Dr. Mary R. Stauffer: a profile in goodness

DOWNEY—Her mind remains razor-sharp, her eyesight keen, her steely nerves intact. Sixty years of work as a lab technician, a research scientist and as a medical practitioner, the latter spanning 53 years here in Downey, have not slowed her down. Well before she retired from all this, in 1997, she started her foundation, "before Bill Gates, before Warren Buffett!", she exclaimed. Besides managing her foundation full-time, she has become a publisher. At age 89, when most men go nodding by their TV set and dawdle, she greets the dawn with fresh curiosity and begins another round of purposeful doing. "Running a foundation and being a publisher is a big job," she says.

She has touched the lives of many, giving money away (she prefers the word "investing") especially to promising youth who, in their march towards college and full engagement with life, can use a lift or two. In turn, high school labs, buildings, donations of cardiac equipment bear her name. A street has been named after her. Accustomed to honors, she has always striven for excellence. She graduated first in her high school class, first in college (magna cum laude), first in medical school (Ohio State).

There is no wasted motion with Dr. Mary R. Stauffer, no pretense, no yielding to compromise. Her roots took care of that. A measure of her precocity—and the discipline imposed to channel it—is revealed in this story of her early years: "I was born at 9 a.m. on a Sunday. I was put in the church nursery almost immediately and seemed to grow up there. As soon as I was 'potty trained' I went to Sunday School at 9 a.m., and again at 10 a.m. At 11 a.m. I attended church with my grandmother. My mother sang in the choir. My father and grandfather were the preachers at this large church in Toledo, Ohio—St. Paul's Lutheran.

"When I was five, before I could read," she goes on, "I was teaching Sunday School. After hearing the lesson at 9 a.m., I would prompt the teacher at 10 a.m., just in case she hesitated. One Sunday she said, 'Would you like to teach?' Not knowing it was veiled sarcasm, that this was just the polite way to say 'shut up' I popped up and replayed the lesson I had heard the hour before. The teacher remained—but just to take attendance, collect the offering and pass out the crayons."

Growing up during the Depression made her appreciate the value of a dollar. Having had a good education, she wants others to get the same. "Education is the way to knowledge," she has been quoted as saying," and knowledge creates wisdom. And wisdom is the key to action." She believes in work, play, the power of love, and the plenitude prayer brings—favorite themes of her grandfather's sermons, and which he distilled in his book, "The Complete Life." If she had her way, everybody in town should get a copy of the book. Right now, copies are being readied for distribution overseas to U.S. armed forces personnel.

Why did Dr. Stauffer, she with the educated heart, decide to "carve out a second career niche in public service (as a philanthropist)?" Because, she says, "I thought I could do a better job running a foundation, one that takes a lot of waste out of the equation and thus more cost effective, and one that's locally beneficial."

She is the Mary R. Stauffer Foundation's CEO and COO. A mong the foundation's several projects is honoring students at Warren and Downey who attain 3.5 GPAs. She says her husband, Floyd, a retired doctor himself, is the program's guiding spirit.

Staying active has kept her body sound, Dr. Stauffer said, adding, "I can't imagine being retired, not doing something worthwhile."

She and 14-year old granddaughter Jessica went to China in August: "We were the oldest and the youngest in the group, and we had the most fun! We went to Beijing, to Xian, we went up the Yangtze and saw the Three Gorges Dam. We even went to the resettlement village where we were serenaded by the displaced natives, they singing "Jingle Bells" in Chinese, we in English, but our voices blended and we somehow managed to sing in harmony. And when we visited the Great Wall, we not only looked (me for the third time) at it, we climbed it!" She advised: "One should go a-traveling when you're young."

"Downey is a wonderful city," she says, "but if we want to make it better, why not try to make it better? But we must put shoulder to the wheel."

The end is not in sight yet for Dr. Mary R. Stauffer. She still has "promises to keep, and miles to go before I sleep." But when that fateful day comes, I'm sure these words will be on everybody's lips: "We are all the better for her having lived."

Ernest Garcia has come a long way from flipping burgers at Jack in the Box, deep within the rough neighborhoods of East Los Angeles. Born in General Hospital in 1955, "Ernie" as his friends and family call him, had a challenging childhood. Coming from a low-income household, Ernie started working at age 9 shining shoes on street corners in the heart of downtown L.A. The swarms of businessmen and women rushing in and out of buildings that seemingly scraped the sky intrigued young Ernie in an enormous way. One day he'd be there and there was no stopping him.

