Free flu shots offered at local fire stations

■ People of all ages are invited to get their immunizations tomorrow at Fire Stations 1 and 2.

DOWNEY – The Downey Fire Department will be administering free flu shots tomorrow, Dec. 1, at two local fire stations, a preventative health measure as flu season approaches.

The Fire Department is specifically targeting children ages 2 to 8, although people of all ages are welcome to receive an immunization, according to Fire Chief Mark Sauter.

Flu shots will be available from 9 a.m. to noon at Fire Stations 1 and 2, located at 12222 Paramount Blvd. and 9556 Imperial Hwy, respectively.

The immunizations are a collaborative effort between the Downey Fire Department, Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, the City of Downey, and Downey Regional Medical Center (DRMC).

The flu accounts for more than 200,000 hospitalizations and 36,000 deaths each year, according to public health officials.

"Each year thousands of Downey residents are impacted by the complications caused by the influenza virus," said Sauter, who added that he received his own flu shot two weeks ago. "The young and the old are the most vulnerable populations. However, community members of all ages are at risk."

Officials also said they hope to reduce the call-load at DRMC, which has significantly increased since the closure of Martin Luther King Jr.-Harbor Hospital.

Influenza (flu) is a contagious disease that typically lasts only a few days, according to DRMC. Its symptoms can include fever, cough, sore throat, headache, chills, muscle aches and fatigue.

In some cases, the flu can lead to pneumonia and can pose a danger to people with heart or breathing conditions.

Children ages 9 and under will receive a free gift Saturday when they receive a flu shot, while supplies last. People with allergies to eggs, or who have an otherwise serious illness, are asked to see their doctor before receiving an immunization.

Credit union donates thousands to DUSD

■ Donation will be divied up between 31 local teachers and staff, who already have plans for its use.

DOWNEY—Thirty-one winners of the sixth annual Student Enrichment Grant Program drawn from 85 entries representing, with one exception, Downey Unified School District teachers and non-teaching staff were each presented with a \$200 check Tuesday, to be used mainly for enriching their students' classroom learning experiences.

The \$6,200 total was donated by longtime education ally Downey Federal Credit Union (DFCU). There was one winner this year from out of the DUSD fold, a teacher from Our Lady of Perpetual Help School.

The participants were encouraged to submit their ideas on how they would utilize the prize money. The winning student enrichment uses ranged from taking students from low-income families to see a live stage show (submitted by Williams' Barbara Stapp) to the purchase of a digital camera for a class project (by Griffiths' Duen Rou Chen and Unsworth's Nora Ortiz) to the purchase of a life-size skeleton for use in art classes on bow the bone structure works (Warren's William Russell) and a model of the human body for learning organs and life science (West Middle's Alyda

A few said they would use the money for special math programs for the kids, while others eyed field trips to museums, libraries, and science centers. An entry (Rio San Gabriel's Samantha Martin) would channel the money to buy landscaping materials for growing grass and a garden at her school, another (West Middle's Deanna McConnell) would get a projection machine to teach her disabled students "on a visual basis," while still another (Ward's April Okimoto) is bent on purchasing eggs or caterpillars for her "lifecycle" science projects, and yet another (Downey High's Tina

Sidi plays his way into Honorary Marshal

 Storied parade has been an annual Downey tradition since its inception in 1951.

DOWNEY – In 1951, a group by the name of the Downtown Merchants Association began an annual tradition known to Downey as the Holiday Lane Parade. A few years later, the Downey Lions Club took over and for over 30 years, produced the parade. In 1986, the Lions Club resigned from parade responsibilities and the Downey Chamber of Commerce picked up the reigns and carried on with parade tradition.

Since the Chamber took over, the parade has hosted a plethora of Grand Marshals and Honorary Marshals.

"I choose parade marshals based on the people I read about in our local paper," said Parade Chairman Maria Larkin, TGIF Travel & Real Estate. "Those chosen are people that have impacted our community

in one way or another." This year the Holiday Lane Parade Committee has appointed

Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard as Grand Marshal and Sebastian Sidi as Honorary Marshal.

Roybal-Allard, California's 34th Congressional District representative, has served three years in the California State Assembly and became the first Mexican-American woman elected to Congress in 1992.

