San Gabriel River corridor plan adopted

LOS ANGELES—The L.A. County Board of Supervisors has adopted the San Gabriel River Corridor Master Plan, which has been developing over several years and meant to guide government agencies, businesses, and nonprofit organizations in enhancing the San Gabriel River

Master Plans outline a philosophy for improving rivers and include lists of projects to beautify the river corridors, provide more open space and recreational opportunities, conserve water and prevent pollution. It provides a consensus-based plan to maximize the river as a resource for

For decades, the San Gabriel River Corridor has provided flood protection and water conservation for surrounding communities and the 21 cities along its reach. The Maser Plan presents a cohesive, coordinated, multi-use approach to new projects along the river corridor that maintain public safety while improving quality of life.

A similar Los Angeles River Master Plan was adopted 10 years ago on June 13, 1996, which has been guiding enhancements along the Los Angeles River corridor ever since. To date, under the Los Angeles River Master Plan, stakeholders have collaboratively implemented over \$112 million in completed projects along the Los Angeles River.

Projects planned

Projects range from beautification of river entrance gateways, to pocket parks, bike trails, pollution control systems, native landscaping and other multi-use, community-focused improvements such as the Los Angeles River Bikeway that stretches from the city of Vernon to the city of Long Beach, and the Riverfront Greenway in Bell and Cudahy, which was kicked off last May when students from Ellen Ochoa Learning Center worked to bring more green to the area.



The constable looked good sitting on horse

DOWNEY—No history of Downey would be complete without mention of the Constable who enforced law and order here for 18 years.

Benjamin Franklin Witherspoon was majestic astride his horse and wearing his star on his vest the later part of the nineteenth century.

He brought his wife, Martha Maniza Nelson, to Downey from her home in Texas in 1882 so she could be closer to her mother, who had moved here earlier with three sons.

A daughter, Zora, was born to the Witherspoons 11 years later.

Witherspoon or "Spoony" as he was known familiarly was the constable in Downey from 1883 to 1923.

No jail

His daughter recalled there was no jail in town for many of Spoony's early years here, and when someone had to be taken to Los Angeles,

Her father would have to ride the train to Los Angeles. She said when her father wasn't using the rail pass she would borrow it to make wonderful shopping trips to L.A.

They lived in a small woodframe house her father had built at what is now Firestone and Paramount Boulevards.

By 1920 Downey was a colorful small town with a train depot, a gas station, two saloons, a fire station, two banks, two newspaper offices, several dress shops, grocery store and the sheriff's office.

Standing watch

The girl recalled that one day her father came home and told her there had been a murder. Witherspoon had to stand guard at the murder scene here until the coroner could arrive from L.A. The body of the dead couple's two year old child was also later found.

She also recalled Downey's worst disaster, a gas station which exploded in flames in 1922.

In the early years Spoony enforced the law by himself, but as age took its toll, he used to deputize George Kellerman to help him.

The young men of Downey showed the aging Constable no mercy. They used to run the stop signs in the old downtown and then race to the nearby orange groves where they hid from the old lawman.

Whether he actually could have caught them or not is a moot question. He probably thought about that long train ride to Los Angeles before attempting a pursuit.



Now is good time to consider flood insurance

SACRAMENTO—As California's rainfall season ended on June 30, now is a good time for homeowners to sign up for flood insurance in anticipation of next winter's storms.

"The best way for property owners to protect themselves against devastating loss from flooding is through flood insurance," according to Federal Coordinating Officer Michael H. Smith of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which administers the National Flood Insurance Program.

The best time to buy a policy is in the summer. It may be too late once it starts raining again because a new policy does not take effect until 30 days after is it is purchased.

"We fully encourage any of our citizens living near or around water to acquire flood insurance," said State Coordinating Officer Henry Renteria, director of the Governor's Office of Emergency Services (OES). "Californians must be aware of their risks to be adequately prepared for incidences such as floods...for some it's not a matter of 'if,' it is a matter of 'when' will it occur again," Renteria said.

Floods are the most common natural disaster. In a high-risk area, there is a 26 percent chance of flood damage during the 30-year life of a typical home mortgage, compared to a 9 percent chance of fire damage.

As little as an inch of water can ruin the walls, floors and carpets of a home, requiring expensive repairs. About a quarter of National Flood Insurance Program claims are for properties outside floodplain areas.

Homeowners insurance policies do not cover flood damage. But most property owners can buy separate flood insurance. The key requirement is that their local government participates in the federal program. Maximum coverage is \$250,000 for residential structures and, under a separate policy, \$100,000 for contents. Renters can buy content-only policies. Premiums are tied to flood risk determinations. Persons who borrow from federally-insured lenders to buy properties in high risk areas are required to buy the insurance.

This past winter brought seasonal precipitation levels to between 140 percent and 150 percent of normal in much of central and northern California, according to National Weather Service data.

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger proclaimed a state of emergency for 38 counties for damages suffered in either the December/January storm period or the March/April storm period, or both. This resulted in two separate federal disaster declarations by President George W. Bush, covering a total of 36 California counties. The declarations provided renters, homeowners and businesses of all sizes with emergency assistance from FEMA and the U.S. Small Business Administration in 13 counties. In 12 of the 13 counties, FEMA is also providing "public assistance" to help local governments pay for clean up and repairs. Another 23 countries are receiving federal public assistance, but no assistance for individuals was provided.

