Oh, how cute!

• Local general store finds its niche selling charming items that can't be found anywhere else. It's the only store of its kind in Southern California, and it's right here in Downey.

BY ERIC PIERCE CITY EDITOR DOWNEY – From hardwood floors to...porcelain dolls?

It was an awkward transition, but one that worked.

Linda Peralta is the owner/operator of Country & General Store, a unique small-town shop tucked away in a dusty corner of Downtown Downey. The store specializes in one-of-a-kind, hardto-find knickknacks for the home and garden, and with its warm, colorful décor and friendly service reminiscent of an old-town type of Americana, it's created a loyal following.

It's the only store of its kind in Downey, or Southern California for that matter.

"I get a lot of customers come over from the Embassy Suites who are from Boston and the East Coast," says Peralta, whose store sits on 3rd Street one block east of Downey Avenue. "And they tell me, 'We have these stores back home, but we never see them over here.' So this store here is pretty unique."

Peralta opened the store nearly five years ago with the help of her family and friends. She and her husband, Donald, previously ran Peralta Hardwood Flooring but when Linda started spending more and more time tending to her crafts and dolls, at the time just a hobby, they decided to make it into a busi-

rustic wooden displays. Lining the walls, hanging from the ceiling and resting on tables are all of the store's distinctive offerings.

"It was really hard at first," recalls Peralta, speaking about the store's first few months. "I would get these beautiful dolls and I would want to keep them to myself. The hardest part was setting prices. Sometimes I would mark a price and my friend would say, 'You really think you're getting that much for that doll?' But I've learned that this is a business and I have to keep things affordable for my customers." Most, if not all, items in the store are clearly marked with prices. And seasonal items are housed in the rear at additional discounts.

Peralta also maintains a large mailing list to which she mails coupons and announcements of store specials.

Time Traveler Soldier's own tales of the South Pacific

t started in Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., and it ended in Yokohama, Japan, and along the way the Commander of Downey's VFW Post 2325 compiled his own tales of the South Pacific that could well rival those of the better known James Michener.

John Vincent is best known today as the president of the Downey Historical Society and as a poet whose work is a favorite in the Eagle's own "Poet's Corner", but as a young man Vincent served in the U.S. Army as a military policeman.

Vincent recalls sitting aboard a troop ship in Tokyo Bay, watching the battleship Missouri where Gen. Douglas MacArthur accepted the surrender of the Japanese to end the final armed chapter of World War II.

Soon after, Vincent was ashore at Yokohama, supervising a group of former Japanese soldiers who were put to work as laborers. One of these had a suspicious lump under his tunic, which on inspection proved to be a 10-pound bag of sugar.

Vincent said the MPs placed a noose around the would-be thief's neck and then threw the end of the rope over a beam. But as the man's hands were lashed behind him, they also placed a portion of the line between his hands.

Thus, while he was hauled skyward to the horror of his fellow prisoners as an example of the fate of thieves, he actually dangled there less than a minute while the others were trooped out, and was then let down. He had held his own weight by his hands, and had not been hanged as it appeared to his unhappy fellows.

Stealing was not just a problem with the Japanese. Vincent recalls one ambitious U.S. private who actually sold a U.S. Liberty Ship to the Chinese during the occupation. He eventually was caught and ended up in Leavenworth federal penitentiary.

Vincent asks in his best Shakespearian, "What's in a name?" Then relates the tale of a G.I. named Lusher, who got so drunk one night he walked off the gangplank in full military pack. Nearby Navy personnel hauled him and the pack out of the ocean.

Resolution may save Downey thousands

• City Council supports legislation that could save City over \$950,000.

DOWNEY—After a detailed and luminous presentation by Director of Public Works Desi Alvarez, who was praised for his efforts, the City Council adopted a resolution supporting a proposed state legislation to amend the State Water Code that would require groundwater replenishment assessments be based on the actual cost of service to replenish a groundwater basin.

A cost allocation study conducted by an independent consultant shows that the Replenishment Assessment (RA) for the Central Basin, from which Downey draws its water, should cost only \$83 per acre-foot, whereas that for the West Coast Basin should be \$366 per acre-foot. Currently, because assessments are based on the average of the two basins, Central Basin pumpers are in effect subsidizing West Coast Basin pumpers by \$10.7 million per year.

