

Neil's Stationers has thwarted giants' surge

DOWNEY—For more than 50 years, office supplies retailer Neil's Stationers has done business in the same general area in downtown Downey, never straying far from the corner of Firestone Blvd. and Downey Ave.

Started in 1954-55, the store was first located at 11134 Downey Ave. (bet. Second and Third St.), moving to where State Farm is today (close to the corner of Firestone and Downey), relocating to 8232 Firestone Blvd. (southeast corner of Firestone and La Reina, then, finally, putting down stakes at 8152 Firestone (right across the street), where it has catered to its customers for over 25 years.

The coming of business behemoths Staples, Office Depot and Office Max a dozen years ago doomed store after store in Bellflower, Long Beach, Cerritos, Norwalk and Whittier. Not Neil's Stationers. Owner Dave Neil Jr., a CSU-Fullerton business administration graduate, says

Humble beginnings mark route to success

DOWNEY—Mayor Meredith H. Perkins gets termed out as Councilman next week, and for probably the first time in a long while, he seemed unsure of his next step: "I have no plans. Maybe I'll conduct sales training for a couple of companies. I'm not sure. We'll see what happens." This sounded strange, for it came from a man who has impressed us as being in control, decisive and does things in overdrive. Yet, come to think of it, by gum, probably the guy needs, and deserves, a little rest.

By any measure, Perkins had already led a strenuous life even before he took public office. He had just a few years left (27 years with the company) before retiring as a sales rep for L.A.-based Bowman Distributing Company when he ran for District 2 Councilman in 1998 and won. He replaced Barbara Riley. He ran and won again in 2002. The two terms were preceded by six years on the Planning commission, an opportunity given by Joyce Lawrence.

Summing up his years in the public eye, he says, "I've been very very fortunate to work with outstanding Council persons, and when I leave office, I hope those replacing me will continue to make the city the great city that it is, and that it will continue to grow."

He sees challenges ahead. A major one may come sooner than later. It concerns the Downey Studios. He conjectures that Downey Studios, for obvious bottom line considerations, may just go down the path of least resistance: that instead of continuing with its film production activities, it may just opt for putting the property it bought dirt cheap (now worth 10 times original valuation) to multiple home use.

The insight comes from someone who has closely felt the city's pulse, spending countless hours poring over reams of budget data, stacks of plans, and thickets of reports; holding discourse with public and colleagues alike; and otherwise charting courses of action according to a vision forged from a hardscrabble past and a temperate, pragmatic nature.

The note of concern is thus a particularly earnest, and valid, one. Even so, as he bids the Council farewell Dec. 12, his last day in office, Perkins sees encouraging signs that the city is starting to draw people from

out of town, indicative of the city's inherent vigor and unfading lustre. He offers three main reasons for this: a school district "second to none," a well-run police force, and a well-equipped fire department. Then there is the golf course. "There is no other city course like ours," he says. "Also, we have excellent city employees. Many are truly dedicated and good people, and for that we can be thankful. I have a motto—"I have never done anything without the help of others."

Perkins thus finds reasons to hope. Besides, "When we are being challenged, we become better people."

lenged, we become better people."

Born during the Depression in Bauxite, Arkansas, a little dot on the map close to Hot Springs and Pine Bluff—some 20 miles southeast of Little Rock—Perkins imbibed three lasting lessons from his parents:

Traffic collisions result in two deaths

■ Separate accidents - both on Downey Avenue - kill two people. One man under arrest.

DOWNEY – A 24-year-old Downey man was arrested on charges of vehicular manslaughter after his pickup truck collided with another car Monday, killing the driver, Downey police said.

The collision occurred at approximately 7:11 p.m. at the intersection of Imperial Highway and Downey Avenue, police said. The Downey resident was reportedly driving a 2002 Dodge pickup southbound on Downey Avenue. As he entered the intersection at Imperial Highway, he struck a Nissan pickup driven by a 60-year-old male resident of Paramount.

The Dodge pickup careened off the Nissan and crashed into a house at the intersection, where a family was reportedly hanging Christmas lights at the time

The driver of the Nissan, whose name was not released, was transported to Downey Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced dead.

The driver of the Dodge was transported to St. Francis Medical Center where he was treated for minor injuries, police said. He was later taken to the Downey Police Department and booked for investigation of vehicular manufaculators.

The cause of the collision is still under investigation. Anyone who may

Time Traveler Ralph family has made Downey proud

DOWNEY – It was April 14, 1922, and Art Ralph of Downey crouched for the start of the half-mile run at the 10th Annual Invitational Track and Field Meet at San Fernando High School.

Ralph was one of the best runners to come out of Downey in years, and along with sprinter Ed Reinke gave Downey a rugged track combination in the sprints and middle distances.

He would probably have run even harder had he known that he was to be the first of three generations of Ralphs that would make Downey proud, both on the athletic field and in the realm of community service.

Downey residents today probably know of Bill Ralph, Art's son, who through a quirk of fate didn't play football or run for Downey, but competed instead for Compton High School.

It seems father Art, who for many years worked for the gas company,

was made a division chief and moved with his family to Compton during young Bill's athletic years.

