No development at Johnie's for 10 months

• Results from police's criminal investigation, meanwhile, expected in two weeks.

DOWNEY – A moratorium halting development of the Johnie's Broiler property was extended for another 10 months and 15 days by the City Council this week. The unanimous vote gives the city more time to explore their developmental options with the site, located at 7447 E. Firestone Blvd.

Some residents, including those from the "Friends of Johnie's" and the Los Angeles Conservancy, have called for the restaurant to be redeveloped to its past grandeur, citing the drive-in's historical and cultural significance to not only Downey, but the entire Southern California region.

Others, however, argue for property owner Cristos Smyrniotis' right to redevelop the site, which had grown dilapidated in recent years and served as a used car dealership since 2002.

The building was almost entirely bulldozed on Jan. 7. No demoli-

-tion permits were pulled from the city, officials said, and police treated the matter as a crime.

Police officials said the case was in the hands of the District Attorney and their findings are expected to be presented to the city in two weeks.

Smyrniotis previously told this newspaper that he knew nothing about the demolition and blamed his tenants for the destruction.

Supporters of Johnie's Broiler, meanwhile, organized a "ghost cruise" last Sunday. A large turnout of classic cars cruised from Bob's Big Boy in Toluca Lake to Johnie's Broiler, where volunteers collected nearly 300 petition signatures calling for the restaurant's complete restoration.

A permit to turn Johnie's into a "retail mall" was received by the city last October. The request was denied by the City of Downey Planning Division a month later.

Time Traveler Garden hose made international headlines

n July 4, 1955, a common plastic garden hose brought the world's print and electronic media to a previously quiet home on Alderdale Avenue and turned the lives of the Downey residents into a living hell.

Rockwell's space shuttle has since made Downey famous and the Rose Float parades down Colorado Boulevard in Pasadena every New Year's Day. But in 1955 the garden hose that suddenly started burrowing straight down into the ground was probably the most famous event ever to occur here.

It set the news world on its ear.

George J. Di Peso hated that hose.

It started on a Thursday afternoon when Di Peso's daughter, Suzanne, was watering the lawn. She suddenly ran to the house and announced that the garden hose was going straight down into the ground and she couldn't pull it out.

Her mother couldn't budge it either.

Di Peso tried to pull it out with his truck. Not only did the truck fail, but the hose continued to gain in its effort to disappear into Mother Earth.

By Saturday night, 17 feet of the hose had gone down the hole. Arthur Swisher, field superintendent for the Arroyo Ditch and Water

DOWNEY—Confirming rumors, the City Council at the conclusion of its regular meeting Tuesday decided to terminate the services of City Attorney/Economic Development Director Charles S. Vose effective July 1, 2007.

According to City Clerk Kathleen L. Midstokke, the effectivity of the termination coincides with Vose's retirement date.

She wouldn't divulge the reasons for the stunning development, saying the matter, decided upon in closed session, was "confidential."

She would say only that staff has been directed to initiate the process to retain a law firm to assume the functions of the City Attorney's office, as well as to recruit a new Economic Development Director.

DOWNEY - Temple Ner Tamid of Downey will celebrate one of Judaism's most joyous holidays on March 4 at 4 p.m.



Hackers infiltrate museum's phone lines

DOWNEY - The Downey Museum of Art had to change all access codes on their message and phone lines after their voicemail was breached by international hackers last week.

According to Kate Davies, executive director of the museum, anyone who called the museum last week would hear a young man heavily breathing instead of the museum's message.

After the public alerted the museum of the distorted message, MCI Fraud Unit was able to trace the hacking back to the Philippines. According to MCI, the hackers gained illegal entry into the voicemail through their computers, hoping to leave a message that could be used for fraudulent long distance calls that would later be rerouted to the caller's phone.

Since the incident, DMOA has returned its voicemail to its normal recording.







Company took a look. His only explanation was that the area around Rancho Los Amigos was known to contain quicksand. He said that might explain the hose's sinking, but didn't explain how the hose got through the thick layer of topsoil to begin with.

It couldn't be gophers, reasoned the experts, because gophers don't go straight down and have not been known to overpower trucks. The nearest sewer line was 30 feet away.

