Rio San Gabriel are champions again

■ Rio San Gabriel remains dominate, breaking two track meet records as it wins its tenth consecutive Carnival of Champions title.

DOWNEY—Overall champions the past 10 consecutive years, powerhouse Rio San Gabriel did it again Saturday, winning the Downey Unified School District's 47th annual Carnival of Champions track and field meet held at Warren High School.

The meet brought together some 400 fourth and fifth grade representatives from nine DUSD elementary schools: Carpenter, Gallatin, Gauldin, Lewis, Old River, Price, Rio Hondo, Rio San Gabriel, and Unsworth.

In winning, Rio San Gabriel, with student Carlo Limatola shooting 36 baskets in a minute, breaking a 26-year record, and its fifth grade girls 440-relay entry breaking a five-year record with a time of 58.8 seconds, gets to keep possession of the champion's trophy for another year.

A third record in the long jump that stood for 29 years was also broken, this one by Gauldin's John Oakamnu, who jumped 7'11-1/2".

The school teams competed in seven events: softball throw, baskets in a minute, standing long jump, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 440-yard relay, and 440-yard co-ed relay. First to fifth place finishers in each event earned 10, 8, 6, 4, and 2 points respectively.

The atmosphere Saturday was electric from the get-go, especially with the introduction of the competing teams in their distinctive colors. With the injection of the Character Counts theme into this year's proceedings, the youngsters took their assigned places in front of the grandstand to the strains of Olympic Fanfare and Chariots of Fire music, with different

Time Traveler Early aircraft tenant of what now is Rockwell

The first aviation tenant of the land we now know as Rockwell International in Downey was EMSCO, a firm which made a name for itself by manufacturing oil field equipment, and which diversified in 1929 by designing a two-place sports airplane.

The first EMSCO (the name stemmed from its founder, E. M. Smith) was built at Long Beach Airport. But the same year EMSCO bought four acres here and built a small aircraft factory and airstrip adjacent to old two-lane Cerritos Road (now Lakewood Boulevard) in Downey.

The second EMSCO aircraft was built at the new Downey plant and flown from the small airstrip that was carved from cow pasture here. Called the Cirrus, the EMSCO plane developed a following when a more powerful version was designed.


The company's third model, the B-3, became popular for long distance flights which were newsgetters of the time. It was described in ads of the time as a "medium priced, eight place, trimotored monoplane. Offers economical transportation, with extreme safety, for corporation executives, transport operators or private owners. Takes off with full load of fuel using any two motors and lands at 50 mph." The plane's most noteworthy long-distance effort was when Don Moyle and Cecil Allen flew from Tokyo to Tacoma, Washington in 1931. That particular B-3 was called "The City of Tacoma II."

Downey Symphony visits Downey schools

DOWNEY - Instrumental students at East Middle School and Downey High School received some first-hand attention from the pros recently, when five musicians from the Downey Symphony visited their campuses with demonstrations, performances, advice and little-known facts.

At East, 300 sixth-graders listened wide-eyed as Pat Maki strolled among them, sending a cascade of brilliant music from her flute. Patricia Massey held her clarinet up high, and Catherine Del Russo her oboe. Detaching reeds from the mouthpieces, each explained how sounds distinctive to their woodwind instruments were produced.

Sprinkled throughout the hour were lively ensemble pieces from the group, Mozart, Verdi, a tango.

Someone asked Duncan Massey how many keys his bassoon has.

"Twenty-three. And our thumbs are always very busy," Duncan answered.

Next, Nathan Campbell stood, cradling his French horn. He sounded a few noble notes, than abandoned its glory for a length of ordinary green garden hose with a kitchen funnel stuffed into one end. He explained that the hose, at 16 feet, equaled the length of the tubing in the horn, and he proceeded to make music through the hose - noises not acceptable in polite society, perhaps, but he did produce a recognizable scale and the

For 14 years the school's band instructor, Andrea Keen commented that it is great the students get to hear live musicians from the Downey Symphony two years in a row.

"Today's performance reinforces what the kids heard at the orchestra's concert for fifth graders last year at the theatre," said Keen.

