

A wild, Western design

Downey's 2008 entry in the Tournament of Roses Parade will feature an on-board can-can routine by Miss Downey and her Court and a live stunt show, courtesy Knott's Berry Farm.


DOWNEY - Can-Can Girls, a stunt show, saloon, boot hill and more will adorn the Downey Rose Float Association's entry in the 2008 Tournament of Roses Parade. The parade's theme this year is "Passports to the World's Celebrations".

The Downey Rose Float is celebrating "Wild Western Days", the title of their 56th consecutive float entry.

"Wild Western Days" features a realistic-looking old Western town. The buildings, which include a hotel, mercantile, feed and grain store, dentist, school house and saloon, will be built with a Victorian styled flair, using vibrant colors, Rose Float officials said. A stagecoach will be located at the front, while the boot hill, or cemetery, will be on the back.

"I feel that this will be one of the most spectacular floats Downey has every produced for the Tournament of Roses Parade," said Downey Rose Float President Gary DeRemer.

"Wild Western Days" will be 55 feet long, 25 feet high and 18 feet wide, the largest such float since 2003's "Midnight Rescue". Due to the float's size, preparation is already underway, as a construction crew is lengthening the chassis and installing a new long block Ford engine.

"You never know what variables will be encountered," he said. "The number of flowers and the amount of steel, paint, wood and foam all need to be taken into consideration. Plus, allowing for the possibility of rain."

Axle weight is limited, officials said, and only materials that will allow the float to remain within

A sound system will bring back the noises Old West, the windmill will rotate and the vulture will move. But the real entertainment will be the live action: Miss Downey and her Court will be performing a small can-can routine, while Knott's Berry Farm will be donating their stunt team and costuming for a live stunt show.

"Wild Western Days" was designed by Thom Neighbors, Jason Redfox and Roberts

According to DeRemer, "Thom, Jason and Kelley did a tremendous job designing this float."

Teacher's assistant accused of sex with boy


 Jean Panzo-Montalbano arrested for allegedly having sex with 16-year-old special ed. student.

DOWNEY - A 53-year-old teacher's assistant was arrested this week for allegedly having sex with a 16-year-old Downey High School special education student.

The teacher's assistant, Jean Panzo-Montalbano, 53, was not an employee of the Downey Unified School District but instead worked for the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), according to district officials.

The boy allegedly told police that he and Panzo-Montalbano, of Bellflower, had intercourse on numerous occasions, beginning last August.

Panzo-Montalbano was arrested Monday after she turned herself in to Downey police, authorities said. She is free on \$20,000 bond and is sched-

uled to be arraigned April 24 at Downey Superior Court. Officials at LACOE, headquartered on Imperial Highway in Downey, said they have placed Panzo-Montalbano on administrative leave and were sending notices out to the parents of children enrolled in special education programs.

Johnie's tenant files for court extension

DOWNEY - Ardas Yanik, the man charged with illegally demolishing what used to be Johnie's Broiler, filed for a continuance Wednesday and is now scheduled to appear in Downey Superior Court April 18.

Yanik, a Northridge resident, is facing five criminal misdemeanor charges related to the bulldozing of Johnie's on Jan. 7. Yanik faces up six months in jail and up to \$1,000 in fines on each count. Property owner Christos Smyrniotis was leasing the property to Yanik, who then subleased it Car Outlet Inc., a used car dealership that had been operating on the Johnie's property since 2002.

Time Traveler Women who dared to take to the air

The women who made history by pioneering flight in the Southland are I remarkable in their independence and daring.

The Time Traveler has already chronicled the story of Dorothy Ruether, who flew her OX5 Eagle Rock out of Ardis Field, a cow pasture south of what is now Rockwell.

And the world knows well the saga of Amelia Earhart, who flew throughout the Southland and whose death in the South Pacific is still a mystery.

But an even wilder and more daring woman of the air was Pancho Barnes, whose name is best known for her operation of the Happy Bottom Riding Club during the great test flight days at Edwards Air Force Base so colorfully chronicled by the book and subsequent motion picture "The Right Stuff."