In the 1950s atomic radiation was a catch-all explanation for many aspects of the unknown. Geiger counters were called in, but they showed no unusual radiation.

Old-timers suggested that the Rio Hondo River might have changed its underground channel and be sucking the hose down.

Others recalled when they buried a cow 10 years before and barely got out of the pit alive when it caved in due to quicksand.

By this time the nation's wire service had got hold of the story.

Di Peso was disgusted with media hounds tramping across his lawn and asking him the same questions again and again. He was so tired he decided to end the matter, and cut the hose off Sunday night, covering over the spot where it had entered the earth.

The media and amateur scientists were aghast. They appealed to his sense of fair play. He couldn't just walk away from this!

Overwhelmed, he dug up the hose end and wired the pieces back together. It was now Tuesday night. The hose had slowed down. But it was still inching its way downward.

Meanwhile, in keeping with their growing fame as the keepers of the hose, the Di Peso family appeared on Art Linkletter's TV show, "House Party," and were given a TV. One Samaritan even donated \$5 for Di Peso to repair his battered lawn.

After the TV appearance the hose mania cooled down. The world may never know whether the hose disappeared into the earth in its entirety or was again cut. Di Peso had stopped talking. He and his family breathed a sigh of relief and returned to a normal life.

However, the hose has never been completely forgotten. John Vincent of the Downey Historical Society received a phone call from a columnist on the Baltimore Sun in July of 1988. The writer wanted to know if there was anything new about the hose?

His newspaper had carried a series of stories on the odd incident in 1955, and he said he'd encountered the old clippings and thought he'd call.

So you see, the story resurfaces occasionally, even though the hose doesn't!

For the majority of my life, I have been raised going to church. And in the countless number of times I have sat in the green-colored pews, I have heard the personal testimonies of many individuals, ranging from the professional football player that was addicted to drugs, to the man who nearly killed his family and himself. Their testimonies weren't just about overcoming their addictions and problems, but more so about how God gave them new life.

In a packed sanctuary at Calvary Chapel of Downey two weeks ago, I heard a testimony unlike any I have ever heard before. Twenty-four year old Nick Vujicic has never been addicted to drugs, committed a crime or had thoughts of suicide. He instead has had to endure emotional hurts due to his physical appearance – he was born without arms and legs.

At first glance, it is a little strange to see a man made of only a head, torso and what he calls a "chicken wing," a piece of flesh that mocks the look of a foot, minus three toes. And you can't help but wonder how a person with such circumstances can be so happy and filled with life.

For Nick, it's all about perspective. Is it hard to live without the help of two arms and legs? Of course. Is it frustrating and sometimes unbearable? Undoubtedly. But for Nick, he looks at his life as a short visit here on Earth, and why not share his story with those who face challenges, whether physical or not.

There may be no medical explanation for Nick's condition, but he knows that there is a reason for everything - it's just a matter of what you do with what you're given.

For him, it's a transformation of going, "from life without limbs, to life without limits."






In other action the Council:

•Adopted an urgency ordinance extending, for a period of 10 months and 15 days, a moratorium on any further actions affecting the property known as "Johnie's Broiler' located at 7447 E. Firestone Blvd. Councilmember Kirk Cartozian said the situation won't be resolved overnight and that the moratorium will provide sufficient time to consider all possible options (concurred by everyone), including laying the groundwork for possible "criminal and civil" litigation (Dave Gafin), against the property owner.

Lennie Whittington suggested that the graffiti problem at the site was getting worse, and that abatement procedures are needed.

•Approved the extension of an on-call real estate appraisal services agreement with The Bronstein Company Inc. (TBC), as the city continues with its right-of-way acquisition efforts for Phase 3 of the Lakewood Boulevard Improvement (LBI) Project (between Telegraph Rd. and Fifth St.). The city has worked with Tarzana-based TBC before. The agreement applies to other related projects, including roadway improvements (anticipating future increased traffic volumes) at the Paramount Blvd./Firestone Blvd. and Bellflower Blvd./Imperial Highway intersections;

•Referred to a Hearing Officer an appeal of conditions on the previously issued police permit for entertainment/dancing issued to Hully Gully, located at 9559 Imperial Highway;