DOWNEY – At the Downey Chamber of Commerce's 56th Annual Holiday Lane Parade, local talent Sebastian Sidi will take the reigns as Honorary Marshal, a first for the musician.

"I was very flattered when I was asked to participate in the parade," said Sebastian, a 17-year Downey resident. "To be honest, I was shocked that they chose me of all people."

Sebastian may be shocked at the picking, but anyone that has ever heard his music or seen him perform knows that he is deserving of the position. In fact, some may even wonder why it's taken so long for him to have been chosen.

Sebastian, 32, has been in love with music since he was 12 years old, when he taught himself how to play the drums. In addition to the drums, he can also play guitar, bass, piano and percussion, all of which he learned on his own. Although he does not sing, Sebastian creates instrumental compositions that contain - what is best described as - Latin, rock, classical, tango and New Age sounds.

His professional career began eight years ago, establishing Sidi Music Records and releasing four albums: "Prelude" (1999); "Electrified" (2000); "Passion" (2002); and "Desperate Journey" (2005). Collectively, the albums have sold over 150,000 copies, Sebastian said.

He has performed at many Southern California venues including Universal City Walk, Downtown Disney, Irvine Spectrum, The Block at Orange, Citadel Shopping Center, Fashion Island, Horton Plaza, Orange County Market Place, and Long Beach Shoreline Village, to name a few.

However, Sebastian favors theater performances, where he can produce and present concerts that are complemented by a full band, lights, props, cameras, dancers, singers, big screens, and a full audience.

In March of next year, Sebastian will be granted the opportunity to film a concert in similar circumstances for his first PBS special. He will be working alongside 12-time Emmy Award winner and producer George Veras, who has produced numerous PBS specials including Doo-Wop 50, the biggest fund raising music special in the history of PBS.

"I can't wait to perform for PBS - it's the perfect avenue to get my career launched," said Sebastian, adding that the concert will air in June 2008. "And we all benefit from the pledges that the program receives."

NASA site revitalization nets city Phoenix Award

DOWNEY – The city of Downey has been honored for their redevelopment of the former NASA property with the 2007 Phoenix Award, a "prestigious environmental award (that) honors individuals and groups who are working to solve the critical environmental issue of transforming abandoned industrial areas into productive new uses."

Downey, along with their application partners, NASA, United States General Services Administration, and International Risk Group (managers of Downey Studios), won for the revitalization project, "Former NASA/Downey Industrial Plant Project."

"We are proud to honor your group who, with all its hard work, used innovative and creative techniques to revitalize blighted, contaminated lands to a productive new use," the Phoenix Awards Executive Committee wrote in a letter congratulating the City.

The committee went on to praise the project as, "an excellent model for other communities and groups to replicate." As a 2007 Region 9, which includes Arizona, California, Hawaii, Nevada, and the Pacific Islands, Phoenix Award winner, the city of Downey will be honored, along with the other nine regional recipients, at the National Brownfield's Conference, "Brownfield's 2008," to be held in Detroit in May 2008.

Additional recognition may be forthcoming, as three of the 10 regional award recipients will be recognized with the "Community Impact Award," "UST Award," and the "People's Choice Award."

"The City is extremely honored to have been chosen for this prestigious award," said Mayor Rick Trejo after learning of the final selection. "Many individuals at all levels of government are to be congratulated for the success of this project. I want to thank everyone who participated in this project for turning what could have been a potential eyesore into a thriving economic center in the heart of Downey."

The former NASA plant, which produced the nation's Apollo capsules and space shuttles, has been transformed into a state-of-the-art medical facility complex, movie studio and bustling retail center. Named Downey Landing, the site features a \$500 million Kaiser Permanente hospital facility; a commercial retail center occupying 34 acres; a renovated film studio with over 1 million square feet of studio space; a 13-acre public park; and the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center, which will honor the legacy of America's space program through interactive science programs.

The Phoenix Award was created in 1997.

New fire safety rules in the works

DOWNEY—The City Council Tuesday introduced an ordinance, which will be discussed in a public hearing on Dec. 11, mostly updating the current Fire Code, save for seven new guidelines in the interest of fire safety and life-safety requirements for the city.

All of this is in consonance with the 2007 California Fire Code (CFC), which prescribes the minimum fire and life-safety requirements in the state. It is based on the 2006 International Building Code (IBC) and the International Fire Code (IFC).

