Charter Ball proceeds to benefit capital drive

 Hospital officials hope to raise funds for new \$60 million patient facility, currently under design.

DOWNEY—In support of Downey Regional Medical Center's plans to build a world-class Patient Care Tower on its campus, the DRMC Memorial Trust Foundation has announced that proceeds from the Nov. 4 Charter Ball are earmarked for it. The Foundation's "Rise to the Challenge" capital campaign aims to raise \$60 million.

Now in the design phase, the proposed state-of-the-art facility will further the hospital's mission of providing quality care, from preventive medicine to diagnostics, therapy and recovery services as well as dignified end-of-life care, hospital officials said.

Spacious private rooms will capture natural light and insulate patients from noise while its homelike setting will not only house the latest medical technology, it will offer guests modern conveniences such as Internet and e-mail.

It will integrate holistic, evidence-based medical services that build on existing service excellence in cardiology, oncology and obstetrics. The facility will be equipped with sophisticated imaging and diagnostics, and innovative surgical suites, designed with the flexibility to incorporate advances in the 21st century.

Further, hospital officials say it will help DRMC attract tomorrow's top-caliber healthcare professionals to a highly desirable work environment.

DRMC's current facility opened in 1969. While it has been well-maintained and major refurbishments are even now underway, it does not comply with seismic laws that will be enacted in the next decade.

The 31st annual Charter Ball will be held at the Hyatt Regency Huntington Beach Resort and Spa, and will feature Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member and former Supreme Mary Wilson. For reservations/information, call 904-5055.

Murder-suicide suspected in restaurant shooting

DOWNEY – Downey police are investigating the shooting deaths of a man and his estranged wife outside a local restaurant as a murder-suicide, authorities said this week.

The shooting occurred about 11 p.m. Monday outside the Acapulco restaurant in Stonewood Center, said Downey police Sgt. Kathleen Mendoza.

Investigators said the couple had been separated for three months but both attended a family birthday party at the restaurant Monday, arriving separately. The woman, identified as 36-year-old Marisela Hernandez, reportedly told a friend she felt uncomfortable because her husband had been staring at her throughout the night.

Hernandez left the restaurant about 11 p.m. with a friend but was followed into the parking lot by her husband.

Downey police say the husband then pulled a gun and ordered Hernandez into his car, where he allegedly shot her several times at pointblank range before turning the gun on himself.

The couple both suffered gunshot wounds to the head and were pronounced dead at the scene, police said.

The name of the man was not released and the investigation into the shooting is ongoing.

cine, medical residency gives in-depth training within a specific branch of medicine. Residents focus almost entirely on the care of hospitalized or clinic patients, mostly with direct supervision by more senior physicians.

DRMC's Family Practice Internship and Residency Program, a postgraduate program for Doctors of Osteopathy (D.O.s), has graduated more than 200 interns and residents since it came to DRMC in 1994.

Osteopathy is an approach to medicine that uses common medical procedures, but it places a greater emphasis on understanding the relationship between the organs, muscles, nerves, tissues, bones and tendons than traditional medical training does.

A Doctor of Osteopathy must complete four years of medical school plus an internship and residency. Throughout their training, interns and residents are exposed to numerous medical subspecialties.

DOWNEY – Downey police arrested three people last week after they allegedly shot a man while attempting to steal his bicycle.

Two men and a juvenile were arrested and charged with robbery and attempted murder, Downey Police said.

The victim was riding his bicycle home about 9:30 p.m. Saturday near the intersection of Imperial Hwy. and Paramount Blvd. when he was approached by a man demanding the bicyle, according to police reports.

When the victim refused and began to ride away, one of the suspects shot the victim in the back, police said.

The suspects then placed the bicycle in the back of a SUV and drove away, reports said.

The victim walked home and called police, which eventually led to the capture of the suspects.

The victim was listed in stable condition at a nearby hospital.

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DRMC 'fostering a healing environment'

• Hospital adds new mattresses in effort to head off skin ulcers.

DOWNEY—In the latest of numerous improvements to Downey Regional Medical Center facilities, 145 new mattresses are now in place—on the second, third and fouth floors, with the Anderson Critical Care Center receiving them in the coming weeks. The motivation? Make the hospital's beds more comfortable, as well as prevent patients' skin ulcers.

A pressure ulcer is an area of skin that breaks down when the patient stays in one position for too long without shifting his/her weight. A pressure ulcer starts as reddened skin but gets progressively worse, forming a blister, then an open sore, and finally a crater. The most common places for pressure ulcers are over bony prominences (bones close to the skin) like the elbow, heels, hips, ankles, shoulders, back, and the back of the head.

