Who Knew What?

Questions abound in Johnie's Broiler saga

DOWNEY – The Downey Police Department this week continued their investigation of the partial demolition of Johnie's Broiler, as supporters from as far away as Texas rallied for its full restoration.

Property owner Cristos Smyrniotis, meanwhile, told The Downey Patriot this week that he was unaware of the Oct. 13 request to tear down Johnie's Broiler and denied it was his signature on the application, saying it was his tenants who applied for the demolition.

Richard Stupin of RAS Associates, the architectural firm that submitted the application to the City of Downey, confirmed that it

was Smyrniotis' tenant, not Smyrniotis, who hired him, but said it was Smyrniotis' signature on the application.

"We can't do anything without his consent," Stupin, who denied involvement in the illegal demolition, told the Patriot. "I went over to [Smyrniotis'] house where he signed the papers."

Regardless, the application was denied by the City of Downey Planning Division in a letter dated Nov. 17. The letter was addressed to Stupin and copied to Smyrniotis.

The city also drafted a letter, that same day, to the Los Angeles Conservancy notifying them of the demolition request.

The lease

Smyrniotis claimed his lease with his tenants allowed them to complete construction projects on his property without his consent or knowledge, provided everything was done legally.

City officials, citing the ongoing investigation, would not comment on specific lease details.

Attempts by the *Patriot* to obtain a copy of the lease, which is not public record, have been unsuccessful.

Time Traveler Former Rockwell site steeped in deep history

The world famous home of the Space Shuttle and other exotic aerospace explorers, Rockwell International in Downey sat on a historic plot where aviation history often left its mark.

The saga began in 1929 when an oil field equipment firm, EMSCO, decided to build an airplane. The result was the EMSCO "Cirrus," and lest cynics scoff too hard at a link between oil equipment firms and aviation, let's note that oil rigging and equipment were where Howard Hughes start-

EMSCO followed the "Cirrus" with a second design that was flown from a small airfield adjacent to the plant in 1930. EMSCO built a third model, the B-3, that made quite a name for itself in long distance flights of the time. A number of B-3s were sold to the Mexican Air Force. And the B-3 was eventually refitted into an airplane known as the "Challenger."

The Great Depression affected the air and oil industry as well as everything else, and EMSCO shut down in 1932, but its hangars, plant and small airfield remained.

Then came Jerry Vultee, a young engineer from Lockheed who wanted to build airplanes of his own independent design.

Vultee started in Glendale, but he sought a facility with more space and an airfield. He moved to Downey in 1936.

The first plane he built in Downey was the V-11, an attack bomber which later flew in China. The V1-A which was conceived in Glendale,

was later built in Downey as well. Vultee was killed in an air crash in Arizona in 1938, but his legacy was the Vultee plant in Downey.

Refinement of the V-11 eventually produced the T-6 Texan, which became famous as a trainer in World War II. And the advent of World War II set off a wild effort to upgrade military air production. In 1942 Vultee merged with Consolidated Aircraft of San Diego. The new company designed a combat plane based on the trainer. The new plane was the

The tenant

Also unclear is the identity of the tenant of Johnie's Broiler, who was subleasing the property to Car Outlet, a used car dealership, since 2002. Downey City Councilman Mario Guerra said at a rally Sunday that Car Outlet had nothing to do with the illegal demolition and were being allowed to remove their cars from the property.

Smyrniotis declined to identify his tenants because of the ongoing investigation. Stupin said he only knew the first name of the tenant, his client, whom he identified as "Alex."

Smyrniotis also disputed certain reports in last week's *Downey Patriot*. He says he was misquoted in the story stating he was having breakfast with his wife (he was preparing dinner, he says), and says the gas was turned off prior to the demolition.

Members of the Friends of Johnie's Broiler, meanwhile, helped organize a rally this past Sunday in support of the classic diner. Car clubs from as far away as Texas made the drive for the two-hour gathering, which included a slow cruise around Johnie's at the exact time the demolition was occurring the week before.

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OC woman disappears after leaving work

DOWNEY - It was 6 a.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 9, when Amber Lee Hill left her gravevard shift at the Coca-Cola bottling plant in Downey. On her way home, she phoned her boyfriend, which in turn would be the last time anyone would hear from her.

Hill, a 38-year-old Stanton resident, was reported missing by boyfriend Antonio King after she failed to pick up her step-daughter from school. Since then, her cell phone battery has been dead and no activity has been registered in her bank account, said Orange County Sheriff's Department spokesman Jim Amormino.