Her colleague, language arts teacher Susan Richardson, added that Mrs. Keen has 150 band students and, "is a phenomenon – she molds them into artists."

At the close of the session, the kids applauded enthusiastically, and Maki thanked them on behalf of the quintet, complimenting them as an audience

Over at Downey High, the students gathered in the band room had already had a day of classes, but a chance to meet with specialists for an hour of workshop and an hour of master classes was compelling enough to keep them on campus past 4 p.m.

"How many of you have seen us at the junior high?," asked Maki. Many hands waved.

"How many take private lessons?"

One hand.

"Okay. You are going to get some private lessons today," said Maki. "All of us make a living in music and there are many career opportuni-

They play with multiple orchestras, traveling regularly between Santa Barbara and Orange County. Most teach as well, in their studios or colleges. Maki teaches, plays in three symphonies and is a contractor, hiring groups for all occasions. Campbell primarily does theater, Broadway





Moyle and Allen succeeded in the Tokyo-Tacoma hop after another noted flier, Harold Bromley, failed. In fact they did it in his old airplane, which he had discarded in favor of a Lockheed Vega. The Vega made history of its own when it was piloted by Wiley Post and navigator Harold Garry around the world. The Vega, named "Winnie Mae," was hangared for years at the little Downey airstrip adjacent to the EMSCO plant.

The success of the Tokyo-Tacoma flight catapulted EMSCO into the headlines, and the small factory and its engineers undertook a design that (sadly) proved overly ambitious. A long distance aircraft of unusual design, it featured a single engine in a nacelle that also housed the pilot. The tail was supported by two slender booms mounted on a high aspect ratio wing. The Downey "Live Wire" newspaper of Jan. 23, 1930, proclaimed on its front page "America's Greatest Airplane Being Built at Plant in Downey."

It has been written that if wishes were horses then beggars would ride. The plane was destroyed on its maiden flight. Sales of other EMSCO designs (and just about everything else) began to lag due to the Depression and the aircraft plant shut down in 1932.

It's of interest to note that another firm that originally manufactured oil rig equipment had considerably more success in the aircraft industry despite the Depression. Ever hear of Howard Hughes? He started as the Houston based Hughes Oil Tool Co., and parlayed a modest oil fortune into an empire that included Hughes Aircraft, motion picture studios and a good chunk of Las Vegas before his death.


Downey was not rid of EMSCO, despite the closure of the aircraft plant. Far from it. The company had also diversified into the asbestos industry and the manufacture of related products such as brake shoes for cars. That EMSCO Asbestos Co. plant, located adjacent to the railroad tracks on S. Downey Avenue, continued until the city incorporated in 1956. EMSCO had battled long and hard against the city's incorporation. It seemed management feared an incorporated city would be likely to meddle with the firm's labor practices.

Whether such fears were justified or not we will never know, because shortly after incorporation the company made good on its threat and left. Of the old airport which continued in use after EMSCO shut down airplane operations in 1932, there are many colorful stories.

One letter in the files of the Downey Historical Society relates how a somewhat rough gentleman known familiarly as "Joe the Dutchman" grew corn between the runways. Joe became particularly incensed when the help flooded his fields.


When they weren't turning on the water, youngsters used to sneak into the old hangars to get a look at the legendary "Winnie Mae" still kept

There were other famous names which took over the old factory land and airfield later. These included Vultee. But it all began with that oil rig equipment manufacturer and EMSCO. Originally published September 9, 1994

Enough is Enough

I guess I'm lucky, I've never been harassed at work.

Not physically, not verbally and (Lord knows) not sexually. I've been bothered, pestered, aggravated and screamed at, but never on a continual basis. Sometimes dealing with irate customers/clients is part of the job, and you need to learn to let it roll off your shoulders. Like the book says, "don't sweat the small stuff...And it's all small stuff."

shows, L.A. Opera and film studio work.

"Learn to play all kinds of different music for free-lancing," Campbell said. "Learn to read music well."

Maki zeros in on the flutists.

"You must learn piccolo also," Maki said. "It is important to be able to play it well.'