•Adopted a resolution prohibiting parking of vehicles on both sides of Paramount Blvd. (between Florence Ave. and Lubec St.), a distance of approximately 800 ft., to "improve traffic flow, reduce congestion and enhance traffic safety." The measure would moreover ease the movement of emergency vehicles as Fire Station No. 3 is located in that stretch;

•Adopted a resolution approving the final subdivision of Parcel

Map No. 60925, located at 9804 Brookshire Ave., approving an agreement with the subdivider and accepted a subdivision improvement cash deposit as surety. The agreement contains necessary public works and safety improvements as conditions of approval. The improvements generally call for installation of a streetlight, street trees, water meters, sewer laterals, driveway approaches, and property line monuments;

•Adopted an ordinance amending Section 3186 of the Downey Municipal Code relating to the speed limits for Tweedy Lane. The California Vehicle Code (CVC) requires engineering and traffic (E&T) surveys be conducted periodically for many roadway segments in order to post speed limits and allow enforcement by radar. Based on recently completed E&T surveys by the Public Works Department, in conjunction with still current 2004 Federal/State manual procedures, the speed limit between Florence Ave. and Suva St. will be increased from 25mph to 30 mph, that between Suva St. and Gallatin Rd. stays at 25 mph (speed limit is always 25mph in school zones when children are present);

•Awarded a cash contract to Palp, Inc., dba Excel Paving Company, who submitted the lowest bid, in the amount of almost \$2.5 million, and appropriating \$1.5 million from the Prop C Funds and \$1.1 million from the Gas Tax Fund, for the construction of raised medians of Imperial Highway between Bellflower Blvd. and Paramount Blvd., for a total distance of about 1.9 miles.

In the course of further deliberations, with contributions from the floor and Councilmembers alike, it was made clear that similar improvements to cover the entire city limits of the Imperial Highway corridor are planned. After Councilmember Mario Guerra pointed out that the proposed new light on La Reina St. would have a disruptive impact on the immediate vicinity, City Manager Gerald Caton said a team including perhaps the concerned Councilmember(s) seek the input of the would-be affected citizens, and that the matter be brought up in the next Council meeting.

•After the City Clerk formally brought up the matter of the varying

agenda placement order of the "City Council Announcements, Requests for Future Agenda Items and Conference Meeting Reports," the Council, in a minute action, decided to place Council Announcements at the top of the hour, to take advantage of a greater crowd at the beginning of meetings, and put Requests for Future Agenda Items at the end.

Gafin says he is reviving the concept of a town hall meeting. The first of such meetings was scheduled for yesterday, March 1, at Alameda Elementary; the second is scheduled for Wednesday, March 7 at Carpenter. He said Asst. to the City Manager Scott Pohmren has prepared a 20minute PowerPoint presentation for the purpose.

In other non-agenda public comments, someone pointed out that the city look into the fencing that would protect the proposed Space Learning Center and park. The Council said it would attend to this.

In closing staff comments, Caton dispelled fears by some that the opening of the Downy Landing retail complex might have a deleterious effect on Stonewood Mall. Instead, the City Manager said, Stonewood reported a 5 percent sales increase last year, and made plans to add capital improvements to the mall.

The next regular public meeting of the City Council will be on Tuesday, March 13 at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall, 11111 Brookshire Ave.





-cessing and student/parent information services, grant writing, and uniform complaint procedures-all of which point to one overarching goal: student achievement.

Of Scottish descent, Cairns is thus charged with the monumental task of making sure each middle school and high school student on the campuses succeed academically. Of course, despite everybody's best efforts, 100 percent success is not achieved. This pains her no end. She believes that with the right program, the right learning and support environment, and enough encouragement (and, of course, a responsive, willful student), there's no reason why every student enrolled in the district should not graduate. After all, all kinds of support mechanisms are in place. Remediation and intervention measures, including tutorials and the like, provide avenues where students may be put right back on track. This is what federally-mandated programs such as No Child Left Behind, etc., are meant to accomplish.

Cairns uses her own experience as an example of how students and parents "can make a difference." She grew up, in Rosemead, with her mother, who never graduated high school, and they barely scraped by. Further, lacking a real role model, she was only a "B" student, she says, all through her primary grades and high school, just marking time, and working at odd jobs.

