Dogs running wild on Downey streets

• Residents claim loose dogs are terrorizing their neighborhood. Elderly woman has scars to prove it.

DOWNEY – Ripping out a dog's insides and causing an elderly woman multiple injuries to her upper body, a wild pair of dogs attacked on Foster Road last month, the latest in a series of attacks neighbors say have gripped their neighborhood.

Mildred Mitchell, 78, sustained moderate injuries to her upper body when she was attacked by the dogs. She was treated for lacerations along her right arm and bruising all along her right side. She said she also received a tetanus shot, and is currently being checked and tested for further injuries.

Mitchell was taking her daughter's dog, Lucy, for a walk around 6 a.m. June 29 when she says two dogs blind-sided her.

"All of a sudden all hell broke loose," said Mitchell, a Downey resident since 1954. "I don't know where those dogs came from."

Mitchell, who says she was more worried about her dog's health rather than her own, picked up Lucy after the rottweiler and accompanying dog ripped open the small puppy's side and rear end.

She then proceeded to try and beat off the attackers with her remaining arm, struggling all the way.

"I just didn't have enough strength to do it all," Mitchell said as she started to break into tears.

Enter a trio of heroes.

Christian Krueger and Ashton Trujillo, students at Calvary Chapel High School, were out for a jog that morning when they spotted the roaming dogs. They tried yelling at Mitchell to warn her of the impending attack but were too late.

The teens quickly sprinted to Mitchell and began trying to beat off the dogs with their fists.

"I saw the little dog and it was bleeding so I ran and kicked the other dog right in the head as hard as I could and it wouldn't move at all," said Trujillo.

About this time, neighbor George Wolder noticed the commotion from down the street. He jumped in his car and raced over to aid in the rescue.

Robert Rubio running

• Conductor leaves behind a legacy of love, friendship and music.

A few days ago someone remarked to me that we are often unaware of the range of a friend's influence and accomplishments until the impressive obituary appears in the papers.

This certainly may reflect the general knowledge of Thomas Osborn's contributions in his field of classical music. As conductor of the Downey Symphony for 18 years and director of the Music in the Schools programs, the Osborn presence in the Downey community goes deep.

But when I attended the Memorial Service for him, "A Celebration of Life," I heard confirmation of Tom the husband and father, the educator, the camper, the family cameraman, the traveler, hiker, singer, choral conductor, clarinetist, church deacon, and planner.

"I am humbled by the output of his life," one speaker said, "He contributed significantly in making the world a better place," said another. And, "He lived life to the fullest to the very end. Was he not an amazing gift..."

He was remembered for his readiness to help students and colleagues.

"He was a father figure to many. Open to all students who knew him as a strong family man. They could come and talk to him about anything. He had a big heart," said his brother Mashall, recalling that Tom was good at interacting with people from age five.

"When we were really little kids," daughters Carolyn Osborn and Dorothy related, "our dad was so involved in teaching classes all day and conducting musicals at night that we didn't see much of him, so Mother decided to take us to his rehearsals. By the time we were 10 and 11 we could help him with the orchestra's set-up. We painted scenery at the theaters, we learned you had to organize and prepare."

On summer vacations the family camped with a tent and trailer, then an RV, then a motor home. Carolyn and her dad hiked to the top of Yosemite's Half Dome. Later, the Osborns beamed happily from Christmas cards, photographed before the spectacular architecture of European capitals and countrysides.


Joyce Osborn, Tom's wife for 49 adventurous years, is a symphony violinist and teaches privately. She wanted to fill the celebration of Tom's life with music. Tom's music. A string quartet gently welcomed us as we signed guest books and found seats. Every musician appearing during the afternoon had played with Tom. Carolyn took up her violin in tribute to her father; a cellist broke my heart with the tenderness of Rachmaninoff's Vocalise; the choir from his church sang Brahms; and Patricia Massey... Patricia Massey is principal clarinet with the Downey Symphony. Tom's instrument. Has Mozart's Clarinet Quintet ever received so loving a performance as this one.

Then there are his friends. How Tom Osborn has friends.

You can begin with Downey's kindergarten children, who met him as narrator and performer with his quintet for Music in The Schools programs. For nine years, Tom visited every elementary school in the Downey Unified School District, with a different musical emphasis each time. "Good morning, Tom!" the kids would call out. When kindergartners became third-graders, they received the full treatment: a trip to the Downey Theater for a concert by the entire orchestra. "Good morning, Tom!" Again in fifth grade, another such trip, the music now more sophisticated. Classical music became accessible, even fun to thousands of youngsters because of Tom. A conductor could be a real person.

