### Polka band to entertain at Furman Park concert

The Main Street Polka Band members have all been part of the world famous Disneyland Band at one point or another. Formed 15 years ago the band has entertained at the Orange County Performing Arts Center, Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest, The Phoenix Club, and Lake Arrowhead Village Oktoberfest, among other events.

The polka was originally a Czech peasant dance, developed in Eastern Bohemia (now part of Czech Republic). Bohemian historians believe that the polka was invented by a peasant girl named Anna Slezak in Labska Tynice in 1834 one Sunday for her amusement. It was composed to a folk song "Strycek Nimra Koupil Simla (Uncle Nimra Brought a White

Anna called the step "Madera" because of its quickness and liveliness. Of all the dances originating in the nineteenth-century, the only one that has survived is the polka. After the initial enthusiasm, the polka gradually declined in popularity and reached a low point with the introduction of ragtime, jazz, and the new dances of the twentieth century.

After World War II, however, Polish immigrants to the United States adopted the polka as their "national" dance. It is also extremely popular with many other Americans who have succumbed to the new polka craze popularized by Lawrence Welk and other post-war bands.

The Downey Museum of Art will be open before the concert and the Downey Rose Float Association will sell food for visitors to enjoy.

### Car-to-car shooting kills woman in South Gate

**SOUTH GATE** – Police are searching for the person responsible in the shooting death of a woman as she drove along a street in South Gate this week.

The same suspect is also accused of shooting at another vehicle

moments before firing on the woman.

The fatal shooting occurred about 8:20 p.m. Tuesday at Southern and Elizabeth avenues. Police say the suspect was riding in a car with three other people when he opened fire on a passing vehicle. There were no injuries in that case, said Sgt. John Hocking of the Sheriff's Headquarters Bureau.

Seconds after that shooting, the woman drove by and the suspect opened fire on her. She was taken to a nearby hospital where she died.

Authorities are withholding the woman's name while they notify family.

# Council OK's grants to local organizations

■ Eight community nonprofit groups will share more than \$144,000.

DOWNEY-The City Council Tuesday approved Community Development Block Grant Subrecipient Agreements with a number of public service agencies, all of them repeat recipients, that provide a variety of services to the community. The services provided are "consistent with needs identified in the City-approved 5-Year Consolidated Plan." The CDBG funds come from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and total \$144,500.

The distribution of the grant funds is as follows: ARC of Southeast L.A. County, \$11,500; Children's Dental Health Clinic, \$3,500; Downey Unified School District, \$35,000; Rio Hondo Temporary Home, \$17,500; Southern California Rehabilitation Services, Inc. (SCRS): \$69,000; Salvation Army Southeast Communities Corp., \$3,000; Su Casa Family Crisis and Support Center, \$2,500; and Southeast Los Angeles County Workforce Investment Board, \$3,000.

Arc's grant of \$11,500 will supplement a job training and employment program for persons with mental and developmental disabilities. The \$3,500 going to Children's Dental Health Clinic is for general and specialized dental care for children of low-income families.

DUSD will use its allocation for two programs: its 10-20 Outreach Program, which offers group support and counseling services, family counseling, and crisis intervention for kids between the ages of 10 and 20 years; and True Lasting Connection (TLC) Family Resource Center, which provides bimonthly health screenings and checkups for children from low-income families.

The Rio Hondo Temporary Home provides temporary housing for homeless families.

The Salvation Army's Southeast Communities Corp. component provides a series of emergency services to low-income families who become homeless or are at-risk of becoming homeless.

The bulk of SCRS funding (\$65,000) is for its Home Modification Program, especially as it involves persons with physical disabilities. Su Casa provides transitional housing shelter for women and their children, who are victims of domestic violence.