The state recognizes the importance of local control and local fire issues by giving the communities latitude to set their own codes, based on certain community criteria. Downey has maintained a local code (incorporated in the Downey Municipal Code) for over 30 years. During this time, amendments have of course been made.

Some provisions will be eliminated this time because they are already covered by CFC, and some are updates. The significant new sections proposed by the Downey Fire Department include: 1) designation of fire lanes by the use of signs, red curbs, roadway striping or any combination of the above; 2) the 'electronization' of the submission of building plans, as this would give operational advantages in times of emergency; 3) requirements for limiting the area of construction during development; 4) building construction requirements to ensure adequate reception/transmission of radio communications; 5) recreational fire requirements; 6) special requirements for a vacant building property; and 7) public fireworks display requirements.

Certain provision updates, such as fire sprinkler requirements and automatic fire extinguishing systems, are deemed urgent.

In other action, the Council:

•Approved the appropriation of \$24,353.14 for two cameras and a computer server associated with the City Council/Community Development Commission broadcasting project;

•Awarded a cash contract in the amount of \$1,988,635.05 to Palp, Inc. dba Excel Paving Company, for Phase 2 of the Lakewood Blvd. Improvements Project; said Phase 2 is the third segment in the multiphased construction project along Lakewood Blvd., which covers the segment from Dalen St. to Gardendale St.; previously completed segments are those between Bellflower Blvd. and Meadow Road, and between Fifth St. and Bellflower Blvd.; these improvements are all aimed at promoting orderly traffic flow, enhancing pedestrian and traffic safety, as well as beautifying the Lakewood Blvd. corridor;

•Approved the use of fire stations as flu-shot centers;

•Adopted a resolution approving the submittal to Caltrans, with administers the state-funded program, of the "Woodruff Ave. at Via Amorita Pedestrian Traffic Signal" and the "Blodgett Ave. Pedestrian Improvements" applications, designed to help K-8 schoolchildren negotiate safe routes to school;

•Set public hearing for Dec.11 for extension of the moratorium on development of the property at 7447 Firestone Blvd., commonly known as Johnie's Broiler;

•Presented pins to Mr. Downey and Little Mr. Downey, and their

•Heard a presentation by the Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation of a Citation Award to Kevin Ellis, Community Services Department recreation supervisor, and the Golden Shield Award to the city of Downey.

This was the last Council meeting presided by incumbent mayor Rick Trejo. The Mayoral Transition ceremony, in which the gavel passes from Trejo to Mayor Pro Tem Dave Gafin, takes place on Wednesday, Dec. 5 at 6:30 p.m. The next regular public meeting of the City Council will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 11 at City Hall, 11111 Brookshire Ave., Downey.



Advanced math class equals success for bright students

■ Eighth graders are conquering an advance geometry course in early preparation for high school.

DOWNEY – It's no wonder why West Middle School is one of California's Distinguished Schools – they are the only Downey Unified School District middle school to offer a high Honors Geometry school course.

The class, offered only to eighth grade students who excel in math and are involved with GATE, AVID and/or additional honors courses, allows the students to enter high school as Algebra II students. On average, students do not take Algebra II until their sophomore or junior year of high school.

Prior to the class being offered, students could only advance as far as Honors Algebra. If a student took Honors Algebra while in the seventh grade, they would have to retake the class while in eighth grade because a mathematics course must be taken every year and Geometry was not offered.

"We just had too many students last year that stood out in our Honors Algebra classes," said Carolyn Katsufrakis, West Middle School's Honors Geometry teacher. "We didn't think it was right to make them take Honors Algebra again when they had so much potential, so we decided to challenge our students and adopt the same Geometry program implemented at Warren High School."

Katsufrakis works closely with Warren's math department,

using the same textbooks, tests and curriculum as Warren's Honors Geometry classes.

"We wanted to make sure the students were getting a real taste of high school Geometry," said Katsufrakis, a West Middle School teacher for 15 years. "And even though it's a difficult class, every student is very bright and it's a pleasure to work with such talented minds.

"We would love to see this program continue year after year and could only hope that the other middle schools would jump onboard."

As far as the students are concerned, they have mixed feelings on the course.