It is this disparity that the resolution addresses, which would mean a savings of over \$950,000 to the city of Downey if it is legislated into (state) law.

In other action the Council:

•Received public comment on the Community Block Grant and Home Partnership Investment programs for FY 2007-2008. This is one of two precondition public hearings prior to formalizing receipt by the city of federal CDBG and HOME grants, together with the submission of an Action Plan, to benefit low and moderate-income residents ;

•Approved agreement with Smith-Emery Laboratories in the amount of \$18,784 for material testing and inspection for Stewart & Gray Road;

•Accepted traffic safety improvements and maintenance responsibility for work done by GMC Engineering, Inc. on Paramount Blvd.; approved extra work in the amount of \$64,636.42; and appropriated \$19,373.83 in gas tax funds for the purpose;

•Approved plans and specifications and grant authority to advertise for bids for the communication area remodel at Fire Station No. 1;

•Approved the annual Investment Policy for Public Funds of the city of Downey and its related entities, in accordance with Government Code 53646 (a)(2);

•Approved the sole source acquisition of an alerting system for the fire stations from Teleque in the amount of \$87,500;

•Ratified the appointment of Councilmember Anne Bayer as temporary alternate for L.A. County Sanitation Districts 2 and 18 meetings held on Jan. 24, 2007;

•Approved a city-wide contest for naming the new city park at 12400 Clark Ave. (former NASA site), with Councilmember Mario Guerra suggesting that, to better conform to the learning center's theme, one of the criteria be that it's space-oriented;

•Adopted a resolution appointing specific representatives (Mrs. Maurina Lee, Finance Manager, as sub alternate to primary alternate John Michicoff, with Mayor Rick Trejo as primary rep) to the Independent Cities Risk Management Authority;

•Adopted a resolution ordering the City Engineer to prepare and file a report on assessments within Lighting and Landscaping District A.D.121 for FY 2007-2008;

•Introduced an ordinance amending Section 3186 of the Downey Municipal Code relating to the speed limit for Tweedy Lane;

•Adopted an ordinance adopting a negative declaration of environmental impacts and approved zone change No. 06-97, thereby rezoning 59 parcels (bounded by Hall Road, Bellflower Blvd., Lakewood Blvd., and Southern Pacific Railroad) from R-3 to R-2:





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


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•Adopted an ordinance amending Section 3186 of the Downey Municipal Code relating to the speed limit for Quill Drive;

•Approved new gates and masonry wall for perimeter security at Fire Station No. 1 in the amount of \$55,000; and

•Approved an agreement with Delphi Productions in the amount of \$74,800 for the continued fabrication of exhibits for the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center.

A portrait of generosity at Downey Regional

• Bob and Maya Mayer's \$400k contribution lands them inside DRMC's Founder's Circle.

DOWNEY – Bob and Maya Mayer, with a recent gift of \$400,000, joined a revered group of people last week when they were inducted into Downey Regional Medical Center's Founder's Circle.

As major contributors to the hospital, they now have a new portrait hanging inside DRMC's Founder's Gallery inside the hospital's main lobby.

"Bob was a 25-year resident of Downey. His three children attended school here. He is a true entrepreneur," said Jack Campbell, a DRMC board and Founder's Circle member, who served as Master of Ceremonies for the portraits unveiling. "Most of you know this from the magnificent, 524-room Hyatt Regency Resort & Spa where we've had the Charter Ball for the past four years, and beyond that he has built 25,000 residential and commercial units. Bob is one of the most innovative and visionary people to come out of Downey.

Campbell also announced that a new Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory will be built at the hospital. It's expected to be "among the finest labs in Southern California," and will be named after the Mayer's and the Guenther Foundation.

Renovation of the lab is expected later this year, hospital officials said. The lab is designed to diagnose and treat patients with heart disease, as well as patients with blockage in the circulatory system.

"Heart disease has the highest mortality rate of all diseases in the U.S.," Hospital Board Chair Mary Lou Schmidt remarked at the unveiling. "We at Downey Regional have had one of the best heart programs in Southern California and our cardiac services represent a large portion of our patient care. Your gift will help us to continue to provide the latest and the best care for our patients suffering from heart disease."

Corporate Board Chair Ron Kolar added his appreciation, noting, "Your gift will enable us to keep pace with the constant improvements in cardiac equipment and in the further training of our staff."

