The 'sole' of Downey Avenue

■ Downtown Downey shoe store struggles to compete against big-name competitors and everincreasing rent. Still, owner says, it's his store that is keeping him alive.

DOWNEY – Nuzzled between Downey Hair Studios and what is soon to be Cartozian Associates Real Estate, Boone's Shoe Service has served Downey for 27 years, providing repairs, polishing and orthopedic adjustments to local customers.

Boone's owner Berj Haidostian, 72, began his profession 30 years ago with his father in Syria. The two opened their own store, selling hand-made, customized shoes. When they decided to come to the United States in 1980, they found it was too expensive to custom-make shoes in America and quickly went into the repair business.

"When we found out that the owner of Boone's was wanting to retire, we decided to take over and continue with the business," said Haidostian. "It had already been in business for over 25 years."

Haidostian has continued to provide specialty services such as dye jobs (particularly important for brides-to-be), sole and heel repairs, and handbag repairs. And for the most part, American leather has been the primary choice of material due to its softness and flexibility.

But throughout the years, environmental and generational changes have contributed to declining business, according to Haidostian.

"The younger generations buy

- either they're really cheap shoes that aren't worth repairing, or they're really expensive shoes that hardly ever need work," said Haidostian. "And because of recent environmental bans, I am forced to import leather from Mexico, Brazil, Argentina and Italy."

According to Haidostian, many American tanneries have shut down because of water contamination. After taking what they need from animals (cattle, sheep, goats, pigs, etc.) and treating the leather with chemicals, the remnants of the material would be dumped into local rivers, which in turn would contaminate water. Therefore, many tanneries have shut down due to environmental bans.

Corporations and international factories - which benefit from cheap labor - are also a reason behind slow business, said Haidostian.

For Haidostian, married for 44 years and father of four daughters, it's a constant struggle just to make enough income to cover the store's

"In 1980, we paid \$450 a month...now, I pay \$1,800 a month, which is a deal in comparison to my neighbors," said Haidostian. "I'm given a discount because I have been here so long."

The store's appearance confirms just how long it has been there: tattered green-checkered flooring is accompanied by empty shelves (which once displayed a shoes on either end of the spectrum variety of repaired shoes), barren

front windows lead into two sections of brand new shoes for sale, and behind the counter sits numerous tools and machines, as well as a shelf occupied by boots and high heels.

"Those belong to customers who drop off their shoes but never come to pick them up," said Haidostian. "When I do an honest thing and not make them put down a deposit, that's usually when they have a repair done without payment healthy," said Haidostian.

and pick up." Finances have been so tight that

Haidostian can't afford to hire help. "I do the jobs of three people -I do the accounting, cleaning and repairing," said Haidostian. "I just can't afford to have employees."

Money aside, Haidostian finds it unlikely that he would hire people to do his job. "I haven't retired for two reasons – I love what I do and the shop keeps me alive and

Park contract expected to increase \$165K

DOWNEY - The Downey City Council this week was expected to approve a \$165,000 increase in the amount of the contract for construction of an enhanced restroom, concession and storage building at the city's new

The council met Thursday with the Community Development Commission in a joint meeting to be held after this newspaper had gone to

In addition to mens and womens restrooms at the new Downey park, the increase would pay for a concession room with order window and a storage room for park maintenance and operations.

The increase would push the total value of the contract to \$6,309,372. Griffith Company is constructing the park, to be located at 12400 Clark

According to the City of Downey Public Works Department, the city will submit a \$100,000 grant application to the Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space District to help off-set the cost.

Car thieves beware: 'bait' cars hit streets

Downey police begin to use 'bait' cars in effort to curb rising auto thefts in city.

beware: That next car you steal may be hotter than you think.

Downey The Police Department, in coordination with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, started using "bait" cars this week, rigged and fully trackable vehicles used by police to help capture car thieves in a safer and more controlled environment.

The program, not entirely new to Downey but reintroduced because of a surging vehicle theft rate, is officially called the Taskforce for Regional Autotheft Prevention (TRAP). Cars are designed to trap the thieves by locking them inside the vehicles while a kill switch, accessible only by police, shuts off power to the engine and the vehicle rolls slowly

The program is exciting, successful and somewhat controver-

And The Downey Patriot was along for the ride.