She and America's greatest test pilot, Chuck Yeager, were kindred spirits who met at Edwards and realized they were alike almost at once. Both were great pilots who believed they could do almost anything in the air.

And both had a dangerous taste for excess.

Yeager's daring is told in "The Right Stuff" when he takes off without permission to single-handedly break the altitude record then held by the Russians. (Almost losing his life in the process). This, plus the fact he was the first pilot to break the sound barrier has secured his place in male aviation history.

Barnes' story is a series of events, each demonstrating independence and raw courage (which sometimes replaced good judgment).

Barnes was born in San Marino. Her maiden name was Florence Leontine Lowe, and as the daughter of a wealthy family, she studied ballet and manners as a child. All appeared to be proceeding well when a marriage between the girl and an Episcopal minister was arranged. But when she took up flying the "ordinary" in her life became a thing of the past.

She marked her break with tradition by buzzing her husband's Pasadena church in 1928. It then became strictly a life of adventure.

Nail salons targeted in string of robberies

DOWNEY - On March 25, just before 1 p.m., an armed man entered Magical Nail Salon located at 9976 Lakewood Blvd., ordering patrons to hand over their purses, according to the Downey Police Department.

The suspect is believed to be the same suspect involved in a series of robberies that occurred between October and November of 2006, authorities said.

Over a four-week period, three Downey nail salons were robbed by an armed assailant, with the first being Magical Nail Salon on Oct. 24. Queen's Hair and Nails, located at 12747 Bellflower Blvd., was robbed on Oct. 31. The suspect then returned to Magical Nail Salon on Nov. 5, followed by a robbery at L.A. Nails, located at 12840 Paramount Blvd., on Nov. 24. All robberies occurred between the hours of 11 a.m. and 6:30 p.m.

In each robbery, the suspect entered the nail salon brandishing a semiautomatic handgun. He demanded wallets and money from the customers and daily cash receipts from the business. No one was injured during any of the robberies.

The suspect is described as a Hispanic male, 20-30 years old, five feet six inches to five feet eight inches, 150-160 pounds, with black hair. In all of the robberies, the suspect was wearing a baseball cap. In three of the robberies, the suspect was wearing dark sunglasses. No vehicle has been seen.

DOWNEY - Daniel Vaughn, an English/language arts teacher at West Middle School, has been selected secretary-treasurer elect of the California Teachers Association (CTA) at its quarterly State Council of Education meeting in Los Angeles Sunday.

Vaughn, a classroom teacher for 27 years, joins CTA President-elect David Sanchez and Vice President-elect Dean Vogel as leaders of the 340,000-member organization. The trio will assume leadership of the state's largest educator and educational support staff organization when they begin their two-year term June 29.

She often flew from a field in South Gate.

In the late 1920s she was mentioned romantically with silent film star Ramon Novarro, and flew as a stunt pilot in the Howard Hughes' movie "Hells Angels." In fact, deciding that she and other stunt pilots were not paid enough, she helped organize the Motion Picture Pilots Association which represented film pilots for many years.

In 1930 she smashed a woman's speed record held by Amelia Earhart. But her name is famous for more than air records. She was wed several more times, once to a magician. She got her name "Pancho" when (disguised as a man) she allegedly worked as a crewman on a banana boat running guns to Mexican revolutionaries.

"Colorful" hardly describes her.

She sometimes barnstormed with her "Mystery Circus of the Air."

Certainly not a beauty herself, she could be merciless to women she considered "too" beautiful. One favorite trick was to give an unsuspecting beauty a ride in the "Mystery Circus." The debutante, strapped into a parachute (allegedly for safety), was then tossed out at altitude, the chute opening by way of a rip-cord as she fell. Many a young woman floated down screaming to the audience below. This also resulted in some legal matters.

The courts didn't seem to bother Barnes at all.

In 1933 she traded an apartment building she owned in Los Angeles for an 80-acre ranch in the Antelope Valley.

A mother and respectable hog rancher, things might have cooled down, but the Air Force discovered the 44 miles of dry lake near her ranch made a perfect testing field.