Of those who registered for disaster assistance in the 13 counties, only about 11 percent had flood insurance, FEMA data showed.

Not every flooding incident will result in a federal disaster declaration. And not every declaration will provide assistance to individuals. Even when it does, the bulk of the assistance is likely to be in the form of an SBA loan that must be repaid, in addition to any other loans outstanding

But losses suffered by flood insurance policy holders are covered whether or not a disaster is declared. And the money paid out is not a



Prostate cancer vehicle touring country

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The National Prostate Cancer Coalition (NPCC), which is celebrating 10 years of saving lives by seeking to reduce the burden of prostate cancer on American men and their families through awareness, outreach and advocacy, says that if only American men knew that 99 percent of them would survive if prostate cancer were caught early, deaths from the second leading cancer killer among U.S. men would drop

It is estimated that only slightly more than half of American men over 50 get tested for the disease.

To offset this grim statistic, NPCC has expanded its Drive Against Prostate Cancer campaign (the only national mobile screening program for prostate cancer) that was initiated on Father's Day.

The Drive will visit over 50 cities by the end of 2006 and will screen over 14,000 men for free. The program is underwritten by Thor Industries, the Gillette Prostate Cancer Challenge, Fiji Water, the Cancer Research Institute, and individual contributions to the NPCC.

The Drive is the only national mobile screening program where local licensed physicians conduct a two-part screening procedure, which includes a complexed Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) blood test and physical examination. The screenings are conducted in a 39-foot Airstream Land yachts.

Optimism over job picture expressed

DOWNEY-Key economic indicators, coupled with oral surveys indicate continued optimism of controlled growth in both the U.S. and local economies.

From April to June, 30 percent of the area companies interviewed said they planned to hire more employees, while only 13 percent said they planned reduced payroll. Another 47 percent expected to maintain current staffing levels while 10 percent said they were not sure on whether there would be changes.

The numbers are from a survey undertaken by Manpower Employment

The survey noted however that employers are less optimistic than they were last year at this time, when 43 percent were optimistic about hiring and 13 percent predicted cutbacks. In the coming quarter, the survey tabbed job prospects strongest in Non-Durable Goods Manufacturing, Transportation/Public Utilities, Finance/Insurance/Treal, State and Education. Hiring in Construction and Public Administration will remain about the same.

According to the national seasonally adjusted results of the Manpower Employer Outlook Survey, U.S. employers show no sign of changing their healthy hiring pace in the quarter.

Of 16,000 U.S. employers surveyed 30 percent see an increase in hiring while only 6 percent predict reductions.

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



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Rauschenberg comes to MOCA



Follow these 10 rules to prevent child drowning

WESTWOOD—With the arrival of summer, UCLA emergency physicians would like to remind parents how to prevent drowning and water-immersion injuries involving children. These unfortunate and heartwrenching events most often occur in the summer months that are filled with water activities.

Annually in Los Angeles County, 72 percent of child drownings occur during June, July and August, according to the Los Angeles County Department of Health Services. Most of these tragic events occur in private backyard swimming pools. Close to 70 percent of toddler-aged children who were found in a pool or spa were thought to have been elsewhere in the house either sleeping or playing.

"Drowning remains the leading cause of accidental death among toddlers ages one to two," said Dr. Larry J. Baraff, professor of pediatrics and emergency medicine at UCLA. "One of the most preventable causes of death, this tragedy can be avoided with just a few simple precautions."

In the past five years, there were on average 2,200 children under five years old treated in U.S. hospital emergency departments for swimming pool submersion injuries and 280 pool-related drowning deaths per year. Ninety percent of thee deaths occurred at home.

Parents should follow these 10 basic rules to prevent a child drowning: 1) Never leave a child unattended, or with a young sibling, in a swimming pool, wading pool, bathtub or Jacuzzi. Only a momentary lapse in supervision may result in a drowning. A child can drown in just two min-

2) Pools should be fenced and gated with self-locking gates. These include pools located in neighborhoods, apartment complexes, family backyards, etc. Pools must be kept clean with no covers or rafts that might obstruct one's view of a child.

3) Always secure the safety cover on your spa or hot tub.

4) Be sure all containers with liquids are emptied immediately after use. Do not leave empty containers in yards or around the house where they may accumulate water and attract young children.

5) Adults and teenagers, ages 14 and older, who supervise children should know CPR. Studies have demonstrated that nearly drowned children given quick CPR suffered no brain damage, while children not receiving such immediate treatment all sustained brain damage or death.

6) Children should be given swimming lessons but should not be considered water safe until they are 14 years old.

7) Keep small children out of bathrooms unless supervised by an adult or older child. Since 1973, more than 500 children have drowned in bathtubs, hot tubs, toilets and five-gallon buckets.

8) Older children and even adults should not swim alone in the ocean or fast-moving rivers.

9) Children should wear bright-colored flotation devices when boating.

10) Don't mix alcohol, children and water.
