Andy Harrod was 'a dear, dear friend'

DOWNEY—Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. today, June 2 at the Trinity Baptist Church at Downey Avenue and Florence for Andrew A. Harrod, who passed away on Memorial Day, May 29 at the Veteran's Hospital in Long Beach after a long and valiant battle with cancer.

Graveside services will take place after at the Inglewood Cemetery (information and directions will be provided at the church). After services at graveside, a reception will be held back at the Baptist Church in Downey. Viewing was held yesterday at Miller-Mies Mortuary at Downey Ave. and Third St.

An inspiration to anyone who knew him, Andy was born in Cranston, Rhode Island June 28, 1922. He is survived by his wife of 34 years, Ruth Harrod of Downey, his 5 children, Drew, Cathy, Bill, Allen and David. He had 15 grandchildren 29 great grandchildren, two great-great grandchildren, and one on the way—all the 'love' of his life!

He also had a true love for the U.S. military. He fought for our county during World War II: he signed up for the Navy in 1942 at the age of 20. He served as Quarter Master Second Class on the USS Denver on the bridge with the Captain/Commander. He served in the Navy for four years, all of which were overseas. His journeys took him to Pearl Harbor, Panama Canal, Guadalcanal, an island called Bougainville in the Pacific, Okinawa, Iwo Jima and Guam, to mention a few. All the locations in which Andy was during the war saw major battles.

Andy earned 11 Battle Star Medals, the Navy Unit Commendation, and the Presidential Commendation Medal from the Philippines. Up until Andy's death, he stayed very connected to his Navy days by attending ship reunions whenever possible and keeping in contact with Pearl Harbor survivors. His last reunion took place in Niagara Falls. Today there are only about 215 known survivors out of 1500 who served on his ship, 28 of whom passed away in the last year.

Funding for L.A. River gains House approval

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard (CA-34) announced last week the May 24 passage in the U.S. House of Representatives of the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act for 2007 that includes funding for major projects in the Los Angeles area.

Through the congresswoman's efforts, the measure includes continued funding for the dredging of the main channel of Los Angeles Harbor, the Harbor South Bay Recycled Water Project, the construction of the Vernon Corridor Extension recycled water pipeline, and a study pertaining to a recreation and development project at the Cornfields site along the Los Angeles River.

"The funding secured for these projects in the U.S. House of Representatives will ensure that progress on important water initiatives vital to the City of Los Angeles continue uninterrupted," said Roybal-Allard, who is a member of the House Appropriations committee.

The bill, which passed by a vote of 404 to 20, is the House version of the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act for FY2007. Following expected passage by the Senate, the bill will go to conference (where a final version is reconciled), and then forwarded to the President.

Recreational projects

Roybal-Allard worked with her colleagues to obtain \$1.05 million for the revitalization effort along the Los Angeles River. This money will enable the Corps of Engineers to work with the City of Los Angeles and local groups in planning parks, recreation, and community improvement projects along the LA River. The over-all revitalization river funding includes \$500,000 for the river's "Cornfields" site, which will be used to complete a study to convert the industrial area into parks or other community uses.

"I have worked for several years with City Councilman Ed Reyes on the LA River Revitalization plan, and I appreciate the continued support of Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and other local stakeholders as we explore ways to convert the land adjacent to the Los Angeles River into parks, housing and economic development for our local communities," Roybal-Allard said. "The Cornfields site is one of the most promising opportunities for these types of initiatives, and I am pleased that we can continue to develop a study to lay out some of the possibilities."

The measure also includes funding for the ongoing dredging project in

the Los Angeles Harbor.

"The \$2 million included in the House version of the measure to continue the dredging of the main channel of Los Angeles harbor will keep this important project moving forward. I will continue to work with Congressional leaders to increase funding for this critical project before the bill is finalized. This project will enable the harbor to accommodate new and larger container vessels which, in turn, will enhance manufacturing

Memorial Day observed at Downey Cemetery

DOWNEY—Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard (CA 34) read the names of those members of the U.S, millitary from Downey who have been killed in Iraq during the lengthening bloody campaign there, and a large gathering witnessed the laying of a wreath at the head of a soldier's grave and the playing of Taps at the Downey Memorial Day observance at the Downey Cemetery, Monday, May 29.

