## Cops win funds for data terminals

**DOWNEY**—The Downey City Council approved the allocation of \$600,000 in asset forfeiture funds to be used for in-car radios and mobile data terminals.

The action was at Tuesday's regular meeting.

In other action the Council:

•Approved the retention of the law firm of Rutan and Tucker LLP, at a cost of about \$3,000 for the Los Angeles Region challenge to the Water Quality Control Board plan.

•Approved the final parcel map for a subdivision of property at 9125-0133 Imperial Highway and accepted an irrevocable standby letter of credit as surety.

•Adopted a resolution accepting a fee and waiving four auto parking places for Downey Hair Studio at 11031 Downey Avenue in the Downtown Parking Assessment District.

•Adopted Resolutions approving the engineering report for assessment within Lighting and Landscape District A,D. 121 for fiscal 2006-07, declaring the intention to collect assessments and set a public hearing for June 13 to consider setting the assessments.

•Introduced an ordinance setting speed limits for Brookshire Avenue.

•Presented the Mayor's Soaring Eagle Award to Phil Cokkinos, maintenance worker for Public Works.

## Greens' claim to be wave of today

**DOWNEY**—The 5th Annual Green Building Conference & Expo was hosted by the gas company at its environmentally advanced building on Firestone last Thursday and Friday, and the wave of the future has arrived if the keynote speaker is to be believed.

Tom Cody, Principal for the South Group, a Los Angeles based group of builders who specialize in incorporating green design, laid the problem out simply—Low income families stand directly to benefit the most from green building. Low income families are often disproportionately exposed to environmental hazards, both indoor and outdoor. And they are often forced to pay utility bills that are larger than what they pay toward health and education. Affordable housing is required by law now, and municipalities are looking for ways to meet these requirements. Green building techniques are one obvious answer.

#### Experts agree

Cody was followed by Walker Wells of Global Green USE, Ann Sewill of Enterprise Community Partners, and Bill Roschen of Roschen Van Cleve Architects who gave examples of how green is becoming a practical alternative in purely financial terms to meeting the needs for low and moderate income housing.

The Friday program continued with a panel on policy planning: Federal State and municipalities, which included moderator Bob Jernigan of AIA Gensler, James Finlay, Vice President of Wells Fargo, Diane Lang, of Thomas Properties, and Scott Lyle, President of Next Ridge. They also pointed out that green breakthroughs in terms of energy generation and conservation have been introduced and proven in commercial building, and are now making practical financial inroads in the private sector.

#### Light bulbs to cogeneration

Again and again from light bulbs to cogeneration of electricity and heating, they said green systems have proven themselves in terms of practicality and pay-back.

One example of practical application of green to every day life were the cups used at the conference, which were made of a biodegradable corn substance.

None of the light, glossy-attractive corn-cups chipped or broke while this user-tester examined them. In fact, they appeared to be superior to their more common counterparts.

The Gas Company hosts the green conference yearly because their building on Firestone is itself a classic of green progress and design.

While entertainment continues on stage, a classic car show will be offered in the Downey High School Parking lot near the pool off Brookshire, which will include customs, street, classic, luxury and sport categories, two radio stations broadcasting and two deejays.

If food is your thing, then forget your diet for one day and feast on a variety of delights in the Food Court located in the High School's South Parking Lot. "I am pleased to offer my greetings to all who have gathered for the fifty-fifth annual *National Day of Prayer*.

Today is a wonderful occasion to showcase the deep spirituality and kinship of Americans. Events like these exemplify the freedoms we enjoy and display the unity of our nation's religious community.

This longstanding tradition dates back to 1952, when President Truman first established an annual national day of prayer. Since 1988, the first Thursday of every May has given Americans the opportunity to worship

# Reality of drunk driving presented in graphic way

**DOWNEY**—Warren High School juniors and seniors were encouraged not to drink and drive when they were shown -- in a graphic way -a realistic view of the sometimes devastating and irreversible consequences of drunk driving.

The presentation, dubbed "Operation Prom Night," was presented by the Downey Police Department in conjunction with the Downey Fire Department, Downey Unified School District, Downey Regional Medical Center and Miller-Mies Mortuary.

A re-creation of a drunk driving collision was placed on Paramount Boulevard between Stewart and Gray Road and Brookmill Road at 12:40 p.m. last Wednesday. The junior and senior classes at Warren watched simulated emergency responses by police, fire, paramedic, ambulance, and coroner/mortuary personnel.

"The presentation (was) a joint cooperative effort aimed at making students think twice about participating in alcohol relation activities on Prom Night or any other time when they may be faced with making a decision whether or not to drink and drive," said Downey Traffic Detective Rocio Gutierrez. "Hopefully, our efforts help them to make the right choice...a life-saving choice."



# Meeting touches on credit union issues

**DOWNEY**—Financial Partners Credit Union recently played host to Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard and other 34th district credit union CEOs and executives to discuss current issues affecting credit unions.