Southeast Los Angeles County WIB assists the Community Youth Corps Program, targeting 17-21 year olds who meet the "at-risk" criteria. In other action, the council:

•Approved an amendment to the existing agreement with Long Beach

The Tax Increase Prevention and Reconciliation Act signed into law by President Bush in May contains good news for investors with taxable capital gains and dividend income. It also offers upper-income taxpayers a Roth IRA conversion opportunity and extends immediate relief from the Alternative Minimum Tax. The law has its downsides, too. One of these will raise revenues by expanding the reach of the "kiddie tax" on unearned income from assets owned by a child. A look at the specifics can help you better gauge how these provisions may affect you tax liability and influence your planning both now and in the years ahead.

Capital gains and dividends. The new legislation extends favorable tax rates on long-term capital gains and qualified dividends to the end of 2010. Under legislation passed in 2003, tax rates on capital gains and dividends were reduced to 15% for middle- and upper-income taxpayers but were scheduled to revert to their former higher rates at the end of 2008. The extension gives them the same expiration date as other provisions of the 2003 law.

Keep in mind that capital gains on assets held for less than one year continue to be taxed as ordinary income, as do dividends distributed by some real estate investment trusts and certain tax-exempt organizations. Additional rules apply to dividends on shares owned for less than a required minimum holding period and on shares involved in hedging transactions.

With lower individual marginal tax rates, marriage penalty relief, and the temporary repeal of the estate tax all due to expire at the end of 2010, Congress will face still more difficult tax policy decisions down the road. That is why it may be a good idea to take a longer-term view of your tax situation and, in doing so, consider the potential impact that higher tax rates may have on your overall financial affairs in the years to come.

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

# Fresh emphasis at the 'Y' on good nutrition

DOWNEY-After giving two lectures in August for all staff and members, new Downey Family YMCA nutritionist Magnolia Hurtado is scheduled to conduct a six-week nutritional program in September for 25 families from the membership base, preschool, after school and Downey staff. The program, made possible by a grant from the Kaiser Foundation, is designed to help families live healthy lifestyles by changing their eating habits.

**DOWNEY**—The city of Downey urges all residents to take precautions to prevent heat-related illness—and to be alert for elderly neighbors and others who may need special assistance to survive the extreme heat.

Children, the elderly, and people with chronic ailments are usually the first to suffer from the heat. Heat exhaustion, cramps, or in extreme cases, heat stroke, can result from prolonged exposure to these conditions. During extended heat waves, people are advised to stay in the coolest area available and limit exposure to the sun; drink plenty of water; and wear loose, lightweight and light-colored clothing.

Downey residents are also urged to check on neighbors that may be at risk or do not have access to air conditioning.

Two air-conditioned city facilities are currently available as daytime and evening cooling stations:





# Legislative resolution salutes role of museums

**DOWNEY**—With the recent heightened focus in Downey on 'quality of life' issues, the transmittal the other day to *The Downey Patriot* by Downey Museum of Art executive director Kate Davies *of* a copy of a resolution passed by the California Legislature designating 2006 as the Year of the California Museum, which delineates the vital role California museums play in the life of an enlightened, vibrant community, couldn't have come at a better time.

Noting that California is home to over 1,300 museums that are located in every county and region throughout the state and which serve over 26 million visitors annually, the resolution avers: "California museums nourish minds and spirits by fostering contemplation, exploration, critical thinking, and dialogue to advance knowledge, understanding and appreciation of history, science, the arts, and the natural world."

It goes on to say, "California museums encourage curiosity and provide a source of enjoyment and education for every generation and every community across the state and enhance those provided by the public sector." Further, California museums "strengthen and enrich the lives of people by inspiring lifelong learning, serving as repositories and stewards for the state's unique histories, culture, achievements and values."

The resolution also pointed out that California museums "present exhibitions and programs created through research and scholarship for California residents and visitors to the state to explore new ideas, exchange stories, and discover collections and objects from our culture and natural heritage."

Thus, California museums "forge relationships with community partners such as schools, libraries, public broadcasting, and neighborhood and social service organizations to foster civic participation and cultural understanding."

A point Davies has repeatedly stressed in the past about the seldom-appreciated economic impact of museums finds pertinent expression in the resolution: "California museums contribute significantly to the livability and economic vitality of the state and its communities and attract tourists and local visitors, all of whom create a demand for services."