There was a showing of the Colors by a Young Marines Color Guard, the Wreath Laying under the command of Capt. Wade T. Murdoch of American Legion Post 723, and of course the National Anthem by Sandra Eatherly. An invocation was read by Downey Police Chaplain Mario Guerra, and brief speeches were heard from Dr. Gary McCaughan, Ken Beckner and Diane Boggs of the Cemetery District Board.

The ceremonies included a rifle salute and also served in recognition of the recently completed Veteran's Memorial Niche Wall which allows the cemetery financial continuity.

Noted present at the ceremonies were persons including Downey historian John Vincent, Councilmen Dave Gafin, Kirk Cartozian, Mayor Meredith Perkins, and Dr. Mary Stauffer.

The Downey Cemetery contains graves dating to the 1870s and serves Downey, Bellflower, Paramount and parts of South Gate. It is located on Lakewood Boulevard just south of the Green Line Station.

The Niche Wall was dedicated last year by Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard.

"For us and for future generations, the wall we dedicate today will serve as a constant reminder of the brave men and women who, in defense of our country, paid the ultimate and very precious price," she said at the time.

"While Memorial Day is a day to remember the service of veterans past, it is also fitting that we recognize and honor those currently serving in our armed forces, including those who have returned from the battlefields of today, like the individuals with whom I have visited at Walter Reed hospital near Washington, DC. Although many are seriously injured or maimed, and their lives altered forever, their patriotism remains strong as does their concern for their comrades, who remain in harms way in Afghanistan and Iraq."





After several years of retirement and with way too much time on his hands, Andy went through the recruitment process yet again, and was hired as a Pupil Services Technician, where he had served up until his death. Andy always said that he "enjoyed helping kids get back inschool to obtain a quality education more than just about anything he had ever done in his life."

Man holds a vision towards the future

•A local realtor carries on with his career -- and life -- after a surgery disaster left him blind last year.

DOWNEY – The walls in Carlos Salguero's office are adorned with inspirational posters.

"Challenge: The harder the course, the more rewarding the triumph," read one. "Possibilities: The only way to discover the limits of the possible is to go beyond them into the impossible," read another. They are vivid in color, serene in setting.

But Salguero cannot see them. He is blind.

Two and a half hours have passed. Four phone calls have been made, numerous have been received, and a pair of clients have been negotiated with. He returns to his office, settles into his chair, and sighs. Pulling a tissue from the pocket of his blazer, he lifts his glasses and dabs the tears trickling down his cheek. "I'm sorry...it's just hard."

It was 16 years ago when Salguero decided to go into real estate. He had been a regional manager for a furniture rental company and wanted to put his people skills to better use. Currently, he is a top producer, the highest of sales brackets, for Century 21 My Real Estate.

Salguero has a comforting spirit with a hearty laugh, jolly personality and charming smile. He is in his mid-forties with salt-and-pepper hair and brown-sugar skin. He wears tinted glasses, which from the right angle, allow you to capture his almond eyes.

"To complain does me no good. I try to play it cool and to be an example," says Salguero. "I get discouraged and become frustrated because I feel helpless at times. All I can do is hope and pray the Lord will heal me."

A year ago this March, Salguero walked into Kaiser Permanente for his third surgery, a final attempt to remove a brain tumor. Doctors discovered the tumor in the pituitary gland of his brain in 1996. The first two operations were done by entering thru his nose and mouth, while the third was done by entering thru the left side of his skull. When Salguero woke up after the last procedure, he was blind.

Eleven months had passed and no sight had been acquired, even though swelling had gone down drastically. Doctors then told him he would never regain his vision

A couple of hours following the news, Salguero dined with good friend Jose Oliden. "I will never forget what Carlos said to me," Oliden recalls. "He said, 'I have two options: Either be upset with the news I just received, or live life with what I have. I choose to live life."

The National Federation of the Blind (NFB) reports 1.3 million people are legally blind in the United States. Thirty percent of that population are currently employed.

Although his life has changed considerably, it has not stopped nor slowed down. He devoutly comes to work everyday, with walking stick in one hand and tape recorder in the other. The tape recorder is used to retain phone numbers, messages, and dates, and is one of many tools utilized to assist him. His assistant, along with his boss, office manager, receptionist, and practically every other co-worker, drive him to appointments, read aloud documents, and aid him in any way possible.

