Police shoot man suspected of burglary

DOWNEY – Was Peter Pelayo Jr. on his way to a morning prayer with a church youth group or was he prowling Downtown Downey in the midst of a burglary when he was confronted and later shot by Downey Police last

It's a question that will ultimately be answered by a jury in Downey Municipal Court.

Pelayo pled not guilty this week to felony charges of burglary, receiving stolen property, petty theft with a prior conviction and resisting arrest. He was arrested last Saturday by Sheriffs SWAT, who found him hiding underneath a pulpit at Downey First Baptist Church, where he worked as

The ordeal began at 4:30 a.m. Saturday when a Downey police officer initiated a traffic stop on Pelayo's vehicle at the intersection of New and Third Street. Authorities said they spotted Pelayo cruising Downtown Downey without lights and in and out of the Krikorian Theater Downtown



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'Superintendent of the Year' honors for Doty

TLC also honored

DOWNEY—Downey Unified School District Superintendent Dr. Wendy L. Doty, who succeeded Dr. Edward Sussman three years ago at the helm of a district that has consistently drawn praise for its dynamic and progressive educational initiatives, is this year's choice of the Association of California School Administrators, Region XIV as "Superintendent of

True Lasting Connections (TLC), a DUSD program that seeks to connect families in need to community resources that provide improved health access and educational support services to especially at risk children, at the same time received the ACSA "Partners in Educational Excellence" award.

At the award ceremonies held at the swank Reef Restaurant in Long Beach April 27, Dr. Doty was described as "a champion of public education, instructional excellence, and the development, support and recognition of leadership" and was cited for her "grounding in the culture of the community through sustained service." "Wendy," the citation read, "has established a level of trust and sense of family in an educational organization that is truly exemplary."

Community involvement

Dr. Doty, who served as superintendent of schools in El Segundo and assistant superintendent in Laguna Beach prior to returning to Downey (she served in various educational roles in DUSD for 22 years earlier), is active on the YMCA Board of Managers, the Rotary, the Downey Assistance League, and the Downey Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma. Her affiliation with GOOD and involvements otherwise with several other community projects has not hindered her, it is said, from making frequent visits to schools and classrooms to connect with teachers and students. District administrators meanwhile attest to her encouragement at valued strategic planning sessions to "think out of the box."

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

Parking structure.


Pelayo did not pull to the curb, police said, but instead turned east-bound on Third St., crossed Downey Ave., and stopped in front of Downey

First Baptist Church. He bolted from the car and ran into the church courtyard, said Downey Police Lt. Carl Charles.

Officers established a perimeter around the church, which sits less than a block away from police headquarters.

As Downey police secured the area, they received a telephone call from the registered owner of the vehicle who reported her car stolen, Charles said. The woman, who turned out to be Pelayo's girlfriend, said her boyfriend may be driving the car and later admitted to police that she received a call from Pelayo

police that she received a call from Pelayo while he was fleeing, telling her to report the car stolen.



Searching officers believed Pelayo was hit after finding blood drops in the hallway, police said. Using the cell number provided by Pelayo's girlfriend, police tried calling him but received no answer. Police said Pelayo had removed the battery from his cell phone to elude detection.

At this time Downey police say they withdrew from the church and called in the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Special Enforcement Bureau. SWAT responded and, during the search, learned Pelayo was a worker at the church and had keys to the entire complex and was very familiar with the layout.

After nearly nine hours of searching, Downey police say Pelayo was found under the stage below the pulpit. Pelayo disabled the church security system when he entered and then re-armed the alarm when he found his hiding spot so he would know when police made entry into the church, said Charles.

Officers found an industrial-sized battery charger inside the trunk of the car Pelayo was driving, which police claim was stolen from inside the Krikorian parking structure. Pelayo has a prior felony conviction for burglary where he was sentenced to six months in jail with his probation ending just five months ago. In that case, he had stolen electronic equipment and a pellet pistol replica of a Walther P-99 handgun which was discovered under the seat of the vehicle he had used for the crime.

He currently has outstanding traffic-related warrants in Nevada.

Pelayo was treated at St. Francis Medical Center for a non-life threatening gunshot wound to the leg, police said. A drug test showed Pelayo was under the influence of marijuana.

Pelayo's father, also named Peter, said his son was being treated for superficial gunshots to the leg and thumb and was doing "OK." He also claimed his son was on his way to a 5 a.m. prayer service and ran from police because he was scared.

"He jumped out of the car and ran into the church using his keys to his office," Peter Pelayo Sr. said in an e-mail to The Downey Patriot. "He was being chased all around the complex and was shot at 10 times in the stairway and hallway. The sheriff searched for a weapon for 12 hours and could not find anything that the officer described that looked like a gun.

"I know my son did not have a weapon. He is not violent. He preach-

Downey police confirmed that 10 shots were fired in two separate incidents, seconds apart.

Pelayo Sr. also said his son was driving on a suspended license and was afraid to go to jail.

Officials at Downey First Baptist Church said they were aware of Pelayo's criminal history but had turned his life around and was a good leader to the youth group. Pelayo was one of 12 local volunteers with the American Red Cross Rio Hondo Chapter to help with hurricane relief efforts last year. He was dispatched to Orlando, Florida.

Pelayo, 22, was a student at Cerritos College and a member of an Internet chess club, where he listed his occupation as "pastor."

No firearm was located by police within the nearly 3,000-acre church complex, which includes over 40,000 square feet of buildings.

As is standard for any officer-involved shooting, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Officer Involved Shooting Roll-Out Team is handling the investigation.

Downey police said no charges were expected to be filed against Pelayo's girlfriend, whom they did not identify.

His choice was volleyball.


During his short time at Downey, he made much progress in his game. In his freshman year, he started off at JV and helped his team go undefeated in league.