"And be sure to put every extra thing you've done on your college applications," added Maki. "Let's say you want to get into a wonderful college. You're one of four applicants for one opening. You all have the same SAT scores, the same GPAs. But your application includes the fact that you played oboe in high school, and that college orchestra needs wind players. Guess who'll get the letter of acceptance?'

Del Russo and the oboe students go into a practice room for intensive study, Campbell and two or three French horn players to another. Maki has eight flutists in a wide arc around her in the band library. Air in the small room throbs as they concentrate on matching notes.

"Every one of you is playing it right," said Del Russo. "That is so good - I'm thrilled!'

Massey works with a mob of clarinetists in the main room.

"Two feet on the floor, breathe very deep and low, let's hear your scales.'

Ian, the sole bassoon student, lifts the school's bassoon from its locker, he and Duncan assemble the sections, then have a one-on-one lesson. There's no wasted time.

All this comes to the students in both schools through funding from Campus Concerts, a non-profit foundation based in Torrance, which has supported appearance from this quintet in Downey middle schools for seven or eight years.

As the Downey Symphony's Music in the Schools program encourages elementary-age youngsters to learn an instrument, they swell classes such as Keen's in middle school, then feed into Cory Olariu's high school

"This was very fun," said Olariu. "The groups sounded so good. This was awesome."





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A beautiful day

and eating habits.

In researching her platform,
Kari has learned that one in four
college women have eating disorders, 91 percent of college women
have dieted and nine percent of
nine-year-old girls (which is about
the same age as Olive) have experienced purging.

With that being said, she makes it a priority to visit campuses of all academic levels – from grammar school to college – to promote eating disorder awareness and prevention.

"I wanted to be involved with a platform that was personal to me," said Kari. "And because the issue is naturally progressing, it's something that I was willing to pour my time into."

In addition to her platform, Kari has been spending time preparing for the Miss California Pageant, which will be held in June in Fresno. A total of 56 girls are competing for the title.

Kari, 24, has already been Miss Covina 2005 and Miss Northern California Regional 2006, competing both years for Miss California.

Because Miss America Pageant guidelines only allow women between the ages of 17 and 24 to be crowned, this is Kari's third and last year to compete for the title.

For those not familiar with how the pageant works, one cannot compete for Miss America without holding a state title, and one cannot compete for Miss California without a city title.

Unlike the Miss USA Pageant (famously known as Donald Trump's pageant), the Miss America Pageant is a non-profit organization that rewards scholarships to its winners, awarding Miss California \$10,000 and Miss America \$25,000.

Kari said her crownings thus far have helped pay for a huge portion of her college education.

Originally from Oregon, Kari moved to California to attend college in 2001. She graduated from Azusa Pacific University in 2005 with a Bachelor of Arts in Cinema and Broadcast Arts. She is anticipating attending USC this fall to obtain her master's in Strategic Public Relations.

Currently, she resides in San Dimas but commutes daily to her job at the Downey Federal Credit Union, where she's in charge of business development. With her position there, she has served as an Adopt-A-School Liaison, Character Counts Coordinator and participated in many other community activities.

And that's just the beginning of her resume.

Kari has served as Eating Disorder Awareness Week Coordinator, GATE Conference Coordinator, Girls State Chief Justice and Alpha Kappa Psi Master of Rituals. She was the recipient of the American Legion Auxiliary Member of the Year, NCA All-American Cheerleader, Miss California 2005 Academic Achievement Honorable Mention, and was listed in "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."

In addition, she participated in APU's Lambda Pi Eta Communications Honor Society and Alpha Kappa Psi Business Fraternity, obtained an insurance license, developed and implemented an eating disorder awareness program, and budgeted, scheduled and produced an original screenplay titled "Wasted," which is about a young dancer who battles an eating disorder.

As if that is not enough, Kari played for APU's Girls Football Team throughout college and has appeared in an episode of "Boston Legal," where she sat next to William Shatner in a bar.

And she still finds time to workout daily.