Dr. Kaushal Tamboli, past chairman of the Division of Cardiovascular Services, offered his thanks on behalf of the Cardiology department: "Last year our Cardiac Cath Lab provided services to 1,682 patients, which represented an increase of 494 patients over the previous year. The new Cath Lab will expand capabilities to include additional vascular services such as renal and ilac angiography and interventional therapies. Our new Cath Lab will be a tremendous gift for the surrounding community."

DRMC President and CEO Allen Korneff told the Mayers, "We are honored to honor you. It means a lot to us that you've been so much a part of this community... Non-profit hospitals are so dependent on gifts to provide medical care. For those people you're helping us to serve, thank you very much."

Location, location, location

Peralta says she gets most of her business from right here in Downey, although some people make the drive from as far as Riverside. Business people from nearby banks and stores stop in during the day, as do City Hall employees and Downey police officers.

Parishioners from First Baptist Church, right across the street, have also found the store.

"Our location is a little off," admits Peralta, who makes her home in Downey. "But the rent is affordable, and it's a little quieter here, which is nice. We have great church neighbors and everybody looks out for us."

In fact, Peralta says, on the rare occasions her store is hit with graffiti, it's removed so quickly she never notices. "My neighbors will come up to me and show me the spot and I'll be like, 'Yeah, I guess that paint is a little off.' My neighbors are great."

The whole family helps with the store's daily maintenance. When Peralta, herself, isn't manning the shop, it's likely that one of her daughters is. Amanda (30), Jennifer (24) and Ashley (20) all assist their mom. Husband Donald is the resident handyman.

The store's official name is Oh How Cute Country & General Store, which Peralta registered with the City of Downey before they opened. But another vendor with the same name threatened the Peraltas with legal action if they didn't take down their signage.

The Peraltas said they cleared the name with the City beforehand and had already printed flyers and business cards, but being just a small-town mom-and-pop shop, they grudgingly complied.

Still, name or no name, the shop has flourished. Peralta is even giving up doing shows at the Sugar Plum Arts & Crafts Festival, a regular gathering of craft dealers from across the country, to invest more time and money into her own store.

Peralta says she's received offers from people wanting to buy the store, but so far she's refused.

"I think people just see the glamour," she says. "They don't see all the hard work that goes into it."

So do her customers have anything to worry about?

Peralta shakes her head and smiles.

"My customers have nothing to worry about."

Educators encouraged to claim classroom costs

DOWNEY – As the April 17 deadline to file tax returns approaches, Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard encourages teachers, teachers' aides, principals and counselors to take advantage of a federal tax deduction for school supplies purchased with their own money.

The \$250 deduction - available to educators regardless of whether they itemize - can be taken by an educator for unreimbursed school-related expenses for items such as books, pencils, scissors, paper and art supplies, computer equipment, and other supplementary materials.

"I was pleased Congress passed legislation to extend this tax break for the 2006 and 2007 tax years for our hard-working teachers," Roybal-Allard said. "It's unfortunate that teachers are often not provided with all the school supplies they need to effectively teach their students in the classroom. By making this tax deduction available, Congress is attempting to help the many caring teachers who use their own money to purchase necessities such as notebooks and pencils for their students.

"These educators are to be commended for their commitment to our children.'

According to the National Education Association, teachers spend an average of \$443 of their own money each year on school supplies for their students.

The tax deduction can be taken by both public and private school educators from kindergarten through 12th grade. To be eligible, the educator must work in a school for at least 900 hours in a school year. In addition, teachers must be prepared to show receipts for the eligible purchases.

> "Oh, we won't go back to Subic anymore, We won't go back to Subic anymore, We won't go back to Subic, The mosquitoes there are too big! We won't go back to Subic anymore..."

Vincent was also a military bugler, a fact which has brought him both glory and grief on occasion. At Ft. Leonard Wood it was the latter. "Old Rex," says Vincent still shaking his head in memory of the police dog who was a mascot on the base.

Vincent suspects he was the victim of a plot, but one morning as he sounded his bugle to awaken the men the normally phlegmatic "Rex" attacked him and his horn.

"He normally liked me," says Vincent, again shaking his head.

To make matters worse, the whole company cheered on the dog. Vincent swears he (Vincent) wasn't that bad a bugler.