TRAP was started in 1993 by the Sheriff's Department. One dollar from every vehicle registration with the DMV goes towards funding the program, which also enjoys generous support from the insurance industry, which has an obvious stake in putting vehicle thieves in jail.

Finding hope in the kindness of others

Tt was 9:30 a.m. and an array of **I**people had already come and gone to donate blood for Alondra Ramos, a fourth-grader at Gallatin Elementary who was diagnosed with Leukemia in January.

The drive was held at Gallatin on Tuesday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., with a variety of donors ranging from school staff members to family and friends of Alondra to many others that saw the flier posted at various locations throughout the city.

Alondra's aunt, Monica Ramos, 33, said the blood drive was her first time donating and that she will continue to donate from this point on to help other people in need.

Ana Hernandez, 49, a friend of the Ramos family, said she has always been a donor, but that Alondra's drive meant saving someone she cared deeply for.

It was evident throughout the morning how many people cared for Alondra.

"We are so happy that we can

help," said Gallatin Principle

Means. think the blood drive is an excellent example of the community here at Gallatin we want to help Alondra and her fam-

Means was originally approached by Maureen Portillo, a member of the school's PTA, about hosting the blood drive.

"I just knew we had to do something to help this family," said Portillo. "And the best thing was to organize a blood drive and educate the students on Leukemia."

The student body at Gallatin not only learned about Leukemia and informed family and friends about the blood drive, but they also

Time Traveler Historic ranch house on Stewart & Gray Rd. By John Adams

 Γ^{ew} realize an old house in the 8700 block of Stewart and Gray Road is so rich in Downey history. It was once the home of the Mussachia Family, pioneers here in

Downey. They first arrived in 1885, and a son, Tony, graduated from Old River School's Class of 1906. He later married a Downey girl, Anna For a wedding gift, the bride's father gave them 20 acres of land, to

which Tony later added 20 more. Those 40 acres of farm land are now the northern portion of Rockwell, bounded by Stewart and Gray to the north, Bellflower to the east and Lakewood to the west.

Tony and Anna had four children, Carl, Frank, Anna Marie and Anthony, all of whom attended Downey High.

During the height of the depression from 1934 to 1938, Mrs. Mussachia opened a restaurant, the Airport Cafe, located where the old Rockwell lobby stands today.

But the land was sold to Vultee Aircraft in 1938. The ranch house was then moved to Stewart and Gray, but had to be moved again when that road was paved through to Lakewood Boulevard. The house still sits in the 8700 block of Stewart and Gray Road today, a monument to the pioneer family which built it.

Meanwhile, the restaurant was moved to Lakewood and Borton Street in Bellflower. Unfortunately, it later burned. The foundation can still be seen next to Frank's TV Shop.

As for the family, Carl worked for Vultee, North American and then Rockwell. Frank ran a parking lot across the street from Vultee from 1937 to 1942. The old lot is now occupied by a rest home.

Frank then entered the Air Force, serving as a turret gunner in B-24 Liberators based both in North Africa and later in Italy. He was even shot down over Yugoslavia at one point, but made his way safely back to allied territory.

When he returned to the U.S., he built Frank's Cafe in 1945. He ran the cafe until 1950. The location is now occupied by a chiropractic office in the 12100 block of Lakewood.

Carl and Frank are retired now, but both can take pride in their family's pioneer history here. The old house is a testimonial to the generations of Mussachias who helped shape Downey.

Citibank to occupy long-vacant building

DOWNEY – The City of Downey will be welcoming the addition of a CitiBank and commercial center on the southwest corner of Firestone Boulevard and Lakewood Boulevard sometime this fall, said William Davis, Downey business development manager.

According to Davis, Citibank has already occupied the property, but abandoned the building over five years ago. An October 2006 Staff Report indicated that the applicant, Citigroup Realty Services, are requesting to change the architecture, exterior building materials, exterior colors and landscaping for the building located at 8764 Firestone Blvd. before reopening.

The applicant is proposing to construct a one-story bank building that will convey a contemporary architectural theme, featuring multiple columns, metal awnings with steel rods and glass storefronts.

"Nineteen feet along the Firestone Boulevard frontage will be dedicated to the City of Downey for future street widening purposes," stated the Staff Report. "An additional six foot dedication will be taken on the Lakewood Boulevard frontage."

The bank will use 6,038 square feet of the 30,465 square foot lot and will have 27 parking spaces.