"While the state average for hospital-acquired pressure ulcers is nearly twice as high as DRMC's rate, our objective is to get the incidences of pressure ulcers as low as we can," said Theresa Mastalski, Nursing Director of the ICU/CCU and Endoscopy, who chairs the DRMC Pressure Ulcer Committee.

Research by the committee showed that the AccuMax Quantum Convertible mattress was the best for pressure relief.

Additional actions included staff education on how to assess, measure, photograph and document pressure ulcers; development and education on pressure ulcer procedures and preventive measures; and the creation of "skin experts" on each unit.

Last month, DRMC acquired new flat screens televisions for all patients' rooms. Re-walling, re-flooring and re-refurbishing throughout the hospital, spanning several months, is nearing completion.

Downey woman killed in chain-reaction crash

DOWNEY – A chain-reaction crash in south San Gabriel killed three people last week, including a 60-year-old Downey woman, authorities said.

Angela Yip was riding in a car traveling southbound on Rosemead Blvd. about 9:10 p.m. Saturday when a 1990 Cadillac veered into oncoming traffic and crashed into another vehicle traveling in the opposite direction, according to the California Highway Patrol.

A total of four cars were involved in the accident. Yip was a passenger in a 1999 Nissan Maxima. The driver of the car, an unidentified 59-year-old Downey man, was critically injured.

The two occupants of the Cadillac were killed in the accident.

Gunman escapes after holding up Food4Less

DOWNEY – One person was hospitalized Tuesday after suffering injuries in an early-morning robbery at the Food4Less grocery store in Downey.

A gunman entered the store at the intersection of Lakewood Blvd. and Rosecrans Ave. about 2 a.m. Tuesday as employees were preparing to close, Downey Police Sgt. Kathleen Mendoza said.

A store employee was apparently pistol-whipped in the face and needed to be transferred to a hospital, according to early reports. There were seven to 10 employees in the store at the time of the robbery.

Police set up a perimeter in the area but the gunman escaped. It was not immediately clear whether anything was taken in the robbery.

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

Lincoln is an American luxury automobile brand, operated under Ford Motor Company. Downey Ford remains open.

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
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



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Dr. Dal Stauffer inducted into Diving Hall of Fame

DOWNEY—Dr. Floyd "Dal" Stauffer, husband of philanthropist Dr. Mary Stauffer and a diving legend, was inducted into the International Masters Swimming (and Diving) Hall of Fame last Friday, Aug. 4, at ceremonies held at Stanford University in Palo Alto.

Dal Stauffer has been diving since he was 8, and what the sport has meant to him all these years is revealed in an accompanying piece by his granddaughter, Alison Blowers. A recent graduate of Boston University, Alison says he has won over 140 medals competing in Masters Tournaments and been in meets all over the world.

It's a matter of record that he competed throughout college in club and AAU regional competitions, diving on occasion with a then young Sammy Lee. Upon his graduation, he was commissioned overseas near the end of the war.

Upon his return to the US he began diving for the Navy, becoming the All-Navy Diving Champion of 1947. After suffering a back injury, he realized he must stop diving for his children's well-being—he could not risk being crippled. Fifteen years were to pass when he heard a local sportsman promote the idea of the Senior Olympics.

He joined both swimming and diving competitions—and wound up losing the swim to his senior, Buster Crabbe. He fared well, however, in the diving event and began diving regularly. Ever since competing, in 1974, in the first Masters diving meet in Texas, he has been participating, coordinating and diving "for the fun of it."

Grandpa, 90, still having fun diving in spite of age

DOWNEY—"Diving is fun. It has always been fun."

Short and succinct, my grandfather, Floyd (Dal) Stauffer, was able to capture the essence of 82 years of diving experience into eight simple words. This was part of his acceptance speech at the International Masters Swimming (and Diving) Hall of Fame on Aug. 4 in Palo Alto. I was honored to attend and to celebrate with 30 of his family and friends.

While the rest of his family and I were thrilled to participate in the induction ceremony, the fun had just begun for him. A few days later Dal competed in the Masters National Championship where he became a part of history as the first man to compete in the 90-99 diving bracket. He also plans to compete next week, Aug. 13-16, in Palo Alto for the Masters World Diving Championship.

I imagine that many people would cringe if not shriek in horror if they saw their 90-year old grandfather plunge from a five-meter platform headfirst into a pool. However, when I had that opportunity this past weekend, I simply felt pride. It was spectacular to watch him perform stunts that I cannot even dream about doing. The look he had on his face while he was diving and while people were hooting and hollering was enough for anyone to tell how much fun he was having.

He has had a long and successful career since he was a teenager, and although he has lost three inches, has had nerve damage, and a hip replacement, these physical ailments are not enough to keep this "young" man from having fun.

My grandfather, Dr. Dal Stauffer, is a reminder of the importance of staying young at heart and most of all, having fun.

