Family escapes injury from wayward SUV

DOWNEY – A woman sleeping in her apartment narrowly escaped injury last week when an SUV possibly driven by a drunk driver careened off a freeway off-ramp and into her apartment, authorities said.

The vehicle flew off the Lakewood Blvd. off-ramp from the north-bound Santa Ana (5) Freeway last and crashed into the building last Friday about 1:40 a.m., according to the California Highway Patrol.


The driver fled the scene and, as of press time, was still at large. Firefighters responding to the accident reported finding alcohol inside the vehicle, but that claim could not be verified by police.

The SUV plowed through bushes and trees when it crashed into the apartment building on Lindell Ave. The vehicle came to a stop feet from where the woman was sleeping.

Her two children, who were also inside the apartment, were not hurt. The crash caused an estimated \$25,000 to \$30,000 in damage to the building, authorities said.

Downey Regional sells Golden Outlook

"Golden Outlook has a rich history of serving the mature population of Downey with unparalleled service and commitment. "It's a perfect fit for our growing network."

No layoffs

Surendra Jain, MD, chief medical officer of AppleCare Medical said the 20-plus staff members will remain with Golden Outlook, most of which are sales and customer service representatives. It will remain based in Downey, and will service the communities in the surrounding areas as well, including Whittier, South Gate, Lynwood, Santa Fe Springs, Montebello and others.

Golden Outlook represents SCAN Health Plan, Secure Horizons, Citizens Choice, Health Net and Blue Shield.

"Golden Outlook has served the community for many years and has played a pivotal role in helping our area's residents obtain the right health plan for them," said Mario Guerra, chairman of the board of Golden Outlook. "By joining with the physicians of AppleCare, we will be able to seamlessly provide better and more services to our members."

General Manager

As part of the purchase announcement, AppleCare Medical Management also appointed Michael Blea as General Manager of Golden Outlook. He will oversee the integration of Golden Outlook into the growing network of AppleCare-affiliated physicians. Blea was formerly Director of Sales for Secure Horizons.

Conductor Osborn dies suddenly

■ Downey Symphony, still shocked by the loss of its longtime leader, will go ahead with concert season.

DOWNEY – Thomas Osborn, the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Downey Symphony at the Downey Theater, is dead. He died suddenly of what is believed to have been a heart attack, Sunday, July 30.

A memorial service will be held on Saturday, Aug. 12, at Forest Lawn Hollywood Hills at the Hall of Liberty. He was 72.

Recognizing his enthusiasm in bringing fine orchestral music to the Downey community, the Symphony Board is proceeding with plans to present the Concert in the Park Wednesday, Aug. 9, as well as three regular series programs, under guest conductors, already scheduled for the 2006-07 season in the Civic Theater.

"We are proceeding in the spirit that Tom would want," said symphony board member Harold Tseklenis. "This is a deep loss for us and for the city, but Tom would be appreciative that we are determined to continue the programs he worked with such vitality to bring to this community."

Board treasurer Bill Hare added, "Tom Osborn did a wonderful job developing the Music in the Schools program over the last 10 years. The Quintet and full orchestra performances have touched thousands of our school children, who came to know and love Tom. They were comfortable talking to him, and they learned so much about music because of him.

"He leaves a rich heritage."

A dedicated musician, Osborn had served as a Professor of Music at Pepperdine University in Malibu, as well as Music Director and Conductor of the Pepperdine University Symphony and Musical Director for fall musicals.

During the spring months he performed as clarinetist and narrator with the Music in the Schools program, which ensures students in Downey are exposed to the basics of music and the classical traditions.

Starting with third grade, the youngsters first are visited on their campuses by the Downey Symphony Quintet, and later the full symphony orchestra in concert at the Downey Theater.

From 1970 to 1981 he directed the Valley Youth Orchestra at CSU Northridge. He served on the boards of the American Symphony Orchestra League, the Association of California Symphony Orchestras, and the Conductors Guild.

Osborn's conducting ranged from professional to youth orchestras and from opera to musicals. He has conducted orchestras nationally and also in Hawaii, Italy and Seoul, Korea, and at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland

In lieu of flowers, Osborn's family suggested contributions be made to The Downey Symphony, P.O. Box 763, Downey, CA 90241.

Thousands of gallons of tar spill onto street

■ Truck reportedly loses control after making improper, and perhaps illegal, lane change and turn.

DOWNEY - On Tuesday morning, Aug. 1, a truck hauling about 3000-3600 gallons of tar overturned on Imperial Hwy. near Lakewood Blvd., spilling its load onto the street.