Neighbor friends. With his friend, Ted, Tom walked every day, five mornings a week. When that was not enough, they walked six mornings a week, for 12 years. When people next door to the Osborns moved away one year, they told Joyce they would miss the whole family, but especially

against 'formidable' foe

DOWNEY—A Downey resident for over 25 years, Robert A. Rubio has declared his candidacy for the Downey City Council's District 2 seat soon to be vacated, due to term limits, by Mayor Meredith Perkins. He moved to the District 2 area three years ago.

Rubio, who ran Rubio & Chavira Wholesale Jewelers and Manufacturing, as president, in the city of Commerce with a partner for 20 years and has been the Chief Professional Officer of the Rio Hondo Boys & Girls Club (which serves over 10 southeast cities including Downey) for the past 10 years, opposes another business owner and community leader, Mario Guerra. Guerra declared his candidacy earlier.



Rubio acknowledged Guerra is "a formidable foe," but he says he is not awed, because he, too, is an achiever. He says if

he beats the odds stacked up against him, he aims to:

•Maintain and increase community service programs;

•Promote the downtown business community and "continue our Downey Landing development";

•Support Downey Fire and Police with state-of-the-art tools with which to combat identity theft especially; and otherwise secure resources "for the protection of our citizens"; and

•Maintain adequate schools (and schooling) for children.

Rubio was born and raised in Santa Fe Springs, graduating from Saint Marianne's School in 1961 (he is past president of the Saint Marianne's School Foundation and a foundation member for 10 years); he was a parishioner of Our Lady of Perpetual Help from 1985-1995. He is past president of the Rio Hondo Rotary Club, of which he has been a member for 30 years (Rio Hondo Rotary covers Bell Gardens and Commerce).


He has served on various committees at the Montebello Unified School District, as Distinct Chair of the Rotary International Ambassadorial Scholars Program; as president of the Rancho Downey Homeowners Association, member of Rotary District #5280 Charitable Giving Foundation for three years, past president of the Bell Gardens Association of Merchants and Commerce, and vice president of El Rancho San Antonio Historical Society.

He is currently a member of the Downey Historical Society, the Downey Rose Float Association, the Downey Chamber of Commerce, the Downey Sister Cities Association, and has been a member of the Project Area Committee (PAC) serving the city of Bell Gardens, and has served on both Miss Bell Gardens and Miss Commerce committees.

Murder victim identified by police

DOWNEY – A woman allegedly stabbed to death in her Downey apartment last week by her ex-boyfriend has been identified as 22-year-old Judy Morales.

Police were called to the apartment unit at 11800 Old River School Road about 1 a.m. Friday morning after neighbors reportedly heard her screaming for help.

When police arrived, they say they found 21-year-old Marco Antonio Rodriguez on top of Morales, both bloody and suffering from stab wounds.

Police used a Taser device on Rodriguez during the arrest. Morales was taken to a hospital where she was pronounced dead.

Rodriguez was suffering from what police called self-inflicted stab wounds and was treated at a hospital. He is expected to be charged with murder.


Rubio is FEMA-trained and is a member of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), and the Downey Emergency Preparedness Committee, to which he was appointed a Commissioner by Perkins a few years back.

As CPO of the Rio Hondo Boys & Girls Club, known nationally as the Boys & Girls Club of America (which consists of some 3,900 clubs throughout the country), and the Rio Hondo Teen Center from 1996 to 2006, he has worked closely, and works, with hundreds of hopeful youth.

He has served three terms on its board and as president. He is currently an instructor as well of "Adelante Joven," a Pregnancy Prevention Program for young men within the schools of the Montebello Unified School District.and also serves as Treasurer and Charitable Trustee to the

One of three brothers who have served in the Armed Forces (he is the third of five brothers in all), he served in 1966-68 with the U.S. Army 3rd Infantry Division (his unit is now in Iraq) in Ashaffenburg, Germany as a Supply Sergeant. His father won the Purple Heart in WWII. Rubio's second wife, Robyn Kotani-Rubio, teaches 3rd grade and is vice principal at his alma mater, Saint Marianne's.

He plans to hold fundraiser-rallies for his campaign in the coming weeks—one at Sambi's of Tokyo, another at Frantone's, a third at Rio Hondo Event Center, and a fourth at Rubio's Restaurant at Downey Landing.

Ever since he moved to District 2, he says, a more intense concern for the betterment of his neighborhood and the community of Downey as a whole began to stir within him. This didn't surprise him much, he says, considering his continuing involvement with youth and education: he is constantly immersed in ideas like "values," "character development," "turning lives of at-risk kids around," "mentoring," "conflict resolution," and such.