No one worked harder at their music craft than Tom. Hard work and dedication paid off in the faces of the children and adults he produced music for.

God bless him for all the years of dedication. May he rest at last in peace, with the knowledge of recognition by his peers.

Snow clones




Peters writes that he is already sick of hearing snow clone variations which have included "once an x, always an x," "my big fat x," or perhaps "to x or not to x.

If you have not been snowed under by this fill-in-the-blank cliché, believed coined by Glen Whitnan in 2004, be prepared for the deluge. Snow clone is believed inspired by the easymyth-based formula, if Easkimos have N words for snow, then x have y words for z. A typical snow clone is "not your father's x." Snow clone journalists have continued to fill in the blanks with such as "governor general," "lacky," "Operationa Data Store," and "cup of sake."

Snow clone collecting is a popular sport on the web in places like Language Log where a linguist at UC-Santa Cruz defines them as some assembly-required adaptable cliché frames of lazy journalists.

Others take a lighter view. A language columnist at the Chicago Tribune says snow clones are often the first thing that pop into your head. Journalism may play into the hands and minds because they pop up so easily, when you try to articulate, especially for news and media types who are rushing to meet deadlines. Snow clones are often all we have time for.





Letters to the Editor: Vigilance key to righting wrongs

Dear Editor:

I've been a tax-paying resident of Downey for 54 years. My wife and I raised five children here, and I've worked with the library and the schools for years. I've followed the changes in Downey as it matured, including the recent discussion on mansionization. I attended council meetings and attempted to influence the recent building code changes with minimal success. Now it's my turn in the barrel. I'm getting a mansion next door. I know from the recent experiences of a neighbor that, if the adjacent homeowner doesn't complain early, loud and often, the planning commission and building inspectors work for the building contractors, not the residents. That's wrong, but I've seen how it works. The place next to me has been sold and I found out that the builder plans a two-story mansion with a total area of nearly 10,000 sq. ft. on a 12,000 sq. ft. lot. The existing home, which sold for over \$1M, will be torn down. Whereas at present my neighbor's home is a single-story structure about 25 feet from my property line, it will now be a two-story wall 6 feet from my property line. And how do I know all this? Because I had the initiative to go down to the planning commission and find out. If I hadn't, nobody would have let me know what was coming. A meeting is scheduled, to which I hope to be invited because I asked to be invited. My neighbor didn't know to inquire about what was planned, and his contractor neighbor violated the building code and his own plans. The building inspector went along with it. When my neighbor complained, he was told he must complain before the foundations were put in. It was too late after they were poured. Now, what's wrong here? We have a building code, we have plan approval and we have building inspectors. But the first two are worthless unless the inspector does his job. It's not the neighbor's responsibility to do the inspector's job for him. Since I know how this works (or rather doesn't work), you can be assured I will monitor every step in the construction of the mansion next door. But why should I? When my neighbor complained to code enforcement that the code had been violated, he was told to get a lawyer and sue. If that's the way things work, we can streamline the city bureaucracy and save some city funds for police when shootouts occur. My real question is—why doesn't the city function as a representative of its residents rather than as a tool of contractors, most of whom don't live here and plan to sell their mansions for multiple family occupancy anyway? They're in it for the money and will cut every corner they can. —Don Niemand,

Anti-corruption bill passes legislature

SACRAMENTO—Authored by Assemblymember Hector De La Torre (D-50), Assembly Bill 2753 passed the Assembly Aug. 7 on a bipartisan vote of 73-0. The bill continues De La Torre's work against unethical behavior by some corrupt local officials in local governments throughout California.

AB 2753 prohibits a recalled elected official from expending or participating in any action that would commit to spend city funds between the time that the recall election is completed and the date on which the election results are certified.

In January 2003, when South Gate residents successfully recalled corrupt officials, those same officials used the certification period to award contracts to their friends and supporters, and to promote employees who were allies of the recalled city council members.

The recall attempt was successful in removing these officials from office; however it was ineffective in ending their practice of abusing city funds. After the recall election, the ousted officials had one week in office and one City Council meeting prior to the expiration of their term. During that week, they spent more than \$2 million of South Gate city funds.


Last year, De La Torre introduced AB 11 (and signed into law by Gov. Schwarzenegger) that is designed to put an end to unjustified compensation for city council members serving on city commissions, committees, associations, authorities and like entities that are created and governed by the city council members themselves. Unless otherwise specified, AB 11 requires a councilmember not to receive more than \$150 per month for serving on such commissions.

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





Services tomorrow for Thomas Osborn

DOWNEY - Thomas Osborn, a noted conductor, musician and educator, passed away Sunday, July 30 of a heart attack. He was 72 and had just returned to LAX from a trip to the North Pole with Joyce, his wife of 49 vears.