The truck driver was heading northbound on Lakewood to meet with clients at Sully-Miller Contracting Co. in South Gate when he made an improper lane change and turn onto Imperial, causing the accident, authorities at the scene said.

The accident occurred at 8:12 a.m. and Downey Fire and Police Department were called on soon after.

About 26 Downey fire personnel, along with the Downey Police Department, people from Downey Public Works, hazardous materials teams from Santa Fe Springs and Vernon, as well as private contactors who were hired to clean up the mess, all responded to the scene.

After sealing off the street, Santa Fe Springs and Vernon Hazardous Materials Teams drilled two holes in the overturned truck's tank, and hoses were used to suck out the remaining tar left in the tank. About 200 gallons of tar and several pounds of concrete encircled the truck, which took hours to remove.

John Miller from Pan Pacific Petroleum was in charge of the cleanup and said the tar was to be picked up and placed in barrels before being disposed of properly at a plant in South Gate.

Wes Owens of Paramount Petroleum, another private contracting company assisting in the cleanup effort, said "[Downey Police and Fire Departments] got here fast, and blocked everything."

Jaime Abrego, also from Paramount Petroleum, agreed, saying the Downey Fire Department did "an outstanding job."

It was a hot summer night, and we had already seen our quota of four applicants, but that night there was a fifth. At 10 p.m., we opened the door one more time, and in bounded Tom Osborn.

He exuded the same enthusiasm and knowledgeability that he came to show at all our concert previews and our Music in the Schools programs. From that moment on, my mind was made up. And after a season of guest conductors, with evaluations from audience and orchestra members, we unanimously made the right choice – Tom Osborn.

He made a great contribution to the status of the Downey Symphony among regional orchestras in Southern California, and we will miss



Behr's absence hurts progress on museum

DOWNEY—Loren Behr, who was hired by the City Council two 1/2 years ago to help to manage, create and design Downey's tribute to more than 70 years of aerospace heritage, has left his Downey job for a museum position in Northern California.

City employees told The Patriot Thursday Behr had said he had another job opening in Northern California—also running a museum.

He then left town after a brief employee farewell party.

Scott Pomrehn, Assistant to the City Manager, must now shoulder the main load of overseeing the center's construction in coordination with various City officials.

The City and Behr had appealed to the public in the form of a letter which ran in part in the Patriot edition of July 21.

Behr wrote movingly of the 70 years of living history in which the former NASA/Boeing property was on the cutting edge of aviation and space science.

"Over the course of that history, Downey was at one time, the most prolific producer of war planes in the country, was at the forefront of missile development and testing, and made a unique and enduring contribution to the nation's space exploration program.

Developed by the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center—part of the City of Downey—the Downey Aviation History Archive is a way to gather memories, stories, anecdotes, history of the site and preserve Downey's heritage as a site of aeronautic and space innovation.

The archive can be found on the Internet at http://aviationhistor-yarchive.org/. There, former NASA or employees of any company who worked at or near the site during the great years can log on and record their thoughts for posterity. The general public is also welcome to read the stories

Allotment of land

Today, the former NASA property is in the process of development by the plan which includes a 30 acre Kaiser Permanente Medical Center which will include a huge emergency ward, a large commercial retail development (called Downey Landing) including Best Buy, Old Navy and Elephant Bar and Restaurant, plus many more, a large motion picture filming facility Downey Studios, plus space for mixed retail and home development, and an "out-back" lot adjacent to the studio of about 78 acres Labor problems have shaken the local film industry.

Behr's salary was paid until recently by funding allocated by Congress for the learning center and museum. But that \$3.5 million grant was nearly exhausted.

The Learning Center and Museum plans were nearly complete. The two story center was meant for three acres in a 13.5 acre public park near the southwest corner of the facility's main gate. But city spokesmen have consistently said that completion of the structure itself will require contributions from the private sector.

Social Security: 71 years strong

■ Social Security a great American success story, but Republican proposals threaten to dismantle it.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Seventy-one years ago, Democrats created Social Security to provide retirement security for all Americans. In 1935, bank failures and a stock market crash wiped out the savings of millions of Americans. Old age meant poverty and dependence. When President Franklin Delano Roosevelt signed the historic measure into law in August of that year, he envisioned that Social Security would provide benefits to workers that they had earned during their working years, which in turn would allow them to retire with dignity and independence. Today, it is clear that Social Security has succeeded in meeting President Roosevelt's

Social Security is a great American success story that safeguards Americans' economic security when they get older. Social Security has provided more than 70 years of rock solid, guaranteed benefits - providing financial security to millions of seniors, surviving spouses, and people with disabilities. Right now, one out of every four households receives monthly benefits from Social Security - 33 million Americans receive retirement benefits, and another 15 million receive survivors and disability benefits. More than 4.4 million of these Social Security beneficiaries live in California.