But on Jan. 14, a hiker along a trail near Colima Rd. in Whittier found some of Hill's personal belongings, including her wallet, identification and car registration.

In addition, it was announced Tuesday during a press conference that Hill had been a witness in a sexual-harassment case, as well as bathroom vandalism, at the Coca-Cola plant, where she worked as a lab technician. Authorities are unsure if the case has anything to do with her disappearance and compa-

ny officials declined to comment. Amber and husband Robert, a San Bernardino contractor, have been separated for quite some time

and were planning to file for divorce this week, according to the Los Angeles Times. Amber's 22-year-old daughter, Jennifer Uribe, told the Times that her mom also hoped to gain custody of Robert's 12-year-old daughter from a previous relationship. The couple met online over two years ago and have been married a year. Amber filed a domestic-violence case against Robert in 2004, but it is

unknown how the case was resolved.

Hill met her current boyfriend nine months ago when she began working for Coca-Cola and have since then moved in together in Stanton, Uribe told the Times. King no longer works for Coca-Cola. Hill spent her free time with Uribe's two children and attended classes

at Chaffey College in Rancho Cucamonga, hoping for career advance-Hill drives a dark blue, four-door, 2001 Dodge Stratus with smoke-tint-

ed windows, black hubcaps and rims, and damage to the hood on the driver's side, said Amormino. The license plate is 4SFE756.

She was last seen wearing a gray Coca-Cola work shirt with black pants and boots, and is described as being five feet five inches tall with long brown hair, brown eyes and weighing 150 pounds.

Lower prescription costs is a Congress priority

On behalf of the millions of seniors and individuals with disabilities in our country, I am proud to have joined my colleagues in the U.S. House of Representatives in supporting "The Medicare Prescription Drug Price Negotiation Act of 2007," which passed January 12 in a bipartisan vote of 255 to 170. And I thank our Speaker Nancy Pelosi for making this issue one of the first priorities of the 110th Congress.

The 2003 Medicare Rx Drug Law that created the current prescription drug program included a provision, sought by big drug companies, that prohibits Medicare from negotiating with drug companies for lower prices for seniors. As a result, the 2003 law has failed to slow the rapid growth in prescription drug prices. In fact, a study by Families USA shows that the prices charged by Medicare drug plans are rising at more than twice the rate of overall inflation.

"The Medicare Prescription Drug Price Negotiation Act of 2007" repeals this special-interest provision - this gift to the drug companies. Instead, the bill requires Medicare to conduct cost-saving negotiations.

Recent polls by the Kaiser Family Foundation and Newsweek have shown overwhelming bipartisan support among Americans for allowing our government to negotiate prescription drug prices for Medicare.

Ironically, the only entity in this country that cannot bargain for lower group drug prices is Medicare. The states, Fortune 500 companies, and large pharmacy chains all use their bargaining clout to obtain lower drug prices for the patients they represent. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs uses its purchasing power to negotiate up to 47 percent lower costs on its frequently prescribed drugs for veterans. Certainly, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services should have this same abili-

An even more tragic consequence of the current drug benefit is that last year millions of Americans - including many beneficiaries in the 34th Congressional District - reached what is known as the "doughnut hole gap." This gap means that in addition to having to continue to pay their premiums without the benefit of their coverage, they are required to spend in the range of \$3,000 out of their own pocket for their medications before their benefits are restored. The result has been that many of our Medicare beneficiaries have been forced to choose between paying for the medications they need to stay healthy and alive, and paying their rent and other necessary household expenses.

Requiring the federal government to negotiate on behalf of seniors would generate significant savings, savings that could be used to close this gap in coverage - or doughnut hole — that threatens the livelihood of millions of Medicare beneficiaries in our country.

Now that the U.S. House of Representatives has acted, I urge my colleagues in the U.S. Senate to follow our lead and support "The Medicare Prescription Drug Price Negotiation Act of 2007" which ends this unconscionable and financially wasteful prohibition on Medicare's prescription drug negotiating authority.

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





Technology catches up with DUSD

rireless capability at all the schools and departments, including Transportation, comprising the Downey Unified School District is 90-95 percent complete, so says Peter Mynar, IT manager. This is exclusive of the apparatus that will be installed in the new buildings now under construction, as part of the "massive" modernization program at Downey and Warren High Schools that will include spanking new state-of-the-art, flat TV-equipped science buildings.