He's never been a nervous type, but he admits he sweated a bit aboard a troop ship as Japanese torpedo planes attacked during the Battle of Leyte Gulf.

Roybal-Allard joins appropriations group

The Transportation-HUD Subcommittee funds all programs and subagencies of the U.S. Department of Transportation, including those related to aviation, surface transportation, maritime and rail systems, as well as the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness and the Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation.

The congresswoman will continue her work on the Labor, health and Juman Services and Education Subcommittee, where she has been an advocate for health research and preventative health programs, workforce training programs, and programs to enhance educational access for all Americans. On the Homeland Security Subcommittee, the congresswoman oversees funding for immigration processing, border and port security, as well as a wide variety of area emergency preparedness efforts, including providing police and firefighters with the training and equipment they need to respond quickly and effectively to emergencies. The powerful House Appropriations Committee is responsible for much of the nation's federal spending. The committee considers 12 annual spending measures which provide funding for a wide range of activities such as national defense, education and crime prevention. These measures also fund general government operations, including the administration of federal agencies.

If you've ever picked up a Kong animal toy from a local Petco or Petsmart, those oddly-shaped, red-looking bouncy things (for lack of a better description), chances are it was packaged by the people over at Arc.

Ever buy those nice bath soaps they sell at Trader Joe's? The one's that come in tiny cardboard packages that always slip out of your hands just trying to open them? (If they're that hard to open, imagine trying to put them together!) Yep, those were probably packed by an Arc team member too.

And when the L.A. Marathon passes out those goodie bags March 4 - thousands of them - each filled with up to 55 different bits and pieces per bag, you can bet it was an Arc employee who stuffed it.

And you can bet he/she stuffed it with a smile on their face. It's tedious, tiresome, arduous work.

But these employees love it.

In fact, the only time they complain, according to Kevin MacDonald, executive director of Arc of Southeast Los Angeles County, is when they don't have *enough* work to do.

Know anybody like that at *your* office?

So efficient are the employees of Southeast Industries, the official name of Arc's packaging and assembly plant, the company rarely mentions to its clients that the work is done by "disabled" adults.

Arc doesn't play the sympathy card; Southeast Industries is sold on its efficiency and competence.

One employee, who only has the use of one hand, was having trouble filling orders so staff contrived a special device to help him grip materials.

No surprise, these employees have been overcoming obstacles all their lives.

Arc started receiving financial support from the State of California 13 years ago. And in those 13 years that funding has increased just once.

Three percent.

Meanwhile, costs rise.

Downey Kiwanis, Rotary, and countless other organizations have been kind enough to contribute money to Arc. Trouble is, lots of donors don't want their contributions going towards personnel, they want new computers and upgraded equipment, which is great, but there are still bills to pay.

"Grants are good for equipment, but it doesn't pay payroll," says Kevin. "We're still operating payroll to payroll."

Sales at Arc's three local thrift stores are on the decline, says Kevin, and it may only be a matter of time before they're forced to close.

It's not all bad news though. The upcoming Arc Walk for Independence (March 24) is thriving, growing from year to year in both number of participants and money raised. When the walk will reach its peak is anybody's guess, but Arc hopes to raise \$100,000 this vear.

It's an ambitious goal that will take a lot of work.


But, remember, these guys have been overcoming obstacles all of their lives.



She was predeceased by her husband Orval and son Danny.



On February 17, 2003, my father, Ray T. Lake, passed away at the age of 85. Although it has been four years since my father's death, the thought occurred to me friends and co-workers he worked with for at least 20 years in Downey may not have known of his passing.

My father was preceded in death by my mother, Verna in 1990 in Tehachapi, California. And, shortly before his death, his middle daughter Linda passed away in Oregon. One year after his death, his oldest daughter Kathleen passed away in Tehachapi, California.

A native Californian, he was born May 2, 1917 in Los Angeles. He was a member of the boy scouts for many years and served his country in the Army during World War II. After the war, our family moved to Norwalk where he lived until he retired.

He had been the Director of Building and Safety in West Covina before accepting the position in Downey. After retiring as the Director of Building and Safety, he and my mother moved to Tehachapi, California.



Disneyland as Asst. Stage Manager-and proud of it. Hired in 2000, Christine, all of 30 years of age, is responsible for the lighting, the music and sound system, scene design, the props, etc., of any live Disney show held at the theme resort or outside its confines.