The resolution includes "a multitude of disciplines and learning experiences, including art museums, zoos, aquaria, historical societies, science centers, botanical gardens, children's museums, and cultural centers" in "California museums" embrace.

The fact that California museums are "accessible to all residents with one-half of the state's museums providing free admission to adults and others offering free admission days" is not missed by the Legislature.

This being commemorated nationwide as the Year of the Museum, the Legislature also sought fit to acknowledge the contribution of, and exhortation from, the California Association of Museums: "The California Association of Museums has served to bring important recognition of this commemorative year and invites all museums, museum service organizations, California residents, and local governments to use this milestone to recognize and celebrate the contributions of California museums as they serve communities, the nation and the world."


Taslitz received his bachelor's degree in political science from Roosevelt University in Illinois and his master's degree in history from Northwestern University, also in Illinois.

# Middle school teachers learn Hollywood 'magic'

■ Two West Middle School teachers learn to 'think and create' like movie producers.

DOWNEY-Two teachers from the Downey Unified School District—West Middle School's Diane Bow and Karen Kordenur—along with 56 other teachers at area public schools, have just completed a special three-day training project at the American Film Institute (AFI) in Los Angeles, where they learned how to think and create like movie producers, directors and editors.

### Ask the Contractors Board

Q: Yesterday a contractor came to my door and said since he was in the neighborhood he wanted to give me a free estimate on new windows for my home. At first I agreed. Then he really started pressuring me, saying my old windows were in really bad shape and were in danger of leaking. So, I signed a contract to have it done. Since then I have found a much better deal with someone else. Is there anything I can do to get out of the first contract?

A: Yes, but only if you hurry! California's Home Solicitation Sales Act gives you until midnight of the third business day after you sign the contract to cancel it. This includes all days except Sunday and major holidays.

The purpose is to protect consumers from the pressure they get to make an immediate purchasing decision from someone gong door-to-door. Unless the contract is negotiated at the contractor's place of business, the buyer qualifies for the three-day right to cancel. The notice must be in writing and can be a letter, telegram or even a FAX sent to the address specified in the contract. Make sure the language clearly states that you are canceling the contract.

In the future, be sure to take your time when hiring a contractor, and get three bids before choosing a contractor for home improvements. This will ensure you get the most for your money and don't get scammed by an unlicensed or unscrupulous contractor. You should always be skeptical when someone shows up at your front door and pressures you into signing a contract.

Q: I am having a pool installed. The contractor said he could offer a better deal if I paid in cash. Is this okay?

A: The Contractors Board recommends that you never pay a contractor in cash. Unless you get a receipt, it's tough to trace the payment, and if something goes wrong you have little proof or recourse. By law, a swimming pool contractor can require only 10 percent down or \$1,000, whichever is less, as a down payment.

It's also important that you don't pay upfront for materials before they're delivered or for work that hasn't been completed. In fact, be sure that the down payment and subsequent payment schedule are clearly written out in your contract. This is the best way to protect yourself from being taken advantage of by a fraudulent or unlicensed contractor.

Q: I want to file a complaint against a contractor who didn't do the job that we agreed on in our original contract. I've tried talking with him. But he won't make the necessary corrections. How do I file the complaint and who do I talk to?

A: Since your contract is in writing, you may have a stronger case against this contractor because you can show proof of the work he agreed to do. Log on to the CSLB website at www.cslb.ca.gov and download a complaint form, which you can print out and mail to the Board. You can also call 1-800-321-CSLB (2752) to request a form be sent to you. Be sure that you attach copies of all relevant documents with the complaint form.

The CSLB offers mediation and arbitrations services and can take disciplinary action against a licensed contractor if any laws are broken. If your contractor is not licensed, there's very little the CSLB can do to help. However, we will investigate the complaint and turn over the case to the local district attorney's office for possible criminal prosecution. This is one of the reasons why it's so important to only hire a licensed contractor.