The congresswoman prefaced her questions about increased capital requirements and business lending caps by giving a Capitol Hill update on current topics ranging from the new immigration laws, social security, to the war in Iraq.

"Credit unions are currently sitting on millions in assets that could be invested towards the communities' economic growth," FPCU president/CEO Nader Moghaddam said. Chris Kerecman, Business & Community Development for California Credit Union, and Jon Hernandez, president/CEO for Downey City FCU, called for increasing the business lending cap side of CURIA, explaining that their members need small business loans for everything from books for schools to lawnmower loans for a start-up landscaping business. "Would Bank of America want to take on a small business loan for something as small as a lawn mower?" asked Hernandez.

The post feedback from the congresswoman and invited guests was reportedly overwhelmingly positive. ## SCAG addresses housing crisis

TORRANCE-More than 200 policymakers and housing leaders from across the region convened recently at the Southern California Association of Governments' (SCAG) 6th annual Housing Summit in an effort to devise new approaches to address the growing housing crisis.

Summit leaders emphasized the need to plan for long-term housing needs with cost-effective, sustainable strategies such as mixed-use development in urban areas and controlled development in open areas. With median home prices more than \$500,000 and household annual incomes remaining around \$55,000, residents are being forced to devote increasing portions of their income to housing. Southern California's population growth continues to far outpace construction, placing additional pressures on the housing market and resulting in higher costs and increased congestion

Rialto City Councilmember Deborah Robertson, chair of SCAG's Community, Economic and Human Development Committee, and executive director Mark Pisano discussed how Compass Blueprint, SCAG's growth visioning initiative, can provide cities and counties with the tools they need to accommodate housing demand over the next 30 years by employing relatively small changes in land use planning decisions to reap tremendous results in housing availability and affordability.

"For too long, land use and housing planning has been undertaken without adequate consideration of the transportation impacts associated with those decisions," said Robertson. "We need to strategically develop housing where it is needed most; near jobs, in suburban centers and near transit stations and corridors."

Dowell Myers, professor of Public Policy, Planning and Development at USC, presented the findings of a study completed for the Fannie Mae Foundation focusing on how much additional housing construction will be needed just to house the children of today's Southern California residents. "If we don't keep building, where will our children go? Unless we pick up the pace, I'm pretty sure my kids will not be able to buy single-family housing," said Myers.

"In many ways, local governments operate as local corporations, and they can really be the economic savior of Southern California, but it is critical that you form strategic partnerships with neighboring cities and the private sector," said Newhall Land and Farming Company president Gregory McWilliams. "It is only through these partnerships that cities can make visions for future growth a reality."

The summit also included a dynamic video presentation by the Western Riverside Council of Governments, which demonstrated the tremendous challenges facing local leaders in California's fastest growing county. The video emphasized the importance of not only providing sufficient housing stock to accommodate 800,000 new residents in the county, but also increasing housing choices and placing new housing in the right locations.

Summit participants identified a number of legislative and land use strategies to address the regional housing crunch, including:


\*Increase coordination of housing development with transportation, water resource management, and other local planning efforts.

\*Reformulate municipal finance and revenue sources to ensure that local governments have the resources necessary to develop adequate housing stock.

\*Focus residential development in areas near major transit centers or corridors.

\*Support greater mixed-use and in-fill development, particularly in urban areas.

"The key question raised here today is where will our children live," said Torrance City Councilman Paul Nowatka. "It is our hope and intent that they will continue to live in Southern California, if our local leaders employ the tools and strategies discussed at today's summit."

As part of that, a clean-up of the railway right-of-way east of Lakewood Blvd. was performed. #### \$346K grant to fund nursing program

NORWALK-A \$346,137 Nursing Capacity Building grant was received by Cerritos College recently from the California Community Chancellor's Office, to help address the increasing crisis related to the shortage of health care personnel by expanding the enrollment capacity of the college's Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program.

More specifically, the funding, which will be provided over a threeyear period, will be used to help strengthen the program's infrastructure to support additional students, evaluate student retention and explore options for expanding program services.

"We are thrilled to receive this grant," said Jenine Nolan, dean of Cerritos College's Health Occupations Division. "The increased funding will enable us to enroll additional students into the program and to develop strategies which will improve student success."

"We also plan to develop and pilot a variety of innovative learning techniques and teaching strategies that expand the use of human simulators," added Nolan. ("Human simulators" are mannequin-like devices used by students in the classroom. The simulators create a realistic patientcare experience that mimics what students will encounter as health care professionals in health care facilities.)

Other plans for implementation of the capacity grant funding include conducting faculty recruitment in order to expand the program's capacity to serve additional students as well as disseminating program outcomes to a broader audience that includes current and prospective employers and donors in the industry.

The Cerritos College Nursing Program is accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission.

## New hope for women suffering spinal injuries

DOWNEY - A study conducted at Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center in Downey shows that women who have experienced temporary amenorrhea at the time of their spinal cord injury (SCI) may still achieve a successful pregnancy, particularly if they were injured at a young age.