With such infrastructure in place, laptops will soon be as commonplace as conventional computers in every classroom, office and DUSD

"Not too long ago," says Mynar, "there were only 500 computers in use throughout the district. Now, there are 4,000-6,000 computers in use all over, and another 3,000 network devices, where none existed before." Overseeing this communication/information network is Mynar, assisted by six computer and three electronics technicians or "techs." They occupy two or three cramped rooms in one part of the DUSD warehouse, which they share with the Transportation office. "This is only temporary," he

One tech is dedicated to help the end-user, whether student, teachers or administrator, with any technical problem they may have with their computer. Another is a servers infrastructure trouble-shooter. Two techs take care of repair of computers and peripherals (scanners, etc.), and two perform networks design, installation, and repair/maintenance of all the networks. The three electronics techs monitor and trouble-shoot the performance of audio-visuals, P.A. systems, fire alarms, telephone systems, and

With the ever-growing demand every year for "faster and better" equipment and technology, not to mention addressing routine maintenance and repair of all the existing equipment in all 21 schools, plus Administration, plus Transportation, Mynar says an extra server area tech and a few more computer service techs would be nice to have around.

No sooner had he said this, when Superintendent Wendy Doty announced that DUSD will be receiving a \$2.1 million share from a recent L.A. County settlement with Microsoft. The amount, to be held in reserve, is earmarked for software and hardware upgrades.

In the meantime, says Mynar, his tech team has been trying over these

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you need to explore further inland.

years to squeeze out every ounce of productivity from its agglomeration of computers, and its attempts at prolonging their useful lifespans from an average of 3-5 years to 6-7 years have proven generally successful.

In charge of software programming is Chris Nezzer, whose official title is computer network support technician. He has been responsible for developing such programs as electronic grading books, elementary report card reports, on-line employment applications for teachers, websites to track warranty and repair work issues, on-line password re-setting, graffiti tracking websites, e-mail websites, to name a few.

Not the least of the department's concerns is continued monitoring and investigating of computer crimes and theft. To minimize such occurrences, firewalls have been built, and web and mail filtering, as well as anti-virus devices, have been installed.

"We're basically service-oriented," says Mynar.

The thrust of DUSD's Technology and Information Systems department was well-articulated in its 2005-2006 annual report: "The department continues to focus on the improvement of network and Internet services to schools and departments through the expansion of both traditional and wireless connectivity, as well as providing technical and logistical support to the many District construction/modernization projects [that have been/are being undertaken]. Through these efforts we [have been] able to ensure that functional fire alarm, data, and telephone service could continue without interruption in the many temporary class-

In addition, many system improvements and cost reduction efforts [are being] achieved including upgrades in firewalls, filters, and other security measures, such as more anti-virus software at a lower cost. Looking ahead..., we will continue to evaluate the staffing structure of the department to determine what is needed to keep pace with the ever-increasing technology demands the District faces with more users; more demand for system upgrades and support; and a greater need to find solutions to help us work faster, smarter, and with greater productivity."

No question, such technological underpinning underscores DUSD's commitment to delivering "quality education to each and every student."

'Big Mike' coached and volunteered in Downey


DOWNEY - Michael Steven Bach, Sr. passed away at his home on January 5 at the age of 61.

Model 72 "Vengeance."

The "Vengeance" was eventually developed into the A-31 and A-35 and saw service all over the world. The consolidated branch of the new company, Convair, built the famous "Liberator" bombers of World War II. It was the "Liberator" that smashed the Polesti Oil fields, a series of raids on which the book "Catch 22" was based.

The Downey production lines turned out thousands of aircraft, and became famous for "Rosie the Riveter," an affectionate name given women who worked beside men to produce defense aircraft here.

After the war the military air contracts temporarily dried up and the big Downey plant closed in 1947. A few engineers from the old company used the production line to build prefabricated housing. But they later moved to a less costly production site in Cudahy.

North American Aviation still had military air contracts, and needed space to produce planes. North American reopened the old Downey plant in December of 1947. Historian Bob Thompson has carefully saved bits of history covering North American's presence here. Among his treasures are old photos showing where original buildings were located, and where they were moved to make way for the huge structures there now.

North American built "Mustangs" in Downey, but the company was also on the cutting edge of the space age, which had kicked off in the U.S. with the Redstone Project.

North American developed into Rockwell. Progressive steps that followed included the Apollo capsules, moon landing and development of the Space Shuttle.

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

An estimated 85 percent of the residents do not have their GED, so part of the rehabilitation includes schooling to prepare the women for employment. And once they complete the La Casita programs, they are offered job placement. Schooling for the children prepares them to return to a regular classroom environment.

With a success rate of 75 percent, these women and children are fortunate to have La Casita.