It was first called Muroc Army Air Field, and later Edwards Air Force Base. Pancho raised alfalfa and sold milk to the base. She also collected its garbage which she fed to her hogs. But she then established the Happy Bottom Riding Club made famous by Yeager in his autobiography and "Young" Tom Wolfe in his book "The Right Stuff." Indeed, at one point the Air Force became so concerned at the condition she returned their test pilots in that it accused her of running a bordello!

Even Yeager broke ribs while riding a motorcycle home one night from "the club." The Air Force finally got rid of her after the club burned down by claiming her land for base expansion.

Pancho, a legend, died following two cancer operations in 1975 in Boron. But she is still fondly remembered. Every year a reunion is held at the club's ruins, marked now only by the shell of a swimming pool. The event is usually billed as a barbecue.

One of those who remembers her fondly is Yeager, now a retired Air Force general.

Much that was salvaged from the fire at the club is kept by her fourth husband, Eugene (Mac) McKendry.

There is often talk of reestablishing the legendary club, but all know it would not be the same without her.

branches stretching from San Diego to Santa Barbara, including one in Downey located inside Albertsons on Firestone Boulevard.

The company has a total personnel complement of 1,100. It is, according to Lopez, the fourth largest credit union in Los Angeles, and the 12th largest in the state.

"Selling my business was a good decision," he says. "Wescom has good, friendly people." He is vice president of Wescom Financial Services in charge of the Downey office. Another financial services arm operates out of Anaheim Hills.

The value of Lopez goes beyond his husbandry of Downey's Wescom Financial Services, which offers a full range of business insurance including workers' compensation, and commercial property, general liability, medical, and life insurance coverage. In his quiet way, Lopez, in the words of an admiring Rotary colleague, "has been doing a lot for the community. His efforts are mostly unnoticed, but he does more good things than most people do. He's a wonderful person."

Modesty aside, Lopez did enumerate some of his community involvements, all current: he is serving on the boards of Downey Family YMCA, the Downey Policemen & Fire Foundation, the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center, Arc of Southeast Los Angeles County, the Parking Place Commission for the city of Downey, DUSD Bond Citizen Committee, and Downey Federal Credit Union.

A past president of Gangs Out of Downey (1999) and the Downey Rotary Club (1994), he remains very active in both associations. Wescom was one of two host sponsors of the recent Arc Walk for Independence. Other Wescom community tie-ups include major support for the Susan G. Komen Foundation 'Race for the (Cancer) Cure'.

His CPA wife, Arlene, a partner at Muller, King, Mathys, Acker & Lopez, also has done her share of volunteer work: she has, for instance, served as president of Soroptimist International of Downey in 1995.

A rabid Angels and Clippers fan, Lopez loves to go to Hawaii and Miami, "for the beach, its warm waters." Older brother Santos, who with his wife Cirila sponsored Lopez to permanently reside in the U.S., have a place in Naples, Florida, but works part-time with him at Wescom Financial Services about 20 hours a week.

Raul's parents and a twin brother have died in Cuba, where the family had a restaurant. He still has uncles, aunts, nephews and nieces living there.

Lopez says one of the riskiest things he has done in his life, over his wife's objections, was jump from a plane at an altitude of 12,500 feet eight years ago above Hemet. "I always wanted to skydive," he says. "So I did. One of my daughters who was studying at UCLA at the time did it, too. There were twenty of us. Now, would I do it again? That's another question."

"I've had a good life in the insurance business," Lopez, 63, says. "It's a tough business and you have to work really hard, especially during the first few years. As long as my health holds up, I'll keep on working. I love what I do."

Despite only "some college" on his resume, by the time Lopez left

Stop the name calling

At April 10th's council meeting, we will be voting whether to put my recommendation of revising term limits on the ballot this November. My position is very simple: Let the people decide what they want. We should-n't limit choice in a democratic society. I also want to be very clear in saying that I do not want to do away with the current term limits. I want to revise the current statute.