A new retail center will also be developed just south of the bank, said

An August 2006 Staff Report indicated that the applicant, Cynthia Gomez, is requesting approval for the architecture, exterior building materials, exterior colors and landscaping for a new retail center and restaurant located at 11217 – 11239 Lakewood Blvd.

Gomez is proposing to construct a three-story commercial building on the southern half of the property, which would include retail and restaurant use on the first floor, retail use on the second floor, and offices on the third

This building will also convey a contemporary architectural theme, featuring tall modular walls, multiple columns, arched entryways, a courtyard, a bridge walkway and a Spanish-style roof.


"The plan proposes 196 on-site parking spaces, a total that includes 137 subterranean parking spaces and 59 parking at grade," stated the Staff

The retail center will total 42,591 square feet on a 79,010 square foot lot. Subterranean parking will total 50,233 square feet.

Dry cleaners targeted in series of robberies

■ Pair suspected of robbing three local dry cleaners over two-week period. Police seeks public's help.

DOWNEY - Three separate Downey dry cleaners were robbed over a two-week period, and the Downey Police Department is seeking the public's help in identifying the suspects.

Crown Cleaners at 12621 Paramount Blvd. was robbed March 29, A Martin Cleaners, 9226 Lakewood Blvd., was hit April 6, and the most recent robbery occurred April 11 at Blue Ribbon Cleaners, 8738 Imperial Hwy.

Police suspect two people are responsi-

ble for all three robberies. In each case the suspects entered the store, brandished silver-colored, semi-automatic handguns, and forced the clerks to remove money from the cash register, police said.

In two of the robberies, the suspects also robbed the clerks and customers of their purses, police said.

No one has been hurt in any of the robberies and there is no vehicle description, police said.

The first suspect is described as a black male, 20 to 30 years old, 6' to 6' 3" tall, 200 to 250 pounds, with black hair, brown eyes and sometimes wearing a baseball cap. The second suspect is also described as a black male, 20 to 30 years old, 5'9" to 5'11" tall, 150 to 180 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes.

raised \$2,700 for Alondra with their "Pennies for Patients" fundraiser and have sent encouraging cards and notes to the Ramos family.

Because of Alondra's health, she is no longer able to attend school and instead is tutored by teachers at Gallatin who volunteer their time.

Reggie Donahue, Gallatin resource specialist and member of the San Antonio Guild, whose mission is to "assist the [Children's] Hospital by contribution of service and funds," knew that their organization could make Alondra's education much more accessible.

"We thought, 'this is one of our kids...what can we do to help?"" said Donahue. "So I made some phone calls and within five minutes, the Guild had raised \$700 to purchase a laptop and webcam for Alondra. Now she can interact with her teachers and classmates from home and the hospital."

All this talk about Alondra and her family made me wonder if I would get a chance to meet her.

Then, around 10 o'clock, a soft silence fell upon the room -Alondra and her mother, Monica, had just arrived. Her presence sent chills down my body and I felt my eyes begin to well up.

Alondra looked like any other 10year-old, wearing jeans, tennis shoes, reading glasses, a green sweatshirt, a multi-colored scarf and a white beanie. Although she was wearing a mask to cover her nose and mouth, and her hair was thinning out, it was her eyes that were gleaming with the hope and joy of a young girl.

She wasn't feeling particularly well and had stopped by for a short visit before heading to the Children's Hospital in Hollywood. She greeted everyone – whether she knew them or not – with a hug and a "thank you."

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April 16th

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She made her way towards me gave me a big hug and sat down next to me. She told me that she loved to write and that she just started to learn how to play the piano. She said she wanted to be a nurse when she grew up and that she loves meeting new friends and playing games during her visits at the hospital.

But when asked how she felt about her health condition, she answered in a way I will never for-

"Sometimes I feel scared," Alondra said. "But I see everyone here trying to help me and it gives me hope in getting better."

Seeing Alondra, I'm sure, made the 45-minute donating process seem like a piece of cake to those waiting to donate. Filling out forms and having a needle in your arm for eight to ten minutes was a small price to pay to help a little girl in

The process begins with the signing of medical release forms, which include medical history and permission to take blood. Donors are then given a mini-physical before any blood is taken. During that time, the temperature, blood pressure and iron levels of each donor are determined. If the donor is in healthy condition, they are escorted to the "Maxmobile," a quarter-of-a-billion dollar RV from the Children's Hospital that is equipped with staff and the proper equipment needed to collect blood.