She reports to Manager of Stage Management Karen Sitz, whose experience (15 years) she values, not counting her previous rich background as performer, producer and project planner. Sometimes Christine works the regular 9 to 5 shift; at times she'd slave from 10 p.m. to 8 a.m.

With this arrangement, and working with some 20 mostly full-time and a few part-time staffers, Christine can be found working on "Aladdin a Musical Spectacular" at both Disneyland and Disney California Adventure venues (Wed.-Sun.) and "Playhouse Disney Live on Stage" (six times a day/seven days a week). Late at night, she can either be found on the Rivers of America assisting with "Fantasmic!", or she can be found calling the Disneyland fireworks show, "Remember...Dreams Come True." She also supervises the seven-times-a- week "Disney Princess Fantasy Fair."

Working with celebrities comes with the territory. She has worked with Jim Belushi, in 2004, doing the ABC Primetime Weekend; with Julie Andrews, as part of the Disneyland 50th Anniversary Celebration; with Steve Martin on "50 Great Moments" at the Lincoln Theatre; with Fess Parker at the Hollywood Bowl (along with Dick Sherman, who wrote the music for "Mary Poppins," "It's A Small World" and the Tikki Room); and Johnny Depp and Orlando Bloom, for the "Pirates of the Caribbean Dead Man's Chest" movie premiere held on the Rivers of America. She has worked as well with Dick Van Dyke and Andy Garcia.

For her "dedication to each show she works on as well as taking on many new challenges along the way," Christine was inducted last December into the Disneyland Resort Entertainment Hall of Fame.

As is often the case, Christine can look back to an earlier time when the stage bug bit. She recalls when her grandmother, Downey resident Dottie Thompson, used to take her to Cerritos College to attend her plays. An amateur actress, Dottie at one time reigned (even in her 60s!) at the college as Homecoming Queen. Distinction runs in the family. Her mother, Joan, who teaches second grade at Maude Price, was voted "Teacher of the Year" last year. Her dad, Gary, is the former Chief of Police in Culver City, and currently works at Fullerton's Hope International University, which Christine attended after Warren. Her younger brother, Scott, is a pastor.

Christine worked earlier as a lifeguard, camp counselor, for Blockbuster Video and for two summers at the Downey Parks and Recreation. She had traveled twice to Edinburgh, Scotland for the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, an experience she cherishes. Prior to all this, she used to perform at the Downey Theatre, danced for the Showcase Studio, and at one time competed in the Miss Downey Pageant of 1992.

Saying she's lucky to be working at Disneyland, she lists some qualities her job demands: one must be organized, a good communicator, you must think on your feet, must have the respect of cast and crew, and must think creatively in unusual situations (e.g., when a prop goes missing, or when one is confronted by a wrong costume, and "a host of other things"). "There's nothing routine about the job," she says

Christine is as excited as ever about her department's next big project-another "Pirates of the Caribbean" spectacular to celebrate the movie's third sequel premiere. Still, she says, neither film nor TV excites her as much as live theater.



CUBIS LOGIC!

It was a simple set-up: an allwhite room with two reclining chairs, two mirrors and two tracks of lighting. But for a group of young, talented musicians, it had become their haven – their recording studio.

Located in the basement of Trinity Baptist Church in Downey, *Cubis Logic* took advantage of the open space, cluttering every inch of carpet with cords, instruments, amps, sound equipment and Monster energy drinks. They were recording their newest album – an album they hope brings an agent their way.

The band, consisting of guitarist Coy Sarell, 21, lead singer Jeff Freberg, 26, guitarist Tim Sarell, 16, bassist and pianist Rick Mora, 20, and drummer Andy Zamora, 24, look far beyond money and fame, and instead desire to make a living doing what they love most – making music.

They would tell you they are "progressively getting better," but I would tell you they don't need much improvement at all. They prop't a trained such hand that can be

I had the opportunity to talk with *Cubis Logic* and although they are all extremely gifted in their musical abilities, it was their passion for the art of music that really stood out. Here's what they had to say:

Downey Patriot: Where did the name Cubis Logic come from and what does it mean?

Coy Sarell: It comes from the art form "cubism," where you look at a figure and you can see all different angles just by looking through one angle. How it relates to life is, as a band, we try to look at everything from all angles, including music, politics and religion. Logic, obviously, is a way of thinking and we put the two together to create *Cubis Logic*.