"It's not easy, but it's great to take this class in the eighth grade because it gives us a head start," said Mathew Johnson. "It gives us a preview of high school and what it takes to get good grades."

The majority of the students agreed that the only downfall to the course is that if you don't get a "C" or higher, you must retake

"It's hard not to worry about failing," said Lauren Ross. "The last thing we want is to have to retake this class after we've put so much hard work into it."

And when asked if he would recommend the course to future eighth graders, Isaac Manriquez said, "Only if the person likes to be challenged and can handle a lot of homework."



The Los Angeles Chapter has a Catastrophic Disaster Plan to increase the number of trained volunteers and equipment necessary for disasters in the Los Angeles Area. An orientation will be available at the American Red Cross East Los Angeles Service Center on Dec. 18 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. The Center is located at 2227 S. Atlantic Blvd.

Disaster can come in many forms – fires, earthquakes, floods and man-made incidents of destruction. American Red Cross estimates that nearly a quarter of a million people will be left without shelter in the aftermath of a major 7.8 magnitude earthquake centered near the greater Los Angeles area. The American Red Cross of Greater Los Angeles will need to be able to care for the immediate needs of these people for approximately seven days before additional resources and assistance will be brought into the area.

The American Red Cross of Greater Los Angeles has begun to strategically place shelter resources in the greater Los Angeles area, including cots, blankets, food and water supplies. The Chapter is also working with key partners such as the City of Los Angeles to train thousands of employees to serve as Disaster Service Workers in the wake of such an event. In addition, recruitment of individual citizens to serve as volunteers has been stepped up.



Is your Medicare drug plan naughty or nice?

he holidays are here again. That means it's time for decorations, gifts, family, friends and food. But during all the celebrating, seniors enrolled in Medicare Part D should carve out time to consider whether they want to stay with their current prescription drug plan.

At the end of each year, from Nov. 15 through Dec. 31, Medicare Part D provides seniors with an open enrollment period, an easy and convenient way to switch plans – or sign up for the first time.

Thanks to the plan's unique design, seniors can choose from a variety of plans offered by private insurers. Unlike traditional government programs, where there's just one plan for everyone, Medicare Part D is structured so that insurance companies must compete for customers. Consequently, prices have stayed relatively low while coverage options have flourished.

In fact, some plans cost just a few dollars a month.

That's why more seniors than ever before have prescription drug coverage. This past year, Medicare Part D provided benefits to almost 24 million people. Meanwhile, polls have indicated that most seniors are happy with their coverage.

This isn't to say the program has no pitfalls.

Many plans don't cover every brand-name drug, so members might have to take a generic medication instead of the brand they were using prior to signing up for Part D. Furthermore, for brand-name drugs that still are under patent protection, a generic version won't even exist. To access these treatments, members might have to pay more out of their own pocket. Or they might have no choice but to take an alternative drug.

So be sure to go over the options carefully, as different plans cover different drugs. And the drugs covered by each plan may change from year to year.

Other problems with Part D include the dreaded "doughnut hole," or the gap in coverage between moderate and high drug expenses. By making smart, informed choices, however, seniors can often avoid

the hole. In California, for example, Part D enrollees can choose between 14 different plans that offer coverage within the gap. These plans often lowers costs by promoting generics, but at least one of them still covers brand-name drugs.

And paying for the drugs need not be a problem either. All the major drug companies have set up patient assistance programs for seniors who need a little extra help paying the bills, even if they don't qualify for

Eligibility and application procedures vary by company and drug, but doctors can assist patients with understanding how these programs work.

Everyone who uses Medicare should also consider a Medicare Advantage program. About 20 percent of Medicare enrollees currently utilize an Advantage plan, most of which offer "coordinated care" by covering Medicare Parts A, B, and D.

These plans work through private insurance companies in order to combine medical and drug coverage, doing away with the need to deal with separate providers.

The Medicare prescription drug benefit works because it utilizes the choice and flexibility that comes from the private sector.

At the same time, Part D makes purchasing prescription medications safer, freeing seniors from the scary prospect of going online in search of cheap drugs from foreign distributors. With 10 percent of the world's prescription drug supply now estimated to be counterfeit, it's extremely dangerous to purchase medicine from fly-by-night Internet pharmacies.