Something her mother said at one point about want of ambition woke her up, and regarded it as a challenge. Wanting to prove her mother wrong, she somehow enrolled at Cal Poly "to become a scientist, to find a cure for cancer." Once in college, she really hunkered down and willed herself to make straight "A's," making Phi Beta Kappa. Mission accomplished, amazing her mother.

She possessed athletic skills as well. In high school, she had played tennis, varsity synchronized swimming basketball and softball. At CSU-Long Beach, she played volleyball, and continued with varsity softball. ("Those were my slimmer days"). Her physical regimen today includes working on the treadmill an hour a day, and with light weights. On weekends she walks her two West Highland terriers, 'Buddy' and 'Idgie'-"my two kids" and named out of 'Fried Green Tomatoes'-in the park and on the beach (she resides in Huntington Beach). Her decision to become a teacher came about unexpectedly. In a physical ed cass she was challenged to teach three foreign-born teenage girls who had never gone near the water how to swim.

Feisty as ever and up to any challenge hurled her way, Cairns says she labored for weeks to show the "green" girls how to float, how to breathe properly, etc. At the end of the 6-week course, she says she had the three swimming gleefully about in the water in triumph. The pains it took to teach as disparate a group as could be assembled, and the deeply rewarding results she felt at meeting her coach's challenge, made her decide right then and there to be a teacher instead.

Cairns' deep involvement with water continues to this day. Not only did she teach marine biology and oceanography, along with science and physical ed in the mid-70s through the mid-80s at Downey High, she has from time to time traveled to Maui to go scuba diving. In the course of which she says she has swam alongside reef sharks and spinner dolphins in 30to 100-ft. deep water, not recommended for rank tourist-amateurs..

Her travels are not confined to Hawaii. She has been to Japan, Tanzania, Kenya, Italy, France, England Belgium, Germany, and Czechoslovakia, among other places.

Cairns has gotten a fair amount of honors and recognitions for her work as teacher and administrator. Among them: the 1994 PTA Continuing Service Award (the "Golden Oak" Award), Griffiths Middle School; the 1996 Administrator of the Year Award given by the Los Angeles County Industrial Technology Education Association; and president of the Association of California School Administrators (ASCA), Region XIV, in 2004-2005.

At the next ASCA awards ceremony April 26 at the Grand Events Center in Long Beach, she will receive yet another leadership award, the prestigious "Central Office Administrator of the Year Award," representing her region. Here are excerpts from DUSD Superintendent Dr. Wendy Doty's ringing endorsement of her for the award: "Dr. Cairns' entire career has been in Downey, having served as a high school teacher, vice-principal, assistant principal, and middle school principal...As the Director of Secondary Education, (she) has provided strong leadership and support to our administrators and teachers... She has a strong passion for quality staff development, instrumental in introducing the AVID program to the district and has expanded the program to all of our secondary schools... Educators encouraged to claim classroom expenses

DOWNEY - As the April 17 deadline to file tax returns approaches, Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard encourages teachers, teachers aides, principals and counselors to take advantage of a federal tax deduction for school supplies purchased with their own money.

The \$250 deduction - available to educators regardless of whether they itemize - can be taken by an educator for unreimbursed school-related expenses for items such as books, pencils, scissors, paper and art supplies, computer equipment, and other supplementary materials used in the classroom

"I was pleased Congress passed legislation to extend this tax break for the 2006 and 2007 tax years for our hard-working teachers," Roybal-Allard said. "It's unfortunate that teachers are often not provided with all the school supplies they need to effectively teach their students in the classroom. By making this tax deduction available, Congress is attempting to help the many caring teachers who use their own money to purchase necessities such as notebooks and pencils for their students.

"These educators are to be commended for their commitment to our children."

According to the National Education Association, teachers spend an average of \$443 of their own money each year on school supplies for their students.

The tax deduction can be taken by both public and private school educators from kindergarten through 12th grade. To be eligible, the educator must work in a school for at least 900 hours in a school year. In addition, teachers must be prepared to show receipts for the eligible purchases.