Years, along with the most random job titles, passed and Ernie found himself married with a son. In 1977, Ernie, his wife, Daisy, and baby, Ernest, purchased their first home in Downey. At the time Ernie was working at his birthplace of General Hospital as a custodian. On his days off he would run errands and perform other miscellaneous tasks at his father-in-law's metal finishing business. He was starting to take on more responsibility and gain personal interest in the many facets of the company.

City Council reconsiders controversial zone change

■ Community members sway council to deny zone change to property behind Calvary Chapel.

DOWNEY—Much discussion took place in a public hearing Tuesday mainly in opposition to a proposed amendment rezoning a 2.64-acre parcel of land behind Downey Calvary Chapel from a commercial and residential zone to manufacturing.

Under the proposed amendment, the property at 12850 Woodruff Avenue would be designated from Neighborhood Commercial and Medium Density Residential to General Manufacturing and rezoned from R-1 5,000 (Single Family Residential) to M-1 (Light Manufacturing).

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





DOWNEY – What a guy, and what a birthday party. Hundreds of cities covering the entire planet Earth have joined in the celebration. It will

take a whole year to hear all the toasts. And now it is the Downey Symphony's turn to say "Happy 250th birthday, Mozart!" in a performance this Saturday evening, October 28, at the Downey Civic

Never have performers or audiences wearied of Mozart's genius, his freshness, his capacity to inform, and we can expect to be delighted and lifted by his music tomorrow.

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Time Traveler

Early Americans were peaceful people

The Indians who first occupied this area were Shoshoneans, cousins of the Comanches of the Great Plain and the Hopi farmers of the Arizona mesas

Their ancestors had trekked across from Asia to North America by way of the Bering Straits.

When the European-American westward movement encountered them, they were referred to as "Diggers" because they often dug in the ground for edible roots. The Americans apparently failed to consider that they themselves rooted in the ground for leeks and potatoes.

The local enclave of "Diggers" was surrounded by a tribe known as the Hokans. To the south, near San Diego, were a separate tribe known as the Yuma. To the north, near Ventura, was another Hokan tribe known as the

How the Shoshoneans settled on this prized piece of real estate is a mystery. They didn't seem to win it by warfare. But once here they were happy to stay. Their villages had such classic characteristics that anthropologists classify them as separate tribes.

On the arrival of the Franciscan Fathers, missions were established about a day's walk from each other. Eventually the tribes took on the names of the missions they were near. Those near the Mission San Gabriel were the Gabrielinos, those near the Mission San Juan Capistrano the Juaneros, those near Mission San Luis Rey the Luisenos, those near Mission San Fernando the Fernandenos.

The most interesting locally were the Gabrielinos. They seem to have noticed very early that the white man's coming was a cultural threat. They promptly drifted away before much of their lore could be recorded.

But the outer tribes held together long enough to provide more insight. In Juanero legend, the San Juan Capistrano tribe tells of its origin in the great village of Sehat in Gabrielino country. This was the area known as Los Nietos (Downey).

A Scots trapper named Hugo Reid married a Gabrielino woman and listed her village as "Carpenter's Farm" in 1837. He referred to Lemuel Carpenter who journeyed west from Kentucky and took a Spanish wife. Carpenter later acquired most of the huge Los Nietos Spanish Land Grant. The village that bore his name was swept away in the great flood of 1867.

The remains of Indian villages have been found where the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe rail road tracks cross, as well as Jaboneria on the west bank of the Rio Hondo River south of Telegraph Road. Other village remains are found near the old Pico Crossing of the San Gabriel River.

Gabrielino villages dotted much of the greater Los Angeles Basin. When Cabrillo arrived in San Pedro Bay in 1542 he called the land the "Bay of Smokes" because he saw so many village fires inland.

It was a good life for those early Indians. Father Geronimo Boscana who lived at Mission San Gabriel and Mission San Juan Capistrano from 1812 to 1831 compared their life to the legend of Creation and a Book of Genesis and Mosaic Law.

Close relatives in the tribes were not allowed to marry. The Chief's duty was benign. Gifts were brought to him which he in turn distributed to the poor and unfortunate. The respect he drew from the tribe was based on his condition of poverty. Since he gave away all he had he was allowed more than one wife to gather acorns for him. Other than this, it was a monogamous society.

"Also, electronic waste is a growing problem, even though many of these products can be recycled so they can be refurbished and reused."