The New York-born son of Marie Louise and James Osborn received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Princeton University and a Master of Music degree in clarinet performance with highest honors from the School of Music at Yale University. Later he was awarded the degree of Doctor of Musical Arts from the School of Music at the University of Southern California and was elected to Pi Kappa Lambda Honor Society. His focus was on twentieth-century music.

During the 1960s, Osborn was a member of the music faculty at Western Washington State University in Bellingham, Washington, where he directed the Symphony and Opera programs. Upon returning to Los Angeles, he joined the faculty of the opera and symphony departments at the School of Music at USC.

During the 1970s, he taught at Los Angeles Pierce College and directed the Youth Orchestra Program at California State University, Northridge. Osborn served as a national board member of the American Symphony Orchestra League and the Conductors' Guild. He also served as a board member for the Association for California Symphony Orchestras and as State President of the Choral Conductors Guild

From 1980 to 2002, Osborn was Professor of Music at Pepperdine University, serving as Music Director and Conductor of the Pepperdine University Community Symphony and Music Director of the annual fall musicals. He was awarded the Robby Award for "1999 Best Musical Direction" for his work with the Pepperdine fall production of the musical, "Evita." During those years, he was also the principal lecturer in all areas of music history and literature.

Since 1987, Osborn was the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Downey Symphony in Downey. Each year, the students of the Downey elementary schools were treated to his school concerts, for which he performed as clarinetist and narrator with a quintet, for which he arranged all the music.

He conducted orchestras nationally and internationally, including in Hawaii, Italy, Seoul, South Korea, and the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland.

Most recently, Osborn was the Music Director and Conductor of Concertos with Orchestra Thousands Oaks (CWOTO which was founded to give young musicians the opportunity to perform solos with a professional orchestra.

Osborn conducted church choirs for 25 years. From 1973-1982, he served as the Music Director at the Kirk O' The Valley Presbyterian Church. Since then, he has been a Deacon, an Elder and served on the Session. For seven years, he was the moderator of the Kirk's Long Range Planning Committee. Most recently he was president of the Kirk's School Board.





UCLA seeks smokers for national study

WESTWOOD-UCLA researchers seek smokers over age 18 for a national study using an experimental vaccine to help them guit smoking.

"Only 10 to 20 percent of smokers successfully quit, so new methods beyond the patch and nicotine gum are truly needed," said Dr. Donald Tashkin, principal investigator and professor of pulmonary and critical care medicine at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA. The vaccine produces antibodies that bind to nicotine, and the resulting molecules are too large to reach the brain. This gradually reduces the satisfaction a smoker receives from cigarettes.

To qualify for the yearlong study, volunteers must be in general good health, smoke at least 15 cigarettes per day and want to quit. Participants who pass an initial screening visit will be assigned at random to receive one of several doses of the vaccine or a placebo. Volunteers will receive four to five injections over the course of the study.

Volunteers will keep an electronic dally diary, receive behavioral counseling sessions to help them quit and have regular physical exams, including blood tests.

Quitting is the single most effective disease-prevention strategy for smokers. Nationwide, more than 430,000 Americans die each year of smoking-related diseases, including heart disease, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and lung cancer.

Side effects of the vaccine may include fever, muscle aches, tiredness, headache, nausea or vomiting, all of which usually resolve within several days following an injection. In addition, there may be temporary local discomfort at the site of the injection. These side effects, however, appear to occur with similar frequency in people who receive the vaccine, called NicVAX, and people who receive a placebo.





Illegal alcohol sales not a brewing problem

 Undercover operations found no convenience stores that would sell alcohol to minors.

DOWNEY - Underage drinkers better look elsewhere to score cheap beer.

The Downey Police Department recently conducted a citywide compliance check at local convenience stores that sell alcohol to the public. Over the two-week period, 38 stores were checked and none sold alcohol illegally.

The operation was done in conjunction with the State of California Alcohol Beverage Control (SCABC).

The City Council authorized the Chief of Police to enter into a grant agreement with the SCABC on July 11. The grant provides the police department with \$45,317 for the purpose of educating business owners in alcohol beverage control laws, to give additional training to law enforcement officers and increase the number of underage decoy operations in the city, which are designed to test compliance of establishments that have been granted liquor licenses.

"The police department takes seriously complaints of liquor stores selling alcohol to minors," the Downey Police Department said in a statement. "In addition to investigating liquor stores unlawfully selling to minors, police will take enforcement action against adults who purchase alcohol for minors as well. Oftentimes, under-age persons wait in parking lots and attempt to persuade adults to buy liquor for them.

"Making this purchase is unlawful and subjects the purchaser to arrest, jail and fines."

Anybody with information about businesses selling or serving alcohol to minors is asked to call the Downey Police Department's special enforcement team at (562) 904-2353 or, for immediate response, the main police line at (562) 861-0771.