According to Patricia LeBlanc, donor recruiter for Children's Hospital, "Max" was implemented in February as the need for blood kept increasing and the availability of donors was limited.

"The 'Maxmobile' is named after one of our patients from Calabasas that was in constant need of blood, but could never get to the hospital to get it," said LeBlanc. "After he passed away, a

LeBlanc went on to say that the hospital holds four to five blood drives a month, contributing to the 850 units of blood needed by the hospital each month.

"Whatever blood isn't used for a particular patient is used for our Intensive Care Unit," LeBlanc. "We always have a need for blood."

Approximately 75 people were able to donate blood, some taking

As I was getting my 7-year-old ready for school this morning (Wednesday), a car driven by an unlicensed woman crashed into the kitchen of our home.

A chair was thrown 7 feet away and plaster from the wall was found 19 feet away from the point of impact inside the house. A chair that my late grandfather made by hand was destroyed. Plaster and glass everywhere.

This happened at 7:35 am and only by the grace of God was my son not having his breakfast at the kitchen table, for if he had been he could have been killed. I have thanked God many times today for sparing any of us from injury, including the unlicensed driver. The car was greatly damaged, but someone was able to drive it away.

Now my family is faced with months of construction, inconvenience, disruption and added stress all because someone was so irresponsible to allow an unlicensed, untrained driver to drive their vehicle. My son or I could have been severely hurt or killed, but did the driver or the person who came to get her even say to me, "I'm sorry"? No, there was nothing said to me at all. Crash into our house, destroy our property, then they go on their way. Even though a Spanish speaking Police Assistant had to translate for the driver, there was still no attempt to apologize at all. The driver just got a ticket. Big whoop. We get destruction and months of repairs. And, although I'm sure there were witnesses, no one else came forward to speak to Police.

What type of people have the residents of Downey become? I shudder to think

Excessive speed played a major role in this accident – near a school, where and when many children are walking to school. This residential intersection has a four-way stop, however many drivers of all ages and both genders choose to ignore it. Please, for your sake and the sake of others, watch your speed. The speed limit in residential areas is 25 mph, even if it's not posted. Slow down and get to where you're going safely and set good examples for our local youth.

The program is multi-jurisdictional, meaning law enforcement agencies from throughout the state work together, specifically targeting neighborhoods prone to high vehicle theft rates.

TRAP has a small fleet of cars at its disposal, ranging from lowend imports (a popular target because of their ease to steal and interchangeable parts) to high-end trucks and SUVs. Most of the cars are donated or loaned by insurance agencies.

Each vehicle is outfitted with hidden cameras that capture both audio and video and, in addition to the kill switch, a special module that prohibits the vehicle from traveling over a certain speed, usually 35-40 miles per hour.

According Sheriff's to Department Sergeant Tim Glover, who helped coordinate this week's sting in Downey, video taken from the hidden cameras are used as evidence in court. Sometimes, Glover says, the videos capture suspects bragging about other crimes, which can lead to more arrests and more charges.

TRAP has also reportedly been credited with helping capture probation offenders, suspects with "two strikes" on their record and even a high-level Mexican Mafia member.

Many thieves target cars sporting expensive accessories, including tires, wheels and sound systems, says Glover. They steal the car, strip it of anything valuable, and then dump it in South Central Los Angeles or other remote areas.

On Wednesday, more than a dozen police officers and detectives from the Downey Police and Sheriff's Department were working on the TRAP program. The bait was a higher-end SUV equipped with premium wheels.

In the first sting observed by the Patriot, the vehicle was parked in the Best Buy parking lot at Downey Landing. The SUV was left running with the keys in the ignition, idling quietly, in one of the first stalls near the entrance.

Police officers in unmarked cars watched from afar while uniformed police formed a perimeter. Walkie-talkies squawked as two young men walked past the vehicle slowly, eyeing it nonchalantly. They seemed interested (they kept glancing back at the SUV as they walked away) and police said they had been spotted loitering earlier in the day in the Bally's Total Fitness parking lot.

The two didn't take the bait, however, and after 15 minutes police called to move the SUV to a new location.