"The improper disposal of household hazardous waste poses a public health threat," added Los Angeles County Supervisor Gloria Molina. "By participating in these free, convenient Roundups, we are able to help do our part to avoid serious pollution problems that could result if these items end up in our landfills or down our storm drains."

The Countywide Household Hazardous and E-Waste Roundup Program is sponsored by the County of Los Angeles and presented by the Department of Public Works and the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County in cooperation with the Community of Unincorporated Florence-Firestone and the neighboring cities of Bell, Bell Gardens, Commerce, Compton, Cudahy, Downey, Gardena, Inglewood, Los Angeles, Lynwood, Maywood, Paramount, South Gate and Vernon.

Upcoming roundups are scheduled in Unincorporated South Whittier on Oct. 28, and in Bellflower on Nov. 4.

Downey vs Warren

The Rivalry Continues

¶ime has run out. This year's much anticipated Downey/Warren football game will be played tonight at Allen Layne Stadium at Downey High School and with so much changing from year to year, The Downey Patriot compares the two teams. Last year, Downey went into Warren and beat the Bears, 35-14.

Downey Vikings

The Offense: The Vikings offensive attack relies heavily on the ground. Running backs for the Vikings have carried the ball 315 times for 1,419 yards this year. The backs are averaging a little over four yards per carry. Leading the rushing attack is senior running back Darren Tubbs. If not for Tubbs, Downey's scoring opportunities would decrease immensely as their passing game is one of the weakest in the league. Quarterback Anthoney Moreno has completed only 49 percent of all his passes, leaving the air game in question. The only reliable receiving option is wide receiver Joshua Higgins who leads the team in receptions and yards. Higgins has 17 receptions and 248 yards to show for his work on the ends. He is also the only receiver on the team to catch a touchdown pass.

The Defense: Downey's defensive line is strong enough to create opportunities to sack the quarterback and slow down the running game. So far this year, Downey has sacked the quarterback 12 times, an average of under 2 sacks a game. Leading the pass rush attack is lineman Vincent Huitt who has five sacks on the year. The biggest glaring weakness of Downey's defense is their secondary. Teams have found success in passing the ball against Downey's slow cornerbacks and safeties.

The Good: One name: Darren Tubbs. The senior running back has been all over the field this year for the Vikings, single-handedly carrying the offense for a team who isn't going to score many points. Tubbs leads the team in most offensive categories. He has carried the ball 186 times this year totaling 1,092 yards on the ground. He has also scored a teamhigh 11 touchdowns.

The Bad: Downey's secondary needs to find a way to keep wide receivers and tight ends in check. So far this year, the secondary has been burned for many big yardage plays, practically sucking the life out of any momentum Downey may have had. Because of this, the defense is on the field way too long, leaving the offense flat.

The Ugly: Quarterback Anthoney Moreno has a quarterback rating of 47. He has only completed 49 percent of his passes and has thrown far more interceptions (7) than touchdowns (3). Moreno needs to be able to read defenses quickly and get rid of the ball. The longer he holds on to the ball, the less likely the ball will leave his hand.

The Wild Card: Hiding quietly in the shadow of Tubbs is running back Caleb Shifflett. Even thought Shifflett is used more for short yardage plays, he does have the ability to grind out large runs by practically carrying the defense on his back. Shifflett has carried the ball 68 times for 272 yards this season. Look for him to supplement Tubbs' running game.



Warren Bears

The Offense: Every year, Warren has the same game plan to their offense: run the football. So far, Warren running backs have carried the ball 291 times totaling 1,565 yards on the ground. Running back Jose Green carries the load for the backfield but is accompanied by four other running backs which have carried the ball over 10 times. The running game is balanced and complete for Warren. They have someone to run it up the middle and another to run it around the sidelines. The Bears are a grind-out-the-clock team. They attempt to keep defenses off balance with an average passing game. Quarterback Alfonso Gonzalez has completed over 50 percent of his passes and has a quarterback rating 30 points higher than Downey's Moreno. Even though not flashy, it gets the job done.

The Defense: Something common found among all Jeff Welch teams is that they like to hit. Warren's defense, although not terribly big, likes to hit you square in the teeth. All around, they have average speed, not completely shutting down passing plays, but doing an adequate enough job to complete the goal. They proved this last week when they knocked out Gahr's passing-oriented offense, intercepting four total passes. Warren's defense is led by Patrick Pelligrino. Pelligrino, when not accompanying Green in the backfield on offense, doubles on defense. He leads the teams with 41 tackles and 19 assisted tackles.

