Police seek three in credit union holdup

DOWNEY – Police are searching for three men responsible for holding up Downey Federal Credit Union Wednesday morning.

According to Downey police, three black male suspects, wearing dark clothing and with their faces partially covered, entered the credit union, 8237 Third St., at 10:38 a.m. Wednesday. The suspects were armed and demanded money from a credit union employee, who complied, police

The suspects fled with an undisclosed amount of cash, police said. Earlier reports had two suspects already in custody but Downey Police said they could not confirm that. No description of the getaway vehicle was available.

The credit union, which would not comment on the incident, had its front glass door shattered during the robbery and closed for the day.

In a separate incident, three boys were arrested on suspicion of robbing three people outside the Olive Garden restaurant in Downey on Monday. Police said the boys, one of whom was armed with a handgun, robbed three people of their wallets in the restaurant parking lot, located at Firestone Blvd. and Woodruff Ave. The boys fled but were caught by a police helicopter using an infra-red system a half-hour later.

Two of the suspects were 17, the third 16.

Police said they weren't sure if the death was a suicide or accidental but no foul play was suspected. No note was found, police said.

The man was identified as Roberto Escamilla of Bell Gardens. The body was discovered by a jogger, police said.

The case is still under investigation.

How City will spend Federal funds here

DOWNEY—The City Council, sitting as the Community Development Commission, held a public hearing and then approved the 2006-07 Action Plan for Federal Community Development Block Grant and Home Investment Partnership programs.

The action was at Tuesday's regular council meeting.

The City is required to prepare and submit the new Action Plan by May 17, in order to receive the federal allocation of CDBG and HOME funds. Three public hearings were scheduled for public input, four residents spoke at these, and staff received 11 requests for CDBG funding help from non-profit agencies.

The federal funding "pie" consists of a total of \$2,293,262, of which \$1,550,819 is CDBG funding and \$742,443 HOME grants. Staff estimates the City will also receive \$190,000, repayment of Program loans. The 2006-07 grants will be 10 percent less that last year, due to cuts by Congress in HUD's budget.





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Funding for improved sidewalks are waiting

DOWNEY—The City Council has approved the City's application to the Metropolitan Transportation Authority for \$58,928 as Downey's share of pedestrian improvement funds.

The funds are estimated on a population basis, but each city must submit an annual request to the MTA.

This year's funding is targeted for sidewalk construction at five locations in the City. These are the west side of Rives between Phlox and Arnett Streets; both sides of Arnett between Horley and Rives; the east side of Horley just north of Adwin; and on 8521 and 8523 Orange Street, and the north and south side of Donovan between Birchdale and Lakewood Boulevard (close to Alameda Elementary School).

In other action Tuesday the City Council:

•Approved an Ordinance changing the speed limit on Brookshire Avenue, and increasing the speed limit on three portions. The result is a speed limit of 40 mph south of Stewart and Gray Road and 35 mph north of Stewart and Gray to Gallatin. The speed limit in school areas is always 25 mph.

•Considered a special event celebrating Downey's 50th Anniversary. In his presentation, Scott Pomrehn, Assistant to the City Manager, said that Staff's proposals were just to start the ball rolling, that more viable ideas are needed for its proper celebration.

Preliminary ideas ranged from a minuscule \$5,000 due to budget considerations suggested by Councilmember Anne Bayer to an eye-popping \$100,000 outlay proposed by Mayor Meredith Perkins. He said it should reflect the "golden" achievements Downey has made over the years, and that the community deserves something fit for the occasion, since it is a "one-time thing." He favors a year-long celebration.

After Councilmember Kirk Cartozian said perhaps the celebration be done along Downey Avenue, to highlight a "resurgent" downtown, realtor Maria Larkin, with a little urging from the mayor, suggested that a parade down the avenue just might work, which would culminate in some good, old-fashioned barbecue in a park.

In any event, it was made clear that, at this stage, ideas from all sources are welcome. The 2nd Century Foundation's Lois Buchanan also reiterated a plea that the foundation be represented in its planning.

•Approved a cash contract and gave final approval to work on Lakewood Boulevard improvement IB Fifth Street to the Union Pacific rail tracks in the sum of \$3,524,073.

•Approved appropriation of \$89,440 in supplemental 21st Century Community Grant Learning Center funds and \$69,227 in carry-forward appropriations from Community Services for the Learning Center.