When term limits were voted in 15 years ago, it was a very new concept and not very well thought out (it was also done for political purposes back then) because it had no track record. We now know of the gridlock in Sacramento and of how Los Angeles voters last November passed a revision to allow a third term.

A few years ago, Long Beach (which has term limits) residents wanted their mayor, Beverly O'Neil, to continue in office. They actually voted her in as a write-in candidate. Very hard to do but at least their residents had that choice. Downey residents do not have such a choice. We have what I call the "death penalty": Once you serve two terms in Downey, you can never, ever be voted in again.

To me, it does not seem very democratic and basically says that our residents are not smart enough to know who or what they want. All I am asking for is to put it on the ballot and let our citizens decide what they want. It has been over 14 years and times have changed. We now know all about the pros and cons of term limits. Let's vote on it!

My recommendation to the Council is to put the allowance of a third term on the ballot and, after sitting out two years, the citizens of Downey can elect you again if they so choose to. This would get rid of the "death







Parsons Foundation funds symphony concert

DOWNEY – Well, it was another of those interesting mornings at the Civic Theatre a couple weeks ago. Downey's Unified School District, the Downey Symphony and theatre staff joined hands again in a monumental endeavor involving hundreds of school kids and a slew of new challenges.

As if there weren't enough built-in already.

This was the morning for the annual Pied Piper Concerts, when every fifth-grader in the city's elementary schools hears a real orchestra in an emphatically live performance.

Of course, everything was controlled by that tyrant, the clock. First off, a lengthy string of school buses rolled in on the dot and spilled out their loads of excited students, who formed orderly lines in the theatre courtyard, filed into the auditorium, found their seats, listened attentively as the musicians of the orchestra played a 45minute program designed for them, applauded happily in all the right places, and filed out to their buses for the return trip to school.

The whole shebang was then repeated a second time. And a third time, and everything clicked.

Would you like to know how much time passes from the end of one concert to the beginning of the next? The DUSD mastermind, Ana Thorne, says, "Six hundred students out, five hundred in, within eleven minutes."

Piece o' cake.

You need to understand some figures here: each program is played three separate times to accommodate the 1,650 fifthgraders in the city's elementary schools. Each performance, including narration, a soloist and applause, must fill no more than 45 minutes. And most importantly, the morning requires major underwriting to pay the bills.

This year the Ralph M. Parsons Foundation, based in Pasadena, stepped up on the podium to deliver the goods so that this "Music in the Schools" event could happen. The Symphony Board is grateful for the Parsons Foundation's vision and very, very generous financial who had met them for the first time only the previous day for rehearsal. Never wobbling on her stiletto heels, Eimear Noone led the orchestra with clarity and enthusiasm.

In addition, Eimear (pronounced "Eemer") had to introduce works by classical composers so the children would understand what it was all about. Before a section of Moussorgsky's "Pictures at an Exhibition," for example, she encouraged the audience. "Use your imagination to see this old ox cart coming closer and closer...Do you know what an ox is? It's a heavy...hulking...um, COW, pulling a big cart."

The orchestra plays. "Did you picture it?"

"Yes, yes!," the kids shout.

One highlight of the concert was the appearance of solo-violinist Brooke Parker, 17, a senior at Long Beach Poly. Stage lights illuminating her hands, she performed Sarasate's "Gypsy Airs" with thrilling confidence, bow arm flashing up and down, fingers flying.

The kids are swept away.

Eimear asks, "Could you play like that? Ah, some 'yeses' over on this side. You go!"

And then the finale, the conclusion to Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture," which is all thunder and cannons and church bell victory. The late Tom Osborn, long-time conductor of the Downey Symphony, added a brilliant element to the performance of this music for the kids, and they gasped when the wind and brass players from Warren and Downey High Schools joined the orchestra for a true rouser. Applause rocked the walls.

Then it's six hundred out, five hundred in, Rolex style. Shepherding his class to the waiting bus, Matt Boynton, a teacher at Carpenter School, said, "My students really enjoyed the performance, and now some of the girls want to be violinists!" He added that the students "are truly engaged when the Quintet comes to play for us," another outreaching arm of "Music in the Schools." So, one more terrific Pied Piper morning, all challenges met with success - funding, organizing, conducting, playing, connecting with the students. A round of applause to everyone who made it tick.