Democrats have fought to strengthen Social Security to better help America's families. In the 1950s, we added disability benefits. In the 1960s, we created Medicare to guarantee health care for our seniors. In 1983, Democrats worked with President Reagan in a bipartisan way to come up with a plan to make sure that Social Security would be there for generations to come. In the 1990s, Democrats fought to restore fiscal responsibility, and we saved every penny of the Social Security surplus for several years in order to strengthen Social Security.

However, as many in Congress have fought to strengthen Social Security, risky proposals to privatize Social Security threaten to undermine its very existence. Last year, President Bush's top priority was a Social Security plan that would dismantle Social Security and cut its guaranteed benefits. And further, it would increase our national debt by \$5 trillion over 20 years, passing the bill onto our children and grandchildren. Overall, it would drain trillions from Social Security and make it harder to pay guaranteed benefits.

Despite opposition by the American public that forced Republicans to temporarily put aside their plan, the Bush Administration and Congressional Republicans quietly persist with efforts to privatize Social Security. This year's budget sets aside \$712 billion over the next 10 years for Social Security privatization. In July, when the President updated his budget, it contained Social Security private accounts. Further, top Administration officials and Republican congressional leaders have said several times that they plan to try again to privatize Social Security after the 2006 election.

On its 71st anniversary, American families can truly celebrate the success of Social Security. After all, Social Security has never failed to pay promised benefits. It has never been a day late or a dollar short, and I along with my Democratic colleagues will continue to fight to make sure its great success continues for generations to come.



'No' to Medi-Cal funding cut proposal

Dear Editor:

The federal government's recent proposal to cut funding to the Medicaid program (Medi-Cal in California) by \$12.2 billion over the next five years would drastically impact health services in Los Angeles County. Low-income children, elderly and disabled residents would be particularly short-changed by those cutbacks, but the quality of care for all citizens would be undermined as well.

Our five hospitals, outpatient clinics and public/private clinic partners serve more than 715,000 individuals per year. Our hospitals provided 551,000 days of hospital care, 276,000 emergency room visits and 1,880,000 outpatient visits last year. County hospitals operate trauma centers used by all Los Angeles County residents. We operate one of four burn treatment centers in Southern California, and train physicians, nurses, and other health professionals through 162 teaching affiliation agreements.

As the major provider of safety net services in Los Angeles County, we depend on Med-Cal funding to maintain these programs for all patients, not just Medi-Cal patients. In the 2006-2007 budget year, we expect to receive \$814 million in State and Federal Medi-Cal funds to support the care we provide. Any reduction in these amounts will reduce access to services in a county where 33 percent of residents are uninsured.

Gov. Schwarzenegger and our California senators and representatives have written to Health and Human Services Secretary Michael O. Leavitt, asking him to not move forward with administrative policies to reduce Medicaid (Medi-Cal) payments that have been rejected previously by Congress. The governor points out in his letter that cuts would impact services for 6.5 million Californians and could impact billions of dollars in services to children, nursing homes, and hospitals.

I urge your readers to write to Secretary Leavitt, President Bush and their congressional representatives to oppose these proposals. –Bruce A. Chernoff, M.D.,

Local athlete getting her kicks in overseas

DOWNEY – Starting at the tender age of five years old, this Downey resident made her mark and made it to the top. Anna Maria Picarelli recently signed a one year professional contract sending her to Verona, Italy where she will play for CF Bardolino, a top ranked women's professional soccer team in the very controversial Serie A league.

The contract she said is almost like going to college. The team is to pay for her housing, food, travel to the country and around with the team, and an undisclosed amount of spending money for the 21-year-old goal-

Before reaching the pros, Picarelli ran the gauntlet of levels in the soccer hierarchy beginning at home.

Playing soccer at a very young age, Picarelli started her career in the Downey AYSO league. During her young start, she played for the "Good and Plenty" where she originally was a forward for the team. She says that before she was old enough to play for AYSO, she would go to her brother's game and want to play so badly that she would run on to the field and try and play.

It was then that she begged her parents to be put on a team. Her parents told her not yet because she was too young. Soon enough, she found herself running up and down the field trying to kick soccer balls into defenders' hands inside the goal box so she could kick penalty shots.

