receiving this honor!"

Downey schools continue to make sustained academic growth. In Downey Unified 84 percent of schools ranked at or above the top half of rankings statewide, and almost half earned above average status in similar school rankings. Assistant Superintendent Jerilyn King-Brown commented, "Our teachers and students are working hard across the District to improve test scores. Many programs have been put in place to provide a learning environment where all students may experience success and achieve. Our sustained efforts are making a difference."

API Base Scores—The API scores are calculated using the combined results of the California Content Standards Tests, California Achievement Test (CAT/6), The High School Exit Exam, and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA) for students with significant cognitive disabilities. The API ranges from 200 (low) to 1,000 (high). A comparison of the API scores for Downey schools, 2002 to 2005, revealed a growth range of 17-75 API points.

Statewide Ranks—Each year, schools are divided into groups of 10 based on performance. This is calculated based on the individual school's rate of improvement on the previous year's score as well as the performance of the other schools with which it is compared. In the Downey Unified School District 84 percent of schools ranked at or above the top half of rankings statewide.

Similar School Ranks—The similar school rank is provided so that schools may compare their academic achievement against other schools with similar demographics, socioeconomic status, and parent education level. In the Downey Unified School District, 79 percent of schools ranked above average in comparison with similar schools.

DUSD spokesmen said in conclusion, all Downey schools are demonstrating sustained growth and the majority of schools are above average when compared with similar schools.

DUSD will continue to demonstrate these efforts plus remedial assistance to students, focus on curriculum alignment, and staff development aimed at student achievement.

The marchers estimated at about 200 were largely from Lakewood and South Gate, but hoped to swell their numbers by getting students here to cut class and join them in a show of support for Hispanic power like the huge rally the day before (Sunday, March 20) in Los Angeles

The marchers Monday, March 21, were somewhat unruly, causing fears because of their sudden unplanned appearance.

The marchers Monday failed because police quickly diverted them onto Stewart and Gray Road and back into South Gate. Meanwhile, school administrators and staff stressed the penalty for leaving classes

Board President Donald La Plante in particular, and Boardmembers Martha Sodetani and Barbara Samperi were loud in their applause for the police work, and were echoed by Superintendent Wendy Doty.

turf, groundcover, trees and shrubs.

Be that as it may, Perkins questioned what constituted "site amenities," which carried a \$1.3 million tag. So the hope is the amount could still be reduced or its components reformulated to satisfy what Councilmember referred to as a "functionality test" factor in finalizing construction plans. Revised cost estimates vis-à-vis specific construction item deletions or add-ons will again be reviewed at the next study session.

More on illegal immigration

Dear Editor:

I've read both sides of the issue on illegal immigration as put forth in The Downey Patriot's "Letters to the Editor." I wonder how many readers know the stand, or lack thereof, taken by our elected officials on the sub-

Let's start off with the actions of Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard. Read her commendation (HR384) which she read on the House floor re the "Freedom Riders." These were the 900 who went in a caravan to D.C. to "educate the public and elected officials about immigrants' rights and the injustices of our country's current immigration policies." I assume she meant illegals, who are referred to in her office as "undocumented," as why would legal immigrants demand citizenship? You can read the whole article in a past issue of the Downey Patriot. I believe it would be in an Oct. 2003 issue. She states there that they don't want or expect handouts. But let's examine a few of the financial costs of illegal immigration.

1. Six states now spend in excess of \$1 billion a year on educating their children. California spends \$7.7 billion. Children in the nation's public schools, who are themselves illegal aliens, or who are the U.S.-born children of illegals, now number approximately 3.5 million;

2. Border hospitals: Many have been bankrupt because of free health care to illegals. In California, I believe 85 emergency rooms and more hospitals have closed and trauma care has become a thing of the past, for the same reason. They can't afford free health care. Many free health care facilities in the county have closed;

3. The cost of immigration is costing the taxpayer \$70 billion annually. In California, the cost is \$1,300 per household per year;

4. Immigrants are 50 percent more likely to get welfare than native Americans—70 percent get food stamps at a cost of \$3.7 billion annually; 5. Total cost of Medicaid and Social Security benefits to immigrants

since 1995 has cost taxpayers approximately \$328 billion. 6. Immigrants with two or more children, who pay no tax, can receive

as much as \$4,800 cash in Earned Income Tax Credit! (Earned?)

If what Roybal-Allard says is true, that they don't want handouts, let's start by canceling these socialistic programs and save a lot of money.

Let's address Sen. Feinstein's remarks – "They are here and they are working..." Yes, Sen. Feinstein, you're correct, the reason being is that neither the House, the Senate, or President has done anything but exacerbate the situation. The Senator now wants to make a law making it illegal to tunnel under our borders. It is illegal (whatever that means in D.C.) to cross the border, but it didn't include tunneling under. Way to go, Diane! Maybe you should include Hot Air Balloons in that bill, too—No illegals

Will Cardinal Mahoney lose the tax-exempt status of the Catholic Church because of political activism?

Cerritos College is located in Norwalk and serves Downey.



SCAG submits plan for regional airport system

CORONA—The Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) presented a proposal recently for how Southern California can develop and implement a regional airport system to accommodate future passenger and freight demands. SCAG executive director Mark Pisano testified before a special congressional hearing chaired by Rep. John Mica (R-FL), Chairman of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee's Subcommittee on Aviation, about "Meeting Future Aviation Capacity Needs in Southern California." Pisano testified that the successful implementation of a regional airport system depends upon critical ground access improvements to Southern California airports.

"SCAG has long advocated for the development of a truly regional airport system that minimizes growing pressures on LAX and maximizes use of Southern California's airport assets," Pisano said. "The primary challenge of a decentralized aviation system relates to the fact that most of the demand will continue to reside in the urban areas of Los Angeles and Orange Counties, so meeting future airport needs are inextricably tied to airport ground access."

According to SCAG, approximately 90 million people currently utilize Southern California's airport system each year, with approximately 60.7 million using LAX. In terms of cargo demand, the regional system carried approximately 2.8 million tons of cargo in 2004, with LAX responsible for around 74 percent of that total cargo.