The research will be presented at the American Association of Clinical Endocrinologists (AACE) 15th Annual Meeting and Clinical Congress, being held this weekend in Chicago.

SCI is a disabling, chronic condition which affects multiple organs including the reproductive system. There is limited data in scientific literature regarding the effect of SCI on women's reproductive life.

The retrospective study will be presented by Ghasak Mahmood, MD; Sylvia J. Shaw, MD; Yaga Szlachick, MD; Rod Adkins, PhD; and Stefan Bughi, MD.

The AACE is a professional medical organization with more than 5,300 members in the United States and 85 other countries. Founded in 1991, the group conducts continuing education programs for clinical endocrinologists, physicians whose advanced, specialized training enables them to be experts in the care of endocrine disease, such as diabetes, thyroid disorders, growth hormone deficiency, osteoporosis, cholesterol disorders, hypertension and obesity.



## Ask the **Contractors Board**

Chair, California Contractors State License Board Q: I have gotten a few bids to get my leaking roof fixed. One of the contractors said we don't need to have a written contract to do the work. He said that it's not a big job, so it's really not necessary. Is this true? Do I have to have a written contract, regardless of the size of the job?

A: Written home improvement contracts are necessary for jobs that cost \$500 or more, including labor and supplies. Even if the job is less than \$500, which may be your case, it's still a good idea to have a written contract because it outlines the terms that you and your contractor have agreed upon. The old axiom is true: "A verbal contract is as good as the paper it's not written on." More information about what contracts should include is available at www.cslb.ca.gov.


Q: The winter storms lodged a branch into my rain gutters and now they are flooded and broken. I need them fixed ASAP, but I am on a tight budget and unsure how to find the best contractor for the cheapest price. Any recommendations?

A: Yes, there are many ways to find a credible and affordable contractor. Looking one up in the phone book is the easiest way, however, you need to make sure you check the contractor's history and verify the contractor's license before hiring someone with whom you've never done business. Your local Better Business Bureau may be another resource. Local roofing associations or building associations have high standards for their members and may be able to refer you to someone who is in your area. Additionally, ask family, friends and neighbors who have had work done on their homes. See if they can provide a reference.

You can verify a contractor's license, and check to see if any formal complaints have been filed against them by going to www.cslb.ca.gov. By law, contractors must have their license number in their ad, or say that they are not licensed. So, you can check them out, even before you call them.


Q: I am having new windows installed in my home. I changed my mind and want windows with a different design than originally specified in the contract. I have told the contractor about the change I want, and he seems pretty agreeable to it. Should I still amend the contract to include the change? It just seems like a lot of unneeded hassle.

A: Yes, you should insist the contract is amended to include the change in the window design. Although it may seem to be a "hassle" to the con-

## **Contractors Board offers** info on hiring landscapers

SACRAMENTO—With the celebration of April as National Garden Month, hundreds of California homeowners will have started digging into yard projects. While some will be planting a few well-chosen trees or flowers, others may be landscaping their entire property. The Contractors State License Board reminds homeowners to hire only licensed landscaping contractors, and to educate themselves about how to find the best one for their specific needs.

April is traditionally the start of warmer weather that usually leads to a rise in outdoor-related home improvement projects There are many qualified landscaping contractors around the state. But there are some unlicensed individuals that will try and pass themselves off as professional contractors and offer attractive cutrate prices. The CSLB encourages homeowners to watch out for these individuals when hiring a landscaping contractor this spring. They can cause property damage, be an insurance liability or even just take the money and run.

In California, anyone who installs landscape systems such as gardens, lawns or sprinkler systems valued at \$500 or more for labor and materials must have a contractor's license. As there are many different classifications of contractors, hiring the correct contractor for the job is vital to ensure the project is completed correctly and to your satisfaction. Since licensed landscapers meet state standards for knowledge, experience and financial responsibility for the specific work they do, the safest bet is to hire only licensed landscape contractors for your outdoor home improvement projects. "Choosing the Right Landscaper" is a helpful, free publication for homeowners available at www.cslb.ca.gov. This publication offers easy tips on hiring and managing a landscape contractor.

Additional tips from the CSLB include:

\*Hire only licensed landscape contractors and verify the license status at www.cslb.ca.gov or by calling 1-800-321-CSLB (2752). Make sure the license is for the exact kind of work you want done.

\*Get at least three bids. Don't assume the lowest bid is the best. It might not include everything you asked for of the quality of materials you would like.

\*Check references and view recently completed jobs.

\*Ask the contractor to provide you with Certificates of Insurance for Workers Compensation and Liability before the work begins.

\*Sign a detailed contract which specifies materials and labor and a schedule of projects tasks with start and end dates.

\*Don't sign a contract until you understand it thoroughly.

\*Be cautious with payment. Don't let payments get ahead of the work. The Contractors State License Board operates under the umbrella of the California Department of Consumer Affairs. The CSLB licenses and regulates California's 299,000 contractors, and investigates more than 20,000 complaints against contractors annually. In fiscal year 2004-2005, the CSLB helped consumers get more than \$36 million in restitution.
