For this series, Villiers experimented with canvas instead of archival paper. The result are prints with the quality of a painting—rich, saturated color and an almost three-dimensional quality to the imagery. The prints however are extremely fragile, printed [as they are] on canvas and then

You may be part of living history

■ Space Science Learning Center turns to the public for help in shaping its archives.

DOWNEY—The director of the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center has appealed for residents who were part of the 70 years of living history to step forth and add their memories and stories.

Loren Behr, in a letter to the public, writes that, "Just 26 years after the Wright Brothers' historic first powered flight at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, an industrialist named E.M. Smith built an airport and airplane manufacturing plant in Downey, thus beginning a fascinating 70-year history of aeronautics in Downey.

"Over the course of that history, Downey was at one time, the most prolific producer of war planes in the country, was at the forefront of missile development and testing, and made a unique and enduring contribution to the nation's space exploration program.

Thousands worked here

"Thousands of local residents worked at the site over the years, for employers including Vultee, North American, Rockwell, Boeing, and NASA. But while many of today's Downey residents attended a community event during the Rockwell and Boeing days, watched the great events like the lunar landings or shuttle lift-offs on television, or even had a family member or friend that worked at the site, few of those of us who didn't go to work there every day have a real sense of what it was like inside the plant's secure gates.

"Cognizant of the fact that as each day passes fewer and fewer of those in the know are still around to tell their stories, many have wished that someone could gather the collective memories of those who worked at the former NASA site. Now there is a program that is doing just that.

Aviation History Archive

"Developed by the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center—part of the City of Downey—The Downey Aviation History Archive is a way to gather memories, stories, anecdotes, history and photographs that help document the rich history of the site and preserve Downey's heritage as a site of aeronautic innovation.

"The archive can be found on the Internet at http://aviationhistoryarchive.org/. There, former workers for any of the companies or government entities at the former NASA site can record their thoughts, memories and images for posterity. The general public is welcomed to log on and read the stories."

Behr calls for additional submissions, saying the design of the archive makes it possible for many more recollections and viewpoints to be included than a few doing personal interviews. But it can only work if people take the time to remember. He urges former workers at the site take their history seriously. He termed their knowledge and experiences "unique."

The City of Downey Aviation History Archive is sponsored by Financial Partners Credit Union. For those without access to a computer, one is available at the credit union main entrance, and computers are also available at the Downey City Library.



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

The Southern California American Red Cross reports a critically low blood supply. There is a special need for Group O Blood, officials say. Nearly one-half the population has this blood type, and Group O negative blood is also the "universal" donor blood often used in emergencies. About one-half of those who do not know their blood type will be a Group O donor. The Red Cross reports that only five percent of the eligible U.S. populations gives blood.

Those considering donating blood must be in good health, be at least 17 years old, and weigh at least 110 pounds. There is no upper age limit on your ability to donate. Conditions that require a temporary deferral are pregnancy, travel to certain parts of the world, inoculations, some health conditions and certain medications. A healthy donor may donate red blood cells every 56 days.

Blood is needed for emergencies and for people who have cancer, blood disorders, sickle cell, anemia and other illnesses. Some people need regular blood transfusions to live.

To schedule an appointment, call the DRMC Volunteer Office at 904-5321, or go to the www.givelife.org site and enter the sponsor code, DOWREG. Walk-ins are welcome, but may experience delays. The entire process generally takes about one hour.

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

"Everyone has junk," says John Korkis who opened his 1-800-GOT-JUNK? operation six months ago. "We're just making it easier for them to get rid of it."

With more than 100 000 small to medium sized junk removal businesses operating across the U.S., the field is getting more and more crowd-

"1-800-GOT-JUNK? is definitely leading the pack in terms of recycling, donation and professionalism, but we are just waiting for the day we see a major competitor give us a run for our money." The types of junk pickups can range from a few small items to loads

of furniture and appliances. The industry generally sees a spike in jobs around the first and last week of the month. "People that are moving tend to think only about the stuff they want to

left over." says Korkis. The industry has also benefited from new reality television series like Clean House and Mission Organization, which show the potential to trans-

form your home simply by clearing out the junk. "Clutter is definitely an issue," adds Korkis. "Once things are organized and pared down people are amazed at how much better they can utilize their space."

The River



Senate should act on Voting Rights Act

■ Voter discrimination, particularly among minority citizens, still exists today.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—On July 13, I was honored to join my colleagues in the U.S. House of Representatives in passing the Fannie Lou Hamer, Rosa Parks, and Coretta Scott King Voting Rights Act Reauthorization and Amendment Acts of 2006.

This important legislation, known as the VRA, was first enacted in

During the 1960s, many brave men and women fought against bigotry and injustice to secure the right to vote for all Americans. The price paid by those allied with the Civil Rights Movement was high: churches were burned and bombed, people were beaten and shot, and some were killed. Among the brave people fighting for voting rights was Fannie Lou Hamer of Mississippi. She was a sharecropper and the granddaughter of slaves. In 1962, at age 44, she was surprised to learn from civil rights workers that African Americans actually had a constitutional right to vote. When the workers asked for volunteers to go to the courthouse to register to vote, Hamer was the first to raise her hand. After she got to the courthouse, she was jailed and beaten by police. She began to receive death threats and was even shot at. But, undeterred, Hamer became a civil rights activist and spent the next three years traveling around the country speaking out on voting rights.

Since the passage of the VRA, many discriminatory practices and barriers to political participation have been eliminated, enfranchising millions of racial, ethnic, and language minority citizens.

Sadly, in spite of these advances, this landmark legislation is still needed today. The fact remains that hate groups continue to exist in this country and unscrupulous politicians, for their own political advantage, continue efforts to disenfranchise vulnerable voters.

Just last month, on June 28, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in GI Forum v. Texas that a 2003 redistricting plan in Texas Congressional District 23 violated the voting rights of Latino voters. The Supreme Court ruling was a resounding affirmation of the need for the Voting Rights Act.

The National Commission on the Voting Rights Act recently released a report which highlighted a troubling pattern of voter discrimination against minority citizens across the nation. Without a complete reauthorization of the VRA, key provisions that protect against these abuses will

One key provision that will expire is Section 203. Voting instructions and ballot information can be confusing even for the native-born, fluent in English. Section 203 ensures that tax-paying American citizens, who are not fluent English speakers, receive the language assistance they need in order to participate in the election process through well-informed choices. The ability to vote in an informed way will also encourage greater voter participation.

Another key provision set to expire in 2007 is Section 5. Section 5 requires certain states, with a history of discriminatory practices, to get permission from the Justice Department prior to changing their election process. This is a necessary safeguard against the potential disenfrachisement of poor and minority voters living in these states.

The Voting Rights Act continues to be as relevant today as it was in 1965. Discrimination today may take a different form than it did in 1965, but the fact remains that discrimination still exists in 2006. As the model of Democracy for the world, we cannot afford to lose one of the fundamental expressions of our democracy-open, free and unencumbered elections.

Now that the House has acted, I urge my colleagues in the U.S. Senate to support the full reauthorization of the Voting Rights Act. While substantial progress has been made in the area of voting rights over the last 41 years, we must continue our efforts to protect the rights of every American







Next up for the series: The Rockit Scientists on July 26. All concerts are free and begin at 7:00. So bring your lawn chairs and enjoy some musi-