When one of the five senses is lost, the remaining four become stronger and much more inclined. Walking into the building, Salguero knows he has entered correctly when the leather strip of bells jingles with the movement of the door. When he hits the couch, he takes a few steps to the left and veers right, leading him into the main hallway. He passes the glass conference room door and runs into wooden mailboxes. That is his cue to go left. He is cautious of chairs, desks and people. He knows once he hits the next doorway, he needs only to take two to three steps straight into his office.

"We are all still in the learning process," says Steve Roberson, Salguero's boss and confidant. "This is all very new to us."

Salguero has always considered his co-workers his family. But now, they have become the heartbeat of his career. They serve him out of love and respect, not out of obligation. And to many, he is an inspiration and considered a mentor.

He is a man of deep faith, attending Calvary Chapel of Downey with a few others from the office. And since the surgery, he seeks additional assistance from God in his career, finances and decisions.

Because he lived independently, Salguero had to hire an in-home aide. Roselia Dubon helps him cook, clean and complete tasks. Besides paying for her out of his own pocket, he also spends money on necessities such as a talking watch, writing guides and walking sticks. The NFB estimates the cost of a lifetime of support and unpaid taxes for one blind person equates \$916,000.

As the real estate market fluctuates, so does his income. But Salguero has been fortunate to have clients who are not leery of his disability. "He knows how to do his job very well," said Roxanna Escoto, a previous client. "I would recommend him to anyone, blind or not." His assistant Flor Mendez said, "He works very hard and perseveres with enthusiasm and motivation."

It is now the end of the day and Salguero is ready to go home. He gathers his belongings into a leather briefcase, reaches for his keys and unfolds his walking stick. As he struggles to find the light switch, he bumps a framed poster. It read, "Persistence: The ability to overcome obstacles along the way."

DOWNEY—The Assistance League of Downey is once again offering a special course to high school junior and sophomore students residing in the Downey Unified School District area.



and business opportunities and spur job creation in the Los Angeles area." The Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach comprise the largest cargo container port complex in the U.S. and the third largest in the world. Approximately 47 percent of containerized trade entering the U.S. currently comes through the port complex, located on San Pedro Bay.

The measure also includes \$800,000 for the Harbor/South Bay Water Recycling project, which is a cooperative effort between the Corps of Engineers, and West Basin and Central Basin Municipal Water Districts. The project will develop up to 48,000 acre-feet of recycled water for municipal, industrial, and environmental uses in the Los Angeles area.

In addition, Congresswoman Roybal-Allard worked with a group of local lawmakers to secure \$10 million for the San Gabriel Basin Restoration Fund and \$743,000 for the San Gabriel Demonstration Project. The restoration fund will be used to contain and treat the spreading of groundwater contamination in the San Gabriel and Central Groundwater Basins. The demonstration project will be used to construct a 12-mile pipeline of recycled water that will serve the cities of Vernon, East Los Angeles County, Commerce, and other neighboring areas.

Washington welcomes L.A. Chamber

WASHINGTON D.C.—Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard welcomed Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa and members of the L.A. Area Chamber of Commerce at a press conference last week to kick off the chamber's annual "Access D.C." trip to Capitol Hill.

During the four-day event, business leaders lobbied on issues including transportation, energy, environment and water, international trade, health care, education and workforce development, and entertainment.

The congresswoman and Congressman David Dreier hosted a bipartisan luncheon for the group.

"Los Angeles is the world's 17th largest economy, the entertainment capitol of the world, the nation's leading manufacturing center, and with 43 percent of the nation's imports coming through our port complex, Los Angeles truly is an economic and cultural asset for our nation," Roybal-Allard said at the press conference. "In spite of these facts, Congress stubbornly clings to the East coast mentality that the United States ends at the Mississippi River. Consequently, unfair as it may be, Los Angeles and California, continue to fall victim to the "ABC Syndrome" -- Anywhere But California. As a result our city and state are often ignored when Congress and the Administration allocate federal resources.

"With our nation's rising deficits, increased demand for defense dollars, and decreased revenue, due in part to tax cuts, we are faced with an extremely challenging situation. So challenging in fact, that the House of Representatives has not been able to pass a budget resolution because of the proposed elimination or cuts to critical programs in areas such as education, healthcare, and research.

"The bottom line is that competition for scarce federal dollars has never been more fierce, and, that is why the LA Chamber's presence in Washington DC has never been more important."

This wisdom could eventually lead to the situation that if the traffic patterns in the city were to be restricted to narrow streets, fewer intersections, no turns, and slow speeds, then we would approach the utopia of ultimate safety, but with it would come the gross inconvenience of our not being able to get anywhere in a timely manner.