DP: When was the band started?

CS: Summer of 2005.

DP: *Who decided to start the band and why?*

CS: It really came from a band I used to play bass in and I really wanted to be more of the originator of the songs and actually write them. I was tired of being in bands that lasted two weeks and only wrote two songs. I wanted to start something serious.

Jeff Freberg: I would say it's because of the love for the music. We all just love to play music and the sound of music. Because of that, we decided to come together and try to share that with others. We absolutely love music and it's absolutely what we want to do.

DP: What inspires your music?

Andy Zamora: It's all about the music we enjoy individually. Tim likes hard core and I like ska and reggae...two completely different types of music. We don't like the same types of music, but we can come togeth-

JF: It's not just one or two songwriters anymore...it's everyone writing songs.

AZ: We all bring in our ideas and we just improvise.

DP: What are some of the best experiences you have had as a band? Tim Sarell: HOT CHICKS! (Laughs) But playing at The Knitting Factory in Hollywood was pretty cool...it was my first venue show.

JF: My favorite is when we come together and take something that has no shape or form and put it together...it's a sense of accomplishment. We realize that WE made something and that we're succeeding and doing something that no one else has done yet.

CS: We've conceived a musical love child (Laughs).

Rick Mora: Working through two songwriting processes – one by Coy and one by Tim. Those were the moments that really brought out the chemistry of the band and really brought out how well we can work together and how well we can think together.

AZ: Having these guys as friends. I've been in other bands before and when all was said and done, they weren't my friends in the end. These are my friends in the music...it's not about meeting chicks or conceiving babies (Laughs).

DP: What are some bad experiences you have had as a band?

AZ: Coy fumbling his guitar cords, dropping amps, kicking cords, breaking strings...anything unprofessional. If we are going to play, we need to be professional about it. It's not just about rocking out.

CS: Jeff crashing my car [right before a show at the Stardust Lounge]! But it ended up being okay because I didn't have to pay off my car.

JF: I had a few bruises but we still played the show that night.TS: For me, my bad experiences are because of my curfew...I'm always getting in trouble for breaking curfew.JF: Having to kick people out of the band. It's not fun when you have

to kick people out. You also fear hurting that person's feelings and losing a friendship.

RM: My worst experience so far is breaking the E-String in a La Habra show. It was the second to last song and I had just tuned up the bass and on the first cord, I broke the string, so I had to figure out how to play the song without it.

DP: What are some challenges you have faced as a band?

JF: Getting shows is really tough. We're trying to get out there and network.

AZ: Having a proper website...for some reason we can't update our website.

RM: The most challenging thing for me was not really being a bass player. I had to go through the process of learning the instrument and buying all the equipment – a bass, an amp, etc. It involved a lot of risk.

DP: What are some of your successes?

AZ: Coming out with our album. And I know for a fact that will open up a lot of doors and provide opportunities to get some shows.

JF: Being able to have what we have – we have a recording studio and an engineer and that alone gives us an advantage.

DP: Have you had any progress in getting an agent?

AZ: Well, we need an album in order for us to present ourselves to an agent. We want something that is well-produced with good sound quality, which is what we're working on right now.

DP: What makes your band different?


TS: The fact that there's a 10 year difference between the youngest and oldest guy. I'm still in high school, while everyone else is out of high school already.

JF: Our sound is very unique. There's not a whole lot of people that sound like me when they sing and I don't think there's anybody that plays drums like Andy. Rick can play just about any instrument...he could literally pick up anything and play live.

AZ: Coy has a lot to do with our style. He and Tim have the same mentality and sometimes they come up with weird, obscure ideas.

JF: What they come up with is not linear.

RM: There's detours and off-ramps (Laughs). They bring two different dynamics and approaches - Coy is more about the art of thoughts and expressions through music, while Tim focuses on the science of the music and what sounds good.

DP: What topics do you address in your songs?

JF: Situations we have overcome. For example, work, bands, friends, religious backgrounds, etc. Not anything specific, it's just different.

TS: And we don't cuss.

DP: How far do you want your band to go?

JF: We just want to go as far as the music will take us. If it takes us into Blink 182 status, then we will be there. If it takes us into Underoath status, then we will be there. They are completely different statuses. We don't want to compromise what we're doing...we just want to be able to make the music that we love and share it with others.