Kari is currently training for a half-marathon that she will run this summer and practices her tap dancing every evening. She has been tap dancing since she was nine years old and shares tap as her tal-



ent in pageants.

"The talent portion of any pageant accounts for the highest percentage in the overall score and is the most competitive," said Kari. "Some of these women are professional singers and dancers, so you really have to be good at what you do."

The Miss California Pageant is broken up into five categories of competition, totaling a possible 100 percent: swimsuit (15 percent), evening gown (20 percent), interview (25 percent), talent (35 percent) and on-stage question (five percent).

Kari's favorite part of the competition are the swimsuit and talent rounds. When competing for Miss Hollywood, Kari won the preliminary awards for the swimsuit, evening gown and interview categories – as well as the crown.

But for Kari, participating in pageants is not just about being able to tap and look good in a swimsuit

"When I first starting competing [at 15], it was about winning the crown," said Kari. "And even though I want to be crowned Miss California and Miss America, the experience is more about refining myself and establishing who I am."

If Kari is crowned Miss California, she will spend the first six months training for Miss America and later tour California schools, speaking about her platform

If she is crowned Miss America, the position will be a full-time job with a paid salary, participating in charity events and serving as the Goodwill Ambassador for the Children's Miracle Network, the pageant's national platform.

Until the Miss California Pageant in June, Kari will be performing tap routines and serving as the master of ceremonies for "Relay for Life" in Culver City in two weeks.

Oh, and beauty queens DO eat ice cream – her favorite is Cookie Dough.



Frijoles Rio Grande

(Makes 12 servings)

- 1 pound dry pinto, red or kidney beans
- 6 cups water
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 tsp. dried oregano, crushed
- 1 tsp. dried marjoram, crushed
- 1 tsp. pepper
- ½ tsp. ground ginger
- 1 pound ground beef
- 4 stalks celery, sliced
- 4 carrots, sliced
- 1 green bell pepper, seeded and chopped • 2 dry or fresh hot chili peppers (optional)
- 2 cups dry red wine
- Wash and sort beans. Combine beans and water in large saucepan. Boil for 2 minutes.

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South of the Border Combo

(Makes 4 servings. Pressure saucepan method.) Follow manufacturer's directions for pressure saucepan.

- 8 pieces chicken, skinned (optional: 4 pork chops or 1 pound round steak, cut in 4 pieces)
- 1 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- 1 cup uncooked long grain rice
- 2 carrots, sliced
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 can (4 ounces) diced green chilies
- 1 can (16 ounces) stewed tomatoes
- ½ cup water
- Seasoned pepper
- In pressure saucepan, brown chicken or meat in oil. Remove meat
- 2 Add rice, stirring constantly until browned.
- 3 Stir in vegetables, chilies, tomatoes and water. Place chicken on top of this mixture and sprinkle with pepper.
- Cover and bring pressure to 15 pounds on high heat. Reduce heat and cook 8 minutes. Remove from heat and allow pressure to drop normally.

<u>De Luz Avocado Dip</u>

(Makes 3 cups)

- 2 ripe avocados, peeled
- 1 cup (8 ounces) sour cream
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- ½ cup finely chopped parsley
- ½ cup finely chopped green onion tops • 2 Tbsp. finely chopped cilantro (optional)
- 1 tsp. seasoned salt
- ½ tsp. lemon pepper or black pepper
- In medium bowl, mash avocado.

2 Add sour cream, mayonnaise, lemon juice, parsley, onion, cilantro, salt and pepper. Beat thoroughly with electric mixer.

3 Cover container; chill at least 1 hour to blend flavors.

4 Serve with chips or raw vegetables. Keeps several hours without darkening.

- On a counter or table, place plates, forks and napkins.
- Place corn chips in a napkin-lined basket.
- Place meat sauce in keep-warm serving container with ladle or large
- Arrange all the topping containers in order listed with an appropriate serving utensil.
- Guests serve themselves the chips first, then the meat sauce and pile on their choice of toppings.



For those who have never attended the Festival, it is a weekend packed with literature and entertainment. And if you're lucky, you may have a dream or two come


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


Howard Dougherty was an aerospace technician

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