From AYSO she went on to play club soccer in the Cerritos Regional Soccer Club where she participated with one of the top youth female teams in Southern California, "Infinity." Just before she joined the team, she learned how to play goaltender. While playing on another team, their goaltender was injured. The coach looked around for an athletic body to put in front of the goal. By chance, that body was her. Ever since, she has been "stuck in the goal" as she says, but makes sure to say she enjoys

During the school year, she played four years of varsity ball for Saint Joseph High School in Lakewood. After a very successful club and high school career, Picarelli continued her playing days at Pepperdine University in Malibu. Her time in college was spent starting as the team's goalkeeper where she helped the team reach the NCAA tournament every year she was there.

Her team, during her freshman year, was successful enough to reach the Sweet 16 in the tournament, that being the first time in the school's women's soccer team history.

She reiterates stories of going to Wisconsin and Michigan for matches during the tournament.

"We were sent half way across the country to play in the snow," she said. "Keep in mind the whole team is from Southern California. During halftime, the tents had fires. Some of the team burned their socks and jackets because we got too close."

After college, still feeling the passion for the game, she was invited to play on AJAX America, a semi-pro team of the Women's Premier Soccer League based in Rancho Palos Verdes, Calif.

The team was invited to play in an international women's club tournament in Seoul, South Korea where they placed second behind international power house China.

This month, AJAX America will be competing for the US National Title in Utah against the best teams from each region of the United States.

It was on this team that she met a player who knew the coach to CF Bardolino. She said that making the pro team was an interesting adven-

"It totally took me off guard because the way I got there was really strange," Picarelli said. "We called the coach and said 'We know a girl that plays with you guys,' and told him that I was a goalkeeper. He said to come try out."

Picarelli then flew out to Verona where she met someone to pick her up and take her to the team's facilities. The team ran her through an hour's worth of drills and exercises then made their decision.

"The coach came up and talked to me and said 'Welcome to the club! How much do you want to get paid?""

The confused goalkeeper said that she really shouldn't talk to him about it and that they should contact her father. The confusion came from the team not even blinking about the decision to make her an addition.

"Once we worked out the contract, I finally realized this would be really cool because I get to go live in Italy and play soccer over there."

Also according to her mom, Picarelli is excited about playing professionally in Italy and hopes to earn a starting spot.

She plans to play in Italy until the reinstatement of the US women's professional league and return home to play once again in front of her close friends and family.

The Serie A league has been in the news as of late due to the success of Italy in the 2006 World Cup where the men took the title over France in a shootout.

Much controversy shrouded the game as French player Zinadine Zidane head butted an Italian player.

The Serie A league has also been noted as having some teams wrapped up in a match-fixing scandal. Juventus FC, AC Milan, SS Lazio, and ACF Fiorentina were put under trial, along with the referee designators and league managers.

The trial took away the last two titles from Juventus, put Milan out of European cups, and sent Juventus, Lazio and Fiorentina to Serie B.

After appeals, Lazio and Fiorentina were reinstated back into Serie A.

Former Downey QB signs with Buccaneers

DOWNEY - Justin Phinisee, a former football standout at Downey High School, has come to terms on a contract with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

He is expected to play cornerback and some special teams.

He went on to play at Oregon, where he recorded 183 tackles, three sacks and seven interceptions. He started 29 games at different positions and was named the Gordon E. Wilson Award winner for most outstanding special teams player.

He also earned first-team All-Pac 10 honors as a cornerback last year. Phinisee was drafted in the seventh round.




COLIN'S CORNER By Colin Clarke When In Doubt...

Home values have been rising, and while some homeowners have been able to capitalize, others are suffering from "sticker shock" when they see their property tax bill. Property tax - the biggest source of income for most local governments - is the biggest expense for most homeowners outside of mortgage payments. Lenders may keep a portion of your payments in escrow to pay those taxes on your behalf, so you might not be aware of how your tax is determined, and whether it's accurate. Because there are various ways to calculate property tax, errors can sneak in. The National Taxpayers Union claims that up to sixty percent of property may be over-assessed, but only one in fifty owners ever challenge their appraisal. It's wise to confirm the data upon which the tax is based, like your home's square footage and number of bedrooms. Make an appointment or check online with the assessment office. You can check your property card, compare your neighbor's cards, and get an explanation of how your home's value is calculated. A good place to start is with the Taxpayers National (www.ntu.org) booklet on fighting property taxes. Then it should just take a few hours to figure out it