All those seeking drug coverage have a multitude of options to choose from, so there's no reason to stick with a disappoint plan. Meanwhile, anyone who isn't covered should take this opportunity to sign up. With all the options that are available, there's a plan that's right for everyone. Now's the time to find it.



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Runners sprint towards Junior Olympics

■ Three Warren High School runners have qualified to compete at the Junior Olympic Cross Country Championships on Dec. 8. Unfortunately, the high cost of travel is proving to be a burden.

DOWNEY - Following a successful cross country season at Warren High School, runners Chris Enriquez, Dani Moreno and Mario Castillo will bring fierce competition to the 2007 USATF (USA Track & Field) National Junior Olympic Cross Country Championships in Lawrence, Kans. on Dec. 8.

The runners will attend the Championships as representatives of The Equalizers Track Club, a youth distance-running organization that trains for and competes in track, cross country and road racing. The club was created in 1986 and welcomes athletes under the age of 19 who are interested in long-distance running, regardless of capability and experience.

In order to qualify for the Championships, all three runners had to compete and advance through the Association (Southern California) and Regional (Southern California, Arizona, Nevada and Hawaii) levels.

The final level, the Championships, consists of 15 regions, with each region bringing at least 25 athletes to compete. The Championships are then broken up into six levels of competition, which are decided upon by

Enriquez, a freshman, will be attending the Championships for the first time, competing in the Youth Boys 4 km.

"I'm really looking forward to it," said Enriquez, who currently holds Warren's school record for Boys Frosh Cross Country. "It's my first national competition and I'm honored to be a part of it."

Dani Moreno, a sophomore, will be attending the Championships for a third time. She will be competing in the Intermediate Girls 5 km.

"I have gained a lot of experience from the Championships," said Moreno, who currently holds Warren's record for Girls Frosh Cross Country and one- and two-mile Girls Frosh Track. "I have met a lot of people from different states and it's a great way to get your name out there, especially if college scouts are there.'

Moreno also received numerous letters from UCLA; UC Santa Barbara; Fresno State; and Pepperdine during last year's cross-country season, all schools showing interest in her athleticism.

Castillo, a junior, will be attending the Championships for the first time as well, competing in the Intermediate Boys 5 km.


"I'm really excited to be able to race," said Castillo, who currently holds Warren's record for two-mile Boys Frosh Track. "I was out during our regular [high school] season because of injuries and I'm so glad I have this chance to compete.'

Although excited to attend the Championships, all three runners agreed that the only downfall is the cost. Each athlete is responsible for their own airfare, hotel, and food expenses. The high cost forces many of the athletes to travel solo, leaving families behind.

What makes this even more interesting is that it has been at least 15 or more years since those two teams have met in the finals for football.


I'm willing to bet it's been longer than 15 years as Gahr's football tradition hasn't exactly been of the winning sort. For a while they were almost a nomad team. They played in no specific league for a couple years before returning back to the SGVL.

But this column isn't about the two SGVL teams still in the playoffs. This column is about the two teams that aren't. As they say, hindsight is 20-20 and there has to be a few opportunities that Warren and Downey are regretting they didn't take advantage of.

Warren has to be kicking themselves right now over the game at Gahr earlier this season. In a very winnable game, Warren's normally reliable defense tripped and stumbled their way to a 36-24 loss to Corey Nielsen and the Gladiators.

The next day's Press-Telegram headline read "Gahr's Nielsen ratings go up." Nielsen, the area's top passer, had a fantastic night statistically. The dirty truth is it's not hard to have that type of night with receivers wide

Roybal-Allard named Parade Marshal

DOWNEY – Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard has been named Parade Marshal for the Downey Chamber of Commerce's 56th annual Holiday Lane Parade.

Roybal-Allard, the representative for California's 34th Congressional District, served three terms in the California State Assembly, becoming the first Mexican-American woman elected to Congress in 1992.

She was also the first Latina in U.S. history when she was appointed to the House Appropriations Committee in 1999.