Next up was the corner of Downey Avenue and Fontana Street, behind the Arco gas station. The bait was parked on Fontana, facing Brookshire Avenue.

Again, the vehicle was left running, keys in the ignition.

It wasn't long before the bait attracted interest. A car full of young men pulled alongside the SUV and idled beside it, surveying the scene. By pure chance a Downey motorcycle officer happened to drive past at that moment and the car drove off.

Still, three young men soon walked from around the corner and hopped inside the bait car.

Literally two minutes had passed since the bait was dropped off and the car had already been stolen.

The SUV proceeded down Fontana while four unmarked police cars scrambled to get behind it. Adrenaline rushed as police officers delivered precise coordinates to their partners and uniformed police on the outside perimeter converged.

Before the suspects could reach the end of the block, a matter of 1015 seconds, two more police officers screeched from around Brookshire, lights and sirens blaring, blocking the suspects.

Nearly a dozen officers pulled and pointed their guns, screaming at the suspects to show their hands and exit the car.

The driver, looking agitated at having a fully-automatic weapon pointed directly at his face, complied. A Hispanic male with a shaved head, late teens to early 20's and sporting a vintage Jerry Rice Raiders jersey, pleaded his case as officers cuffed him. He was simply driving his buddy's car, he said, he didn't steal a thing.

After all, the suspect told police, the keys were in the ignition. How could he have stolen the car when the keys were in the ignition?

Police didn't pay much attention. They were busy extracting the two other scared young suspects, who turned out to be Columbus High School students.

Critics of TRAP claim the program is entrapment. Police, critics say, entice victims by leaving the bait car running in full public view. Parents of juveniles are especially critical of the program as they defend their children, police say.

The police don't dispute they do sometimes leave the car running but they argue that most law-abiding citizens wouldn't hop into a car and drive off, whether it was running or not.

The bait car isn't always left running either; sometimes the car is parked and locked and other times the car is left open but with the key in the ignition.

What's not debatable is the program's success, at least on Wednesday: In less than three hours a total of eight people were arrested for stealing the bait car, including five in a sting near Independence Park.

At 5 p.m. police broke for lunch, a short reprieve before hitting the streets again.

Expert answers to DMV questions

DIRECTOR, CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES

O: I am getting ready to buy a new car. Is there any way to find out how much my registration will cost before my purchase?

A: Yes. The DMV's web site, www.dmv.ca.gov, has a vehicle registration fee calculator feature that can give you that information, as well as other information such as sales tax and vehicle license fees. This is also a place to identify how much of your registration fees you can write off for tax purposes. Just click on the Online Services link and then the Vehicle Registration Fee Calculator. It will prompt you to answer a few questions and give you information based on your answers.

Q: My grandmother recently fell ill and can no longer transport herself around town. I will be her main source of transportation but was wondering if it would be possible to obtain a disabled persons placard for my car?

A: Unfortunately, only people issued disabled placards can use them legally. Although the disabled person does not necessarily have to own or drive the vehicle to use the placard, they must be present when the placard is displayed. If you'd like to have your grandmother apply for a disabled placard, go to www.dmv.ca.gov, click Forms and Most Commonly Used Forms. Once you are there, you will find an Application for Disabled Person Parking Placard or Plates under Plates, Placards, and Stickers. Click to download the form, print it out and mail to the appropriate location listed on the document.

Q: I was involved in a car crash where there was property damage for more than \$800. Do I need to report it to the DMV?

A: Yes. When you're involved in a collision, report it to DMV using the Report of Traffic Accident Occurring in California form located online, under Forms. You or your insurance agent, broker, or legal representative must complete the form and send it to the DMV within 10 days if someone is killed or injured (no matter how minor the injury) or if the property damage is over \$750.

Q: My teenage son is getting ready to start driving and will be taking the driver's training course this summer. Does the DMV provide any material for parents regarding teen driving?

A: Yes. Parents can now go to www.dmv.ca.gov and click on the Publications link to find a "Parent-Teen Training Guide" to use as resource for current traffic laws and other related teen driving information. The DMV also has a teen-specific site designed to provide useful information to teenagers who are gearing up to take their driver's test – both written and behind the wheel. While there, teens can take a sample test, get test tips and even simple ways to save gas.