All of which brings to the forefront the questions of 1) Just how much "wisdom" the city can afford before we are strangled, and 2) How soon there will be another reversal of wisdom and, with great fanfare, the reopening of the full intersection of Lakewood and Clark.





Steroids no joke in high school athletics

And there it went like a shooting star through the night sky. The ball traveled with a particular aura surrounding it. That aura was history. Through it, we could see visions of the Babe winking back at us. We could see him waddling around the bases waving his hat. We could see him calling his shot toward the outfield fence. Then in a split second it all shattered like glass. No longer would George Herman Ruth be number two on the all-time homeruns list. With one swing of the bat on May 29 he went from the silver medal to the bronze.

Unfortunately, the end of that sentence for a lot of people around the game would be finished off with "for someone that takes steroids." Yes folks, it's our most favorite topic to talk about, especially when talking about Bonds. It's like that illegitimate step child standing at your doorstep on a cold rainy night asking to talk to you about what you two could have. That black cloud that hovers over Bonds' legacy and sports in general is still there and not going away.

Fortunately for Downey, we don't have a professional team that could be criticized for possible steroid use. Instead, we our proud to say that we have high schools that represent our city in tournaments and other competitions. We are completely convinced that all of our athletes are clean. The question posed is this: Are they really?

In a study done by the University of Michigan called "Monitoring the Future", no they are not. There has been plenty of steroid use reported by students in the United States, both middle school and high school. Thankfully, it's probably safe to assume that elementary school students don't know much about steroids at this point and don't really care either.

Moving on, in this study done in 2002, a trend of steroid use is detected. As students get older, steroid use tends to increase. Among eighth graders from the year 1991 to 2001, the percent of students who reported steroid use jumped from 1.9 to 2.5. In tenth graders that number was 1.8 percent to 3.5 percent, and in seniors in high school that number went from 2.1 percent to 4 percent.

With these trends, we should start worrying about students and the possibility of them using these drugs just to improve appearance or performance. We should worry very much due to the ability of the kids to get their hands on them. According to the in-study survey, 22 percent of eighth graders, 33.2 percent of tenth graders, and 46.1 percent of high school seniors reported that they are "fairly easy" or "very easy" to obtain.

According to a 2001 study, the number of twelfth graders who believed that taking these drugs caused health risks declined from 68 to 62 percent.

There have been talks about possible steroid testing in schools. The CIF Southern Section has started talking about having athletes sign a pledge to not take steroids. Violators could face possible suspension or expulsion.

The answers to all of our questions are out there. This is a fight worth winning. The past is ladled with our mistakes. It's up to us to make sure that the present is fixed in order to safeguard the future. The question is when does all the steroid use stop? The answer we need to respond with



Merritt Yancey was heavily involved here

DOWNEY—Merritt Yancey, one of the persons who worked actively for the incorporation of Downey as a city, has passed away. He was born Jan 1, 1917 in Charles City, Iowa, and died in his sleep at his home in Downey on May 18.

He had a varied career. He graduated from Iowa State College and started working for the Oliver Corporation in Iowa designing tractors. In 1953 the Yanceys moved to Downey and he worked for Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. in South Gate designing the Corporal guided missile, and then North American Rockwell. Firestone later persuaded him to come back to their Coated Fabrics Division to design rubber-fabric-coated dams. This work took him all over the world, including three trips around the world as he created dams to improve the reliability of water sources and electricity to impoverished Third World countries, as well as many dams in the

He served in both the World War II (for 3-1/2 years) and the Korean conflict (for 1-1/3 years). He entered as a private and was a captain by the

He had been a volunteer in many organizations in Downey. They include election to the school board, both the Alameda District prior to unification, and 12 years on the Downey Unified School Board. Other organizations include the Library Board (when it was built), the Downey Symphony Board, the Downey Radio Club (he was a "ham" for over 50 years), and the Masonic Lodge. He was a member of the Downey Free Methodist Church. He was also in PTAs as his daughters were in school,

He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Juanita; daughters Kathi (Rick) Diederich of Palm Desert: Dr. Janelle (Rod) Engel of Mesa, AZ, Lanita (Rev. Harry) Van Aken of Prescott, AZ, and Laurel (John) Cross of Downey; eight grandchildren; and two great granddaughters.