Security ensures new babies sleep easy

• Family Birth Center at DRMC installs new, upgraded security system.

DOWNEY – An upgraded security system in the Downey Regional Medical Center (DRMC) Family Birth Center provides more information about where the babies are in the unit and what activities may be happening with the babies, allowing staff to respond sooner in case of a problem, the hospital announced this week.

There have been two infant abductions in the U.S. in the last three weeks, one of them only a few miles from DRMC. That abduction was by a family member, while the other, in Texas, was by someone impersonating hospital staff.

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children reports fewer than 12 hospital infant abductions by non-family members annually.

"No matter how small the number, when a kidnapping occurs, the devastation to the family, and to hospital staff, is enormous," stated DRMC Family Birth Center Director Ranie Hamilton. "The number of custodydispute cases is growing, and these babies are at risk for abduction by family members, not by strangers."

While the risk of hospital abduction has dropped, the number of stranger abductions from homes or public places has increased. In part because of that risk, the hospital said, DRMC provides no information to newspapers or websites, including The Downey Patriot, about deliveries.

The hospital recommends that families do not put signs in their yards advertising the birth of a baby, and that they give no information over the phone or in person to strangers purporting to provide free goods or services for newborns.

"Our electronic system is one part of a comprehensive plan to decrease risk for our babies and their families," said Hamilton. "The plan includes intensive training for Family Birth Center and Security staff, as well as 'Code Pink' training and drills housewide.

"In addition to the upgraded infant security system, we have closed circuit cameras. We are a locked unit, so we do not have casual foot traffic through the Family Birth Center, and we have visitor restrictions. We also have specially coded ID badges."

She added, "Even with the most current technology and with trained and aware staff members, good patient education is our best defense against infant abduction. We work to involve our patients and their families in knowing how to keep their babies safe in the Hospital, and after discharge."

An average of 140 babies are born each month in the Family Birth Center.

DOWNEY – National Doctors' Day was observed March 29 at Downey Regional Medical Center (DRMC) with an elegant lunch. Staff, wearing "DRMC Docs are Tops" stickers, served the meal.

"This is a day set aside to let our doctors know how much they are valued and appreciated," said DRMC CEO Allen Korneff. "This community is blessed to have such dedicated physicians taking care of its citizens. Our doctors play a vital role in keeping the community strong and healthy."

Chief Nursing Officer Heather Conwell also lauded Downey's doctors.

"Our docs are highly regarded because every day we see them go above and beyond the call of duty for our patients," she said. "At the drop of a hat they may be called to deliver a baby or operate. Many take emergency calls at all hours, and provide charity care. They work long hours, and commit to maintaining their skills and improving patient safety.

"They have earned our affection and respect through their quest for knowledge, empathy, compassion and clear judgment in moments of grave peril."



A new requirement by the California Department of Education is that parents provide proof of an Oral Health Assessment, which must be completed by a licensed dentist or registered dental health professional. Examinations must have occurred after Sept. 1, 2006.

De La Torre lobbies in Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Assemblymember Hector De La Torre, representing the 50th Assembly District, which includes Downey, returned from a visit to Washington, D.C. last week where he lobbied the Bush Administration and Congress for more federal funds for California and to learn about the status of federal legislation and programs that impact the state.

De La Torre and a bipartisan delegation of more than 30 assembly members were on Capitol Hill March 19-21.

"California deserves to get more resources from Washington. We currently receive only 79 cents for every tax dollar that we send to the federal government," De La Torre said. "After extensive bipartisan lobbying, we expect Congress to listen to California's concerns and anticipate that more of California's federal tax dollars will be actually reinvested in California.

"After speaking to the administration, senators, and representatives, I hope that California's concerns will be addressed. California has been ignored for far too long."

In addition to a meeting with White House officials, the delegation talked with California's two U.S. senators, Dianne Feinstein and Barbara Boxer, and met with the U.S. representatives from California who serve on the House Appropriations Committee, including Lucille Roybal-Allard.