Bill made up for it by coming back to Downey and working 33 years for the City. He retired two years ago as the city's public works director, and now fills a seat on the Downey Cemetery District Board.

The archives of the Downey Historical Society still contain the old track and field programs with father Art Ralph's name. When asked about them, Bill reminisced about his father's athletic career.

It seems Art held the Downey High School record in the high hurdles until 1984, partially because Downey didn't run the highs for many years.

Bill said he almost got to see his father's and his son's name on the same record chart. Bill's son, Chris, set a shot-put mark at Downey, but it came the year after his grandfather's hurdles mark was shattered.

Close enough to give the reader an idea of the athletic prowess of this family, however.

Bill said his father went on to run one year for Whittier College, then transferred to the University of Nevada, Reno, where he trained by mail. Many athletes in the West in the 1920s and 30s got their training direc-

tion from noted Eastern coaches who mailed them their regimen. Bill added that interestingly enough his son, Bill, also attended the

University of Nevada, Reno, years later. While the old program indicates the Ralph family probably holds the record for having three generations of local athletes, Ed Reinke was the

best local runner of his era. He went on to compete at the 1923 California Interscholastic Federation Field and Track Championships in Santa Ana, and won the 100 and 220. Veterans who remember those days said he ran in the 10-flat range, very swift for the times.

Other Downey names of note in the old programs include Benstead in the low hurdles; Hair and Nooschekian in the mile; Haygood who joined Ralph and Reinke in the half-mile relay, and Cline who ran with Ralph in the 440.

proudly: "I'm the last traditional store in the area."

His explanation is simple. The superstores, he says, are notorious for their "impersonal touch": "We provide personalized and speedy service. We have a great deal of product knowledge and experience on our side. If an item is not on the floor, we can get it delivered in a day or two."

Neil's Stationers, whose catalog is as thick as a telephone book and contains a listing of 28,000 items, has access to a network of 35 warehouses nationwide, not to mention its own warehouse in the back. Prices are competitive, he says. Routine deliveries are made to such places as Cerritos, Compton, South Gate, Culver City and Los Angeles.

In addition to traditional office supplies, Dave has noted a rise in sales of art supplies. "There is a growing demand for them especially among students," he says. Another major item is paper shredders, reflecting today's security concerns.

hard work, good ethics, and character. "For that I'm grateful," he says. "In that classic mining town, we enjoyed three things: food, clothing and shelter. The company my dad worked for, Alcoa, owned everything in town, except for the barbershop, the post office, and the school. A phone was unheard of, and a car was an extreme luxury. We didn't have a car until the '50s. These days, people can't relate to that.

People in those days knew how to survive."

Nothing to lose, Perkins moved to California in the late forties with his mother, father and younger brother. "We took the train and arrived with three suitcases, and not much in our pockets. We lived in a one-bedroom apartment. The bathroom was at the end of a long hallway. Despite it all, we seemed to be very happy.'

Later, after they had moved to Lynwood, came a succession of employments, mostly smalltime but at the time crucial: delivering 320 copies of the Bell Gardens Review Thursday

mornings, and the L.A. Examiner seven times a week, 365 days a year; as a boxboy for a supermarket; then a journeyman stock clerk-all this through elementary and high school, while he saved as much as he could for college (he never finished his bachelor's in business administration at CSU-Long Beach). Anyway, with his savings, he lucked out by buying into a partnership in a company called Plasticast, which supplied drills and taps for the aircraft industry. Their clients included Lockheed, Rockwell, and Rohr. Had it succeeded, and it almost did, a failed Platicast project would have made him a millionaire, he says.

Meanwhile, he continued his regular employments with Safeway Stores (this time in the computer department), then KL Design, then Eutectic Welding Alloys for 15 years, and finally Bowman Distributing. A graduate of Lynwood High, Perkins next moved to South Gate, then finally, in 1962, to Downey. "I've lived in Downey, in the same house, for 44 years," he says.

Leisure pursuits have included a little golf, reading mostly self-help books, and frequent trips to St. Louis visiting son Greg who's finishing medical school. He also finds surcease in Pismo Beach, which he visits once a month. Daughter Peggy, the oldest, lives in Santa Monica, while Jeff, a frequent guest at the Council meetings, is office manager for Victolic, a Long Beach pipe company. All three offspring graduated from Warren High ("Is there any other high school?" he asks, in an obvious dig at a Downey High product and Council colleague). Younger brother Johnny lives in Las Vegas.

Last year he established the Soaring Eagle Award, which rewards those who go back to continue their interrupted education while holding on to their jobs. It's totally financed by him. He says, "It's one of the most rewarding programs I've been a part of."

"I've been on top of the hill, and down in the valley below," he says, "but I've been very fortunate. I've lived a good life." Then he got a little more philosophical: "Really, our lives are contained in just that dash between the two dates that are carved on tombstones. Sometimes, that's all we've got."




Shaw was a seasoned traveler, having visited the majority of the United States, the territory of Hawaii, Canada and Cuba. She took many trips with her nephew Joel.

Jackson is a resident of Norwalk and was a full-time faculty member at Cerritos until his retirement in 2002.





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