The Good: The return of Jeff Welch to the helm of the football program has once again injected life into a previously moot football team. Welch brought back discipline and emotion to a team who was deemed lifeless last year. With Welch's return, look for him to light a fire under this team's belly. The Warren head coach will make sure that his team is up to facing

The Bad: Although the passing game is good enough, in order to beat a Downey team who hung tough with Dominguez, they'll need to do more than just complete short passes. Gonzalez has been adequate for the Bears, but he'll really need to step up and find the receivers that will be open downfield against Downey's secondary. Completing only 50 percent of his passes might not be good enough in a game like this. With both teams running the ball burning the clock, there will be a time where he will need to step up in the pocket and launch the ball to get a big yardage play. Gonzalez's longest pass this year has only been a 41-yard reception.

The Ugly: Warren's record shows a team that has won only three games. That record should be better, but special teams is hurting the Bears. Earlier in the season, kicker Alex Salcedo struggled with field goals costing the Bears precious points and possibly wins. Salcedo needs to find a confidence in himself to be the kicker everyone knows he can be.

The Wildcard: Keith Shetler is a surprise for Warren. So far, he has complemented the running game well, exploding for 429 yards on 66 carries. He's averaging over six yards a carry and is fast. The one thing that should be known about Shetler is he played his first three years of high school ball with the Downey Vikings. His knowledge of how their defense operates and years of football experience should have the Vikings not only looking for Green carrying the ball, but Shetler as well.

The Outcome: Like every Downey/Warren football game, anything can happen. Downey is coming off tough losses versus Santa Fe and Dominguez but rebounded with an easy win over Lynwood. Warren is coming off impressive victories over Paramount and Gahr. The game will be a low scoring affair but will be exciting nevertheless. It will come down to which offensive line is on and which running game is better this night. If that's not the case, the game will rely on the feet of the two kickers.

Prediction: Warren comes out the victor by a field goal. Warren 24,



Ask the Contractors Board

CONTRACTORS STATE LICENSE BOARD

Question: I want to hire a contractor to put a new roof on my home. What should I look for when researching one, and where can I get a referral?

Answer: The first rule of thumb is to find a licensed contractor. Don't hire someone who doesn't have a valid license from the Contractors State License Board (CSLB). Look for someone who can provide you with positive references along with general liability workers' compensation insurance. Make sure their policy covers every worker who will be on your roof. (A new law taking effect in January 2007 will require all roofing contractors to have workers compensation insurance.)

Ask neighbors, family and friends for referrals if they recently had their roof repaired or replaced. You can also call your local roofer's or builders association, which may be able to give you a referral. Associations like these hold their members to high standards.

If you decide to look online or in the yellow pages, a contractor's license number must be displayed in their advertisement. To check the license number of a contractor, or get more information, visit the CSLB's website at www.cslb.ca.gov. You can also refer to the CSLB consumer publication "Tips for Hiring a Roofing Contractor" which can be found at the CSLB website, or ordered for free by calling (800) 321-2752.

Q: I want to hire a licensed contractor for repairs after a sprinkler broke and flooded my yard. The contractor seems honest and was referred to me by a neighbor. I agree with the contractor's recommendations for what needs to be repaired and amount he wants to charge me seems fair. He said that we don't need a written contract, is this a good idea?

A: Even though your contractor seems like an honest person, California law requires that contractor to give you a written contract. You really want to have everything in writing. The majority of complaints against contractors center on disagreements over what a job was supposed to cover. One of the best way to avoid miscommunication and insure that expectations are clear is to have everything spelled out in writing. The contract binds and protects both you and the contractor. It should include everything you have agreed upon, materials to be used and exactly what work will be done.

Q: I have hired a contractor to install new kitchen cabinets. He provided me with a written contract, but it is not very detailed. Does this matter?

A: Yes, the contract should be as specific as possible regarding all work to be done and materials to be used, including information such as

quality, quantity, weight, color, size, or brand name as it may apply. Make sure the contract includes everything that is agreed to, including complete cleanup and removal of debris and materials. They best way to avoid disputes over what was or wasn't agreed to is to write out the details in a contract. All changes in the contract must be made in writing as well. Matt Kelly is the Chair of the Contractors State License Board. The CSLB operates under the umbrella of the California Department of Consumer Affairs and licenses and regulates California's 302,000 contractors, and investigates more than 20,000 complaints against contractors annually.