Thus, "giving something back to the community"—even though this sounds like a clichéd mantra nowadays—really means something to him. After learning of citizens' complaints and concerns as he went the rounds soliciting pre-candidacy signatures, he says he decided to be "a part of the solution, and not part of the problem."

"I am going to be 60 in four months," he said. "It's a good time to enter local politics, to make a difference in my community."

Wielding the cane he uses to help him walk, he joined the teens in beating the dogs until they stopped attacking. A few minutes later, they finally did.

Krueger and Trujillo took hold of the badly battered dog and tried to calm Mitchell, clearly shaken from the attack.

"We saw the dog tore open," explained Trujillo. "There wasn't really a lot of blood, but it looked a lot worse than what it was. I didn't think the dog was going to survive, it lost a lot of tissue."

The next move by the teens was to get Mitchell and the dog back home. From there, the three of them, with Lucy, jumped in Mitchell's car and drove to the nearest pet medical center they could find.

The veterinarian present performed emergency surgery on Lucy, just enough to hold her together until they got her to an animal hospital better equipped to treat her injuries.

Lucy is now slowly recovering at home.

Wolder, the neighbor who helped beat off the dogs with his cane, suffered a heart attack Mitchell says was brought on by the stress of the attack. Wolder survived the scare and, after a brief stay at a local hospital, is now home resting.

The location of the dogs implicated in the attacks is presumably known. However, since *The Downey Patriot* cannot independently confirm the dogs' location, the newspaper is withholding the exact address.

Still, a local neighbor doesn't doubt the dogs next door to her were the ones who attacked Mitchell.

"I don't question the identification because these owners let the dogs run wild all the time," said Karen Heath, who said she allowed Mitchell into her backyard in order to look over her fence and identify the dogs.

According to Heath, the dogs are let loose into the neighborhood by the owners every morning around 6 a.m.

Local residents have also implicated the dogs in other incidents, including cornering people up and down the street, attacking a little girl, and running after cars.

Heath says she even witnessed her own son being cornered by the dogs. She said that her son was leaving for work in the morning when one of the dogs ran up to him and forced him on top of his car.

Residents said they have contacted the Southeast Area Animal Control Authority (SEEACA) many times about the dogs but are continually given the runaround. Mitchell says because her home lies on the border of Downey and Bellflower, authorities from both cities try to pass the responsibility to the other.

According to a SEEACA representative, the agency is aware of the situation and patrols the neighborhood parks and visits the registered owners of the dogs on a daily basis.

Since the attack, the dogs themselves have come up missing, according to neighbors. The alleged dogs' owners reportedly told SEEACA that the dogs were lured out of their yards by neighbors brandishing food. Since the, the owners said, the dogs are nowhere to be seen.

The suspected dogs' owners were not available for comment on this story.

U.S. report card

John McNally has written a book that has shaken the establishment by its inference that standardized test scoring of exams and tests are being skewed.

McNally asserts that no assessment of contemporary American life that we get from the media, the government and policymakers comes close to approximating reality, which is all-too-often desperate, chaotic, precarious and bewildering. "The crazy thing about the Bush Administration, "he says, "is that each worst case scenario that you imagine seems to come to fruition by the end of the month. When I was writing about a kind of domestic government espionage I was worried I was stretching credibility. But two years later...it's reality."

The book's message includes:

•What McNally's job as a standardized test scorer taught him about our government's "recalibration" of our personal information.

•What the government actually does with our standardized test results.

•Why he feels No Child Left Behind is an ill-conceived program destined for complete failure.

•Possible long-term solutions to the education problem in this country.

The book has received positive reviews from the Los Angeles Times and Washington Post. It is also a very funny read of fiction if one can separate its Swftian satire from its humorous allusions. "America's Report Card," John McNally, Free Press, New York, London, Toronto, Sydney.

August observed as 'child support awareness month'

LOS ANGELES-In its continuing efforts to improve the collection of child support and customer service for residents of Los Angles County, the L.A. County Child Support Services Department (CSSD) has scheduled an ambitious calendar of community outreach this month to build awareness in the county about its importance to constituent families and children.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors had presented a resolution to CSSD earlier to help launch "Child Support Awareness Month" and help recognize the important work being done by the department.

Then there is a New Case Workshop tomorrow, Aug. 19, scheduled in Commerce to assist parents in opening a child support case. Another is a free workshop for escrow and title company professionals, scheduled for Aug. 30 in Los Angeles, on expediting child support demands during processing.