Roybal-Allard currently serves on three subcommittees. On the Labor, Health and Human Services and Education Subcommittee, she oversees funding for public schools, workforce training programs, health research and preventative health programs. On the Homeland Security Subcommittee, the congresswoman oversees funding for immigration processing, border and port security, and a wide variety of emergency preparedness efforts, including providing training and equipment to police and firefighters. On the Transportation, Housing and Urban Development and Related Agencies Subcommittee, Roybal-Allard oversees federal funding for critical federal transportation projects, including improvements to the region's bus systems, railroads and freeways, as well as federal housing initiatives to increase homeownership, support community development and increase access to affordable housing.

Since 2002, when she first began to represent Downey, Roybal-Allard has successfully secured federal funds for important community projects in Downey, including Gangs Out of Downey's 10-20 Club. She also secured \$500,000 for a coalition of cities, including Downey, to participate in an innovative study to address storm water runoff pollution into the Los

Roybal-Allard was instrumental in facilitating the conclusion of the NASA land transfer to the city of Downey. In October 2004, the congresswoman ushered through Congress a measure she authored to name the

planned space science learning center in honor of the Columbia Space Shuttle and crew. One year later, she secured \$1 million for Downey to house a model replica of a mock space shuttle as a scientific exhibit in the Columbia Memorial Space Science Learning Center.

The congresswoman also secured approximately \$6 million to upgrade traffic signals and make major road and intersection improvements in the

Knabe was fire elected to the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors in 1996, winning reelection in 2000 and 2004.

He represents the Fourth District, a uniquely diverse area that is home to over 2 million residents and includes the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach, and Los Angeles International Airport.

Following the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, Knabe was appointed by the White House as a member of the State and Local Officials Senior Advisory Committee to the President's Homeland Security Advisory Council. He was the only appointee from the State of California.

In 2006, he was appointed to the California Emergency Council by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger

Knabe was elected to the Cerritos City Council in 1980 and served as a councilman for eight years, including two terms as mayor. He was a leader in the development and implementation of Cerritos' General Plan.

Knabe and his wife, Julie, have been married for 39 years and have two sons, Curt and Matt.

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





Kiwanis learns ups, downs of conducting

DOWNEY - Have you ever watched a symphony conductor and thought, "I can do that – up and down, back and forth...simple"? Meet Sharon Lavery, professor at the University of Southern California and conductor of the USC Thornton Symphony Orchestra, is the one that makes it look simple.

Lavery comes to Downey by way of Ossining, NY - infamous for Sing Sing Prison – Michigan State where she earned her bachelor's degree in music education, and for whom she marched in the 1988 Rose Parade, and the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, earning her master's of music degree in clarinet performance.

The journey brought Lavery to USC where music studies took her to a senior course in conducting – and her passion. Conducting, however, would have to wait.

Shortly after the USC graduation ceremonies, her father said, "it's time to get a job." Sharon headed back East to teach music in the public school system in Melville, Mass. Here, the summers can be long, so Lavery followed her passion, attending conductor workshops for five years, after which she headed back to USC to earn her master's degree in orchestral conducting.

Conducting – you really want to know how? Here's a little history first so you appreciate Lavery's talent: It is the year 1640, a time when the conductor was more like a mechanical metronome, with a piece of metal strapped to his shoe to literally bang out the beat. A few decades later, conductors began using a long wooden staff to bang the floor. Watch your toes! Bang hard enough and you could loose a few. After one conductor died from an infection, the staff became a small stick, or a rolled sheath of papers, or just hands waving about. In fact, the conductor's position was taken as so unnecessary that the lead violinist would often conduct when not playing.

In the 1800's, chamber orchestra music is in vogue and there are more participating musicians. It is realized a conductor is necessary in order for the musicians to focus on the performance.

Music conducting was transformed when Wagner, one of the first to use the modern baton, changed perceptions by interpreting the music as he envisioned the composer intended the piece to be performed. What a concept – actually read the score and figure out what the composer was trying to convey.

Now the conductors' job was to convey this "interpretation" to the musicians by way of physical gestures that could be followed - hand movements, body inflections, head nods and eye contact. While the right arm/hand controls the tempo, the left controls the volume and it's these physical gestures that bring life to the music.

open all the time as they were that game.

What a dagger that must have been to Warren's championship hopes. Not only that, the loss inevitably determined who would take the No. 2 seed in the playoffs for their league.



But we're sure that both teams are being as well behaved as possible hoping that Santa will put a second chance for the 2007 season under their