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All rise for London Steverson, one of Downey's finest citizens

7hen asked what he would like his legacy to be, Judge London L. Steverson, who has been serving as federal administrative law judge with the regional Social Security Administration's Office of Hearings and Appeals located at the corner of Dolan St. and Firestone Blvd. for 18 years, says: "I wish to be remembered for a life of faithful service to humanity."

Judge Steverson is a familiar face in town, especially if one patronizes the Embassy Suites Hotel, which is right across from the Social Security Administration offices. It is a favorite haunt of his. It is at the Embassy Suites where, when he is off duty, one is likely to encounter him, wearing that charismatic smile, his lean 6'3" frame in all likelihood dwarfing everyone he meets.

One of his social strengths is his knowledge of languages. A native of Millington, Tennessee, he can talk fluently in Spanish and German, is adept at conversational French, knows "some Hungarian" (his wife is from Hungary), and is currently studying Mandarin Chinese. He amazes me by his command of Tagalog, the Philippines' national dialect and my native tongue. In fact, in preparing this article, I would couch some of my phrases as a sort of trial balloon, as well as say my felicitations and thank you's, in Tagalog, and he would invariably reply in kind, with perfect diction and intonation, and I have never even once caught him off-guard. (It turns out he has been to the Philippines on a number of occasions, and has lots of friends there, including "a few former girl-

Judge Steverson was a career U.S. Coast Guard officer before becoming a judge, you see, and he has been to many corners of the world, particularly to Antarctica (twice), Eastern Europe, and South America, including Chile, Brazil, Argentina, the Panama Canal (twice) and, of course, especially through his active affiliation with the Sister Cities Association of Downey, Costa Rica and Mexico.

He is as closely identified with his Social Security judgeship as his very active affiliation with Sister Cities, his favorite volunteer gig.

Judge Steverson's reached his present perch as a federal judge adjudicating family law, Social Security, workmen's comp, welfare, widows'/orphans'/infants' insurance/benefits issues and the like, as a result of a combination of talent, opportunity, commitment, discipline and faith.

Born March 13, 1947, he went





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to a segregated elementary school in Tennessee, graduating valedictorian from the all-black Woodstock High School in Memphis. In 1968, as a result of an executive order by President Truman in 1948 desegregating the armed forces and President Kennedy goading the United States Coast Guard Academy particularly to tender appointments to Black high school students (there being no discernible black participation in the services at the time), Judge Steverson became one of the first two African-Americans to graduate from the USCG Academy. He graduated with a BS degree in engineering and was commissioned as a Second-Lieutenant. He was to spend 20 years in the serv-

His first duty assignment out of the Academy was in Antarctic research logistical support, serving as a deck watch officer aboard a Coast Guard cutter, an icebreaker, and as head of the Marine Science Department. This provided him his first taste of responding to another icebreaker's distress call in frigid waters. Subsequent assignments included a duty tour from 1970 to 1972 in Juneau, Alaska as Operations Duty Officer, and leading a search and rescue operation in September, 1971 when an Alaskan Airlines Boeing 727 airline passenger plane bearing 109 passengers went down in drizzling rain and fog on the side of a mountain about five miles from the airport (there were no survivors).

In 1972, Judge Steverson was reassigned from Alaska to Washington, D.C. to become the Chief of the newly-formed Minority Recruiting Section of the USCG, and was charged with working toward desegregating the nearly all-white USCG, starting with the USCG Academy. His intensive efforts resulted in 28 black cadets gaining entrance into the Class of 1977 and again in 1974 when 20 black cadets were admitted as part of the Class of 1978. It was from these cadets that the Coast Guard's first black officers of flag rank were to come in the 1990's, officers such as Admiral Joseph Jones, Admiral Errol Brown and Admiral Manson K. Brown. A parallel function was finding minority college graduates who were willing to receive direct commissions as lawyers and as aviators. This too proved fruitful.



Judge London Steversonspent 20 years in the Coast Guard before pursuing a career in law.

While still in the Coast Guard, in 1974, Judge Steverson entered the National Law Center of George Washington University, graduating in 1977 with a Juris Doctor of Laws degree. William Barry, former Attorney General under President Clinton, was a classmate.