"I was especially interested in addressing federal solutions for healthcare and financial aid assistance that will benefit my constituents in the 50th Assembly District," De La Torre said.

Other meetings included Senator Ted Kennedy on immigration; Rep. Henry Waxman, a senior member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee's Subcommittee on Health; and Rep. Hilda L. Solis.

A HOME away from home

DOWNEY – Patients of all ethnicities, ages and circumstances have been known to travel from all corners of the world to be treated at Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center. And when they arrive, their families have the option of staying at HOME – Housing of Medical Emergencies.

Opened in January of 1998 by the Assistance League of Downey, HOME is a 10-unit apartment complex, which provides temporary, low-cost housing to families who have loved ones undergoing treatment at the medical center, located on the grounds of Rancho.

Low-cost indeed.

Residents of HOME can stay for \$10 a night. Not bad for a unit that includes two twin beds, dresser, night stand, television, telephone, table and chairs. Each unit also has a kitchenette, equipped with a microwave and refrigerator.

And if the family can't afford to pay the daily rent, Assistance League will pick up the tab.

As if that isn't enough, each unit comes with a basket of goodies – cookies, fruit snacks, crackers and instant soup – as well as a hygiene package including shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste, toothbrush and razor.

Laundry and cleaning services come regularly to clean each unit and wash linens and towels. A laundry room is also available to residents.

"HOME aims to provide a place to establish a camaraderie amongst people who share the same problems," said Mary Lou Schmidt, Assistance League of Downey President Elect and earlydevelopment chairman.

All of this is made possible not only because of the support received from the community, but also because of the partnership between Rancho, the Assistance League and Los Angeles County.

"This is a unique partnership," said Schmidt.

The program was originally pioneered by the Assistance League of Santa Clara, who is in partnership with Stanford Medical Center in Palo Alto.

-low served as the local residence for families. After moving in the first family, the program grew immediately, moving in a second family only weeks later. Demand to accommodate families grew so rapidly that the program moved three times over a 12-year span, moving from the one bedroom bungalow, to a three bedroom

house, to five apartments. In 1997, the value of HOME was recognized by the County's Board of Supervisors and the County leased out the land where HOME currently stands. The quest to raise \$750,000 to build and furnish the complex began, hosting numerous fundraisers and accepting generous donations. Major donors include Dr. Mary R. Stauffer, Downey Kiwanis Foundation, Ahmanson Foundation, Downey National Bank, Weingart Foundation, and R.C. Baker Foundation.

After raising all the funds needed and waiting 11 years for building to begin, HOME broke ground on Feb. 6, 1997 and opened less than a year later on Jan. 1, 1998, just walking distance from Rancho.

Since opening, families have come from 24 countries, almost every state in the United States and over 75 California cities outside Los Angeles County.

The complex is maintained by a live-in manager, as well as over 40 volunteers from the Assistance League. The program is financed through rent paid by residents and The facility costs approximately \$2,000 a month to operate due to maintenance and utilities.

HOME pays only \$1 a year for their 66-year lease with the County.

According to Schmidt, residents stay for numerous reasons, whether they are a patient waiting for a mechanical repair on a wheelchair, or a parent of a child in critical condition.

"It really just depends on the situation," said Schmidt. "Sometimes they are here for a year and sometimes they are here for six weeks."

The facility remains full for the majority of each year, with only a room or two being vacant at the same time. And it doesn't matter where you are coming from – you can live at HOME as long as you have a patient at Rancho and you are recommended by the Social Services Department at Rancho.

The availability of on-site housing contributes directly to improved patient care by allowing family members to accompany patients upon admission, be present during surgery, assist in their daily care, and receive training in posthospital care.

"The staff at Rancho tells us that the patient's length of hospitalization is greatly reduced by having their families participate in their treatment," said Schmidt.

More importantly, the emotional support provided by the presence of family members has a direct effect on the patient's ability to participate fully in their rehabilitation program. HOME] has been educational and interesting," said Schmidt. "One thing I enjoyed most in my life is seeing HOME being built."