•Set a Public Hearing for May 23 on the appeal of the denial of a zone variance to allow an unpermitted structure's conversion to a guest house at 7753 Hondo St.


•Approved the purchase of police car mobile radios for \$55,622 using federal homeland security funds.

•Proclaimed Older American Month; California Building Safety Week; National Foster Parent Recognition Month; and presented certificates of recognition to Downey High School's student body as the top fund raisers in the recent Leukemia/Lymphoma Societies Pennies for Patients program.






DOWNEY—Winners of this year's first Writers' Workshop West poetry contest have been announced.

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My Country 'Tis of Thee

The current controversy over Spanish words for the National Anthem reminds me of another such flap in the early 1930s. Except to say that the translation I read seemed to be rather uninspired I must say that the solution to the differences must be left to younger folks.

The flap that I remember was in the late 1920s and early 30s. Probably in the first Franklin Roosevelt administration. The National Anthem was a rather smooth old hometown type of song titled "America." There were many who objected to the ancient music-our version was attributed to Henry Casey, written in 1847. They objected not because of lyrics, they were poetic enough and also the sweet notes had little range and were easy to sing. The gripe was that the melody was borrowed from what in those days was still referred to by some as the "Mother Country". The song's title in England was "God Save the King." Many were offended by the slightly illogical juxtaposition of words and music.

Most complaints against the "new" candidate—The Star Spangled Banner—involved the difficulty of its range—nontenors had difficulty with that high note.

Still, novelty prevailed and the Star Spangled Banner was declared the official anthem just in time to be played in movie theaters during -- and for a long time after -- World War II.

The older anthem was usually referred to by its first line, it went:

"My country 'tis of thee, Sweet land of Liberty of thee we sing.

Land of the Pilgrims pride, land where our fathers died From every mountain side let freedom ring.

My native country thee, land of the noble free" and so on. This is what we pledged ourselves to in those benighted

times and those are the lyrics which, come to think of it, we traded for another borrowed melody.

Interesting how the old memory clings to things of little importance that happened in the far away past. "Hace muchos anos amigos, hace muchos anos."

Bill to restore the Los Angeles River

Rio San Gabriel repeats



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
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Roybal-Allard supports national security agenda

One of our government's foremost responsibilities is to provide safe communities for America's families. Unfortunately, the Republican budget before the House fails to do so on many counts. For that reason, I have joined congressional colleagues in support of a homeland security agenda that proactively and responsibly prepares us for the ever-changing security challenges facing our country.

This is not an acceptable way to thank our brave men and women in uniform for their sacrifices.

In contrast, the Real Security Agenda is a broad initiative that will strengthen national, state and local preparedness by immediately implementing the 9/11 Commission's recommendations. These protective measures are especially critical to our nation's large urban centers where population density and other attributes make them particularly vulnerable to terrorism. An excellent example is our Los Angeles region which has our nation's largest port complex and is home to our nation's third busiest air-

More specifically, the Real Security Agenda will:

•Screen 100 percent of containers and cargo bound for the U.S. in ships or airplanes at the point of origin and safeguard America's food and water supplies, mass transit systems and chemical and nuclear power plants;

•Prevent the outsourcing of critical components of our national security infrastructure -- such as ports, airports and mass transit -- to foreign interests that put America at risk;

•Provide firefighters, emergency medical workers, police officers, and other workers on the front lines with the training, staffing, equipment and cutting-edge technology they need;

•Guarantee that our troops have the protective gear, equipment and training they need and strengthen the National Guard to ensure it is fully manned, equipped and available to meet missions at home and abroad;

•Enact a GI Bill of Rights for the 21st Century that guarantees that our troops, veterans and their families receive the pay, health care, mental health services and other benefits they have earned and deserve;

•Protect America from biological terrorism and pandemics, including the Avian flu, by investing in the public health infrastructure and training public health workers; and

•Reduce our dependence on foreign oil from the Middle East by increasing production of alternative fuels from America's heartland, promoting hybrid and flex fuel-vehicle technology and enhancing conservation initiatives.

By taking these concerted steps, the Democratic Real Security Agenda will replace inadequate policies that severely underfund key programs with a national security agenda that truly protects our nation. As a member who sits on the Homeland Security Appropriations Subcommittee, I will continue to fight for passage of the Real Security Agenda to help keep our nation strong and secure. America's families deserve no less.