He next worked, from 1979 to 1982, as a Law Specialist in the 12th Coast Guard District Office in San Francisco. As an Assistant U. S. Attorney, he was charged with the collection of civil penalties under the Federal Boating Safety Act, and as Assistant District Legal Officer, he was required to defend as well as prosecute military members who had been charged with violations of the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

From 1982 to 1986, he served as the Chief Marine Investigating Officer for the Marine Inspection Office in Battery Park, New York. The job, he says, was similar to that of a city prosecutor. With a staff of ten investigating officers, he investigated marine disasters for negligence and causes of action. "Any marine personnel found to have violated a marine safety law," in his words, "was charged and tried before a Coast Guard administrative law judge at the World Trade Center, where he worked for two years on the 6th floor. In the case of a major marine disaster with multiple loss of life, a formal Board of Inquiry would be convened under the direction of the National Transportation

He became the Chief of the Investigating Division at the Marine Inspection Office in New York, NY, and in 1986 was detailed to the National Narcotics Border Interdiction System under the Office of the then Vice President George H. W. Bush.

When he retired in June 1988, he became the first black Coast Guard Academy graduate to retire as a regular line officer from the service. He held the rank of Lieutenant-Commander during his last 10 years of service. He says he thinks he knows the reason why he was passed over for promotion five times and did not attain the rank of Commander. He doesn't dwell much on the issue.

He retired to Dumont, New Jersey and practiced law in New York, with a focus on family law and defending Coast Guardsmen accused of federal crimes. He is a member of the New York State, New York City, and Tennessee Bar Associations.

His appointment as a federal administrative law judge by President George W. Bush came in July, 1990. He was assigned here, which forms part of the Ninth Region in California.

Judge Steverson, firm in his belief that law is the "noblest profession one can aspire to," says he harbors "100 percent satisfaction" with his function as judge. Being able to hand down rulings from the bench that affect the fates of thousands makes him feel, humbly, as a "servant of God." He is a member of the Seventh Day Adventists, and as an avid student of Bible history, he sprinkles his comments with Biblical allusions. Crediting Presidents Kennedy ("He was Moses") and Lyndon B. Johnson ("He was Joshua") as the catalysts of the profusion of civil rights legislation that precipitated the civil rights movement in the 1950s, he says he pursued law after he had a dream in which he had "a vision

from God," back when he was serving in 1971 in Juneau, instructing him to become a lawyer.

Another of Judge Steverson's passionate 'loves' is his involvement with the Sister Cities Association of Downey, of which he was president 7 straight years, from 1993 to 2000. He is serving now as its current Secretary. Now down to a membership of 45, it was established by the city of Downey under President Eisenhower's "People to People Program," conceived and initiated in 1956 as a new approach to "securing peace around the world through the establishment of personal peopleto-people friendships between Americans and the peoples of other nations." The way Judge Steverson, displaying his wit and ability to "cut through the crap," says the idea of the program, in simple terms, really, is to "prevent people from killing each other" through friendly relationships and mutually beneficial programs. It was the city of Downey that established the first Sister city affiliation in Mexico, when an affiliation was forged with the city of Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico on Aug. 26, 1960. The cities of San Quintin, Baja California and Alajuela, Costa Rica followed. He says he enjoys the Sister Cities' 'ambassadorial' or diplomatic aspects.

Among the multifarious activities engaged in are student and business information exchanges, as well as art/cultural ones, paramedic/earthquake preparedness training, medical training, donations

of medical equipment and supplies, toy and clothing distribution for underprivileged children, athletic equipment/programs, environmental information exchanges, and so

Judge Steverson has a 2-year old daughter and two grown daughters from a previous marriage. His wife, Sylvia, is also a lawyer. Her latest distinction is as a writer - she has just written a healthy recipe book "Children's Healthy Menu and Recipe Guide," available on www.amazon.com.

His take on Downey? "I think Downey is a small town with a big city's heart," he says. A resident of Downey since 1990, he says it's one of the best cities in which to live. "Everything is here - churches, schools, a good city government, good police, fire, and other public and community services you name it, we've get it here. And it's relatively a safe place in which to raise your kids."

And in addition to traveling, he likes to read (Bible History, European History, World War II, and, of course, Law). He also belongs to the Los Angeles Adventurers Club, The club, he says, looks for "off-the-beaten track high adventure."

With his integrity, his accomplishments and his ongoing service, Judge London Eugene Livingston Steverson, solid citizen of Downey, is, as somebody remarked, "a good man to know."

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
