

Travelogue series concludes Sunday

DOWNEY—Travel with filmmaker Clint Denn throughout Ireland this Sunday, April 23 at 2:30 p.m. when the Downey Theater concludes the 2005/2006 "Armchair Adventure" Travelogue Series with the film "Inside

Ireland is 302 miles long by an average of 150 miles wide. That small size belies its diversity and the adventures at every turn. Near Connemara is a typical sheep farm, where trained dogs round up the sheep and the farmer demonstrates shearing (with the "help" from a nosey little lamb). Meals are traditional, with highlights of Irish Stew and Raisin Scones. On the Ring of Kerry and Dingle Peninsula are recorded prehistoric stone sites, ancient monasteries, quaint old villages, dramatic seaside cliffs, and intriguing ports. From Blarney to Killarney and Cobh to Dublin are adventures such as the Irish Stud Farm, the Foynes Flying Boat Museum, Waterford Crystal, and Ulster Folk Park celebrating Ireland's immigration

One can both record Irish history and live it at Adare Manor and Ashford Castle. On the castle grounds are the cottage and squire's house from the "Quiet Man" movie, which also featured the nearby village of Innisfree. At Clonmacnoise (548 AD) is the High Celtic Cross of Scriptures and high tower (60 feet) used for defense. Then on to Newgrange and Knowth, with their incredible Neolithic tombs that predate the pyramids by 1,000 years. Knappogue Castle with its medieval feast, stories, song, and dance is an exciting window to the past.

Honors pour in for a 'special' person

School district, YMCA sued

DOWNEY - Six Warren High School students who were secretly videotaped undressing by their gymnastics coach filed a lawsuit this week against the Downey Unified School District and the Downey Family

Anthony Darrell Vankirk, who pleaded no contest to a felony count of eavesdropping and two misdemeanor counts of child molestation in November, is also named as a defendant in the suit.

Attorney Gloria Allred filed the lawsuit, which seeks unspecified damages and claims sexual harassment, negligent supervision, invasion of privacy, and assault and battery.

"We alleged that these defendants knew – or should have known about and failed to prevent or remedy a hostile, sexually abusive and offensive environment," Allred said. "As a result, our clients, young girls, suffered serious invasions of their privacy and, in many cases, extreme mental anguish and severe mental distress."

Vankirk, gymnastics coach at Warren for about two years, allegedly had the girls train in a utility room at the Downey YMCA instead of the locker room. A student discovered the video camera last May and turned it over to Downey Police.

The girls, who ranged in age from 14-16 when they were videotaped, regularly trained at the Downey YMCA, officials there said.

Vankirk was sentenced to 330 days in prison in February, but given credit for time served and released. He is currently on probation and was required to register as a sex offender.

'Tagging' costs city and taxpayers alike

DOWNEY – "Tagging" is the act of writing graffiti on walls, signs, benches, windows and street posts using spray paint, ink markers or etching devices. The City of Downey spends in excess of \$160,000 of taxpayer money annually to repair the damage done by these graffiti vandals known as "taggers." Moreover, this figure does not include the costs borne by home and business owners who pay to repair damage done to their properties by these vandals.

Parents should become aware of warning signs that may indicate their child is involved in tagging:

*Taggers are out late at night or early in the morning. They may take frequent naps late in the afternoon to compensate for lost sleep.

*Taggers possess spray paint cans, large markers, grease pencils, etching tools or etching devices (used to etch into glass or paint.)

*A tagger may carry a notebook used to practice tagging. Taggers refer to this book as a "tag book" or "piece book."

*Taggers may deface their own bedroom or garage with their tag. This same tag will no doubt be scrawled somewhere in the neighborhood where they reside.

*Taggers will not use their own name and will instead use a nickname.

*There may be spray paint residue on the tagger's hands or clothing.

*The tagger may be visiting websites of groups that advocate graffiti.

Cerritos College looks to help low-skilled adults

NORWALK - Cerritos College announced this week that it is one of 16 community colleges selected to participate in a multi-year national initiative designed to increase the number of low-skilled adults who enter and complete occupational and technical degree programs in community and technical colleges.

Cerritos College is one of ten learning colleges who will work with six leadership colleges in a series of national peer-learning meetings. The project, known as "Breaking Through: Helping Low-Skilled Adults Enter and Succeed in College and Careers," will be managed by the National Council for Workforce Education (NCWE) and Jobs for the Future (JFF). The Charles Stewart Mott Foundation made a \$751,000 grant to JFF this year in support of the initiative, which is designed to use community colleges as a vehicle to help low-income people advance in the labor market and to enhance their income.

"The evidence is persuasive that a postsecondary credential is the key to careers that pay family-sustaining wages," said Jerry Rubin, JFF vice president.

Jack Litzenberg, senior program officer at the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation concurred.

"This initiative should help demonstrate how community colleges can make a meaningful difference in improving the odds that low-income, low-skilled adult with a high school education or less can earn collegelevel occupational or technical credentials," he said.

The participating colleges were chosen based on their current efforts and commitment to the goal of advancing adults with limited language skills and/or weak educational backgrounds. The project is built on the principle that the participating colleges can learn from each other and improve their efforts.

At Cerritos College, the focus is on its bilingual vocational program, which provides adult English-language learners a step-by-step transition into occupational instructional programs conducted in English.

"The program enables immigrant adults to enter occupational areas, such as welding and health care that provides wages that sustain a family," observed Cerritos College President Dr. Noelia Vela.

Jim Jacobs, director of workforce development and policy at Macomb (County) Community College in Michigan, says this demonstration project has two goals: to substantially improve community college efforts to serve low-skilled adults; and to draw national attention to this challenge.

Measure targets drunk drivers

NORWALK - Assemblymember Rudy Bermudez announced the passage of a measure this week that would require continuous alcohol monitoring as a condition of probation for those who are convicted of multiple DUI offenses or other offenses where the court determines alcohol to be the primary cause.

Current law requires those convicted of multiple drunk driving violations to participate in a alcohol treatment program and placed on unsupervised probation. However, the courts have no way of determining whether individuals are in violation of probation.

Secure Continuous Remote Alcohol Monitor is one of two types of alcohol monitoring systems available in some 40 states to test an individual's blood alcohol content (BAC) level. The device is worn around the ankle and determines a persons BAC level by collecting their perspiration. The bill would give courts the discretion to offer the alcohol monitoring program as a condition of probation in addition to requiring the individual to participate in an alcohol treatment program.

Property tax assessment seminars set

NORWALK - The County of Los Angeles is sponsoring a series of free seminars to assist property owners who feel their taxes should be lowered due to a decline in the value of their property.

The meetings are intended to help taxpayers better understand the assessment appeals process, which many find confusing. The seminar will be of value to homeowners who are interested in learning about the assessment appeals process and to those who have already filed an appeal. The seminar will also cover how to prepare for a hearing, what qualifies as admissible evidence, what will happen at the hearing and what to expect after the hearing.

Vikings get offensive, sweep season series

"We had 11 hits, but we left too many guys on base," said Nino. "We had too many strikeouts again. As a team we struck out about 8 times. We just weren't able to hit at the right time."

Vikings pitcher John Ortega said thank you very much and took every missed opportunity as he went on to pitch a complete game, picking up the win for the visitors. The Vikings managed to show how much of an offensive force they can really be by scoring 19 runs in two days.

With that win, the Vikings take city bragging rights and are now looking to gain momentum in the SGVL as they are now tied for third place with the Bears.

When both teams resume league play next Tuesday, the Bears will host first place Gahr, and Downey will be at second place Paramount.

The NASPE, which is sponsoring the award, counts 17,000 members.

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
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