Meanwhile, the L.A. County Child Support Services has teamed up with a number of community-based organizations and government agencies to provide information on child support issues. These include the Los Angeles County Office of Education, the L.A. County Sheriff's Department, the Family Law Facilitator, the American Payroll Association, First AME Church, local schools and community organizations CSSD is also taking its message to the media with an appearance on KMEX-TV, Channel 34's "34 A Su Lado," a public affairs phone call-in in primetime on Aug. 23. To assist with public education, KTLA, Channel 5 will be running public service announcements on the importance of Child Support Awareness Month. It matters little to them that people don't want to suffer the loss of privacy, the loss of an afternoon breeze or not being able to grow the flowers they like because the sun has been blocked off. These little "niceties" of life are unimportant to them, especially when money is involved.

To those who complain to the city, the only answer given them is to sue the owners of the property...doesn't that make for good neighbors? Actually one neighborhood did collect the money to hire an attorney, but it only resulted in the building process being sped up to finish more quickly. Who would trust our judicial process to rule on the codes or CR's and CCR's in favor of the homeowners? When CR's and CCR's are mentioned at the city, we're told it's not their responsibility. Just what is their responsibility? To do whatever they please, because it brings in money?

A few weeks ago I read in *The Patriot* what someone referred to as the "dirty little secret." Now let me tell you what the "dirty big secret" is! That is that the majority of these "mansions" are being built by unlicensed contractors or owner-builders. One such owner-builder built a \$1.5 million home without deducting Federal or State taxes, Social Security or Workmen's Comp. Supposedly it was built by friends and relatives. (I'd like to be friends with his relatives and friends.)

To those of you who really care about this, get a copy of the "Blueprint for Becoming a California Licensed Contractor - 2005 edition." I'll only give sketches of what it says. If you read it carefully, you'll see that the State laws aren't being enforced either. It tells who is exempt from the requirement of being licensed, that being work on a project for which the combined value of labor, materials and all other costs on one or more contracts is less than \$500 (owner-builder). There are also other applications to the \$500 limit, and that govern this exemption, i.e., the exemption is only valid if the structure is not intended to be offered for sale within one year of completion, how long a person has lived in the house, etc.

Now, here's the "kicker." We have Contractor's Licensing Board established statewide and Investigative Task Force (SWIFT) that focus on unlicensed contractors and the underground economy, to curtail illegal

Folks, we have an election coming up in November, not that it matters too much. I wish there would be a square on my ballot saying "None of the above."

Guess that's all for now, or until 1 I go for my walk and see a moat and a drawbridge in front of one of these "castles."

Please check these codes and see if the mansion being built close to you complies with the Building Codes of the State of California.

Luxury home values post small gains in Los Angeles market

LOS ANGELES – Luxury home values posted small gains in Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego in the second quarter of 2006, according to the First Republic Prestige Home Index by First Republic Bank, a leading provider of wealth management and private banking services.

The Index, which has tracked luxury homes since 1985, found:

•Los Angeles values rose 3.0 percent from the first quarter of 2006 to the second quarter and climbed 12.8 percent from a year ago. The average luxury home in Los Angeles is now a record \$2.36 million, up \$268,250 from a year ago.

•San Diego values grew 1.8 percent from the first quarter of 2006 to the second quarter of 2006 and were up 6.4 percent from a year ago. The average luxury home in San Diego is now a record \$2.14 million, up \$128,372 from a year go.

UCLA seeks smokers for national study

WESTWOOD—UCLA researchers seek smokers over age 18 for a national study using an experimental vaccine to help them quit smoking.

"Only 10 to 20 percent of smokers successfully quit, so new methods beyond the patch and nicotine gum are truly needed," said Dr. Donald Tashkin, principal investigator and professor of pulmonary and critical care medicine at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA.

The vaccine produces antibodies that bind to nicotine, and the resulting molecules are too large to reach the brain. This gradually reduces the satisfaction a smoker receives from cigarettes.

To qualify for the yearlong study, volunteers must be in general good health, smoke at least 15 cigarettes per day and want to quit. Participants who pass an initial screening visit will be assigned at random to receive one of several doses of the vaccine or a placebo. Volunteers will receive four to five injections over the course of the study.

Volunteers will keep an electronic dally diary, receive behavioral counseling sessions to help them quit and have regular physical exams, including blood tests.

Quitting is the single most effective disease-prevention strategy for smokers, experts say. Nationwide, more than 430,000 Americans die each year of smoking-related diseases, including heart disease, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and lung cancer.

Side effects of the vaccine may include fever, muscle aches, tiredness, headache, nausea or vomiting, all of which usually resolve within several days following an injection. In addition, there may be temporary local discomfort at the site of the injection. These side effects, however, appear to occur with similar frequency in people who receive the vaccine, called NicVAX, and people who receive a placebo.
